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A highly endangered species of plant found only on 29 hectares at North Rothbury has been successfully propagated by the NSW Royal Botanic Gardens North Rothbury Persoonia Conservation Program. The species, unknown to the public 15 years ago, was centre stage in the opposition to the proposed Huntlee 'new town development by 'The Greens'

The Greens' suggested that the species was unable to be propagated and that once it's natural habitat was gone it would become extinct. When development approval was finally given a condition of consent was that the developers provide an environment within the development to protect the species.

Project director Stephen Thompson said LWP Property Group has undertaken a 10year action plan to protect and conserve the plant.

"We've been liaising with the Royal Botanic Gardens about some translocation programs that will ensure the future survival of the persoonia," he

'We also have a 'Persoonia Park' that we have set aside to keep some of those persoonias safe in perpetuity.

"We have also dedicated 750 hectares of land, right here in Huntlee, for conservation." Mr Thompson said the developer is also working closely with the Royal Botanic Gardens.

"The management plan really lasts forever, but we have an

obligation to implement for at least 10 years, so that is part of the process," he said. As part of the ongoing translocation process Persoonia, known as Geebungs in eastern

Australia, are notoriously difficult to grow and many are rare or endangered. Several species also have potential for horticultural development. At the Australian Plant-

Bank, they are focusing on the reproductive biology of eastern Australian Persoonias by developing techniques to improve germination success. Plants are also being propagated from cuttings and tissue culture as an alternative to seed germination. Staff at the Australian Botanic Garden Mount Annan have recently discovered a Bowerbird that has been sneaking into the nursery and eating the fruit from plants of the Persoonia pauciflora. Having been unable to find the culprit for the last year, staff finally got lucky and

Botanic Garden are currently investigating factors, including climate and pollination that may influence the production of viable seeds in a number of Persoonia species. From the perspective of the research program, the Bowerbird can be seen as a nuisance because they are using this seed for scientific experiments. Yet it offers a unique insight into the mutual relationship between plant and animal. Fruit predation by animals has been documented throughout the plant kingdom. For Persoonia, there remains uncertainty surrounding the amount of fruit from a given species that is consumed by animals over one season. Does the consumption of fruit by birds and other animals lead to viable seeds that are more likely to germinate as they are encased in a nutrient-rich substrate in their scats? Given the North Rothbury Persoonia are currently only found in an area covering a mere 29 hectares, a relationship such as the one caught on camera could help ensure that the species recruits at a level that maintains current population numbers, or



of its distribution. Indeed, Bowerbirds are well know known to co-habit the same area in North Rothbury (we have one male who has lived in our garden for the past 4 years with his 'bower', anything purple & his 3 lady bower bird friends).



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

It went on to say approximately 96 per cent of those losses were recovered as many customers successfully disputed transactions and had fraudulent charges reimbursed.

This is done through a chargeback process, and if your business has not taken the right steps to validate a transaction you could find yourself out of pocket. If a cardholder does not recognise or agree with a transaction, they can report it to their bank.

The bank will investigate and if it is found the merchant or business who charged the transaction cannot provide enough evidence to support the charge, the cardholder will be reimbursed and the bank can issue a chargeback to the





When your pet is out and about you are responsible for its actions. Be mindful when your pet is around other dogs, animals and humans. If your pet does not play well with others, make sure you keep them on a lead or a muzzle if necessary. This applies to off leash areas too. You must be able to keep your dog under control at all times, even when he is excited to be at the dog park with his mates.

If you're taking your dog to the park or for a walk make sure you leave no trace of poop behind and dispose of your poop bag in the nearest bin. Off-leash areas have bins emptied regularly by Council for your convenience.

Keeping livestock in residential areas is not recommended and will most likely result in annoyed neighbours.

here are some handy facts for you to consider.

- 1. To keep livestock, you must have appropriate fencing or you neighbours will be asking who let the cows out?
- 2. NSW legislation has strict guidelines for keeping chickens in residential areas. Some chicken coops require a Development Application to be lodged. Contact Council for more information or visit www.cessnock.nsw.gov.au
- 3. Roosters look nice but don't produce any eggs and are noisy. Do your neighbours a favour and don't keep roosters in residential areas.

If you are thinking about getting non domestic animals, 4. Please remember Council does not permit the keeping of pigs in residential areas. All pigs including miniature pigs belong on a farm 60 metres away from any dwelling.

> Another quick reminder to choose safety over convenience when dropping your kids off at school. Don't park in a no stopping zone or a bus zone, it is critical in keeping school students safe during pick up and drop off times.

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

RAISING THE BARR YOU HAVE LOST YOUR RIGHT TO BE PRESUMED INNOCENT

I swear to you, I don't make this stuff up. I feel like I am writing the same story over and over again - the story of our rights being taken away, piece by piece, through Legislation in NSW Parliament. Disappearing this week was the right to be presumed innocent until proven guilty. Frighteningly, I was stirred to re-read George Orwell's Nineteen Eighty Four and wonder to myself how the 'Thought Police' had arrived here in NSW. I also paused to reflect on a more recent (although quite old now) movie called 'Judge Dredd', starring Sylvester Stallone.

The two pieces of Legislation that I refer to are called CRIMES (SERIOUS CRIME PREVENTION ORDERS) BILL 2016 and CRIMINAL LEGISLATION AMENDMENT (ORGANISED CRIME AND PUBLIC SAFETY) BILL 2016. In essence, what these changes mean is that if the Police or a Judge is convinced that you might be involved in a crime or you might have already been involved in a crime then you can be given "orders" about where you can or can't go. It even includes the possibility that if you are charged, the case goes to Court and you are not found guilty, that you can still be deemed likely to have committed the crime/ offence and as such be given "orders" So what is an "order"? Well, a person under an "order" can be told where they can and cannot go, almost without limit, and with no ability to appeal. A person can be told to stay away from an area or stay in their own home. A person can be prevented from attending an event, seeing family and friends or travelling interstate or overseas. Consider this example, the Police might think it "likely" that there will be a serious criminal event at the rugby league match, and, that on the balance of probabilities, the crime will be committed by a Newcastle Knights fan. They could place an "order" on all persons wearing a Knights jumper and prevent them from attending. The concerns for serious criminal activity might be about a red haired person or an elderly white man; these same 'classes" of people could be prevented from attending.

I am sure that you will agree that these are quite extraordinary powers. And that, there will be countless innocent people caught up in these powers. There can be no doubt that our good honest Police will use these powers sparingly and well. But imagine if someone like Roger Rogerson had these powers. To understand the many and varied ways that these powers could be used, think about your own workplace and how many different interpretations of the "rules" of your workplace there are. Think about a school and how many different "styles" of teaching and teachers that there are. Think about our taxes and how different people take a different approach to what they can/can't do when it comes to tax returns. Well, these powers, in the hands of 16,000+ Police officers across NSW will have various uses. Can anyone imagine a young adult white Anglo-male being banned from attending church on Sunday? Can anyone imagine a young adult Middle Eastern male being banned from attending mosque on Friday? R.I.P. JOHN KAYE, MLC

Last week, the Honourable Dr John Kaye, MLC died after a short battle with cancer. Although John was a Member of The Greens in the Upper House, he often had quite a bit of Labor in his views and to that end we would agree on many things. Understandably, everywhere I go I'm asked who will win the July 2 election. It's a hard

It's a bit like asking who will win the Melbourne Cup eight weeks out, too many things can change including form by race day. There are some things we do know. Labor currently has only 55 seats in a House of Representatives of 150. That means it needs to win 21 seats to reach the magic 76 to govern in its own right. But it's a little more complicated because of the recent re-distribution.

As a result of those boundary changes, two seats currently held by the Coalition are "notionally" Labor. That means that if you applied the booth-by-booth results from the last election to the new electorates in question Labor would have won them both. One of those electorates is Paterson right here in the Hunter. The other is Barton in Sydney.

So the real target for Labor is now 19 seats. To win that many seats Labor needs a national uniform swing of 4 percent. That's a big ask. To put it into perspective, Kevin Rudd enjoyed a swing of 5.4 percent in 2007 delivering him an additional 23 seats. In 1996, John Howard also pushed through the 5 percent barrier to pick up 29 seats. In 2013, Tony Abbott only had a 3.6 percent swing but it delivered him 18 seats. These historical results not only give us a sense of the scale of a 4 percent swing, they also demonstrate that similar uniform swings can deliver different results because it all comes down to what's happening in individual electorates. To provide another example, in 1998 Kim Beazley secured a 4.6 percent swing, won 50.98 of the primary vote and an additional 18 seats but lost the election. In other words, the vote overall came up, but didn't grow enough in enough electorates.

This is the problem with relying on "national" figures. The polls which tell you most are those which are taken in the individual seats the Opposition party must win. These are the electorates the television broadcast will focus on most on election

But I suspect the swings in the coming election will be less uniform than in the past I describe it as the 150 by-elections phenomenon. Once there was a thing called a "safe seat" but no one believes in them any longer. Certainly, no one can afford to take their seat for granted. Just ask Barnaby Joyce in New England!

I believe some of the seats Labor is hoping to win will fall short and others we were less optimistic about will be won. That makes the election even harder to predict. So maybe you should turn to Sportsbet where the coalition is \$1.33 to Labor's \$3.25. Labor is not concerned about being the "underdog"! More than ever, we believe policy will matter most.

****** The election is only weeks away and if you're eligible to vote you don't want to get caught off guard and find yourself

unable to vote. Of course if you haven't changed address and have voted before your enrolment should be fine. But if you were too young to vote last time and haven't enrolled, you need to do You must be an Australian citizen. If you are 16 or 17 you can still enrol now so that you'll be able to vote when you turn 18.

The \$1 million funding package is available to upgrade or install war memorial plaques and refurbish community halls used by veterans groups.

The NSW Government is committed to conserving and improving important military history that will ensure the Anzac legacy lives. We anticipate that local RSL sub-branches, community groups and councils will apply for projects to ensure Australia's servicemen and women continue to be remembered.

Examples of how the grants could be used include plaques at places of historical significance in the state's wartime efforts, or restoration and display of honour roles with the names of men and women who fought and died in war. I know there's so much important military history in our suburbs and towns that has fallen into disrepair or been targeted by vandals and is in danger of being lost.

The NSW Government is committed to preserving and displaying our military history, so that the bravery and sacrifice shown by so many in the past can been seen and reflected upon by generations to

31 INCIDENTS OF ILLEGAL HUNT-ING IN THE UPPER HUNTER

Last week saw two vehicles, firearms and hunting bows have been seized during a NSW Department of Primary Industries' (DPI) Game Licensing Unit and NSW Police operation conducted in the Upper Hunter. On ground surveillance and vehicle patrols on public and private land, combined with aerial surveillance using drones were used to detect unlawful activities, with 31 incidents of illegal hunting identified. Whilst the vast majority of hunting taking place in the Upper Electorate is completely lawful, recently unlawful activities detected included hunting deer without a game licence, trespass on private property and use of a firearm without a firearm licence. During the three-day operation, two motor vehicles connected to game offences were seized, as were a number of hunting bows, a firearm and ammunition. Hunting equipment including binoculars and spotting scopes, clothing, knives and other items with an estimated value in excess of \$15,000 were also seized. The significant support the Game Licensing

Unit and NSW Police received from the local community, including many landowners, was a major factor in the success of this operation. Future compliance operations are planned for the Upper Hunter area including areas around Scone, Willow Tree and Murrurundi as part of a State-wide campaign to ensure that people hunt safely, legally and ethically in NSW.

Reports can be made anonymously by calling the report line 1800 SHUT IT and including the time, date and place of the alleged offence as well as particulars about any vehicles and

individuals involved.

Food Allergy Australia has one of the highest reported incidences of food allergies in the world, and the numbers are growing at an alarming rate with one in 10 babies born in Australia today forecast to develop a food allergy. Council applies to remove 40 trees from Park

Singleton Council has lodged an application with the Office of Environment and Heritage to remove 40 of the 83 trees in Burdekin Park in Singleton. The application follows a resolution of Council to undertake whatever is necessary to make the park, located on the New England Highway, safe for the community. Council closed the park on 3 March after a large colony of little red flying foxes took up residence in the park's heritage trees, which has been home to a colony of protected grey-headed flying foxes since 2000.

The sheer weight and number of the "little reds", estimated to be about 20,000 at their peak, has caused significant damage to the trees and resulted in large limbs falling to the ground.

An assessment of the trees by an arborist in April identified 40 of the 83 trees were dead or dying beyond saving, 12 will require pruning of the canopy, 9 need pruning to remove hanging branches and dead wood and a further 7 trees will require extensive pruning. Only 15 trees were identified as requiring no action. Singleton Council General Manager Jason Linnane says an application for the tree removal and pruning has been lodged with the Office of Environment. Council is also preparing a development application.

"We want to be in a position to remove the trees as soon as possible after the little reds have moved on from the park," he says.

"Little reds are highly nomadic and follow their flowering food source, found on

Spotted Gum. The above average autumn temperatures means the flowering season has lasted longer than usual, resulting in the little reds hanging around longer than anticipated.

"If there have been any positives from this unprecedented event, it's that the grey-headed flying foxes have been all but driven out of the park by their little red cousins, meaning Council is in the best position it has ever been in to implement deterrent measures."

Mr Linnane says once the trees have been removed, Council hopes the community will work with Council to use non-violent methods to discourage the flying foxes from returning to the township.

"This may be the best opportunity we have ever had to rid our town of the flying foxes," he says

"While we recognise their protected and vulnerable status, and their contribution to biodiversity, our community has lived with the noise, odour and destruction of our heritage trees for long enough.

"It will be up to the community to tell us how they want Council to treat the park in the event our application is approved and the trees are removed. We will be inviting the community to participate in this process as part of a review of the plan of management for Burdekin Park." Mr Linnane says brochures containing information about the flying foxes and Burdekin Park were being letterbox dropped to all households in the Singleton township next week.

"In addition, we are seeking feedback from those residents who live in close proximity to the park and are most affected to tell us what practical assistance they think could improve their current situation," he says. "We appreciate how difficult this issue has been for our community and we appreciate their ongoing patience as we work with state and federal representatives to achieve legislative change."



How to: Protect yourself from rental scams

The convenience of online rental listing puts options at your fingertips, but there are some important things to watch out for. Anywhere there are listings

and reviews online, unfortunately there are usually scams. Rental listings are a popular target for scammers.

Prospective tenants are used to having personal details at the ready for applications, expect to be asked some questions, and ultimately, expect to hand over some

Scammers shouldn't scare you off the Internet (there are plenty offline too). You just need to know how to guard against them and what to look out for.

Rental scam warning signs * If it sounds too good to be true, it almost definitely is. Look for advertised prices well

below the rest of the market, the promise of water views, full furnishings and any other combination of benefits for an impossible cheap rate.

* The landlord is overseas. This is an immediate a red flag. Though it may on

occasion be true, it should be treated as suspect for safety's sake.

* You're asked to hand money before anything else happens. If you're asked for a viewing fee, a holding fee to secure a property, or any other kind of upfront fee (usually in the form of an electronic transfer), stop immediately.

This isn't standard practice

and is deeply suspect.

* You're being offered lots of excuses as to why you can't view the property. Just like that landlord who is overseas, something doesn't add up. You should be able to go through all the usual channels without hinderance.

* There's something off about the photos in the listing. They may be low quality images (blurry, pixellated, or only one distant shot). They may be stock images or taken from other websites. If you think vou've seen a picture before, trust your instincts and run an image search on Google. Sometimes

pictures show outdoor environments that don't match up with the cities they're advertised in (palm trees where there should be skyscrapers).

Look very closely.

* Text within images. If an image has text superimposed, or is nothing but text itself (such as an email address), raise that red flag again. This is highly unusual and very suspect.

* The words in the ad may be clumsily composed and sound unprofessional. While agents can occasionally be accused of exaggerating, they know how to describe a property well, and have a certain style of writing. A fake listing looks and feels different.

Look for repetition elsewhere.

Cut and paste the content of the listing (including the address and any contact details) into a search engine. If it's a popular scam, you'll likely find it elsewhere. It may be mentioned on blogs or amateur scam watch sites (you should always check

with official sources like SCAMwatch as well). How to protect yourself against fraud

- Organise an inspection for the property. As SCAMwatch advises: "A drive by is not enough. With these types of scams, the property may genuinely exist, but it is owned by someone else." If you press this point it may dissuade the scammer from pursuing you.
- Keep copies of any emails Keep all correspondence you exchange with the landlord or representative you are dealing with in case you need to provide these to the authorities.
- Do thorough online research about the property. Search the name of the person or company involved. If they do not have an online presence (or one that looks like it was hastily cobbled together), you'll affirm

you suspicions and can stop the conversation before it progresses any further. Remember that even fancy, professional looking sites and profiles can be fake. Check other review sites for those names or for similar activity

- If you are checking references or recommendations, do so independently. Do not rely on contacts provided by the landlord, owner or representative.
- Lay your own groundwork with money and finances. Do not consent to a money transfer. This carries a high risk. If conducting an online transaction on the listing website, ensure it uses the latest in website security.

Never, ever hand over money or information to someone vou don't trust. Trust your instincts – it's better to be safe than sorry.

No landlord or agent can fault you for doing your due diligence. What to do if you've been targeted by a scam If you suspect – or know you've been

scammed, report it right away. Contact the ACCC's Infocentre on 1300 302 502 or SCAMwatch (via their report a scam page). This may help the authorities track down the culprits and will help warn others against the scam. The more people that

usually have a plan for dealing with these types of listings which includes taking it offline and investigating further. Don't let other users of that website fall victim too.

- Advise the authorities if necessary. If you have given anyone your personal or financial details, advise the authorities immediately, and contact your financial institutions to alert them your accounts have been compromised. You can usually prevent any further charges from occurring and cancel cards or accounts so no one can withdraw funds or access their contents
- Contact the transfer service provider if you've moved funds.

If you sent money through a wire service, contact the service immediately and ask them to stop the transfer.

How do you get the biggest bang for your renovation buck? We consulted the experts to discover the most cost-effective renovations that could make the biggest difference to your home. From minor additions to big -ticket structural changes, here's what they had to say. Install a skylight

Let there be light. Skylight, that is. Georgia McKay, a project manager at Buildwise Projects in Melbourne, says adding a skylight – or window to a northern wall – can make a huge difference to a dark room or hallway. "There are some very fancy skylights available, but if you go for a basic model, it costs about \$700 to \$800," McKay says. High-end models can cost more than \$4000.

Rip up the carpet

Scuzzy carpets are out. Timber floors are in. "Polished floors are really nice and clean – and they're great if people have pets," McKay says. Expect to pay from about \$30 per square metre to sand and polish floorboards. If there aren't timber floorboards under the carpet, consider overlay flooring. "You can go from very ordinary-

looking floors to a real wow factor. And rugs work really well."

Repair the roof

It's not the sexiest job on the renovation wish list, but McKay says roof repairs can have an enormous impact. Ensure the gutters are in order, the insulation is effective and there are no structural defects. "People go and do all these fancy things inside the house,

then the roof leaks. I always say, start at the top, then work down," she says.

Reconfigure living spaces

Outdated or dark living spaces can leave you feeling boxed in, says Richard Misso, creative director at The Stylesmiths, which offers interior design services in Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane. The solution? Ask a builder if





The Murder Book

Stuart Littlemore



It's not really surprising that Stuart Littlemore. well-known legal counsel, would attempt Australia's answer to Rumpole of the Bailey in a series based on cases where the Defence (in the guise of Harry Curry) rides to victory on the back of some cunning goings-on in the trial courts of NSW. However Curry's partner Arabella Engineer is no 'She Who Must Be Obeyed' and certainly not one to worry about the state of the chops as Harry quietly drinks his Chateau Cardboard in celebration of another stunning victory. Instead, Engineer stands firmly in her own place in court, albeit guided in strategy by Curry as his own legal career veers from minor infraction to bush-based defending from the farm.

This final instalment adds impending parenthood, the complicated partnershipversus-marriage question of the modern couple and the concomitant complications

of a very traditional potential mother-in-law. All of which Curry must 'win' while simultaneously holding up his end in South Coast courtrooms

While it's reasonable that a

barrister might regard a barrister as a hero, there are points at which the reader could very well wonder what the real crime is here - the actual offence or the level of puffery that can be applied to the art of defending the lesser criminal classes. But if readers are willing to stick their tongues firmly in their cheeks and go along for the ride, there is some self-deprecation buried in this book - usually in the person of instructing solicitor and long-time friend David Surrey: 'Listen carefully, girls, said Surrey, 'this may be the only time you ever hear Mr Curry talk about a case *he lost.* '(He didn't ...) In a storyline that's fleshed out with lots of small

victories and cases in


which Arabella also triumphs, the central focus of this book is the case of a security guard who shot a ride-along colleague. Obviously the outcome depends on whether or not Curry can prove that the victim, now wheelchairbound, is lying about the actual events of the night in question. While a lot of evidence-putting and cross -examining goes on, there's nothing baffling or overly 'legal' for the lay reader to deal with and the resolution works out as expected, while cleverly presented. The point of this series isn't immediately obvious. It's

not crime fiction in the sense that a crime is committed and an investigation ensues. It's not even legal crime fiction where the case hinges on the prosecutor or the defence counsel proving/ disproving/establishing a case. While there is the personal element, it's also not necessarily a series about the developing relationship of two people. Rather, this is a series about how the Defence always triumphs because of either the incompetence of the prosecutor or the judge, or through some clever interpretation of whatever law is involved. Perhaps because it's not necessarily trying to be anything in particular it's quite good fun, in a selfcongratulatory, aren't-weclever sort of a way, as long as the tone and the style don't get up your nose which readers will be able to gauge from about the second paragraph. But don't expect to find Rumpole and Hilda lurking under the covers. It might come from a similar vine,

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How Do I Find E-mail In The Cloud


A reader opened a question with my least favourite sentence around here, "This is a stupid question, but how do I get into the cloud site to see if I have e-mail there?" It's not stupid to ask a question about something you need to know. In fact, this is a question that could benefit a lot of people.

Many people get their e-mail via an e-mail client like Outlook and never visit the webmail interface of their account online. In fact, I missed a very important e-mail about a job interview once because it was stuck in the Spam filter of my ISP and never downloaded to my PC. I checked Outlook's spam and junk boxes regularly to see if anything I actually wanted had been filtered out, but not online.

Since the reader has an att.net e-mail address, she'll find her online webmail at Yahoo.com. Yahoo manages the e-mail for att.net. Just click on the Mail icon.



Log in with your username and password and you'll be taken to your inbox.



Other Internet Service Providers may have their own web-based mail interfaces. You can usually go to their website and look for an option to go to e-mail, or contact them to find out how to get there.

If you have any type of Microsoft account or address (Outlook.com, Hotmail.com, Live Mail, or MSN), go to Outlook.com and log in with the e-mail and password for that account.

If you have an Android phone or any type of Google account, go to Gmail com and log in

Ransomware Attacks Are Getting Worse:

Ransomware Attacks Are Getting Worse How To Fight Back


Ransomware attacks are increasing in frequency and in severity. Ransomware is particularly dangerous malware that locks down your PC and sometimes even destroys important files if you don't pay up. Organizations like hospitals are being held hostage as crooks lock down their patient records and demand payments in Bitcoin electronic currency before unlocking the files.

So far in 2016, victims have included medical centres in Texas, California, Kentucky, Washington D.C., Maryland, Delaware, Virginia, Indiana, Germany, and New Zealand.



Police Departments in Massachusetts and Maine, as well as the Pima County, Arizona Superior Court. School districts in South Carolina, Mississippi, and Texas have also faced attacks along with public utilities in Michigan.

Many desperate organizations have paid the attackers, though often far less money than they originally demand. In fact, law enforcement and security advisors are warning people not to pay, even though it seems like the easiest option. Instead of helping, you can actually make yourself an even more attractive target. These untrustworthy criminals will likely hit you again and raise the ransom price next time.



Most ransomware attacks are launched when employees mistakenly open something that looks like a legitimate document to them or are redirected to a

malicious site and tricked into downloading the ransomware.

As with many things in like, the only sure cure is prevention.

1. Back up all important data regularly. If you lose a particular PC, so be it. But you'll still have your valuable data available to restore to a new machine.

2. Keep your anti-virus software and malware protection updated. If you're using software that has an update available, take it. Yes, it may be a pain to spend the time updating, but that's better than not being protected against a ransomware attack.

3. Educate yourself and be cautious. Watch what you click and where you go. In fact, it's not a bad idea to do away with attaching documents to e-mails. Instead have designated shared folders either on the network or in cloud storage where items are shared and people know to go there to look without sharing any links. If you have a business or are part of an organization, make sure everyone knows the rules for safe computing. If you must share links or attachments, have a standard protocol of what the message will say so users can tell that it's genuine.

If your PC is attacked, it's time to call in a professional. If you're a home user, find a reputable computer tech. If you're at work, immediately contact the person who handles IT. Make sure you warn everyone else in the office about what's happened.

Internet Explorer Fights Browser Hijacking

Internet Explorer is stepping up its game to prevent browser hijacking by adding a feature that's already part of the Microsoft Edge browser.

Many of you have had the experience of opening your browser and finding that your homepage or default search engine has changed. This is usually because you've downloaded something that came with a sneaky stowaway that later hijacked your browser and your search engine.

Removing these items is a royal pain. You have to not only delete sneaky toolbars from your add-ons but also reset your default search providers and your homepage. Seriously, fixing this mess can take HOURS!

I opened up Internet Explorer on Monday and saw this pop-up.



Internet Explorer wanted confirmation that my choices for a homepage and a search engine were what I wanted them to be. From this point forward, Internet Explorer will not allow a third-party program to change these settings. This can effectively end a lot of browser hijacking. That certainly doesn't mean you shouldn't be very careful when downloading, but it's good news.

How Do I Save My Data?

A reader needs some help with getting files off a dead computer. "I have an internal hard drive in a computer with integrated video which went bad and a monitor will no longer work with that machine. What's a good way to transfer the data on that drive to a new computer?"

The best solution would have been that all of your important files were already backed up on a regular backup you make to an external drive or the cloud. Sorry, but I have to get that in. Prevention folks! If that's not the case, the simplest way would be to walk your dead machine down to a computer store and have someone there transfer it for you. The tech can remove your old hard drive, plug it in to an adapter cable and pull the data off.

If you feel comportable enough taking your dead PC apart, you can remove the old hard drive and attach it to an adapter cable or put

it into a hard drive enclosure designed for turning old internal hard drives into external drives. Your new PC will then treat your old hard drive like any external hard drive and you can transfer files at will.

The Privy Council

My last article was a little off the subject - it didn't deal with malicious prosecution nor with the Privy Council and how that body can still affect our laws. Rather I tried to show the relationship between courts within the one hierarchy.

The Privy Council is outside the Australian and the British hierarchy but its decisions can be persuasive. How persuasive its decision on Mr Paterson's claim for malicious prosecution is about to be seen in England. Mr Gubay was a successful British businessman; he established a chain of supermarkets and later another chain of health clubs. Mr Willers was Mr Gubay's right hand man from 1986 until his dismissal in 2009. Mr Gubay controlled a host of companies. Mr Willers was a director of one of them Langstone Pty Ltd. Langstone funded and indemnified the liquidator of another company Aqua Design and Play Limited to prosecute an action against the former directors of Aqua for wrongful trading. The action against Aqua was abandoned shortly before trial, meaning that Langstone became liable for costs of £1.95 million. Then after Mr Gubay dismissed Mr Willers, Langstone brought a claim against Mr Willers alleging breach of directors' duties. Mr Willers denied all liability and sought an indemnity from Mr Gubay, whom he joined into the action as a Third Party, Mr Willers, claimed Mr Gubay was the sole effective decision maker and it was in fact Mr Gubay who had directed Mr Willers to bring the action through Aqua's liquidator in the first place.


Two weeks before Langstone's action against Mr Willers was due to be heard in a 5 week trial, Langstone discontinued its action and was subsequently ordered to pay Mr Willers' costs. Around a year later, Mr Willers brought a claim against Mr Gubay claiming damages for the tort of malicious prosecution of civil proceedings. Mr Gubay applied to strike out the claim on the basis that there is no action for malicious prosecution of civil proceedings known to English law. A "strike out" action is often brought when there is a legal issue which means the claim cannot succeed.

Mr Gubay's strike out succeeded. The judge said she was bound to follow the House of Lords decision in Mr Gregory's case which I wrote about some time ago - that there was indeed no such action.

Mr Willers appealed. His appeal 'leapfrogged' the English Court of Appeal straight to the Supreme Court. This unusual procedure is used only where there's a decision of the Supreme Court or the House of Lords (which was replaced by the Supreme Court) on the point, (here the House of Lords ruling against Mr Gregory) and when the appeal concerns a point of law of general public importance. All the parties and the Supreme Court have to agree to the "leapfrog". Nine Supreme Court judges heard the appeal but their decision has been delayed, Mr Gubay has died but his estate is still defending the case.

The leapfrog procedure is an example of fact following fiction. It was first proposed by A P. Herbert an English lawyer who switched to being a writer. He'd been a soldier in

Gallipoli and later on the Western Front in World War One. (He was one of two officers to survive in his battalion after one battle in 1916) His novel based on his war experiences "The Secret Battle": with an introduction by Winston Churchill is said to have changed the treatment of shell shocked soldiers (today we call shell shock "Post traumatic shock disorder"). Herbert later became a member of parliament advocating law reform- one of the bills he brought to parliament was written in verse. But one of his main claims to fame was writing spoof law cases in the English magazine Punch which were - later



Two of these spoof cases pointed out the foolishness of the appeal system. You had to appeal from a single judge to the court of appeal even if the court of appeal was bound to "follow" a House of Lords decision. Herbert said why not leapfrog straight to the House of Lords? Years later his procedure was adopted in England, it would be a good idea if it were adopted in Australia too.

There are really two issues to be decided in Mr Willer's leapfrog appeal. The first is whether an action for malicious prosecution is available in the context of civil proceedings. The second is how binding or persuasive are Privy Council decisions- most of the judges of which are also judges of the British Supreme Court . I will let you know.

In this series I've used malicious prosecution as an example of how and why the judge made law changes over time and of how the different courts interact.


But I want to conclude with another reason why Mrs Cuneen would be unlikely to have succeeded in a claim for malicious prosecution, one which she would undoubtedly know and would by itself be a good reason why she never brought an action. And one which you'd hope the media commentators who speculated about Mrs Cuneen bringing an action would know too.

To be successful in an action for malicious prosecution the claimant must prove the action was indeed malicious. A very recent example in New South Wales shows this. The case refers to the family only by initials –so shall I.

On 10 May 2012 HD's daughter suffered a broken nose and other facial injuries. That night she told her friend that her father did it. The next day the school deputy principal saw her in the playground. Her injuries were obvious despite her attempt to cover them with makeup. The deputy principal spoke to her, and got her to hospital for treatment and later reported the case to the police. After speaking with the daughter, her best friend, and school and hospital staff, the police charged her father (HD) with assault. A week later the daughter changed her story saying that the injury was an accident- that she'd been behind a door when her father abruptly opened it. The police dropped the charge.


The father brought an action against the police and the state government for malicious prosecution. He failed in the District Court, his appeal to the Court of Appeal also failed. The main reason he failed was because he could not show that the police did anything wrong, "Malice" in a malicious prosecution case requires the prosecutor's sole or dominant purpose to be other than proper invocation of the criminal law. AD couldn't show that the police had not honestly and reasonably concluded that the material available to them warranted charging him. When I read the case summary I wondered just how much "H D's" legal bill was. Even if his lawyer was a friend and working for free, the government's costs in the court of appeal was surely out of all proportion to any money AD might have expected to get if he had been successful.

To return to Mrs Cuneen and ICAC, ICAC was 'tipped off' about the alleged phone conversations in which Mrs Cuneen was supposed to have told her son's girlfriend to fake an illness by the Federal Police who were conducting wire taps as part of another investigation. The phone conversation as "overheard" by chance. I can't see how ICAC was malicious in acting on information given to them by another law enforcement agency. I can see that ICAC could and probably would have been criticised if it had not investigated the matter.





More training for coffee making than property sales



An overhaul of education and training standards for the real estate profession must take place to help prevent illegal activities, according to the Real Estate Institute of New South Wales.

REINSW President John Cunningham said trust account fraud, misleading and deceptive conduct, underquoting and a lack of knowledge about property and the laws relating to its transaction are simply unacceptable behaviours.

"On the surface real estate sales and management appear to be very simple," Mr Cunningham said.

'However it is in reality a very complex and multilayered process that requires a high level of knowledge and diverse skills to carry it out in a professional man-

"Most people would expect that an agent has been properly trained and has the required qualifications to fulfil their obligations.

"The sad truth is that for the past 10 years the education standards delivery especially in NSW have been watered down and in the interest of increased competition abused by many course providers that are allowed to continue operating.

"It actually requires more training to become a barista than a real estate agent," Mr Cunningham said.

"You would expect an agent to understand how the property they are dealing with was built; its age; what the zoning is; if there are any easements, building or height restrictions; and what special conditions are in the contract, to name just a few issues.

"Professional agents can answer all of these questions, but not every agent will be able to because of the low level of training in the industry.

"The Real Estate Institute of New South Wales has been fighting for the past 10 years for better training and qualifications, and government cannot ignore the

"Inadequate real estate agent training needs to be addressed to achieve better consumer experiences and outcomes. Both the NSW Government and NSW Fair Trading must act on our recommendations for reform. "Professional agents and consumers demand it, and now is the time to deliver it," Mr Cunningham said.

RBA cuts interest rates to 1.75%



The Reserve Bank of Australia has cut interest rates by 25 basis points to a new record low of 1.75 per cent at its May 2016 meeting.

REINSW President John Cunningham said the RBA's decision followed low inflation data.

"The RBA has acted after the consumer price index rose less than expected in March. All eyes are now on the banks to see if they will pass on the full 25 basis point reduction.

'It is 12 months since the RBA cut interest rates to the previous low of 2.00 per cent and since then the banks have independently moved rates higher. The banks now have a duty to pass the full benefit onto consumers.

'Now is a good time to borrow money to purchase a property as the cost of capital is the best it has ever been," Mr Cunningham said. The official cash rate has fallen 300 basis points since November 2011, with the RBA cutting interest rates twice in 2013 in May and August and at its February and May meetings last year. The RBA will next meet on Tuesday, 7 June 2016

New underquoting laws apply to the sale of NSW residential prop-

erty from 1 January 2016 to give clearer rules for agents around the quoting of property prices.

Underquoting

NSW Fair Trading defines an underquoting offence as follows:

"The underquoting reforms are designed to stop real estate agents understating property prices. An agent is committing an underquoting offence if they state or publish a price for a property that is less than their reasonable estimate of the property's likely selling price contained in the agency agreement with the seller. This practice of underquoting can cause interested buyers to waste time and money on inspecting properties, getting reports and attending auctions based on misleading estimates of the selling price.

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MOVIE REVIEW

FLORENCE FOSTER JENKINS



Eddie the Eagle is uncomplicated. Eddie knows he's never going to be a serious competitor as a ski-jumper but manages to do just well enough to get to the Winter Olympics, achieve an ambition and amuse others with his antics. He's not deluded, he's having fun and the recent film about him happily embraces that story. The joke is with him, not on him.

The case of Florence Foster Jenkins is more puzzling. Born in Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania, in 1868, she appears to have been a genuine child prodigy as a pianist but, after her wealthy father refused to pay for further musical studies, she eloped in her teens with a man called Dr Foster who, allegedly, infected her with

syphilis. After their separation she supported herself as a pianist and teacher in New York but, perhaps suffering a hand injury, switched to singing, supported in this by her common-law second husband, a British actor called St Clair Bayfield, whom she had met in 1909. Later that year her father died and, after a court-room battle, she inherited a substantial estate, which enabled her to become an influential music and arts patron in New York, founding her own "Verdi Club". She gave her first song recital in 1912, when she was already in her forties, and carried on for 30odd vears more. Small problem: she couldn't sing. Not at all, really. She couldn't hold a note. She had almost no sense of rhythm or pitch or intonation, nor much grasp of the many languages she attempted. As her surviving recordings prove (available on a Naxos CD waggishly titled Murder on the High Cs, a David Bowie favourite), she sounded like a very unlucky banshee — or maybe just a regular cat being protractedly tortured by a fiend. Yet, protected from the bad

news by Bayfield, Florence genuinely seems to have believed she was good, perhaps until near the very end of her life. Simply bad singing is neither

eniovable nor particularly

funny but Florence Foster Jenkins projects a crazed self -belief that makes her hilarious and even exhilarating to hear. It's the enormous distance between what she obviously believed she sounded like and the evidence of your own ears that's so funny

In her own lifetime she seems to have been popular, primarily as a joke or a camp fad, although she may not have been aware that this was why people wanted to hear her until the very end, when a sold-out concert at Carnegie

Hall in 1944 was greeted with gales of laughter and derisive reviews. The extraordinary costumes in which she posed so proudly (as, for example, the winged "Angel of Inspiration") don't suggest much self-doubt either.

another way, it is a sad one, since it may have been tertiary syphilis and the toxic treatments then available that lay behind her ineptitude, perhaps even giving her tinnitus that prevented her hearing herself. Should we admire her courage in pursuing self-fulfilment, if not her actual singing? "People may say I couldn't sing but no one can ever say I didn't sing," she could and did boast. Or then again, perhaps this is a not so admirable tale of how money permits the rich to indulge their fantasies of being talented too and ensures they are cynically indulged by their acolytes and dependents? Whatever. All these qualms are swept away in this new biopic, the debut feature script of TV screenwriter Nicholas Martin directed by Stephen Frears. It's all broad humour and bigheartedness, out to entertain and amuse. Although made in Britain (the Hammersmith Apollo standing in for Carnegie Hall, a Park Lane hotel for the Ritz-Carlton in New York), it is sumptuously mounted by costume designer Consolata Boyle and production designer Alan Macdonald and glamorously filmed by cinematographer Danny Cohen, making for a fine spectacle all round. If it has a moral, it's no more than that love conquers all and critics can be really mean. Florence Foster Jenkins is played by Meryl Streep, wearing a fat suit and, as always, committing herself wholly to the part in a way that transforms the performances of those around her. As we know from her last film, Ricki and the Flash, Streep can sing for real - and here she uses that talent to sing for real really badly. The performances were recorded live and they are amazingly good impressions of the true horror of FFJ's original. However, grotesque as she is prepared to look and badly as she is prepared to sing, Meryl Streep is still Meryl Streep, one of the great stars, 19 times Oscar-nominated, with irreducible charisma. That

Fun it Yet it is worth noting that, as luck would have it, the story of Florence Foster Jenkins was made into a much more serious film last year, Marguerite, directed by Xavier Giannoli, which translates her story to France in the 1920s but is otherwise faithful enough. Catherine Frot deservedly won a César for playing "Marguerite Dumont" and the story takes her more seriously altogether. suggesting that her amateur dramatics and frightful warblings are a poor substitute for her husband's love — and that her delusions eventually cost her both her sanity and her life. Coincidentally, Stephen Frears's previous film, The Program, a drama about cycling cheat Lance Armstrong, was also closely preceded by another film on precisely the same subject. The Armstrong Lie, a documentary by Alex Gibney that had good claim to reveal more too. ONE of my best mates is a chap by the name of Ed White. Ed is the youngest of seven children. He grew up on his family's



Blood On The Track

Redoute's Choice Australia's top Group1 source

ARROWFIELD'S wonderfully consistent Danehill sire Redoute's Choice had his progeny's Group1 score and overall list of stakes winners added to when his daughter Abbey Marie broke into black type at only her third start when she took the Schweppes Australasian Oaks over 2000m at Adelaide's Morphetteville on Saturday.

Unbeaten, the Michael Kent (Cranbourne) trained filly has only been racing for six weeks and is probably the fastest of the Redoute's Choice 29 Group1 winners, a record for an Australian produced sire, to attain this level of excellence. Twenty-four of them gained their Group1 successes in Australia. Saturday's win lifted Redoute's

Choice's aggregate of individual stakes winners to 132, 86 of them in Group races. All have been sired at Arrowfield at the northern end of the Segenhoe Valley, ten minutes drive east of Scone

Inbred 4x4 to His Majesty, a Ribot Group1 winner and champion American sire, the latest Redoute's Group1 winner, Abbey Royal, was bought out of the Arrowfield consignment to the 2014 Easter sale by Dermot Bloodstock Ireland for \$300,000. She is a sister to 2007 foaled Absolutely, a winner of only one race, but at the top level the AJC Australian Oaks.

Now in Japan, the Teeley Assets bred Absolutely, in her 16 start career also showed ability with a second in Adelaide's Australasian Oaks. The dam, Catshaan, ran 14 times four sprint wins on prominent Victorian country tracks. She was a half-sister by shuttled Storm Cat sire Catrail (USA) to Kinshasa No Kiseki, a dual Group1 winner in Japan, and to the dam of She's Clean, a Redoute's Choice winner of ten races up to 1400m and Gr 3.

Abbey Martin's grandam Keltshaan (USA) was an unraced half-sister to Groom Dancer, a Group1 winner France, and a grandaughter of Lady Berry, a winner of the Prix Royal-Oak (French St Leger).

2016 Kentucky Derby winner better than American Pharoah

ALTHOUGH runner up Exaggerator was making up ground on him close to the post, the favourite, Nyquist, still recorded a commanding victory when he landed the \$2million Kentucky Derby over ten furlongs (2000m) by margins 1 ¹/₄ lens and 3 ¹/₄ lengths at Churchill Downs on May 7.

It was an effort that saw Nyquist, a bay son of the Grey Sovereign male line sire Uncle Mo (by Indian Charlie), maintain his unbeaten record, one embracing eight appearances, the last six Group1, and suggest he may be as good or better than 2015 Triple Classic Crown winner American Pharoah (Pioneer of Nile). The sires of Uncle Mo and American Pharoah are little known outside

Their champion 2015 Champion Juvenile, Nyquist in earning US\$4.9million has included in his successes the Del Mar Futurity (by 3 3/4 lens), Best Pal 2YO Stakes (5 1/4 len), Breeders' Cup Juvenile, San Vicente Stakes (1 ½ lens), Florida Derby (3 ¾ lens) and Kentucky Derby. He is the only named foal of Seeking Gabrielle, a winner of one modest race by the good Storm Cat racehorse and sire Forestry and from the Seeking the Gold Group1 2-year-old winner Seeking Regina. Inbred 5x5 to Northern Dancer, Nyquist is one of only two Group1 winners under the first six dams.

His sire Uncle Mo, himself a Breeders' Cup Juvenile winner and champion at this age, is based at Coolmore's Ashford sprint at Churchill Downs, he has Stud in Kentucky. He came out to the

Hunter Valley stud in the last four years, supplying over 200 foals to date and looking after 193 mares in 2015, but his sensational early success in America has ruled him out of a 2016 visit.

Exaggerator, a Santa Anita Derby winner and runner up to Nyquist in the Kentucky Derby, has two Australians in his breeding. One of them, Noholme, is in the pedigree of his sire Curlin, a Smart Strike (by Mr. Prospector) winner of the Preakness Stakes, Breeders' Cup Classic and Dubai World Cup, and third in the Kentucky Derby.

The other, Strawberry Road, appears as the sire of Exaggerator's maternal grandsire Vindication. He also won the Breeders' Cup Juvenile and was the champion 2-year-old of his year.

Derby third Gun Runner is by Candy Ride, a Mr. Prospector male line Argentinian who set a new track record in winning the Group1Pacific Classic (10 fur.) at Del Mar and who is a major North American sire, and from Quiet Giant, a Group 2 winner by Giant's Causeway. The latter is a Storm Cat superstar European racehorse and American sire who left nearly 300 foals from visits to Coolmore Hunter Valley in three years,02-

Gallorette, the sixth dam of Gun Runner, was the fourth on the bottom line of the pedigree of Success Express (USA).

Eight of this year's Kentucky Derby twenty runners are by sires also used in Australia, namely Uncle Mo (3), Giant's Causeway (2), Street Cry, More Than Ready and Bernardini.

Two Darley Australia visitor, Street Boss (USA) (Street Cry; Northwood Park, Seymour, Vic, 2009, 11, 12,13, 14, 15) and Bernardini (USA) (A.P. Indy; Kelvinside, Aberdeen HV; eight seasons 2008-2015) supplied first and third in the Kentucky Oaks, respectively.

A \$30,000 yearling, the Oaks winner, Cathryn Sophia, has won five of six starts, including two other stakes, one of them, a Group 2 at Gulfstream Park, by seven lengths. She is the first foal of Sheave, an unraced daughter of Mineshaft, an A.P. Indy Horse of the Year at four. The bottom line goes back to 1923 Kentucky Oaks winner Untidy.

POWER ALERT: A former Australian bred and raced performer who ran well on the Kentucky Oaks program was Power Alert, a 6-yearold gelding who finished third under top weight in the Group 3 Twin Spires Turf Sprint over five furlongs. It was a race which he won in 2015 in new track (turf) record time of 0:55.17. Sired at the Lamont's Kooringal Stud near Wagga Wagga NSW by Alert (Arg), a grey son of More Than Ready's sire Alert, and bred by J. Power using Gold Locket, a mare by an earlier Kooringal sire, Lochrae (by Scenic), Power Alert was shipped off to America at three in mid 2014 after four country wins from 13 outings, including the Wellington Boot (2yo). He was trained at Wagga Wagga by Trevor Sutherland for his breeder and Mrs A.M. Power. Power Alert has competed a further 11 times to date since transferring to America, recording five wins, all at five furlongs (1000m) and on major track. Besides the 2015 Group 3 won three Listed events.

Quality was fair to good, as numbers eased, with the bulk yarded the younger vealers and yearlings. There was a good percentage in prime condition and suitable for the butchers. Lightweights sold to a cheaper trend, while heavyweights were firm to dearer.

Cattle set sail for Indonesia as 250,000 permits are released

for second trimester By Matt Brann

The live cattle trade to Indonesia is back on track with permits released for the second trimester and cattle already setting sail from Darwin port.

The Indonesian Ministry of Trade on Monday evening signed off on the Ministry of Agriculture's recommendation for 250,000 cattle to be imported over the next four months.

Stuart Kemp from the Northern Territory Livestock Exporters Association said it was good news for the industry. He said Australian exporters had acted quickly, with the Bison Express loaded overnight with about 3,000 head. "Exporters are now able to fill orders with those permits and the first vessel is sailing out this morning," Mr Kemp said.

"The Bison Express was loaded yesterday evening and has just departed for Indonesia." Mr Kemp said it had been an up-and-down year so far in terms of cattle numbers exported via Darwin port.

But he said he was expecting the next four months to be more consistent. "A lot of those cattle for Indonesia [during the second trimester] will come out of Darwin," Mr Kemp said.


'We saw over the wet season, January and February in particular, a lot of cattle went out of Queensland and it was fairly quiet here in the NT.

"April numbers through the Darwin port were down close to 70,000 head on last year.

'So this next four months will mean a fairly consistent flow of cattle through the port of Darwin." From a high of \$3.90 a kilogram paid for some cattle at the start of the year, live export prices (ex-Darwin) have eased considerably and are now below \$3 a kilogram - which historically is still exceptionally good money.

Mr Kemp said there were no indicators to suggest the price would be going up or down during the second trimester and "only time will

"The NZ producers will posed changes to the continue to enjoy the rebate under the Free Trade Agreement and will continue to flood the Australian market. The Government has advised that the NZ producers can only legally be excluded

from the WET Rebate regime if the regime is abolished."

Mr Souris said the requirement after 1 July 2019 for a producer to own a winery or have a long term lease over a winery will severely affect the state.

'In the Hunter, there are many small producers who have their wine made by neighbouring and other wineries and then sell their wines from their own Cellar Doors.

"Equally there are legitimate businesses that are the winemakers for those grape growers" "The Government has promised me, and the broader industry, it will consult on the definition of a winery.'

"I am pleased to say I asked Minister Ruston to visit the Hunter as soon as possible to discuss these matters and she has accepted my request.'

"The Hunter is characterised by these small producers who contribute to the boutique wines market that we are famous for. These multiple Cellar Doors at legitimate growers' establishments are the essence of the special character and vibe that has made the Hunter the No 1 destination for international wine tourism.'

Gospel: John 16:12-15

"I still have many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now. When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth; for he will not speak on his own, but will speak whatever he hears, and he will declare to you the things that are to come. He will glorify me, because he will take what is mine and declare it to you. All that the Father has is mine. For this reason I said that he will take what is mine and declare it to you.'

The opening sentence of today's gospel touches something very deep in human experience. Jesus tells his disciples: "I still have many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now." In John's gospel, Jesus is depicted as sensitive to the anguish of his friends and to their limited capacity to absorb the enormity of what was happening to him and to them. There was only so much they could "bear" as the inevitability of Jesus' death dawned on them. They will come to understand who he is and what he has taught them, but only through the power of God's "Spirit of truth" who will guide them into "all the truth". As we think back on our own lives and tell stories of the past, we realize how little we understood of what was happening in our world and in our own lives at the time of the events we recount. We become wiser with the knowledge of hindsight, even if we never fully understand. As Christians, we credit any insight and understanding we may have to the power of God's Spirit at work in our lives. We believe in the Triune God and, along with the whole Earth community, we are caught up into a wonderful dynamism of Trinitarian life. No one image can capture the mystery of God's dynamic Trinitarian existence. Since God is neither male nor female, it is important to remember that the traditional male language of Father, Son and Spirit is one way of imaging the Trinity and is not to be absolutised or taken as a literal description of God who is three in one. Perichoresis, a Greek term suggestive of dancing or of figures interweaving, is one of the earliest and probably one of the most striking images used to explain this Trinitarian life of God. The life that is in God is three and yet one in a totally harmonious dance of equals. The wonder is that we are invited to join the dance. Trinity Sunday is the day that we set aside to celebrate who God is in Godself and who God is in relation to everything that exists. We celebrate the nearness of the Triune God who draws us as participants into the dance of life and love. The Spirit of truth guides us "into all the truth". We continue to listen to the Spirit so that we might understand more fully the "things that are to come" and the relatedness we are called to live. The dance of Trinitarian love casts out hatred and enmity and wanton destruction. It calls us to live in harmony with one another and with the whole of the Earth community.

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
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
