

Raising the BARR BAT FUNDING – A WIN FOR THE PEOPLE, BY THE PEOPLE

Getting Government funding to develop a Management Plan for the flying fox problem, is a win for all of the residents that took the time to write to me. As an MP, I rely on residents raising their concerns in writing, whatever those concerns are – it is evidence to the various Ministers that there is a genuine issue, not just a thought bubble in my head. I know that writing a letter of complaint or concern is not everyone's cup of tea. Fortunately, I received almost 100 letters from people frustrated by the bats. Every single one of them, one by one, was forwarded to the Minister's office and the Minister was forced to make a reply, in writing. The funding that Cessnock Council has received to tackle the bat problem is a result of those many many letters. The people of our community have directly affected Government spending. Call it the "squeaky wheel gets the oil" or call it "making the problem (the many letters) go away" or call it whatever you want the people won! Congratulations and thank you to all.

NSW BUDGET IN 3 WEEKS TIME

I imagine a whole host of readers immediately jumped past this section, just because of the heading. Budgets and numbers can do most people's heads in. But there is more truth in the Budget than most other things you will hear from a Government and the Budget affect every single one of us - so it is important. In general there will be "record spending" for health and education and almost every other department. There always is. The health budget in 1968 was bigger than it was in 1967; it was bigger in 1985 than it was in 1984; and it will be bigger in 2016 than it was in 2015. In fact, here is a tip - I reckon the health budget will be \$20.8B (up by 5.1%). Why? Because the health budget went up 5.1% last year and the year before and the year before; in fact every year since 2012. Now, that 5.1% in health spending is a really important number. Most health experts will tell that you that cost of providing health services rises by between 7% and 9% each year. This is a mix of many things, but mostly it is due to technology. Even a Government report released last week offers an annual increase in costs for health care of 6.5%. So, those are all a whole bunch of numbers, but what do they really mean and why do I raise them? Well, the truth is that a health budget increase of 5.1% is nothing to be sneezed at, but, importantly, it means that we are actually going backwards in real terms. Whether we are going backward by 1.4% per year or 1.9-2.9% per year can be debated day and night, but the truth is, against every measure, we are going backwards in health care. And this is a worry for all of us, right across our community because generally we rely on brilliant little "cottage" services in health care. I include Cessnock and Kurri Hospitals in my use of the word "cottage". Every health service offered to us, in our area, is smaller and scaled

down compared to a facility like The John Hunter or RPA of Randwick Children Hospital. These are all facts. The staff in our health services work incredibly hard, generally with a beaming smile on their face, even though they know our health services are pretty low down the food chain of funding. As an example, our hospitals will get some of their equipment as second hand, from the John Hunter. So any cuts to health funding, or to put it more accurately, if funding doesn't keep up with the rising costs, the cuts to services will be made. The Minister will call it an "efficiency" saving – but how many times can you cut out "efficiency" of at least 1.4%. This year will be the fifth year of "efficiency" savings in our health system. To put it more simply, this year we will reach 7% (5 x 1.4%) of "efficiencies" cuts to our health care. I dip my hat to our incredibly hard working health staff who will turn up to work after the Budget, with a smile on their face, knowing that they will have to do more with less, oops, I mean, be "efficient".

The much awaited new Singleton Gym & Swim opened on Wednesday 1 June. The Gym & Swim facility is open to the public in all areas, except for the Hydrotherapy pool and is a fantastic improvement to the old facility.

Tenders for the construction of the Hermitage Road Upgrade and Cycleway Project are now open. The detailed designs for the 10.6 kilometre project have been completed and include construction of a two-way cycleway on the western side of Hermitage Road. The Hermitage Road Upgrade and Cycleway Project is a joint venture between Singleton Council and Cessnock City Council. It is being funded by a \$16.734 million grant under the NSW Government's Resources for Regions program, with additional contributions from both councils. Tenders close on 28 June 2016. COMMUNITY BUILDING PARTNERSHIPS APPLICATIONS **FOR 2016**

Applications for the 2016 round of the NSW Government's Community Building Partnership program will open on 13 June 2016, and close just over a month later on 22 July 2016.

GRESFORD ROAD BRIDGE **RESTORATION STARTS THIS MONTH**

Worked has started to repair Gresford Road Bridge across Glendon Brook, which has been closed to traffic since it was damaged in the devastating Hunter storms in April last year. The NSW Government funded \$865,000 in natural disaster funding to Singleton Council for repairs to the bridge and approaches. Singleton Council awarded the contract to repair the bridge to Diona Pty Ltd. Once the completed bridge is reopened to traffic, motorists will once again be able to travel on a direct route between Singleton and Gresford.

they made it clear that broadband was a big issue for them. They are angry and rightly so. Some are angry because the NBN is still some way off in their street. Others are outraged that fibre will never come to their homes. Some say they now have Malcolm Turnbull's fibre-to-the-node NBN and its inferior to their old ADSL2 service. Like many of our own local residents, many in Tamworth were upset that their telephone landline switch from the old network to the NBN network left them without a phone for weeks. Some of them are

in small business and the black hole has cost them dearly.

The NBN will influence the vote of many on July 2. Increasingly people are coming to understand that the fibre-tothe-node project won't provide them with the service they need. Increasingly a decent broadband service

is critical to us for some of the most basic things we need to do. Things like school assignments and government application forms. So many of the platforms we use now - Facebook, Netflix, email rely on a decent internet

But even more important, a world's best broadband service will drive economic growth, revolutionise medical service and bridge the city-country divide. We deserve nothing less

The upcoming election has prompted a number of people to ask me questions about our voting systems. When people go the polling booth on election day they do so to do two things; to elect one person to represent their local electorate in the House of Representatives and usually six (half the Senate) to represent their state in the Senate, but on this occasion due to the double dissolution every Senator is up for

In the House of Reps the compulsory preferential system that we always use remains unchanged. You'll have probably heard that voting rules for the Senate have changed – this federal election you'll have new ways to decide your preferences on your white Senate ballot paper.

If you vote above the line, you must number at least six boxes from 1 to 6. Place a 1 in the box above the party or group that is your first choice, the number 2 in the box above the party or group that is your second choice and so on until you have numbered at least six boxes above the line. You can continue to place numbers in the order of your choice in as many boxes above the line as vou like.

If you vote below the line, you must number at least 12 boxes from 1 to 12. Place a 1 in the box beside the candidate that is your first choice, and the numbers 2, 3, 4 and so on to at least the number 12. You can continue to place numbers in the order of your choice in as many boxes below the line

Many people believe that the "first past the post" system is fairer but I would like those who believe so to consider the following scenario. Let's say there were just twelve people voting and candidate A received 5 votes, candidate B receives 4 votes and candidate C receives 3 votes. Under first past the post candidate A clearly wins but when you think about, he is supported by only 5 of 12 voters, only just over 40

So the preferential system works to ensure that the person elected is the candidate who is favoured by more than fifty percent of voters once their preferences are allocated. Of course the party which after the election can command the most number of votes in the House of Representatives becomes the Government and its leader the Prime Minister.

My office has received numerous calls asking about early voting. Early voting starts on Tuesday 14 June 2016 once the candidates have been declared and the ballot papers are printed. In the Hunter electorate there are a number of pre-poll locations available, although not all of them commence on 14 June. 14th June

Skin cuts and abrasions

Skin is the largest organ of the human body. It is soft to allow movement, but tough enough to resist breaking or tearing. It varies in texture and thickness from one part of the body to the next. It consists of two main layers the epidermis and the dermis. The epidermis refers to the surface laver and is made of several sheets of skin cells. The dermis lies underneath and consists of elastic fibres (elastin), for suppleness, and protein fibres (collagen) for strength. Sebaceous glands, hair follicles, nerves and blood vessels are found in the dermis.

The two broad categories of skin wounds include abrasions and incised wounds.

First aid for abrasions An abrasion means that the surface layers of the skin (epidermis) has been broken. Thin-skinned bony areas (like knees, ankles and

elbows) are more prone to abrasions than thicker, more padded areas. The scraped skin of an abrasion can contain particles of dirt. First aid treatment includes:

* Clean the wound with a non-fibre shedding material or sterile gauze, and use an antiseptic such as Betadine. If there is embedded dirt, Savlon may be used as it contains an antiseptic and a surfactant to help remove debris. Rinse the wound after

saline or flowing tap water. * Don't scrub at embedded dirt, as this can traumatise

the site even more. * Cover the cleaned wound

Change the dressing according to the manufacturer's instructions (some may be left in place for several days to a week). If you reapply antiseptic, wash it off after five minutes and then redress the wound.

First aid for incised wounds Incised wounds are caused by sharp objects, such as knives or shards of glass, slicing into the skin. Depending on the injury, underlying blood vessels can be punctured, leading to significant blood loss. A severed artery is a medical emergency, because the muscular action of this blood vessel will pump the entire blood supply out of the wound in just a few minutes.

First aid treatment for severe bleeding includes: * Remove clothing around the site for easier access

Apply pressure directly to the wound with your hands to stem the blood flow

Cover the wound with a sterile dressing, if possible, and continue to apply direct pressure (bandage firmly).

Try to raise the injured area above the level of the person's

Don't remove existing dressings if they become saturated with blood, but instead add fresh dressings over the top.

 Seek urgent medical attention. You may need to call an ambulance if you cannot stop the bleeding, are feeling faint, sweaty or dizzy.

Tetanus-prone wounds

Some wounds are more likely to encourage the growth of tetanus bacteria than others, unless the person is immunised against tetanus. If it is more than five years since your last dose, you may need a booster. You should see your doctor without delay

Stages of healing

The body begins repairing a wound immediately and the process may continue for days, weeks, months or even years, depending on the injury. The basic stages of healing

* The body takes action to maintain a normal state. Blood vessels to the wound constrict, with an appropriate non-stick reducing blood loss. Blood

platelets gather at the site to form a clot

Once the clot has formed, the blood vessels dilate, allowing maximum blood flow to the site. This causes inflammation. White blood cells start cleaning the site of bacteria, micro-organisms and other foreign agents.

New layers of collagen are laid at the site. Capillaries are formed to service the new skin

Contraction occurs at the edges of the wound to reduce the size of the wound.

Surface skin cells migrate from one side of the wound to the other, covering the wound with cells to form the new skin. * Depending on the injury, the site is left with a scar. Generally, scar tissue isn't as

strong as undamaged skin. Treatment for cuts and abrasions

Some wounds are too large for the body to seal without help. Your doctor will decide whether or not a wound requires stitching or gluing. General suggestions to take care of a stitched wound

Keep the site dry and clean. It may be covered with an occlusive thin film dressing, which is waterproof and protective.

* Only apply lotions or ointments to the wound if instructed to do so by medical staff.

* Try not to exert yourself, as physical activity may cause the site to bleed.

* Seek medical advice immediately if the site starts to produce pus, swell or exude a disagreeable odour.

The 994 House candidate is greater than the 849 candidates in 2010, but compares to more than 1,000 candidates from 1998 to 2007 and the record 1.188 in 2013. The electorates with the fewest candidates is Gorton (3), while there are seven electorates with 11 candidates, Grayndler and Lindsay in NSW, Batman, Dunkley and Murray in Victoria, Longman in Queensland and Solomon in the Northern Territory. 631 is a record number of candidates for a Senate election, up from 529 candidates in 2016. Some of this increase is caused by the election being a double dissolutuion, with many parties standing more than

There has also been a surge the Hunter electorate there in ungrouped candidates in several states.

Expressed as an average number of candidates per vacancy, the numbers decline from 13.2 candidates per vacancy in 2013 to 8.3 in 2016. Only South Australia has seen a substantial decrease in the numbers of groups on the ballot paper. 631 candidates is much greater than the 255 that contested the 1987 double dissolution Senate election, 271 in 1875 and 245 in 1974. There are 151 Senate candidates in NSW in 2016 compared to 50 in 1987.

Locally the old electorate of Hunter will see around 40.000 voters in Kurri Kurri and western Maitland transferred to Paterson – an important development, since it turns the 9.8% Liberal margin there into a notional Labor margin of 1.3% – while 9500 voters at rural areas in the north are ceded to New England. Restoration and rehabilitation of Lower Hunter dry rainforest Minister claims 'astounding' says



Hunter Councils has been successful in receiving \$99,618 in funding from the Environmental Trust to assist in improving the condition and resilience of Lower Hunter dry rainforest at the Hunter River Reserve, Greta. Cessnock City Council co-wrote the application

and are active partners in

the project from both a strategic and on-ground perspective, with Council's weed control staff addressing a number of high priority issues on the site.

The three year project will commence from August 2016, with an aim to improve the current state of Lower Hunter dry

rainforest along the entire extent of the reserve. Funded by the NSW Environment Trust, the Restoration and Rehabilitation Program encourages and enables community and government organisations to protect, conserve and restore our valuable natural environment.

Cessnock City Mayor Councillor Bob Pynsent said the area is extremely important as it contains one of the last remaining forests of its kind in the Lower Hunter.

"The reserve is a hidden gem of the Cessnock local government area and is highly valuable as it contains one of the

few examples of intact native vegetation along the Hunter River. The reserve includes two endangered ecological communities under the NSW Threatened Species Act along the upper western section," Cr Pynsent said.

"This project is needed to protect remnant vegetation from widespread weed infestations within two gullies and reduce erosion along the steeper sections." Bush regeneration and targeted weed control works will be carried out to improve the condition and resilience of Hunter Valley Dry Rainforest within the reserve, Greta and adjacent properties in the Lower Hunter. This project provides the

opportunity for extensive partnership and collaboration with local councils, agencies and landowners which will result in positive biodiversity outcomes. Latest figures show Singleton on the rise

SINGLETON'S economy is showing signs of significant recovery according to an assessment of economic data within the Singleton Local Government

The figures indicate a 4.2 per cent improvement in Singleton's gross regional

Three years ago Singleton's gross regional product (total value of all the goods and services sold) stood at \$5.5billion. By August 2015 that figure had dropped to \$3.5billion with a significant amount of this due to the downturn in the mining

industry. However, by April this year, the figure increased to \$3.9 billion, with all key indicators forecasting continued improvement. The figures show improvement in almost every aspect of Singleton's economy, except for the mining sector.

Topping the improvement list is the provision of administration and supply services that has increased a massive 49 per cent over the past three years. This category includes businesses such as employment and recruitment agencies, touring and travel businesses, documentation preparation and administration support. The value of this sector to the Singleton economy stood at \$222million in

April this year.

Retail trade is up 27 per cent over the past three years from \$89million to \$113million and real estate is showing signs of recovery with a 36 per cent increase from \$307m in 2013 to \$418million in April this year. Singleton Council's General Manager Jason Linnane says this highlights the importance for diversification in our

local economy "There is a real opportunity to drive innovation in the Singleton economy through business collaboration," he says. "Even recently we have seen new retailers open their doors in our CBD, which

indicates confidence growth in the retail sector. "Council recognises the significant role local

businesses play in sustaining a viable economy and it is very pleasing to see these aspects of our economy gaining positive and well deserved results.'

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OEH working with Cessnock Council and local community on North Rothbury Persoonia



The Office of Environment and Heritage (OEH) is working with Cessnock City Council and the local community to conserve the critically endangered North Rothbury Persoonia (Persoonia pauciflora). The Persoonia grows only within a small area near North Rothbury within the Cessnock City Council Local Government Area. Recent studies of the North Rothbury Persoonia population have recorded an increase in numbers over the past five years from under 350 mature individuals to around 1,000 individuals, including many juvenile plants. However, these plants only occur at a small number of sites, with most occurring on private property or along road

verges. Sharon Molloy Senior Team Leader Ecosystems & Threatened Species said OEH recently held planting days involving the community and the council to establish new populations of the Persoonia in bushland around North Rothbury using nursery plants in an effort to increase the local population and give the species a better chance of survival.

"It was great to have the local community involved in the recovery program as we often rely on members of the community to supply information on the plants as they mostly occur on private property.

"Having the community involved in the program will further strengthen the plant's chances of survival and we welcome their involvement," Ms Molloy

The plants were grown at the Australian Botanic Garden at Mount Annan as

part of a research project to help conserve this species. The Persoonia is also earmarked under the NSW Government's flagship \$100 Million Saving our Species program to ensure the population's viability in the long term. To learn about future

"OEH undertook a survey of the North Rothbury Persoonia population to assist in understanding the species' distribution and provide opportunity for seed and plant collection," Ms Molloy said.

"As a result seed and plant cuttings were collected from as many wild plants as possible to create healthy new populations of the Persoonia to help the species strengthen its foothold in the area and possibly increase its distribution.



If you're a first home buyer you probably know that you're eligible for government assistance, commonly known as first home owner grants. But how exactly does this work? And how much do you get?

Differences across Australia The process is similar across Australia, but there are differences between jurisdictions. In all states and mainland territories, you have two options when applying for a grant:

1. You can lodge your application through an 'approved agent', which is the bank or financial institution

providing your mortgage OR

You can download the application form, complete and lodge it yourself with the authorities once you have completed the sales transaction.

You also need to provide the government with supporting paperwork to prove you're eligible, including the contract of sale, contract to build, and proof of your identity. If you apply via a lending institution, grant payments will usually be available for settlement or the first construction progress payment. If you apply directly

to the government agency, most will pay the grant into your bank account when your purchase is complete. NSW

In NSW, there is a \$15,000 grant for new homes purchased for \$650,000 or less, and a Regional Relocation Grant of \$7,000 if you move from a metropolitan area to a home in a regional area. There are also exemptions from transfer duty on new homes valued up to

\$550,000 and vacant land up to \$350,000, as well as concessions for new homes valued between \$550,000 and \$650,000 and vacant land valued between \$350,000 and \$450,000

Ten things to check before buying a home

Buying a home is one of the biggest decisions you will ever make so how can you be sure everything will go to plan?

Here are 10 things to check before you sign the deal.

1. Research the local area "Purchasing a house

should never be an impulse buy," says Bessie Hassan, a money expert at financial comparison website Finder.com.au. According to recent data from the website, 33 per cent of first home buyers wish they had looked around more before they purchased their property and 22 per cent regret the area in which they

You should thoroughly research the suburb you're contemplating. Is there considerable crime in the area? Has the local council employed restrictions that

prohibit you from building extensions in the future? What amenities are available that will cater to your requirements?"

2. Find out why the property is on the market Ask the agent why they are selling, says Anna Porter, principal and senior property adviser at property investment specialists, Suburbanite. "Try to dig into the story a little but do it in a chatty friendly way, not a confrontational way. This might reveal more than you think."

3. Make sure your finance neighbours is in place

"One of the pieces of advice I give most often when people tell me they are going to buy a house is to get their finance sorted before they even go on Domain.com.au," says Ben Munro Smith, licensed real estate agent at McGrath Estate Agents, in

Balmain, Sydney.

"I was once at an auction where the property sold to a young couple who had only seen the home for the first time that week. They had the deposit so could exchange at auction, but they later realised their borrowing capacity couldn't get them the loan for the full amount. In the end, thanks to the bank of mum and dad, the property sale went through, but save yourself the hassle and call a mortgage broker first."

4. Check out the

"There is no reason why vou can't knock on the neighbour's door to have a chat and get their feedback on the area," recommends Porter. "Remember that you could be living next door to these people for a long time. If they are lunatics, it would be better to know before you move in. A bad

neighbour can really impact your quality of life.' 'Neighbours doing extensions can be a reason for people to move" says Munro Smith. "Sometimes there is a falling out, sometimes it's a gentle push that it might be time to look elsewhere, sometimes

"I once sold for a client who was selling after only a short amount of time in the property," says Munro Smith. "When I asked what the reason was for the sale, she confided that she had only seen the property once before the sale, on a Wednesday. "This is simply a must when signing a contract in NSW," says Porter. "Always get a conveyancer or solicitor to review the contract."

7. Get a building report, strata report and pest inspection

Have a building and pest inspection even if the property is new as not all properties are built to the same quality, says Michelle Amarant, director of Amalain Buyer and Vendor Advocates in Melbourne. "We always recommend a building report for all purchases, even units,' agrees Porter. "This is

find issues that owners and tenants may not know exist. Like failing waterproofing or leaks in the roof. If the property occupants don't know the problem exists, they will not report it to strata and it therefore will not be in a strata report. A building inspector can also lend commentary to issues that could arise in the future from poor design, problems starting to present that could become costly if not fixed or bad workmanship that will deteriorate."

8. Check the surrounding zoning

"This will help you know if a property behind you or next to you is zoned for high-rise units or something else that you may not like to live near," says Porter. "If you are buying a house in a nice quiet street and next year a seven-storey unit block goes up over the back fence, will that be a deal breaker? The surrounding zoning can give you some indication if this is at all possible in the near future "

9. Check for proposed arterial roads

Finding out if there are any major road proposals for next to or near you is very important, says Porter.

"Imagine buying your dream home, only to find out that a four-lane freeway is being built over the back fence in 12 months. There are a few ways you can find this out. You can check the RTA website, the local council website, call your local council, check the zoning (arterial roads will be zoned differently and you may see a corridor of rezoned homes - this can be an indication of future planning intentions), and in some instances you can see it on online maps like Google maps or Whereis.com."

10. Check for environmental hazards Always, always, always check for environmental hazards that could impact the property, says Porter. "Known hazards can impact insurances as well as values. If your property is in a known flood zone, land subsidence area or bushfire zone to name a few, this could mean that your insurance may not cover you for these disasters. Or they could significantly premium load your policy to get full cover and that could cost you thousands of dollars extra per year."





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Free Grammar Checker

I've had my eye on the site Grammarly for a long

time, but it's always been a pay for service, so I'm delighted that they've released a free version! The free version is Grammarly Editor. It is an automated proofreader that will check your writing for over 250 different common grammatical errors, spelling mistakes, and more! It's available for Chrome, Safari, Firefox, and Microsoft Word.

I've been using it at home on my desktop computer to help catch spelling errors in abstracts that I'm cataloging for work, and I have to say I'm really impressed with the free version.

If you look at the image on the main page, you'll see that it shows words underline in either green or red. That indicates places where Grammarly suggests there is an error. It could be a spelling, punctuation, or grammar error. If you click on it in text the suggested correction for the error, and then if you agree with the correction you can just click and it will autocorrect it. You also have the option of clicking the red circle at the bottom of the document to deal with all the errors Grammarly found at one time. I like this option, because it feels more efficient.

This is a really cool application that will help you improve your writing. Go check it out for yourself



Chromebooks Outsell

Chromebooks look like a laptop, but they are actually Internet appliances that run the Chrome operating system.

Really more like tablets in the body of a laptop.



They usually are far less expensive than traditional laptops. And that's leading to booming sales. The devices have actually surpassed Macs in sales for the first time. Around 2 million Chromebooks shipped last quarter compared to 1.76 million Mac shipments. Most of those Chromebook sales are to schools, which purchase them for students to use

PC Sales Still Struggling

While rising demand for Chromebooks is a bright spot in the laptop market, overall demand for PCs continues to struggle with demand falling more than 11% compared to last year. PC shipments fell nearly 6% in the first quarter of 2015.

Dell managed to overtake HP as the most popular provider of PCs in the U.S. The company actually managed to show a growth in sales of 4.2% compared to a 14.1% decline for HP.

PC sales have suffered as consumers increasingly turn to smartphones for their personal computing needs.

Uber Is Checking Your Battery Life

Companies can learn a lot about you from your smartphone. They can even tell if you're willing to pay more for a taxi ride. In a recent interview with NPR Uber's head of Economic research admitted that the Uber app collects information about the battery level on your phone.



The company has learned through research that people with low cell-phone batteries are more likely to be willing to pay higher prices for rides. (During busy times Uber raises its fare rates to what they call "surge" pricing which can be double or more the regular rates.) Although he promises they don't use that information to raise the price of your ride.

Will I Need To Reinstall Office?

I get a lot of questions about Microsoft Office and Windows 10. A reader asks: "I run Windows 7 and Office 2007. When I update to Windows 10, will my Office have to be reinstalled? Thank you for your help and interesting and useful letters to the years.



Updating to Windows 10 shouldn't affect programs already installed on your PC (with the exception of things that are part of the Windows 7 operating system like Media Center and the built-in Games pack.) Programs and files are left undisturbed by the upgrade (some folks have had issues, but the vast majority have not). The only problem you might see if that an older program might not be compatible with Windows 10. In this case, Microsoft says Office 2007 and forward will be compatible with Windows 10. I'd still make sure that all of my important files are backed up before doing the upgrade. They should all be backed up anyway, but if they aren't, this is a good time to do it. Is Windows 10 A Resident Program?

A reader wanted to know more about how Windows 10 works. "Is Windows 10 a resident program or is part of it or all of it in the cloud, like the new

Your free Windows 10 upgrade is here!

While Windows 10 does use a lot of cloud features, the program is installed on your hard drive and can fully function offline. You do, of course, need Internet access to do updates or access cloud storage. While you can choose to use Office programs in the cloud, you can also fully download all office programs to your hard drive and use them offline. When you activate Office, you don't have to download all of the programs at once, unless you choose to. But once they are activated, they are fully functional without Internet access. You do, of course, need Internet access to run updates and access cloud storage. That's not to be confused with Microsoft's free Office Online. Those are available for free, but you do need to use the

iOS vs. OS

A reader wrote in with this question. "I bought an app cam for use with IOS Vista. Found the App download on iTunes which I had to download to get for free.When I tried to download I was told it would not work for any IOS older than Win 7. I am using Vista. *Is there a work-around?*



To quote a classic movie line, "What we have here is a failure to communicate." I think you've mixed up the terms iOS and OS. OS is short for operating system. Windows is an OS. So is Android. Actually, iOS is also an OS. *iOS* is the operating system for mobile products manufactured by Apple such as the iPhone, iPad and iPod. (That's why it's "i" OS). So, you can't have an iOS Windows 7. What you probably need is a device running iOS 7 or later, iOS 7 is a version of the Apple mobile operating system.

An iOS app will not work on a Windows PC. If you want to use a device with a Windows PC, you first need to make sure that it works with a PC and then with the particular version of Windows you're running. Windows operating systems will be identified as Windows Vista, Windows 7, Windows 8.1 or Windows 10

Will A Factory Reset Fight Ransomware?

A reader's daughter was a victim of a ransomware attack. "My daughter 's computer was hi-jacked for ransom. since she is only 9 years old, my e-mail is the main one on her computer and hers is tied into mine. my info has been accessed but what I need to know is I ran her computer back to day 1 as if I were to sell it with all our info removed, did this remove the ransomware????" You were very lucky that you were able to factory reset her PC. A lot of ransomware would prevent you from doing that. A factory reset that wipes out all of her files should take care of the problem. I say should, because I have heard of bugs crafty enough to rewrite part of the OS and escape a reset. But, fortunately, that's unlikely. I also hope you immediately installed virus and malware protection & scanned it.

The benefits of the Torrens Title system

One of my constant themes throughout all the series I have written has been the benefits of the Torrens Title system - a system as the then Chief Justice of Australia wrote - not of registration of title but of title by registration; that is that one does not have title till one is registered.

But there are a few exceptions to this rule that you don't have title unless its registered and the first and most important of them is easements.

The Real Property Act - the act setting up the Torrens system in New South Wales provides that a registered proprietor's interest in land is subject to the omission or misdescription of an easement subsisting immediately before the land was brought under the provisions of this Act or validly created at or after that time under this or any other Act or a Commonwealth Act.

Incidentally, the phrase the act uses to describe an owner "The registered proprietor" again shows the importance of being registered.

The first group of easements that trump a registered proprietor's interest is an easement that existed before the land burdened by the easement was brought under the Torrens title system. I've written about this before, telling you that there are several properties in High Street Maitland where there were easements created by a written agreement (generally a 'conveyance' - the deed used to transfer land that isn't under the Torrens system but sometimes a deed simply creating the easement) before the land was 'converted' to the Torrens system and do not appear on the Torrens

The reason appears to be that the Registrar General- the government office controlling the title registries - does not normally record these easements on Torrens title deeds when it converts the title which it does these days by a largely administrative process. This in turn is because it does not search back the chain of title deeds to see whether an easement was created perhaps 80 years ago but only examines the most recent deed and then issues a Torrens 'certificate of title' based on that most recent deed.

The problem can be fixed - even when the owner of the land burdened by the easement refuses to assist you. I've done it. You lodge a form - called a Request - asking the Registrar General to register the easement with two other documents. First a supporting 'search 'showing the title deed by which the easement was created and every title deed since (these are required to show that the easement was not released in the years between when it was created and when the land was brought under the Torrens system). Second a statutory declaration (or even better two) by independent people who live locally who say that the easement is and has so long as they can remember been in use.

The Registrar General then writes to the owner of the land burdened by the easement telling him or her that unless he or she takes action within a month the Registrar General will register the easement on their land. The action is normally to seek a "declaration" in the Supreme Court that the easement does not exist. I have never seen anyone take that action.

But as I wrote in my series on roads and rights of way last year easements are not always created by a written agreement. They can be created by "implication" by, for example, an owner of land building a duplex on his or her land - such that each house of the duplex requires support for the common wall from the other house (which is usually the case) and then selling one of the houses. An easement for support will arise in favour of both blocks of land. Another and more contentious

issue (and I've written about this before) is when an owner uses part of his or her land to the benefit of another part of their land in such a way that had it been two separate lots an independent person would have thought there was an easement over the part used and in favour of the part benefited. The owner then sells the part so benefited. The law implies an easement.

Examples of such a use are a drain on part of the land draining the other part, part of the land being used for vehicular access to the other part, and even the right to use a "garbage room" in a large shopping centre.

These implied easements also prevail against the registered proprietor. Perhaps the best example is one of the first cases to decide this, the Court of Appeal decision in Beck v Auerbach. Before 1911 two houses were built on two adjoining blocks owned by the one owner. Perhaps because survey techniques were then not nearly as good as they are now, the wall of one of the homes was over the boundary of the adjoining block and pipes and wires overhung still further. In 1911 the owner sold the block on which was the house which encroached onto the adjoining block which he retained. Soon after the new owner successfully applied to have his block brought under the Torrens system (in those days the only way to 'convert' the title system was by a "Primary Application" a quite involved and expensive procedure - these days there are

The original owner sold the block he retained and some time later a later purchaser of this land also successfully applied to have this block brought under the Torrens system.

several other simpler ways).

Both conversions had been done without anyone apparently noticing the encroaching wall, pipes

60 years later – in the 1980s there was a dispute between the then owners (who by then were many steps removed from the original ones), and the owner of the land who encroached on the other sought and obtained orders that that they had a right to go into and upon the adjoining land to maintain and repair their own home and the right to permit such parts of their own home as overhung the adjoining land in 1911 to continue to so overhang. Both of those rights are easements and had been omitted from the title deed. The title deeds were then corrected by court order to show the easements.

The most interesting comment the judges made from my point of view is that the primary obligation of the Registrar-General is to investigate and to consider the title of applicants seeking to bring land under the Act and that investigation required consideration of the question whether any and if so what easements had been created in relation to the building on the adjoining land and which should be noted on the applicant's certificate of title.


The court continued by saying A proper investigation would have revealed the existence of the easements (for overhang, support and access to carry out repairs)

I say that is the most interesting comment because it strongly suggests that the Registrar General should investigate titles more fully when converting them to Torrens land and not rely on its present practice in just looking at the current deed.

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Provide retirees with tax incentives

The state government must recognise the key contribution retirees can play in the housing





As part of a review of its Real Tax Policy ahead of the June 2016 NSW Budget, REINSW has called on the state government to make amendments to stamp duty

REINSW President John Cunningham said that unfortunately for many of our retirees, the prospect of selling their existing property and relocating to a property that better responds to their current requirements is subordinated to the cost of the stamp duty involved with relocating

"Stamp duty is seen as money thrown away in the transaction, and for a retiree with minimal income, this becomes an important consideration," Mr Cunningham

"The decision not to sell, has an adverse affect not only on the retiree but also on other property consumers who could and would make better use of the retirees property. This supply blockage distorts construction strategies and puts unnecessary pressure on infrastructure.

"REINSW believes the state government has a number of options to elicit a positive response from retirees, which will increase stock, favourably affect affordability and drive construction of high quality, higher density and more efficient dwellings by developers.

Mr Cunningham called for the NSW government to provide retirees with a 50 per cent reduction in stamp duty for a residential property purchased to replace an existing residential property up to the value of \$1 million. In combination with this strategy there needs to be genuine and compelling incentives for

retirees to relocate to regional areas. "A reduction in stamp duty will drive an increase in

transactions," Mr Cunningham said. "The revenue Government loses from he retiree's

purchase is more than compensated for, form the revenue earned by the purchase of the retirees property. This is a sale that would not have occurred but for the incentive.

"Meanwhile, encouraging retirees to relocate to regional areas takes pressure off an already strained greater metropolitan infrastructure system," Mr Cunningham said.

REINSW tax policy calls for first homebuver relief

It is time for the state government to put the interests of first homebuyers at the top of its agenda, according to the Real Estate Institute of New South Wales. As part of a review of its Real Tax Policy ahead of the make. June 10, 2016 NSW Budget, REINSW has called for the state government to make amendments to stamp

duty for first homebuyers. REINSW President John Cunningham said our first homebuyers are a class of property consumer that

needs assistance. "Home ownership is not only something that individuals should aspire to, it is also something that government should foster and encourage as a means of building wealth and providing for a persons care post

employment," he said. Mr Cunningham called for the NSW government to provide first homebuyers with a 50 per cent reduction in the stamp duty on a purchase of a residential property less than \$1 million and provide the ability to pay the stamp duty over time.

"Not supporting first homebuyers, is to say the least short sighted and creates the risk that our best and brightest will be enticed to other states where the dream of home ownership can be a reality. The existing first homebuyer incentives are focused on

new dwellings. The strategy being, by focusing demand toward new properties this will correct the supply problem. 'Unfortunately the strategy has two major short comings, firstly most first homebuyers buy existing properties as new dwellings are financially beyond their capacity. Secondly increasing demand will not solve the supply problem. "We refer to ourselves us the Premier State, if there is truth behind the words then providing a pathway for our first homebuyers into their own home, is a clear way to demonstrate that the words have substance," Mr

Blood On The Track

Tycoon of Victorian sires writes more Danehill long distance performer headlines

FEW sires used at stud in Victoria have had a better year with progeny on the racetrack than Written Tycoon, a sire whose 2015-16 Australian earnings jumped above \$9million, when his 4-year-old gelded son Music Magnate took out the \$750,000 Group1 Doomben 10,000 (1350m) on this historic Brisbane track on Saturday May 28.

These earnings, a Victorian record, have been swelled to over \$11million by the successes of twenty of his progeny competing in either New Zealand, Singapore, Malaysia or Hong Kong. Through to the end of May his statistics for the year included 131 winners (120 Aust), 51 others placed, 212 race wins (195 Aust) and \$11,078,080 (\$9,223,659

In the national statistics, he is third on the Champion Sires list by money, winners and wins and is unbeatable by earnings in the race for the Champion Australian juvenile title.

His black type contributors in 2015-16 have included eight stakes winners (four at two including one in New Zealand) and four others stakes placed. Group1 winners during the year have been the 2-year-olds Capitalist (dam by Fusaichi Pegasus (USA); four wins, \$3,508,700, won ATC Golden Slipper, Gold Coast Magic Millions 2YO Classic, Wyong Magic Millions Classic, ATC Breeders' Plate), Luna Rossa (More Than Ready (USA); won Manawatu Sires' Produce Stakes) and Doomben10,000 winner Music

A good prospect for more glory in the \$1.5million Stradbroke on rebuilt Eagle Farm on June 11, Music Magnate had not won above Group 3 before, but had indicated that he is an emerging star in the current racing year with three successive wins in Sydney and a tenacious second in the Luskin Star at Scone (May 14) since late September. Trained by Kiwi Bjorn Baker (Warwick) for a tribe of excited owners, he has a career record of six wins, four seconds, a third and \$825,000 from 12 starts.

Music Magnate was foaled in New Zealand for NZ Holdings Ltd, but is the product of the mating in Victoria at Eliza Park of Todman Slipper Trial Stakes winner Written Tycoon, a showy chestnut by the Last Tycoon Australian 1200m record holder Iglesia, with Concert Girl, a non-winner by Coolmore shuttled Danehill Dancer (Ire).

A half-sister to Marrok, winner of the Group 2 Wellington Guineas, and Appeal Process, a South African Group 3 sprint winner, Concert Girl is from Review, an unraced daughter of Chalayer, a top performer up to 2800m by the runner up in the ATC Australian Derby Luskin Star sire Covetous. In the first three in 14 events, Chalayer included in her efforts wins in the AJC St Leger, Adrian Knox, seconds in the AJC Sydney Cup, STC Kingston Town - twice, thirds VRC Victoria Oaks, STC Canterbury Guineas and MVRC Moonee Valley Cup.

Inbred 4x3 to Star Kingdom, Chalayer was out of Plady King, an unraced Planet Kingdom mare out of Lindsay (Ire), an unplaced half-sister to Gypsy Moss (GB), a Mossborough mare who won five races in Australia for the Foysters of Gooree Park. Mudgee NSW, including the Queensland Tattersall's Cup and AJC Narwee Handicap. She split champions Divide and Rule and Black Onyx in finishing second in the 1970 Stradbroke.

A relation of 1954 English Derby winner and influential sire Never Say Die, Gypsy Moss became a major matriarch. Foyster matings to Planet Kingdom produced Our Planet (won Queensland Derby, Grand Prix, second AJC Derby) and Gypsy Kingdom (won AIC Warwick S second AJC Doncaster, STC George Ryder).

Also, u sing Planet Kingdom and Ideal Image, a Vain mare who didn't earn in only two starts, the Foyster's bred Ideal Planet, winner of nine races, including the Doomben 10,000, and second in the VRC Newmarket, AJC Galaxy and MVRC William Reid.

Retired to the stallion yards at Eliza Park in 2007 on a fee of \$8,750 (including GST), but moved several years ago to the Woodside Park Stud at Tylden in Victoria's Macedon Ranges territory, Music Magnate's sire Written Tycoon has had books of 177 and 184 in the last two seasons. He is facing up to another big book in the 2016 season, one for which his fee has been lifted to \$49,500 (inc

ONLY two of the 89 Group1 winners (48 sired in Australia and the others got at Coolmore in Ireland) of dual hemisphere supersire Danehill won at 3200m or further. They were Westerner, a Great Britain produced world champion long distance performer, and the Australian Danestorm, a winner of Brisbane Cup (at that time Group1 over this distance) and runner up in the Adelaide Cup.

Danestorm may have been a serious contender for the Melbourne Cup if he gone round in it. It is a race in which three Australian Danehill Group1 winners who never won beyond 2500m acquitted themselves well. They were Nothin' Leica Dane, the second placegetter at three and fifth at four, Elvstroem, fourth at four, and Zipping, twice fourth.

These Aussies were overshadowed in long distance racing by the deeds in Europe of Westerner, a horse who is recalled because of his relationship to Mighty Lucky, the Fred Cowell Gosford trained 6-year-old gelding who was having his 41st start and claiming his ninth win when he took out the Group 3 Lord Mayor's Cup over 1615m at Doomben on May 28. He had won two successive races at Randwick, December 25 (2000m), Summer Cup-G3 (2000m) and April 16 (1400m), finished a close second in the Hawkesbury Cup-G3 (1600m) April 30 and, on the way to Brisbane, sixth of 16 in the Scone Cup-LR (1600m).

Burdened with 64.0 kgs in each of the Hawkesbury and Scone races, but dropped to 59.0 for the Brisbane outing, Mighty Lucky was bought privately by Cowell off his breeders, Phil and Gayle Greenwood of Tamworth, Earlier manager of the Thurecht's Westminster Stud near Camden NSW, they raised his mother, the non-winning Octagonal mare Buxom Babe, and her brilliant Snippets half-sister High Rolling, a winner of six races, including the AJC Breeders' Plate and Gosford Pacesetter Stakes.

Mighty Lucky's grandam Woman of Valor, is an unraced American bred three -quarter sister by Lyphard (Northern Dancer) to the Pathos, grandam of Jymcarew (Danzero), a Greenwood bred winner of the Canterbury Guineas and Gosford Guineas, and third dam of Jameka, a winner of the VRC Victorian Oaks and Sires' Produce Stakes and and MRC Thousand Guineas.

The next dam, Warfever (Fr) (by Luthier), won at Group1 in America and was a half-sister to Waya (Champion American Handicap Mare,14 wins, four Group1s) and Warsaw, a Listed winner at 2600m in France and grandam though Walensee (Troy Group1 winner at 2400m) of Westerner.

A 1999 Danehill foal, Westerner, won 11 of 28 starts, headed by France's top staying test, the Prix du Cadran (4000m) twice, Prix Royal Oak (French St Leger, 3100m) – twice, Ascot Gold Cup (4000m), York Gold Cup (4000m), Prix Barbeville (3100m) twice, Prix Gladiator (3100m) and Prix Vicomtesse Vigier (3100m). Nine seconds included an



appearance in the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe.

Named Champion Stayer Europe 2004 and 2005, Champion Older Male Stayer France 2003, Champion Older Male Staver in GB in 2005 and at the top of the 2005 International Classification (extended), Westerner has been used by Coolmore in Ireland sire for both flat and jumps racing (National Hunt). He is currently in the top ten on the list of leading European National Hunt Sires.

Yarding 770 ~ Change -90 (Comparison Date 25/5/16)

Although the surrounding area received substantial rainfall throughout the week, numbers remained equal and quality was mixed. The bulk was younger cattle with a mixture suitable for the restockers and butcher orders. There was a greater selection of heavy weight grown steers and bullocks, as around 110 cows were in the penning. The usual buyers competed in a dearer market. Vealer steers returning to the paddock gained 14c to 19c, as the medium weights made from 281c to 350c, with the heavier



end topping at 337c before averaging 331c/kg. The vealer heifers to the same orders improved 18c, making from 290c to 318c/kg. The limited supply of yearlings to the restockers also sold to dearer trends. Prime conditioned younger cattle to the butchers lifted from 5c to 15c, with the best topping at 352c/kg. Heavy weight grown steers and bullocks ranged from 285c to 313c/kg, depending on age, as the heifer portion reached 300c/kg. Cows gained from 8c to 15c, as the plainer 2 scores averaged 213c, with the better finished 3 and 4 score heavy weights making from 230c to 249c/kg.

Yarding 493 ~ Change –1027 (Comparison Date 31/5/16)

Weather conditions contributed to a smaller yarding and quality was fair to good. Vealers were well supplied, with limited numbers of yearling steers and heifers, while around 57 cows were in the penning. The usual buyers competed in a dearer market. The vealer steers to the restockers lifted 24c, as the medium weights sold from 317c to 353c, with the heavier end averaging 328c after topping at 333c/kg. The heifer portion also to restocker orders improved 30c, as the medium weights ranged from 291c to



324c, with the lighter weights reaching 334c/kg. The yearling steers returning to the paddock gained 9c, making from 308c to 328c/kg. The majority of the yearling heifers were in prime condition and suitable for the butcher orders. The prime conditioned younger cattle lifted 15c to 20c, with the bulk receiving in the 310c to 337c/kg range. The older steers sold to solid competition, with those showing 2 teeth selling up around the 327c/kg to the lot feeder orders. The cows gained from 12c to 20c, as the plainer 2 scores averaged 209c, with the better covered 3 and 4 score heavy weights ranging from 226c to 250c/kg.

Yarding 595 ~ Change - 754 (Comparison Date 39/5/16)

With rainfalls of 50mm and more across the district the numbers fell by more than half. A large percentage were light and medium weight young cattle suitable to restock and feed while cows accounted for most of the grown cattle. Despite the low number all the regular buyers were in attendance with demand for all classes high. Restockers were active on all classes of light weight young cattle with steer vealers selling to



dearer trend, up 14c to 17c/kg. Heifer vealers to restock were up to 20c/kg dearer. The lower numbers also brought with it a general improvement in average quality which in turn had a mostly positive effect on average price changes. Medium weight yearling steers to feed sold to a dearer trend, up to 8c/kg with increased competition. Heavy yearling feeder steers were firm to cheaper, however much of the price change was breed related. There were strong gains for heifer yearlings to restock and feed regardless of quality. There were dearer trends through the grown cattle with strong price gains for medium weight 2 and 3 score cows in comparison to the heavy 4 score cows.

RESULTS FOR THE MARCH QUARTER 2016 FEEDLOT SURVEY 1 MLA's Market

□ The ALFA/MLA quarterly feedlot survey indicated the number of cattle on feed at the end of the March quarter had receded 5% year-on-year, to 914,901 head. Underpinning the decrease was NSW, with 291,312 head on feed (back 6%), and Queensland, with 495,578 head (back 5%). However, the number on feed remained historically high, buoyed by the low A\$, easing grain prices and continued strong international demand for grainfed beef.

□ Grainfed cattle turnoff during the quarter fell to 631,726 head, down 13% to represent 35% of national adult cattle slaughter. Shipments of grainfed beef for the March quarter reached 62,282 tonnes swt and were up 3%, or 1,888 tonnes swt, compared to the same period in 2015 (DAWR).

□ While the A\$ strengthened against the US\$ during the March quarter, averaging 72.18US¢, it remained 8% below 2015. Against the Yen the A\$ averaged 83.27\for the quarter, back 11% year-on-year. On the back of increased production, first quarter US grainfed exports was more competitive with Australian product; shipments to Japan lifted 7% year-on-year, to 42,963 tonnes swt, and exports to Korea increased 18%.

□ There was a large volume of Australian grainfed beef shipped to Korea in the first quarter, which jumped 63% from last year, to 13,187 tonnes swt, assisted by the third tariff cut occurring at the beginning of the year, combined with less locally produced Hanwoo product on the market.

On the other hand, there was an 18% decline in grainfed shipments to Japan, to 29,208 tonnes swt. Japanese demand was somewhat sluggish due to the reportedly high volumes many traders had at the time and increased competition from the US. Despite the fall, Japan still accounted for 47% of the quarter's total exports.

 Australian feeder cattle prices for the March quarter remained well above year-ago levels, with the eastern states saleyard feeder steer indicator up 33%, averaging 319.26¢/kg lwt, while the paddock purchased domestic feeder steer indicator increased 32% year-on-year. Grainfed cattle prices did not increase to the same extent, with the Queensland grainfed overthe-hook indicator averaging 535¢/kg cwt during the quarter, up 15% year-on-year.

 Partially offsetting the high cost of feeder cattle was cheaper feed grain prices, underpinned by high global supplies. Darling Downs feed wheat prices averaged 16% cheaper year-on-year, averaging \$263/ tonne for the quarter, sorghum prices declined 22%, to \$228/tonne, while barley prices averaged \$239/tonne, back 21% year-on-year (Profarmer).

One of the Pharisees asked Jesus to eat with him, and he went into the Pharisee's house and took his place at the table. And a woman in the city, who was a sinner, having learned that he was eating in the Pharisee's house, brought an alabaster jar of ointment. She stood behind him at his feet, weeping, and began to bathe his feet with her tears and to dry them with her hair. Then she continued kissing his feet and anointing them with the ointment.

Now when the Pharisee who had invited him saw it, he said to himself "If this man were a prophet, he would have known who and what kind of woman this is who is touching him-that she is a sinner." Jesus spoke up and said to him, "Simon, I have something to say to you." "Teacher," he replied, "Speak." "A certain creditor had two debtors; one owed five hundred denarii, and the other fifty. When they could not pay, he cancelled the debts for both of them. Now which of them will love him more?" Simon answered, "I suppose the one for whom he cancelled the greater debt." And Jesus said to him, "You have judged rightly." Then turning toward the woman, he said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? I entered your house; you gave me no water for my feet, but she has bathed my feet with her tears and dried them with her hair. You gave me no kiss, but from the time I came in she has not stopped kissing my feet. You did not anoint my head with oil, but she has anointed my feet with ointment. Therefore, I tell you, her sins, which were many, have been forgiven; hence she has shown great love. But the one to whom little is forgiven, loves little." Then he said to her, "Your sins are forgiven." But those who were at the table with him began to say among themselves, "Who is this who even forgives sins?" And he said to the woman, "our faith has saved you; go in peace."

Soon afterwards he went on through cities and villages, proclaiming and bringing the good news of the kingdom of God. The twelve were with him, as well as some women who had been cured of evil spirits and infirmities: Mary, called Magdalene, from whom seven demons had gone out, and Joanna, the wife of Herod's steward Chuza, and

Susanna, and many others, who provided for them out of their

Background on the Gospel Reading

Before Lent began we were reading Luke's version of the Sermon on the Mount, which is known as the Sermon on the Plain. This Gospel passage is taken from the following chapter of Luke's Gospel. The concern of this chapter, as well as in Chapters 8 and 9, is Jesus' identity as the Messiah, one who is greater than a prophet. Throughout the chapter Jesus has been performing miracles similar to those done by Old Testament prophets. When John the Baptist sent some of his disciples to Jesus to ask who he was, Jesus listed the miracles they had seen him perform and then compared himself with John the Baptist to show that he was

In today's Gospel Jesus sits down to eat a meal at the house of Simon, a Pharisee. A sinful woman approaches him, falls to her knees, wets his feet with her tears, dries them with her hair, and then anoints them with oil. A similar scene occurs in the other three Gospels, but in those versions the anointing takes place in Bethany, near Jerusalem, before Passover. In the other three Gospels, this anointing is related to his being proclaimed king by the crowds when he entered Jerusalem. It also related to his being anointed as a preparation for his burial. In Luke the anointing takes place north, in Galilee, early in his ministry.

Simon the Pharisee challenges Jesus, telling him that a prophet would surely know that a sinful person was touching him. Jesus responds by telling a story about the true nature of forgiveness Two men owe money. One owes an amount that would equal 500 days' wages. The other owes 50 days' wages. Yet the moneylender forgives the debt of both when they ask him. Simon is forced to admit that the one who had the bigger debt cancelled probably loves the moneylender more.


After telling the story, Jesus turns to the woman and tells her that ner sins are forgiven. In this scene we see that than heal physical ailments, as prophets of the past had done. He also forgives sins. This leaves the crowd to ask, "Who is this who even forgives sins?" This question is answered in Chapter 9 by Peter when he professes that Jesus is the Messiah and at the Transfiguration when the voice from heaven declares, "This is my chosen Son.

Today's reading ends with the first three verses of Chapter 8. At first they may seem unconnected to the scene that has come before. But they serve to show Jesus' ministry beginning to move from one town and village to another, proclaiming the Kingdom of God, until he eventually arrives in Jerusalem. He is accompanied not just by the Twelve but by a group of women, three of whom Luke names. It is significant that they are linked with the Twelve, and they seem to be equally important to Jesus' ministry. It is the women who provide for the needs of these travellers out of their own resources. Although in Palestinian society women had a much lesser role than men, in Luke's Gospel they are shown as equals.



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
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
