Cessnock City Council calls on Hunter Water to prioritise North Rothbury sewerage service

Cessnock City Council is backing North Rothbury residents and is calling on Hunter Water Corporation (HWC) to review their decision not to provide sewerage services to the area until 2024/25. Cessnock City Mayor,

Councillor Bob Pynsent said a motion was passed at last weeks Council meeting in support of North Rothbury residents and other villages in the Cessnock local government area gaining access to sewerage services earlier then currently planned.

"Council passed a resolution in 2014 which placed North Rothbury at the top of a list for the provision of sewerage services. The list included North Rothbury, Abernethy, Mulbring and Wollombi". "This priority list was established at the request of Hunter Water and was provided to them," Cr Pynsent said. Despite this in August HWC

advised Cessnock City Council North Rothbury is not on the agenda for at least a decade.

Cr Pynsent said he is extremely disappointed by the decision and believes it has unacceptable implications for residents. "North Rothbury is rapidly growing, Huntlee continues to expand and residents are struggling with their private septic sewage systems. I have heard directly from the residents about the impact this is having, treated effluent is spilling on to neighbouring properties and roadsides", Cr Pynsent said. As a result of the motion Council will reiterate its support for the 2014 resolution. Council will write to HWC and the Minister for Land and Water requesting urgent



that the necessary works be brought forward by HWC to be completed by August 2020.

Council will also seek support from Parliamentary Secretary for the Hunter, Scot Macdonald and the State Member for Cessnock, Clayton Barr, MP. North Rothbury Tidy Towns, at its last meeting, endorsed councils actions unanimously but some residents say that there needs to be more community consultation.

One resident said that the

on-site treatment tanks work properly if serviced and hoses moved regularly. "I think council need to police it more than they do as they don't seem to care (about improper servicing and drainage problems)", he

said. A spokesperson for North Rothbury Tidy Towns said that the issue is about the health risks associated with poorly maintained services and thanked Clr Dagg for putting the motion to council.

Cessnock Mayor Councillor Bob Pynsent, oversaw official proceedings with General Manager Stephen Glen as MC of the intimate event in the Council Chambers forecourt. "We provide a personal ceremony here at Cessnock, and today was no exception despite the urgency", Cr Pynsent said.

"Each new Australian Citizen is presented with a certificate, a native Australian plant and a commemorative gold coin to mark the occasion".

Born in Poole, England Mr Lummus migrated with his family at the age of 9 months and now lives in Cessnock to complete his studies. Studying at the Basair aviation college, Mr

"I think it's a very good idea for people and in particular service groups to recognise someone who is doing good work and nominate them."

Mayor of Singleton, Sue Moore said the Australia Day Awards were a wonderful way to highlight the many hours of volunteer work and commitment made to our community, and to say thank you to those who happily gave their time and effort.

These are people who go out of their way to contribute to making our community better, and they don't do it because they want to receive an award or a prize," she said.

'In fact, they are usually embarrassed by the attention. 'But it is important to recognise the work they do for the community, and to let them know that it is appreciated."



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
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Cessnock City Council hosted the seventh Development Consultation Forum at the Cessnock Performing Arts Centre, which included a feature presentation from the NSW Rural Fire Service. Cessnock City Mayor Councillor Bob Pynsent said land-use planning is an important part of building and preparing a community for future generations. "This forum is a great opportunity to share feedback and information with stakeholders about our plans for the future" "It is also brilliant platform to share the latest news about local and regional planning matters and to focus on different aspects of the planning system that need clarification". 'We are often reminded that having a plan is important ahead of each bushfire season but what is not as well known, is that managing the risk of bushfires and other hazards is a fundamental part of the planning process".





Drayton officially closes

Anglo American has closed its Drayton coal mine early as it failed to get approvals for its Drayton South project after the Planning and Assessment Commission (PAC) rejected Anglo American's Drayton South project on three occasions. The current Drayton mine ceased operations earlier this month as opposed to previously set date of December 2017.

Around 200 jobs have been lost, although a small team has been retained to manage the mine's rehabilitation commitments.

Concerns were raised earlier this year over Anglo American's ability to rehabilitate the mine. Conditions for the Drayton mine specify a three year period of decommissioning and rehab after the closure, however a 2014 Planning and Assessment Commission report said it was "not confident" the work would be carried out.

The proposed Drayton South extension plan was put forward as a way to extend the Anglo American operations in the Hunter Valley, however it saw consistent setbacks during its approval process eventually forcing its closure.

The Hunter Valley Wine and Tourism Association 2016 AGM was held last Wednesday 26th October at McWilliams Mount Pleasant Wines.

Three new board members were appointed to replace outgoing board members Bruce Tyrrell, Belinda Paterson and Steve George.

The new board members are Guiseppe Spagnolo from The Vintage, Gwyn Olsen (Pepper Tree and Briar Ridge Wines) and Chris Tyrrell (Tyrrell's Wines).

HVWTA chairman George Souris spoke highly of the departing trio mentioning their tremendous contribution to tourism in the Hunter Valley while on the board.

"Our immediate goal remains to grow overnight stays and day visitation by attracting greater shares of markets that fill non-peak seasonality and to target differential market penetration to attract a new segment of visitors," Mr Souris said.

"Twelve months on we can now see that the alliance (Cessnock & Singleton Council representation) has set the platform for future success and the realisation of the goals that will deliver outcomes for both the tourism and wine industries," he said.

Some of the key tourism achievements for Hunter Valley wine country for 2015 include:

- \$494 million economic contribution - \$108 million in salaries and wages

- 2451 jobs supported by tourism

- 1,484,000 domestic overnight visitor nights, representing

2.77% growth from the previous year - 19,141 international visitors, representing 81% growth from the previous year.

Because the third and final generator business in NSW, Essential Energy, primarily in National Party seats, won't be sold off, no matter how wonderful the outcome for city folks. So who exactly gets the wonderful and who misses out?

Primarily, I try to be a logical and factually driven member of Parliament, representing our community with my own political allegiances, but there are some days, many days in fact, where logic is an absent fact.

As this is an all-Australian consortium, there is no need to seek approval from the Foreign Investment Review Board. IFM Investors is a global fund manager owned by 29 Australian superannuation funds. AustralianSuper manages assets on behalf of more than two million members. One in 6 working Australians is a member of AustralianSuper. This lease means that for many, your money is being invested in your state, and it is your super that is investing in your power network. The Price Commissioner, Professor Allan Fels AO, has signed off on the Ausgrid transaction. The consortium has also signed the Electricity Prices Guarantee which confirms total Ausgrid network charges will be lower in 2019 than they were in 2014.

The NSW Government will of course retain 49.6 per cent of Ausgrid and will have an ongoing role as the lessor of the business and an investor.

Hot weather risks and staying cool

We live in a sunburnt country where hot days and heatwaves can stress our bodies. Here's how to stay cool and hvdrated. Heatwaves are a cause of

weather-related deaths in Australia and are also considered the most underrated of natural disasters in our country. There were almost 1,000 deaths during the severe heatwaves in southeastern Australia in 2009 when Melbourne sweltered through three consecutive days at or above 43 °C in late January. This was almost 400 more (mostly among people aged 75 or older) than the estimated average for that time of year

Who is most at risk from hot weather?

While most people find extremely hot weather and heatwaves uncomfortable, some people have a higher risk than others of becoming ill. These include:-Elderly people aged over 75

vears, babies and young children, people with long term health conditions, for example heart or respiratory disease, diabetesor

circulatory diseases, people who are obese, people taking certain medicines, people who are socially isolated, people who work outdoors or in hot and poorly ventilated areas, people engaging in vigorous physical activity in hot weather & people who are not acclimatised to the heat, for example overseas visitors.

It's important to keep drinking water even if you

drinks (including tea and coffee) because these can make dehydration worse. Keep your body cool Keeping as cool as possible can also help you prevent heat related illness. Making sure you

stay out of the sun, drinking cold drinks and eating smaller cold meals, such as salads and fruit, can help you to keep cool. Other things to do include wearing light coloured and loose fitting clothes made from natural fibres such as cotton, and taking cool showers or baths

Keep your house cool You can help keep your house cool by shutting curtains and blinds during the day. If you don't have air-conditioning, go to a cool place such as a library, shopping centre, cinema or swimming pool. Stay in the coolest room in the house and use the stove and oven as little

as possible. * Take care of others

Visit or call elderly friends, neighbours or relatives at least once a day. Check they have water in the fridge and encourage them to drink it. You may like to take them to a shopping centre, library or cinema with air conditioning. Children also need to be reminded to drink water, and babies, children or animals should never be left alone in a car, even if the air-conditioner is on. Ensure animals have water and plenty of shade if they are outside.

* Have a plan Keep an eye on the weather forecast and know who to call if This occurs when the body you need help. Ask your doctor if you have any health conditions that mean you are at greater risk of heat related illness, and what you need to do

about them to keep well in the heat. If you are unwell, contact

continue to drink plenty of water. Open windows and door to let your house cool down, contact family and friends to find out how they have coped and to see if they need help, and go to your doctor if you feel unwell. You might also like to think about how well you coped and if you would do anything differently next time, including making changes to your home to make it more comfortable during extreme heat periods. * Stay safe in the sun If you need to go out into the sun, it's important to protect your own skin and that of your

children's. If you avoid sunburns you reduce the risk of skin cancer, which is one of the most common cancer types in Australia. What heat related illnesses should I look out for?

*Heatrash This is an itchy, painful rash commonly called 'prickly heat'. It is caused by excessive sweating during hot, humid weather, and particularly affects

young children. Symptoms: A cluster of red pimples or small blisters, particularly on the neck or upper chest, or in creases in the groin, elbow and under the breasts.

What to do: Move to a cooler, less humid environment. Keep the affected areas dry (powder can help), and avoid using ointments or creams because they keep the skin warm and moist which can make the condition worse.

* Dehydration doesn't have enough water and other fluids to carry out its normal functions.

Symptoms: Dizziness, tiredness, irritability, thirst, dark yellow urine, loss of appetite, fainting. CONT P. 14



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Why Chinese investment is booming

Chinese investment in Sydney's property market continues to soar year on year. Why is it so popular? What

do investors need to be wary of? And where can vou find the most value in 2016 – the Year of the Monkey?

It's no secret that the Sydney property market is ripe for investment. Despite notoriously high prices, both the demand and the potential for growth are there to sustain it. Chinese buyers spent \$24.3 billion on Australian property in 2014-15, according to FIRB's past annual report, more than

three times that of the next

biggest investor, the USA. With increased savviness and competition among investors, here's what prospective buyers should

know. Why are Chinese investors

interested in Australia? First and foremost, the policy of state-owned land in China doesn't offer much scope for local investment. All properties are lease-held, so when a term expires, it's often unclear what will happen in terms of ownership. It will either be renewed at

a high rate, or taken back by the government without compensation to the occupants. Therefore, many Chinese people have significant wealth and nowhere to safely invest it locally. In order to get on the property ladder, investors must look overseas.

The question is: where are the opportunities?

One of the best opportunities is Australia, which as a result is experiencing a boom period for Chinese investment. Part of that is fuelled by strong Chinese migration. More Chinese-operated businesses are opening on Australian shores – leasing to tenants without a language or cultural barrier is usually preferable. But beyond that, Australia offers opportunity, both in terms of development and return on investment (ROI) potential. Chinese buyers prefer free-

standing buildings with scope for redevelopment something that Australia can offer, albeit in shorter supply these days. Though market growth has slowed in Sydney, there are gains over the long term. Interest rates remain low and the growing population means that property demand consistently outweighs supply.

Commercial versus residential property in Sydney

Commercial property is proving attractive to foreign investors for a number of reasons. For example, there can be a higher return on commercial property. While 5% per annum is considered a strong return on residential property, commercial investment (office and retail) has the potential to earn 7-8%. Making commercial property even more attractive is the fact that a

lower percentage of returns

go towards things like council rates, repairs, maintenance and insurance. With commercial property, the tenant pays a larger portion of these fees. providing a higher yield for owners.

This is important as commercial property is often purchased with a strong emphasis on generating cash flow, whereas residential property is usually bought primarily with a view to capital growth. Expanding infrastructure in the form of freeways, tunnels and rail links means that western Sydney

suburbs are hotting up for development. However, the CBD remains a strong performer in terms of demand and ROI.

What foreign investors should know

Recent changes have been made to protect local interests. Potential obstacles for Chinese buyers include:

- Additional 4% stamp duty for overseas buyers
- 10% withholding tax on properties over \$2 million
- A crackdown from the big four Australian banks on loans based on overseas income
- Stronger enforcement of restrictions on moving money out of China - \$50,000 (USD) per year.

Foreign buyers are also limited to purchasing new property with permission from the

Foreign Investment Review Board (FIRB), a government agency. This means only new development projects which are under construction or those which have not been previously occupied. Existing commercial space can be purchased, on the condition it has undergone extensive refurbishment. Failure to gain requisite permission, or buying an off-limits, established property carries the potential penalty of

\$134,000 or three years in prison.

Foreign investors must pay tax on income and capital gains earned in Australia. However, expenses such as property management fees, maintenance and interest on mortgages can be deducted from the taxable income to reduce the amount owed.

Affordability, a backyard, and a safe neighbourhood are the key priorities for Australian home buyers, new research shows.



Hot weather risks and staying cool What to do: Drink plenty of water or diluted fruit juice and avoid tea, coffee and alcohol. Move somewhere cool (preferably air-conditioned), and if possible use a spray bottle filled with water to cool you down. If you start to feel unwell call your doctor or the nearest emergency department

* Heat cramps These usually affect people who

sweat a lot during strenuous activity causing the body to lose salt and water. This can lead to heat cramps.

Symptoms: Muscle pains or spasms. Heat cramps can also be an early symptom of heat exhaustion. What to do: Stop all activity and lie in a cool place (preferably

air-conditioned) with your legs raised slightly. Drink water or diluted fruit juice, have a cool shower or bath, massage your limbs to ease the spasms and apply cool packs. Do not go back to strenuous activity for a few hours after the cramps have subsided. If they continue for more than one hour seek medical attention.

* Heat exhaustion

This is the body's reaction to losing excessive amounts of water and salt contained in sweat.

Symptoms: Heavy sweating, pale skin, fast and weak pulse rate, fast and shallow breathing, muscle weakness or cramps, tiredness and weakness, dizziness, headache, nausea or vomiting, fainting.

What to do: Move to a cool place (preferably air-conditioned) and lie down. Remove excess clothing, take small sips of cool fluids, and have a cool shower, bath or sponge bath. Put cool packs under the armpits, on the groin or on the back of the neck to reduce body heat. If symptoms last for longer than one hour, call your doctor or the nearest emergency department Heat stroke

This occurs when the body temperature is not controlled properly and it rises above 40.5 °C. It is the most serious heat-related illness and is a life-threatening emergency. Immediate first aid aimed at lowering the body temperature as quickly as possible is very important.

Symptoms: A sudden rise in body temperature, red, hot dry skin (because sweating has stopped), dry swollen tongue, rapid pulse, rapid shallow breathing, intense thirst, headache, nausea and vomiting, dizziness, confusion, poor coordination or slurred speech, aggressive or bizarre behaviour, loss of consciousness, seizures or coma.

What to do: Call triple zero (000) immediately and ask for an ambulance. While you are waiting for help, move the person to a cool shaded area and keep them as still as possible. Remove excess clothing and give them small sips of water if they are conscious and able to drink. Bring their temperature down any way you can, for example by gently spraying them with cool water from a spray bottle or garden hose, soaking their clothes with cool water, or sponging their body with cool water. Place cool packs under their armpits, on the groin or on the back of their neck to reduce body heat. Do not give aspirin or paracetamol because they won't help and may be harmful. If they are unconscious, lay the person on their side (the recovery position) and check they can breathe properly. Perform CPR if needed. If you are unwell, contact your doctor or go to the nearest emergency department. If you think your symptoms are serious call for an ambulance immediately on triple zero (000). If calling triple zero (000) does not work on your mobile phone, try 112. While you are waiting for an ambulance try to cool yourself down. You can do this by placing icepacks under your armpits, on your groin or on the back of the neck to reduce body heat. Take a cool shower or bath (if you feel well enough) or spray yourself with cool water from a spray bottle.







If you want a bunch of jokes, then I've got you covered".



You'll see the standard Privacy and Rules links at the bottom, but guess what? They don't work.

ATTENTION: CHECK YOUR PC



A window will open and you'll hear a voice telling you that your computer has just been infected and that you need to call a certain number right now to fix it. What's worse, there's a scary countdown that says you only have 5 minutes to call or else.

In the past few days a friend of mine's mother, our graphic artist's father-in-law, and my father-in-law were hit by this same scam. It's completely FAKE! If your virus software detects a virus, it fixes it. It won't direct you to a number to call. These crooks just want to get your credit card number or access to your computer.

What you're hearing is just a pop-up ad. There is no legitimate scenario under which a voice will tell you there's an issue with your PC and have you call a number. Got it? Promise? If it happens, just shut the browser to make it go away. If you can't get the browser to shut regularly, try pressing the Ctrl + Alt + Delete keys to bring up task manager. Then you can just choose your browser and select end task.

If your browser offers you the ability to restore the last session when you re-open, don't choose it. You don't want to go back to where you were and get stuck with that nasty pop-up.

If you're actually concerned about your computer run a scan with your always up-to-date security software.

MOVIE REVIEW HACKSAW RIDGE

ABOUT H

HACKSAW RIDGE is the extraordinary true story of Desmond Doss (Andrew Garfield) who, in Okinawa during the bloodiest battle of WWII, saved 75 men

without firing or carrying a gun. He was the only American soldier in WWII to fight on the front lines without a weapon, as he believed that while the war was justified, killing was nevertheless wrong. As an army medic he single-handedly rescued the wounded from behind enemy lines, braved fire while tending to soldiers and was injured by a grenade and hit by snipers. Doss was the first conscientious objector awarded the Congressional Medal of Honour, which is the highest military honour in the US, awarded for personal acts of valour above and beyond the call of duty.



Hacksaw Ridge must be the most quintessentially Mel Gibson-y film that Mel Gibson has ever made. Like so many of the projects he has had a hand in, it features plenty of rigid Christianity, plenty of entrail-splattering violence, and zero subtlety.

It even harks back to his youth in Australia: most of the actors are Australian, and it was shot in New South Wales. The one Gibson trademark that's missing is the craziness that has enlivened so much of his work both in front of and behind the camera, from his live-wire performance in Mad Max to his ancient dialogue in the last two films he directed, The Passion of the Christ and Apocalypto. There's nothing as exhilaratingly eccentric as that in Hacksaw Ridge. Maybe Gibson was feeling chastened by the scandals that have followed him since Apocalypto came out a decade ago: the racist and anti-Semitic outbursts, the drunk-driving, the starring role in Jodie Foster's awful comedy, The Beaver. Whatever the reason, he proves with Hacksaw Ridge that he can still make an efficient Hollywood epic which is as stirring, and as gruesome, as Braveheart. The film tells the true story of Desmond Doss (Andrew Garfield), a pacifist and Seventh-day Adventist who served courageously as a US army medic in World World Two, despite his refusal to pick up a rifle. The screenplay, by Andrew Knight and Robert Schenkkan, traces his pacifism back to an incident in his picturesque childhood in rural Virginia when he clonked his brother on the head with a brick, and then, afraid that he might have

murdered him, dashed

kill." See what I mean about subtlety? Another factor is that his father (Hugo Weaving) became an alcoholic after he lost his friends in World

War One, a trauma which the film conveys by having him slugging whiskey in an army cemetery. *It would be harsh to call the film 'Hackneyed Ridge', but*

not too harsh. The depiction of Desmond's romantic life is even more old-fashioned. From the moment he catches sight of a winsome nurse (Teresa Palmer), lit like an angel, and wearing a perfectly tailored and laundered white uniform, it's plain that she will turn out to be as loyal, virtuous, and loving as he is. Sure enough, after one of those film courtships in which the woman addresses the man by his full name ("Are you going to help me, Desmond Doss?"), the young sweethearts are engaged. It would be harsh to call the film 'Hackneyed Ridge', but not too harsh. The film doesn't get much more sophisticated when Desmond joins the army and meets his new buddies at training camp. One of them is a cowboy nicknamed Tex who is first seen practising lasso tricks. Another is a drill sergeant (Vince Vaughn) who, like every other drill sergeant in the movies, seem to have spent as much time in an improv-comedy class as he has in a warzone. But as hokev as this part of Hacksaw Ridge is, it's also spirited and entertaining, and it raises some interesting issues: does Desmond deserve to be on a battlefield if he won't carry a gun? Will he endanger his comrades if he can't defend them? And how do his pacifist principles square with the knowledge that his fellow troops will slaughter as many enemy soldiers as they

can? 'Relentless carnage'

Well, we soon find out. After an hour or so, Desmond and company arrive at the titular Hacksaw Ridge in Okinawa, where they have to scale a sheer cliff-face and then charge through a smoky, blasted wasteland towards the waiting Japanese. What follows may not be the best battle scene ever, but it's certainly the one in which the most faces and limbs are turned to raw mince. As well as getting the adrenaline pumping, this relentless carnage demonstrates just how bold Desmond's pacifism is.

In one breathless set piece, he dashes through a warren of dark tunnels, dodging Japanese soldiers, and there's a real frisson in knowing that, for once, we're watching an action hero who can't resort to a dagger or a pistol or even a punch in the face. He just has to keep running. It's clear that, rather than being the coward that some of his comrades had accused him of being, Desmond is a genuine braveheart - and that's even before he puts himself in danger, again and again, so that he can drag wounded soldiers away from the frontline and back to safety. Beyond the novelty of a war film about a pacifist, and the fact that the remarkable events it depicts really happened, Hacksaw Ridge doesn't have many surprises. There is no ambiguity, no questioning of Desmond's beliefs, and no complexity to his wholesome, all-American character. Another director would surely have made a more challenging, intelligent version of his life story. But no other director could have made a more sincere one. As clichéd as it is. Hacksaw Ridge passes muster because it is so uncynical about the man it memorialises. Gibson's reverence, for soldiers and for hardline Christians alike, is disarming. Still, the film would have been better if it hadn't been quite so hagiographic. It's one thing to have Desmond slap away a grenade that's just been thrown at him, but having him deflect another one with a Maradona-like kick immediately afterwards is a little too reminiscent of Garfield's most famous character, Spider-Man. ...... enjoying the Hunter Wine lifestyle with Andrew Marsh of Marsh Estate Winery, Pokolbin

Andrew is on hols so I have taken the liberty to re-publish an article he had written for paper recently

Three weeks ago, my Uncle Jim wasn't feeling well and decided to visit the doctor. He passed away at the start of this week. We are very, very sad. The thing about uncles is that although they are generally around your parent's age

and are in a position of

responsibility, they are not so much an authoritive figure whom you view with vast amounts of fear or reverence but a figure you can relate to when you can't relate to your parents. I hardly need to tell you that at the age of 15 or 16, uncles are the only ones you can relate to.

Jim was a figure my brothers and I dubbed Santa Claus from a very young age because he was always laughing and generously filling the air with humour.

When we arrived to see him, wherever it may be, his entire face would light up and the fun would start. He was more like an older brother at times yet he seemed not to have to discipline us very often as we respected this arrangement. Every second year growing up, my parents would head overseas to different wine regions in Europe for two or three months. When I was seven years old, I was to stay with Jim and my aunty Susan, in their house in Sydney. Mum and Dad had actually been away the previous year and my brothers and I had stayed with my grandparents. This time around, however, both my older brothers were in boarding school and it would be another year before I could start. So this was my first time out of home by myself and although I thought the world of Jim and Sue and my cousins, three months of not seeing your parents or my age." brothers at seven years old precipitated into me developing Jim's funeral is on Thursday (today). a minor nervous twitch. It wasn't so much a twitch actually. Periodically when I blinked, I would shut my eyes quite tightly. Whatever it was, Jim, who assumed it was an eye problem, took me to an optometrist. The optometrist put me through a series of tests and confusingly declared that there was nothing wrong with my eyes and to bring me back if I started going blind. Jim studied me over the following days and finally got the whole family together and we played a game where we had to blink hard for five minutes and whoever could blink the hardest (not the fastest) won the game. Three things happened. Firstly, I won convincingly. Secondly, I never felt the urge to blink like that again and thirdly, Jimmy called me "Blinks" from that day forth.

It was at this time that I attended the local public school which was a harrowing experience well out of my comfort zone. I befriended an Italian boy named Alderino Valentino. We were inseparable. The friendship began when he asked me on the first day what my name was and what my father did. When I told him my father was a winemaker, he smiled and said that his father made wine as well. I didn't quite understand how his father could make wine in the middle of Sydney but I didn't recognise at the time that many Italian families made wine in their backyards. Alderino's family lived in one of the biggest houses I've ever seen and on the last day before I was to go home, they invited us over for dinner. As we begged our farewells, Alderino and his entire family stood on their verandah, took their handkerchiefs from their pockets and waved them in sorrow at my departure. I will never forget that day.

Many years later whilst at boarding school, Jim noticed that many of my rugby team mates had names such as Sergi and Trimbole and were infamous identities from Griffith and suggested that maybe their families just may have done some business with Alderino's family. After putting two and two together, this may have made some sense. We couldn't stop laughing about that.

Jim was my father's younger brother. Whatever Dad did, Jim followed. Growing up in a very serious horse racing family, spanning five generations before them, it was hard to resist the urge to gain knowledge of the game. Both became heavily involved in different capacities but at the same time ran successful businesses outside the racing arena. In true tradition however, they spoke only of

racing... and Uncle Ted! Don't worry who Uncle Ted was as you cannot sit for more than ten minutes with the Marsh clan before his name is mentioned. He died before I was born but I know more about him than I do about anyone! During an interview one day, the journalist asked Jim what it was like to grow up in a horse racing household. Jim smiled and replied"I was born at 10.00am on a Saturday morning. Saturday as you can appreciate, is race day. My entire family were at Randwick racecourse. The only ones at the hospital were Mum and me. By about 2pm Mum had me put in the care of the nurses and changed into her racing clothes

and trotted off around the corner to the racecourse to let the others know I was born, as there were no phones allowed on the racecourse in those days. They stayed at the races all day, then sipped Champagne until the early hours of Sunday and the next time they saw me was Monday morning."

The interviewer looked slightly aghast "Is that true?"

Jim laughed. "No, of course it's not true....it was more like the Tuesday or

Wednesday!" I sat with my grandfather last night at his home. He is ninety years old and reminds me of a younger version of my father. I keep telling him he will outlive the lot of us. He is taking it pretty well but he did make the

comment..."It is against the laws of nature to bury your kids... even at

None of us can believe he is gone. The racing fraternity will be there in droves. I guess we will hear his countless achievements including the Paul Harris Fellowship Recognition for Rotary and his love of racing and of course-his family. One thing Jim did love was reciting poetry. He would sit with a good glass of red and have people in stitches or have them welling in tears. If I may leave you with the last three verses of Banjo Paterson's "Old Pardon, the Son of Reprieve"...

But he's old - and his eyes are grown hollow; Like me, with my thatch of the snow; When he dies, then I hope I may follow, And go where the racehorses go. I don't want no harping nor singing -Such things with my style don't agree; Where the hoofs of the horses are ringing There's music sufficient for me.

And surely the thoroughbred horses Will rise up again and begin Fresh races on far-away courses, And p'raps they might let me slip in. It would look rather well the race-card on 'Monast Cherubs and Seraphs and things "Angle Harrison's black gelding Pardon, Blue halo, white body and wings.'

And if they have racing hereafter, (and who is to say they will not?) When the cheers and the shouting & laughter Proclaim that the battle grows hot? As they come down the racecourse a-steering, He'll rush to the front, I believe;

And you'll hear the great multitude cheering For Pardon, the Son of Reprieve.

Thank you for your laughter.....will miss you dearly... Blinks

Winx's adds ladies Horse of the Year leadership

WINX, the now 5-year-old daughter of the Darley deceased Mr. Prospector grandson Street Cry and Vegas Showgirl, a dual Listed winner by the Success Express sire Al Akbar recorded her second successive win in this month's Cox Plate and, even at this early stage, her second Horse of the Year title.

Bred by John and Debbie Camilleri's Fairways Thoroughbreds, Hunter Valley and sold through Coolmore to part owner Peter Tighe's Magic Racing at the Gold Coast for \$230,000, the Chris Waller trained Winx's extraordinary ability has already been recognised by Horse of the Year for 2015-16.

Since the start of the 2016-17 racing year, she has primed for the 2016 Cox Plate by winning her three outings, the Warwick Stakes-G2 and George Main Stakes-G1 at Randwick and Saturday's Caulfield Stakes-G1, with consummate ease.

Her second Cox Plate victory on October 23 gave Winx a feat only two females have achieved since the race was first run in 1922. Victorian Tranquil Star, romping home in 1942 (5yo, by 5.0 lengths) and 1944 (7yo, 2 ¹/₂ lens), and Sunline scoring in 1999 (4yo, 1 ¹/₂ lengths) and 2000 (5yo, 7.0 lens).

A daughter of Gay Lothario (GB), Tranquil Star contested the Cox Plate in five successive years for two wins, a second, fourth and fifth, and New Zealand foaled Sunline challenged in four years, following her wins with a second in 2001 (a protest against the winner was unsuccessful) and fourth in 2002. Named Horse of the Year in 2000, 2001 and 2002, Sunline was by the Green Desert sire Desert Sun and from the Western Symphony mare Songline, one who went back seven generations to Fortune's Wheel, a sister to two times Cox Plate winner Phar Lap

Winx's 2016 Australian Horse of the Year title increases the leadership of the females over the males in the honour board for this century. Including Sunline's success in 2000 2001 and 2002, the ladies have been anointed on eleven occasions, the other recipients being Makybe Diva (GB) (2005, 2006), Miss Andretti (2007), Typhoon Tracy (2010), Black Caviar (2011, 2012 and 2013) and Winx (2016).

Despite their wonderful athletic ability, none of these Horses of the Year with performers of racing age has set the world on fire as producers. Sunline has had two minor winners in New Zealand from four foals; Makybe Diva has two winners from seven foals, namely Rockstardom (by Galileo, two wins, \$29,015) and Taqneen (Lonhro, one win, \$9,410); Miss Andretti has only had three foals, all unraced, from seven seasons, including a current Nicconi 2-year old named Mr Hamilton; and Typhoon Tracy died delivering the foal from her August 20 foal out of Nediym's Glow, first service on August 12 2012, a colt by Winx's sire Street Cry.

The Australian Racehorse of the Year awards were introduced in 1968-1969, a year it was headed by the stallion Rain Lover and one in which he won his first of two Melbourne Cups. Prior to Sunline, seven females had been honoured, Leilani (NZ) (4yo, by Oncidium) 1974-75, Surround (3yo, Sovereign Edition) 1976-77, Maybe Mahal (5yo, Maybe Lad) 1977-78, Rose of Kingston (3yo, Claude) 1981-82, Emancipation (4yo, Bletchingly), Bounding Away (2yo, Biscay) 1985-86 and Let's Elope (4yo, Nassipour) 1991-92.

The most successful winner

producers among these were Rose of Kingston (used America and Australia), 9 foals, 5 winners including Kingston Rule (by Secretariat; four wins including Melbourne Cup, Moonee Valley Cup) and Rose of Portland (Seattle Slew, five wins to Group 3); Let's Elope, 8 foals, 6 winners, Ustinov (Seeking the Gold; won MVRC AAMI Vase-G2, second AJC Champagne Stakes, Caulfield Guineas) and Outback Joe (won Adelaide Cup), Bounding Away (2 foals, G2 winner In Abound); and Emancipation, 7 foals, 3 winners, Royal Pardon (G2 winner, second AJC Derby).

None of these sprinted as brilliantly as unbeaten world champion Black Caviar, a mare whose first runners are eagerly awaited. She has supplied three foals, an Exceed and Excel 2yo filly named Oscietra, yearling Sebring colt and a Snitzel filly born September 18.

Exceed and Excel exceeds with early juveniles

FEW sires have excelled so spectacularly with early juveniles as Exceed and Excel, the Darley Australian champion sprinter and champion sire who also flies the flag nobly from use at their stud in Ireland. The weekend of October 1 and 2, saw his new 2-year-olds win three of the first metropolitan races of 2016-17 for the age group, namely the Gimcrack Stakes (won by Jorda) and Breeders' Plate (Khan) at Randwick and the Maribyrnong Trial Stakes (Madeenaty) at Flemington.

In addition, Exceed and Excel progeny finished second (Double Jeopardy) and fourth (Inquiry) in the Maribyrnong Trial Stakes. They are colts, while the winner, Madeenaty, is an August 28 born filly and in consequence the first of her sex to beat the males in the new juvenile racing year.

Bred by Segenhoe Thoroughbreds, Scone, the August 28 born Madeenaty was purchased for her owner Shadwell Australasia (Sheik Hamdin bin Mohammed Al Maktoum, Crown Prince of Dubai) for \$775,000 at the Gold Coast and runs out of the D & B Hayes/T Dabernig stables. She is from Set For Fame, a winner of three Group 2 sprints and an Australian Guineas second by Reset, a Zabeel sire resident at Darley's Northwood Park Stud in Victoria.

On the same day that his daughter was represented by Madeenaty, Reset supplied Hauraki, a Godolphin raced son who won the Group1 Epsom at Randwick, This was followed up by a sire son, Victoria Derby and South Australian Derby wnner Rebel Raider (Wyndholm Park Stud, Ballarat Vic) supplying Pretty Punk, the winner of the Hill Smith Stakes at Morphettville on Saturday.

Double Jeopardy, the Ellerton/Zahra trained runnerup in the Maribyrnong Trial races for his breeder, David Moodie's Hesket Bloodstock. He is an a General Nediym Melbourne dual Group 3 winner.

Jorda (September 9), the Exceed and Excel filly who was a smart winner of the Gimcrack Stakes at Randwick was bred by Darley and races under the banner of their world wide Godolphin operation. She is from Montmelo, a winner only once, but a Group 2 and 3 placed three-quarter sister by Viscount, a triple Group1 winner by Quest for Fame, to MRC Debutant

Stakes winner Le Mans. The success of the new 2-year-olds in Sydney and Melbourne lays the foundation for another big year for Exceed and Excel in the age group. He has been formidable in this sphere

Singleton report date 26 OCT 2016

Yarding 540 ~ Change -410 (Comparison Date 19/10/16) There was a reduction in numbers with young cattle making up the bulk. The quality of those young cattle was very mixed and there was a great variation in condition. Well finished cattle suitable to the trade were in limited supply. There was a single pen of very heavy grown steers, a few beef cows and a fair selection of dairy cows. The usual buyers were in attendance. Market trends through the young cattle showed some variation, mostly cheaper. There were however, some breed specific sales in the light weight restocker steers that were dearer. Well finished heifer vealers to the trade re-

mained firm with some quality related price change. Medium weight yearling steers to restock sold to a cheaper trend, down 6c to 12c/kg on average with some sales more. The very light weight yearling heifers to restock remained close to firm, again some price variation for quality. There were cheaper trends through the light and medium weights to restock. Well finished heifers to the trade saw a firm to dearer market trend with some quality related change as butchers struggled to satisfy requirements. The very heavy grown steers remained firm. Cows sold to a dearer trend for all classes

Scone report date 25 OCT 2016

Yarding 1074 ~ Change 164 (Comparison Date 18/10/16) There was a slight increase in numbers and the quality was good for the young cattle. Vealers were better supplied and there were good numbers of yearlings. Restockers and were not as active and feeder buyers were after a larger framed and better

conditioned beast. There were a few more grown steers and bullocks and cow numbers

were similar at 75 head. The market trend was cheaper with the exception of the feeder cattle. Restocking vealers were 6c to 9c cheaper, with most selling from 366c to 410c, with light weight Angus steers reaching 476c/kg. Heavy butcher vealers sold to 389c/kg. Feeder steers lifted 5c to 6c and feeder and restocking heifers were firm to 6c/kg stronger. Steers sold from 302c to 389c, averaging 370c/kg. Heifers to feed ranged between 330c and 348c/kg. There were too few trade steers to quote, with the feeders purchasing most however heavy trade heifers lost 20c, selling from 285c to 324c/kg. Grown steers and bullocks were back 25c ranging from 270c to 280c/kg. The medium weight 2 score cows sold from 170c to 202c and heavy 3 and 4 scores ranged from 200c to 235c, easing 20c to 25c/kg. The better covered medium weight cows sold to similar values.

TRLX Tamworth report date 24 OCT 2016

Yarding 996 ~ Change -1221 (Comparison Date 17/10/16) Very good rainfall across the region over the weekend saw the numbers reduced by more than half. All categories except for vealers and grown steers were well represented with yearlings making up the bulk of the offering. The quality was generally good with condition varying from forward to well finished. The full field of buyers were in attendance and there was a little extra processor competition on secondary quality lots. Demand was generally weaker for all classes. Restockers were more

active in procuring cattle to put on grass than most of the feedlots were in sourcing stock to put on grain. The result of the weaker demand was cheaper trends through all classes of young cattle. Light weight steers to restock saw the trend up to 28c/kg easier. The medium and heavy weight yearling steers to restock and feed were 11c to 30c/kg cheaper with a minimal supply of heavy weights available to attract much feedlot competition. The cheaper trends carried through to the heifer yearlings with similar price falls recorded. The well finished heifers suitable to the trade were the least affected. There were too few heavy grown steers to quote. The well finished grown heifers saw a cheaper trend of up to 8c/kg on the good quality lots. The cow market sold on a firm to slightly cheaper trend although there was not a lot of change.

Jesus invites himself to the home of Zaccheus who provides hospitality "joyfully". Hospitality, joy, haste to respond to divine visitation: these are constant themes

in Luke. In any human group there are the critics. This time evervone who sees what is

happening has something to say. They complain that Jesus chooses to stay with a sinner. The critics no doubt consider themselves more worthy hosts for God's prophet than Zaccheus. They have little love in their hearts. Their criticism of Zaccheus echoes that of Simon the Pharisee when Jesus allows himself to be touched by a "sinner" woman (Luke 7:36). Like Zaccheus, the woman's sins have already been forgiven. and his kind in contempt. That is why she knows how to love, according to Jesus. There are clues in the narrative that Zaccheus, though labelled as a sinner, has changed his ways. The future tense of our translation ("I will pay") obscures this

important element in the story. He gives half his property to the destitute and if he has cheated anyone, he pays them back four times the amount. In other words, he already goes way beyond what is required of a faithful Jew. Jesus looks at Zaccheus and assures him that salvation has come to his house. He then turns to the crowd and acts to restore honour to Zaccheus in the eyes of those who hold him

Like the bent-over woman and Lazarus the beggar at the rich man's gate, Zaccheus is a true descendant of Abraham, his ancestor in faith.
