

ON Tuesday 22nd November the Branxton Fire Brigade officially received the keys to a new firetruck; a \$195,000 Bushfire & Hazard Reduction Tanker. The NSW Minister for Emergency Services, David Elliot MP, was on hand to present the keys to Branxton Captain Paul

The new tanker is the result of the NSW Governments decision to upgrade NSW emergency services &, as the Minister said, it is just one way they can thank their emergency services for the sometimes dangerous & important work they do.

'When it comes to emergency services you don't get any more front



line than standing face-to-face with fire & flooding," the Minister

said. The 'hand-over ceremony also included the presentation of a 'commendation' to the Branxton Fire crew for their work during the state emergency last April 2015. 
Ticket cost covers return travel to Tamworth; light breakfast; tea, coffee and orange juice as well as tea/coffee on return trip.

Snake warning issued as warmer weather rouses reptiles out of hiding

HUNTER Valley residents are being urged to clean up their properties to reduce the number of hiding spots for snakes.

As the warmer weather sees snakes slithering into the sunshine, the Australian

Veterinary Association is also reminding animal owners of the dangers they pose, not just to humans, but to livestock and

Reptile expert Dr Robert Johnson froi The Australian Veterinary

Association says there's a few ways to

'Snakes in barns are probably looking for mice, or rats. They're attracted to rodents, as well as rubbish to hide under so it's best to try and keep the place tidy. Cleaning up can make it less hospitable,' he said.

He says some snake bites are so small it's difficult to tell when animals have been bitten, but that the venom from a brown snake could bring down a 'Horses, sheep and cattle are susceptible to snake venom. Signs to look for

include muscle tremor, laboured breathing and dilated pupils followed by paralysis. They say if you suspect your animal has been bitten to contact your vet

The chances of recovery are much greater if treatment is delivered early. If you can't get veterinary attention immediately, applying a pressure bandage over and around the bite site can help slow the venom

preading to the heart,' Dr Johnson said. Should you come across a snake Dr Johnson says don't panic.

'And leave them alone. Resist the urge to catch it. If it's near a house, or habitation, it's probably a good idea to keep an eye on where it goes and call a wildlife agency or a snake catcher.' Dr Johnson said.

Dr Johnson said snakes were important to the environment and should not be

He urged people to remember it is an offence to kill snakes unless they are actually posing a genuine risk to you.

"Respect them and enjoy them but leave them alone," he said



Community suggestions sought to put a signpost on unnamed Gresford Road bridge in the wake of repairs

Singleton Council is calling on the community to put forward their suggestions to name two bridges on Gresford Road over Glendon Brook.

The bridges have come under the spotlight following the recent repair and re-opening of the unnamed Gresford



2015 storm, and embankment and stabilisation works under Brunner's Bridge over West Brook. Anthony Egan, Council's Director of Corporate and

Community Services, said the recent repairs had given the bridges a new life, and provided the opportunity to rename the assets.

"It is Council's proposal to rename the unnamed bridge to Brunner's Bridge, then rename the existing bridge on Gresford Road over West Brook which is currently signposted as Brunner's Bridge," he said.

"As part of the consideration process, Council is asking the community to let us know what they think of the proposal to name the bridge over Glendon Brook Brunner's Bridge, and make some suggestions for a new name for the bridge over West Brook.

"We have already received some great possibilities for the unnamed bridge and look forward to hearing lots

"Council will make a decision on the naming of the bridges based on community feedback after submissions close on 2 December 2016.

Second rate NBN is failing regional Australians

All is not well with the roll out of the second rate Turnbull Government's copper-based National Broadband Network in Regional Australia. The release of the **Telecommunications** Industry Ombudsman (TIO) 2016 Annual Report confirms the Government has left rural and regional communities behind with the top 10 complaints coming from rural and regional communities. In fact, more than a quarter of new complaints in 2015-2016 to the TIO came from regional and rural Australia, a six per cent increase. Disappointingly, the top ten postcodes for NBN complaints are nearly all in regional Australia.

cannot connect to the NBN, have sluggish internet speed and experience extended outages when switching to the NBN. Many are business owners whose livelihoods rely on reliable internet service. This is simply not good enough.

According to the TIO, the most common issues consumers have raised are faults, such as slow data speeds, unusable services and drop outs. The TIO recorded 7,480

fault issues for NBN services - making up 38.5 per cent of internet and landline issues recorded in 2015-16 – a massive 147.8 per cent increase on the previous year. In addition, complaints about NBN connections

of calls from constituents in complaints now represent 11.9 per cent of all new

complaints to the TIO. Copper is the most likely culprit here with most of these locations relying on Mr Turnbull's expensive and second-rate Fibre to the Node.

Fibre to the Node relies on copper to get internet services all the way from the node to the home. In regional areas, this copper is often degraded and should have been ditched years ago.

The figures in the TIO report are of deep concern and confirm the myriad issues that are being reported to MPs offices every week.

When a fault arises, people are getting bounced between NBN and their Retail Service Provider and are simply unable to find anyone who will take responsibility for helping them fix their problem. It is no surprise that there are more complaints about internet problems than in previous years and that the TIO has recorded a rise of 22 per cent in complaints about internet services – the highest level in five years. Many people just give up in sheer frustration in trying to find help.

Swimming pool safety reminder from Council

As the weather heats up, Cessnock City Council is urging residents to be mindful of swimming pool safety for the upcoming summer months. Regrettably, 280 people

drowned in

Australian
waterways and backyard pools between 1 July 2015 and 30 June 2016

Health and Building Manager Grant Hamilton reminds residents it is a requirement for all pools, including portable and inflatable pools to be separated from the house and yard by a compliant pool barrier.

"Pool barriers are there to help protect our young kids from accessing the pool area when unsupervised," Mr Hamilton said.

To be compliant with the required standards pool fences must be checked and maintained regularly ensuring there are no gaps greater than 100mm under or between fence panels and the gate is self-closing and selflatching.

"In the end, nothing can replace the constant supervision of children by a responsible adult."

Here are some other important rules for pool owners:

 once finished using a portable or inflatable pools, empty and store them
 never prop open pool gates or remove latching devices

* pool fencing must be a minimum of 1200mm high (1800mm at the property boundary fence)
 * ensure the fence is not climbable—horizontal rails should be

greater than 900mm apart and objects from around the barrier that provides a foothold must be removed * ensure an up-to-date resuscitation chart is visibly located

within the pool enclosure and learn how to perform CPR
* all swimming pools must be registered—Council may issue fines of \$220 for unregistered pools.

If residents are unsure whether their swimming pool barrier complies, they may apply for a Swimming Pool Certificate of Compliance with Council by way of application and \$250 fee.

Mayoral Column

The New England Highway has again come under the microscope in the wake of a fatal accident on 17 November 2016, coincidentally as the NSW Government invites submissions on the New England Highway Draft Corridor

Any death or injury on any road is a tragedy, and my heart goes out to the family of the young man who lost his life, and the other man and woman who were injured in the accident at Whittingham.

It is important that we learn from these events so that we can stop them happening again, which is why we continue to keep pressure on the State Government to progress a dual-lane bypass of Singleton as a matter of urgency.

At the same time, Council has made a submission in response to the New England Highway Draft Corridor Strategy, which sets out how the NSW Government will manage road transport along the highway in the short, medium and long term from Belford to Jennings (on the NSW/QLD border).

The Roads and Maritime Service (RMS) has indicated the report will be finalised and distributed in mid-2017. Our submission covers several key points of concern, including consideration of the proposed bypass, and highlights that:

the draft identifies casualty rates higher than the state average between Belford and Singleton;

there is a short term need to increase overtaking opportunities between the Golden Highway and Singleton/

Muswellbrook; planning for the 8km section from the Golden Highway to Singleton should be undertaken within five years; and the \$92 million reserved under the Regional Road Freight Corridor Rebuilding NSW Program for the Singleton Bypass and referenced in the draft report is particularly noted. Of course, the only short-term measure we can take to ensure our roads are safe is for us all to take a little bit of extra caution, particularly as we launch into the Christmas holiday season. There's no doubting it's more than beginning to look a lot like Christmas after the Christmas on John Street event in Singleton's main street last Friday, which sent jingle bells ringing with a range of free entertainment and activities, as well as a special visit from

Raising the BARR YOUR LAND TITLE - AT RISK

I have written about the issue of Land Title previously. It is such an incredibly important issue that I find myself again penning a small brief snippet for all. Land Title "at risk" is quite a difficult idea to grasp, because for so long it has been so good in NSW. It has been certain. It has been assured. It has been definitive. It has been absolute. Today, as you read this, if you have a Land Title in your name you can be 100% certain that you own that land and that nobody can take it away from you (as long as you keep paying your bills).

But the truth is that with the Baird Government's plan to privatise the land title arm of the public service, that your land title in the future might be something less than the 100% guarantee of today. In the future the land title that you hold might be 99% certain, or maybe 98% or maybe even 90% certain. I don't know about you, but I don't want my land title to be 99% certain. I want it to be 100%! But even if we, as citizens, accept that 99% or 98% is still a very good land title system, there is every chance that your bank or financial institution, that has funded your mortgage, will take a different view. You see, their (banks, etc) job is to avoid risk, and, where possible, have absolute certainty. So the view of your bank is likely to be that they would like you to take out "just in case something goes wrong" insurance on your land title. If someone were to challenge your title, or contest your land boundary, or falsify documents to say that you don't actually own your land, then the bank would consider themselves at risk. The way to avoid the risk in this case is to have insurance. Future cost to you about \$200 p.a. for a \$250,000 home/ land title. The money that the Baird Government gets from selling the land title arm is expected to be about \$1billion and will go into sports stadiums in Sydney. It was extraordinary week in Parliament. The Government held firm on its insistence to impose an internationally uncompetitive tax on backpackers. The decision will be devastating for many of our farmers, growers and tourism operators. Make no mistake; growers can't get all their labour locally. The work is highly seasonal and often remote. They need backpackers at peak times. The irony is that backpackers who don't come here don't pay income tax, GST or excise on the alcohol and cigarettes.

The next extraordinary event was the confirmation that Barnaby Joyce will proceed with his crazy intention to move the Australian Pesticides and Veterinarian Medicines Authority (APVMA) from Canberra to Armidale. Armidale just happens to be in his electorate.

The APVMA approves and monitors crop sprays, animal medicines and the like. It deals not with farmers, but with the big multi-national chemical companies. It does not do research, its regulatory lawyers and scientists check the data provided by the companies.

This work is critically important to both our farmers and all those who consume food after it has been spayed. The professionals who do this work live in Canberra and have their children in Canberra schools. They have made it clear they have no intention of moving to Armidale. Who will do this work when they all go off to secure a job elsewhere?

It takes years to train these professionals to do this specialised work. It's going to be a disaster. The move will cost the taxpayer \$28 million, that money could help so many elsewhere. The potential cost to human health farm productivity is immeasurable.

The third big shock in Canberra last week was Barnaby Joyce's self-declaration that he will effectively tear-up the Murray-Darling Basin Plan. The plan was a long time in the making and both the work and final outcome have enjoyed bi-partisan support.

The only way to keep agriculture sustainably profitable into the future is to properly manage the water flows of the Murray-Darling. Like any worthwhile reform, it brings some pain for some but the benefits are without doubt.

The flying fox inquiry kicked off in Canberra last week and I thank our local Councils and residents for their submissions. The inquiry is helping MPs better understand the process for species listing and the circumstances in which they may be

de-listed.

I'm pleased that in addition to submissions received from directly affected residents, the committee has received submissions from expert independent of the Environment Department.

Western Sydney University academic Dr Justin Welbergen is a leading expert on flying foxes and tells me he understands the impact on communities. He undertakes research on strategies for assisting communities while ensuring the long-term viability of flying fox colonies. The work of academics like Dr Welbergen often receive too little attention and the inquiry will be a good

vehicle for learning from his work. Will something come of the inquiry? Well so far it has also highlighted the complexities and challenges in dealing with the bats. This week I'll be speaking with the Committee Chair and other Members about some options. We shall see where it takes us. Greta's Police Station

According to the current website of the NSW Office of Environment & Heritage, the former Greta Police Station, Lock-Up and Residence, in Water Street Greta, which is now the Greta Pre-school Kindergarten, is 'of historic significance as evidence of the extended role of the town following its rapid growth with the opening of mines in the 1860s, and its use as a government administrative centre during that time and until the decline of the economy of the town after the Second World War... The courthouse and the police station demonstrate the work of two prominent government architects from the late 19th Century Barnet and Vernon.' The site is listed under Hunter Heritage 1989, Schedule 2, Listing Number No. 1102. The Greta Police Station's story began on Saturday, 13th March 1875, when the Miner's Advocate and Northumberland Recorder printed 'provision will be made in the next estimates for the erection of a lock-up at Greta', and signed as written at Greta on March 3, 1875, author unknown. In August 8, 1876, page 4, the Maitland Mercury and Hunter River General Advertiser, reported on the public meeting that was held in Branxton, regarding both Branxton's desire for a court house and the plan to petition the government. Mr JA Tulloch was reported as saying that Greta already had a police station that had

years (perhaps using another building as so many did then?), while Branxton had none and inferred a great need for both. The same paper, on page 6, reported Greta also had a public meeting for the same reason, with Mr P Henry commenting that Greta had fifty court cases to only one in Branxton. A questioner in the crowd said he would support the resolution, and he thought a lock-up should be provided as well as a courthouse. The Greta police station is said to be designed by James Barnet in 1880. James Barnet was a government architect who was responsible for the building of a number of properties including defence works at Port Jackson, Botany Bay and Newcastle, New South Wales court houses, police stations, lock-ups and post offices, as well as some lighthouses. He joined the Colonial Architects Office in 1860, became its acting head two years later, and then official colonial architect in 1865 which position he held until 1890, then the office was reorganized. Walter Vernon was appointed government architect in the new branch of the Department of Public Works on 1 August 1890. Greta's police station had been built by 1888, well ahead of the Greta Court House which didn't open until 1896. Looking at the floor plan design of the police building it can be seen that three bedrooms were also allowed for, along with the two cells. kitchen, veranda and charge room (two outside

toilets were located in the back two corners of the property, probably one for the prisoners and the other for anyone else). No doubt having the bedrooms in the police building was to allow the Sergeant or Constable in charge to have his family living with him, but can you imagine the noise created by a rowdy drunk locked up for the night while the family were trying to sleep? The Australian Town and Country Journal on Wednesday 15 February 1905, page 30, published an article, with pictures, on the town of Greta. At that time Constable A Williams was in charge of the courthouse and also acted as clerk of petty sessions.

The Newcastle Morning Herald and Miners Advocate reported on Tuesday 12 October 1920, that Sergeant McCrea, who had been in charge of Greta police station for the last

The trustees were joint tenants, known as lessees, with the council as the lessor on the lease and the trustee of Crown Land Reserve No. 95916. notified on the 3rd April 1982 for Community Centre purposes. As the land was Crown Land, the lessors had gained consent from the Minister for Lands for the use of the property for a term of twenty years by the Greta Children's Centre Association. In 1992, the former small separate Lock-Up building, that appears to have been

The sardonic epigraphs of Lucy Treloar's brilliant first novel, Salt Creek, reprint official documents that proclaim (in fact "erect") the colony of South Australia in 1834, then fix its boundaries and guarantee the rights of Abor -igines two years later. Treloar's story takes us into the marginal farming land of the Coorong, where the Finches, a Quaker family, have been forced to remove from their capacious home in Adelaide ("two storeys and a cellar") because of the father's fecklessness. His whaling station has failed. His consignment of sheep from Van Diemen's Land has been lost to shipwreck.

resigned yet sympathetic judgment is that of his eldest daughter, Hester. She is the complex moral and emotional centre of the novel. For all the harm that her father wreaks, she says, "He has spent most of his life hoping, I think.' The novel begins in 1874. Hester and her son Joss are in possession of her grandmother's house in Chichester, back in England. The colonial misadventure has been redeemed by the legacy that allows them to return whence her family came. Nevertheless she is

Now he finds himself and those he brings with him, ailing wife and

so little" — and for the family property "which stretched as far as a person could ride across in a day". Now she must adapt to the strictures as well as the comforts of

Yet her first impressions of Salt Creek had been dark: "the journey to that place was like moving knowingly, dutifully, towards death". There the Finches had to establish themselves, build a home partly of driftwood, tend to a mother who "had so little of insistence left in her", seldom encounter visitors, be bound to the drudgery of seemingly hopeless work. This is the antidote to Australian novels of pioneering as triumphs of will over malign natural

forces, and domestic discord. On arrival at Salt Creek, the Finches "boiled over the edge of the dray". Among Hester's siblings are the wilful Addie, named for the almost city the family had to abandon, Fred who would be an artist — and his hulking brothers Hugh and Stanton. Boldly and without strain Treloar introduces into this mix the Aboriginal youth Tully, who "existed in two worlds". Named for his Irish father, his mother is the implacable Rimmilli, of whom Hester reckons that "anger was the essence of her, deeper than bone"

What particular grievance Rimmilli may hold, or what is Hester's father's part, is one of several crucial matters Treloar dares to leave undecid-able. The usual momentum

of pioneering fiction is undone by backtracking, indeterminacy. A more complex narrative of adaptation and failure is offered instead. Treloar is also attuned to the want of dramatic incident of an outback life in which "there are years that pass in which nothing at all seems to happen'

There is news of the wider world: the American Civil War, and before that the Victorian gold rush. Attracted are not only "the Celestials", Chinese diggers, but Hester's older brothers. When they decamp, she is moved to wonder, with her usual acuity, "what it would be like to be a man ... they are solitary creatures for all they work in each other's company" Among much else, Salt



Lucy Treloar was born in Malaysia and educated in Melbourne England and Sweden. A graduate of the University of Melbourne and RMIT's Professional Writing and Editing program, Lucy is a writer, editor, mentor and creative writing teacher and has plied her trades both in Australia and in Cambodia, where she lived for several years. She was awarded an Asialink Writer's Residency to Cambodia (2011) to undertake research and to work on her first adult novel, then titled Some Times in Life. Lucy is the winner of the 2014 Commonwealth Short Story Prize (Pacific), the 2012 Writing Australia Unpublished Manuscript Award and a 2013 Varuna Publisher Fellowship. Her short fiction has appeared in Sleepers, Overland, Seizure, and Best Australian Stories 2013, and her non-fiction in a range of

Lucy's debut novel, Salt Creek (Pan Macmillan) was published in 2015 to critical acclaim. It has won the Dobbie Award, the Matt Richell Award for New Writer, and the Indie Award for Best Debut, and has been shortlisted for the Miles Franklin Literary Award, the Walter Scott Prize for Historical Fiction and the Readings Prize for New Australian

Lucy is an Artist in Residence at Melbourne's Arts House.

Creek is a subtle study in masculinity. For all his biblical sternness, the patriarch may have corrupted his sons. Given the chance, Fred — like Hester — escapes to England, realising his vocation and there able to express his homosexual desires. Mr Bagshott, touring the district to make records for the colonial government, may have been acquainted with the Brontes back in Yorkshire, but reprehends the education of women and Aborigines, opinions unthinkingly bolstered by scripture. His son Charles seems the morally fine as well as romantically apt person to lead Hester out of her durance and such prejudice, but Treloar admits no simple or painless resolutions. In its larger compass, Salt Creek refigures the histori-

cal novel in Australia, compelling us to unfix assumptions about frontier life, domestic and economic, relations between men and women, and generations, European and indigenous people. Line after line of Treloar's book has an arresting stylistic felicity. Here, for instance, two of the Finch children are feeding chickens: "From this distance, it was as if they were wandering through blossoms." Or this of a sexual encounter: "It was everything, not only pleasure, and shocking." Salt Creek introduces a capacious talent that is distinguished by a sceptical intelligence about historical sources and how casually they have been used, an incisive ear for dialogue and the ambition to broaden into elegy and regret rather than celebration perhaps the boundaries of historical fiction in this country.



McGuigan Wines Awarded International Winemaker of the Year

Winemaker of the Year McGuigan Wines has been crowned International Winemaker of the Year at the 2016 International Wine & Spirits Competition (IWSC) in London and in doing so has become the only winery in the Competition's history to win the title four times. Having won the title in 2009, 2011 and 2012, McGuigan Wines saw off competition from the world's wine producing nations including France, Spain, Italy, Germany and the USA to become the first winemaker in the world let alone an Australian one to receive the award four times. The win not only reinforces, but enhances, Australia's reputation as a world-class wine producing country. This is not only a

major boost for the profile of Hunter Valley and Australian wines on an international level, but an extraordinary result in, arguably, one of the most challenging wine competitions in the world. Congratulations to McGuigan Wines.

Lack of mobile phone coverage on the Hunter Expressway and NBN implementation in the region

Chairman of the Hunter Valley Wine and Tourism Association (HVWTA) the Hon George Souris AM is dismayed by the lack of mobile phone coverage on the Hunter Expressway and NBN implementation in the region and has written letters to Telstra Corporation CEO Andrew Penn and his NBN Co Ltd counterpart Bill Morrow on behalf of the HVWTA. Similar correspondence, as well as a letter of support from Cessnock and Singleton Councils, have also been distributed to Hunter MP Hon Joel Fitzgibbon, Upper Hunter MP Michael Johnsen, Hon Scot MacDonald MLC and Cessnock MP Clayton Barr. The letters address the issue of mobile

coverage along numerous spots on the Hunter Expressway and in Wine Country; and the nonimplementation of NBN in parts of Wine Country. Mr Souris felt it was necessary to state his concerns, given the importance of the region to locals and visitors alike. The Hunter Expressway forms part of the national highway between Sydney and Brisbane and is important for its commercial traffic and equally important for the Hunter Valley, it is the gateway to NSW's leading regional tourist destination, Hunter Wine Country. 
This is a really cool way to look back at an aspect of US election history and see how things have changed over time and how some things haven't changed at all.

A reader is having an issue with the Chrome browser. "I have a Microsoft Surface Pro 4. I have been using Google Chrome for years, but now it crashes almost every time I try to connect to it. Is it not compatible with Windows 10 or what? Should I change

Chrome is compatible with Windows 10. Let's try a few things. First, make sure you have the latest version of Chrome. Click the menu button on the upper-right and check the drop-down menu. If there's an option to update Chrome, you'll see it. If not, you're up-to-date.



If updates don't help, I'd suggest checking what types of extensions you have running in Chrome. One of them may be causing the problem. Or, you can try uninstalling and re-installing Google Chrome.

One of these options should take care of the problem.

USA County Pays \$28,000 To Hackers

Madison County in Indiana paid \$28,000 to ransom back their computer system after falling victim to a ransomware attack. The county's insurance company offered to pay the demand and the county had to pay the deductible along with an additional \$18,000 to have techs bring their computer system back online.

The attack hits hundreds of PCs and 75 servers. The attack completely shut down the systems, making it impossible for the county to conduct business.

Want to update your Android tablet or phone to the latest Android operating system? It's not that difficult, but there is a catch. Your device may not be able to upgrade. Since each Android device is different, that manufacturer has to prep a special version of the OS just for that device.

You'll need to go to your device's settings and look for a setting called About tablet or About phone.

That's a heck of a list! I agree that reinstalling your security software is a great first move. Let's look over the list. If you use a card reader, I'd probably suggest reinstalling the software for the Realtek card reader and drivers for other devices that you use. You'll probably want Adobe Reader for PDFs. Adobe Flash may be needed for some websites, but it can be a security risk. You could just wait until a website asks for it to download. You may want to consider Windows Live Essentials, which has Movie Maker, Live Mail and other programs. But the support life is ending for these programs, so it might be time to consider an alternative. Other than that, you can probably just wait until you miss something. Most PCs come overloaded with bloatware that tends to slow things down. In fact, if you've purchased a new Windows 10 PC, I suggest doing a factory reset as soon as you get it home to remove all of the extra stuff.

Why Can't I Get Free E-mail Without Ads?

In response to our article about removing ads in Outlook.com, a reader wrote.: "Just wanted to say that AdBlock does indeed remove the ads, but the ad bar is still there and keeps getting bigger and bigger. It now covers half of the mail making it unviewable. You stated that there's no free lunch.. Considering Microsoft and Google are two of the richest companies there is because of us, perhaps they ought to go back to mail being a free service as it costs them nothing. The name change from Hotmail to Outlook did not come with any different or extra special services that I can see. If a user got extra services or storage space a nominal fee might then be in order. This tactic of slowly blocking out the viewing area and asking for money to unblock it seems an awful lot like a hostage/ransom scenario or extortion to me.

It's not really a hostage situation, since hostages are taken against their will and you have voluntarily sign up for either Gmail or Outlook.com. If you don't want to pay for the ad-free version of Outlook.com, you could certainly opt for e-mail provided by your ISP or pay for an e-mail service like FastMail. FastMail costs \$10 yearly for the light version, \$20 for the Full, \$40 for Enhanced and \$70 for Premie You will need a contract and your mail storage is as little as 250 MB for the lite and up to 60 GB for the Premier level. Also, if you opt for an Office 365 subscription, those ads will vanish from your Outlook.com. Another option might just be to get an e-mail client like Windows Live Mail or Thunderbird and download your messages.

When you say that it costs Google and Microsoft nothing to run these e-mail accounts, you couldn't be more off-base. Running the servers and personnel to manage the e-mail accounts of millions and millions of people costs a fortune. Microsoft operates over one million servers, as does Google. Operating costs are in the billions. And you're also off-base about Microsoft not adding any new services as they switched over from Hotmail to Outlook.com. The company added free cloud storage at OneDrive, along with free online access to their Office products like Word, Excel and Powerpoint. Google also offers free cloud storage as well as a free office suite with your Gmail account. And both services are still free, though advertiser supported

MOVIE REVIEW

Nocturnal Animals

Winner of the Grand Jury Prize at the 2016 Venice International Film Festival. From writer/director Tom Ford comes a haunting romantic

thriller of shocking intimacy and gripping tension that explores the thin lines between love and cruelty, and revenge and redemption. Academy Award nominees Amy Adams and Jake Gyllenhaal star as a divorced couple discovering dark truths about each other and themselves in NOCTURNAL ANIMALS.



Art can make us squirm. That's the theme of "Nocturnal Animals," a theme telegraphed with almost sadistic clarity as we watch, under the opening credits, a series of obese naked women shimmying in slow motion, their folds of voluminous flesh wielded like weapons.

Those videos, as it turns out, are works of art on display in the Los Angeles gallery of Susan Morrow (Amy Adams), a contemporary art dealer who, over the course of writer-director Tom Ford's creepily elegant, enigmatic new film, encounters several others. They include: a hyper -realist sculpture of an animal impaled by arrows; a painting consisting of the word "revenge," writ large; and a photograph of a man aiming a rifle at another man. Message received, loud and clear: Acts of the imagination can unsettle, disgust and frighten us, even wound us — not in the flesh, but deep in the tender psyche — just as surely as actual ones. Occasionally, they also make us think. (But more on that later.) The most disturbing artifice

Susan comes across in this story — which Ford, in his first project since "A Single Man," has adapted from Austin Wright's 1993 novel "Tony and Susan" — is a manuscript. The book is an unpublished novel by Susan's ex-husband, Edward (Jake Gyllenhaal), a struggling writer whom she unceremoniously dumped 19 years ago, when it became clear that his career was

going nowhere. Called "Nocturnal Animals," Edward's book plays out, as Susan reads it, as a film-within-a-film, one that Ford devotes more time, energy and attention to than the framing story, which comes across, in the director's signature high style, as shallow and artificial.

That world - Susan has a handsome second husband (Armie Hammer), an impossibly luxe house and fabulous friends may look comfortable, but Susan is an insomniac, and her husband is cheating on her. By way of reassurance, a friend (Michael Sheen) reminds her, 'Our world is a lot less painful than the real world" - meaning the one not insulated from suffering by money and power. His ironic line, of course is another signal of Ford's intention to tell a meta story about the power of storytelling itself. In "Nocturnal Animals," the plot of Edward's book unspooling in Susan's head and on the screen in front of us for much of the film — feels at once more real and, paradoxically, less so than the life that Susan leads. Adding to this sense of disorientation is a third story, told in flashback, showing Susan and Edward's history as a couple, the demise of which has left her wracked by guilt over her selfishness and impulsive behavior.

The "Nocturnal Animals" of Edward's novel reads, to Susan, like a nasty revenge fantasy. During a vacation road trip with his wife and teenage daughter, the novel's protagonist, Tony, is forced off the road by a trio of sadistic thugs, who end up doing horrible things to his family. Underscoring the roman

-à-clef nature of that narrative, the wife is played by Isla Fisher, who is a doppelgängerganger for Adams. Gyllenhaal plays Tony, with Ellie Bamber as their daughter, Michael Shannon as a lawman investigating the aftermath of the crime, and Aaron Taylor-Johnson as its chief perpetrator.

What, we're meant to wonder, is Edward's purpose in writing this? At times, Susan appears tortured by the vicarious anger it seems to express and also titillated by it. Or maybe, just maybe, she is happy to experience a weird catharsis at the hands of the book's punitive plot, which can come across as Edward's crudely lurid and violent attempt to teach his ex -wife a lesson.

Those are less interesting questions than the ones that "Nocturnal Animals" raises about Ford's goals, and whether he in fact achieves them. The story-inside-thestory is as hard to watch at times as those slow-motion videos that Ford opens his film with, and that can be read as fat-shaming or as critiques of fat-shaming. Similarly, the "Nocturnal Animals" of Ford's movie is as slippery a read as Edward's book. It's a tale bluntly told that arouses intense, evanescent emotion and then leaves you haunted, long afterward, by provocative but arguably answerable questions

I was saddened by the news that Nestle have decided to cease making its iconic chocolate bar, the Polly Waffle. Polly Waffles have been around forever and cemented their ever-loving goodness across a wide band of generations. Of course, I had never actually tried a Polly Waffle until the other day, when I read of its impending demise. Now, although I don't really care much for commercially processed, confectioned and over-grossly sweetened goo which is intended to be known as a 'marshmallow' centre, covered in deliciously and overly sickening lavishes of cheaply made chocolate - the point here is that another product we've all grown up with is making its way into the retro books and onto café walls as part of a conglomerated archive.

I guess the circumstances by which it is making its exit is akin to an older celebrity passing away. You read the newspaper or hear it on the nightly news and before you know it, there is just a whimper of a tear in your eye, as the sentimental pathways from your sympathetic nervous system open your colloidal cognitive synapses, allowing a release of adrenaline and lactic acid, which in turn puts your mind and body into a state of mild shock. That is actually not how it works at all but it sounds convincing and I'm sure it's how you feel.

My grandmother used to stock Polly Waffles in her pantry. My family, for those of you who don't know, are cursed with a kind of 'one's too many - a hundred's not enough' mentality. Whether it's sport, work, hobbies or in this case Polly Waffles, the family creed is 'Go hard or go home!' Strangely enough, we were never really allowed to eat chocolate as kids; nor lollies, cakes or soft drink. Maybe my parents did not wish to trigger the compulsive genes which lay dormant, just waiting to surface at the right time (they eventually did - alcohol - enough said!). It comes then as no surprise to hear that the very first book I ever read was Roald Dahl's Charlie and the Chocolate Factory and my favourite movie (ever!!) is the movie based upon the book starring Gene Wilder, titled Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory. The interesting thing is that I never witnessed my grandmother eating Polly Waffles, nor do I recollect her giving us a Polly Waffle at any stage.....but they were always there.

And that is the point. They've just always been there. You don't have to necessarily partake but just knowing of their existence keeps our world on an even kilter. I look around my winery laboratory, where I am currently sitting. There are several bottles of weird and wonderful chemicals which have been here on display since the seventies and of which we do not use in the industry anymore. Every time I do a mass clean of the place. I go to throw them out but the sentimental notion of discarding these things which have been gracing the lab shelves since I was a young kid is too strong. I will never use them as long as I live but they are a part of the deal – they keep things in order! There is also a 500 ml glass storage container holding a clear liquid of some sort with the label 'EPG 741 – 1976'. I have no idea of its contents and frankly, I don't need, nor care, to know. Just knowing it is there and has been since I was a kid proves beyond reasonable doubt that its existence is as credible as yours or mine.

Ever since I can remember, I have subconsciously aligned with the collective gender narrative that Mars Bars were for men and Polly Waffles were for women and men who fancied other men. It's funny how we come to those conclusions. There was a time when red wine was a man's drink and white was for the people who ate Polly Waffles. Social perceptions are an interesting subject. Put it this way, if I was with a group of blokes doing blokev stuff and one of them pulled out a Polly Waffle, I'm unsure if I would continue to trust him. Of course, vice versa, if a group of women were to be at a Tupperware party, for example, and one of them pulled out a Mars Bar and began to munch away, ideally I would instantaneously pigeon-hole her being a rampant Ellen Degeneres fan. In fact, I would be inclined to further my observation that she would be the type of woman who would sit there drinking beer from a bottle and smoking a cigar or pipe, whilst her husband was a Polly Waffling wimp who sits down to do a wee-wee. To prove my point, the other day whilst sampling my first ever Polly Waffle, my attention turned to a lifestyle program my wife was watching. Halfway through, I make a comment on the flower arrangement in the kitchen of the cooking

"I said, I'm not so sure those azaleas suit that redwood base in the forefront.... And the penny dropped! What else isah yes.....the Flake! The creeping Jesus of chocolate bars. Flakes stand on neutral ground, but they stuff with your head. They retain amazing texture and an amazingly delicious mid-palate but their delicate makeup resembles a tree, ring-barking. There is little chance I will ever find myself in a moment of effeminate leaning and strike the urge to purchase another Polly Waffle but I do not wish for them to dissipate into oblivion either. They are a part of the crew. They stare at each and every one of us as we visit the corner shop, newsagent or video store and grace the supermarket aisles. Just knowing that there is an horrendously over-sweetened, over-refined, gelatinous and sickly, fatty commercial confection inside a colourful poly-plastic wrapper, almost vindicates the essence of freedom of choice and a right to live. Polly Waffles make a statement. They do not pretend to be a Mars Bar or a Picnic but they stand tall and are counted. To all Polly Wafflers world-wide, my condolences. This is indeed a sad day. As the earth spins slightly off kilter, we will all remember the Polly Waffle with great affection. Excuse me now whilst I rush to the bathroom....I'm not feeling very well.....whatever you do.....do not touch the rest of my Kit Kat or I'll.....

Saleyard report - cattle

Singleton report date 23 NOV 2016

Yarding 710 ~ Change -460 (Comparison Date 16/11/16)

Numbers slipped sharply and quality on average was plainer, as the good runs of younger cattle presented at the previous market were absent in the competition. The bulk was younger cattle, with the export weights limited in supply. The usual buyers competed in a firm to cheaper market; however quality did contribute to most price variations. Vealer steers to the restockers slipped 7c, as a line of well-bred light



weights topped at 470c/kg. The over 200kg pens returning to the paddock averaged 377c after reaching 401c/kg. Vealer heifers to the restockers and backgrounders trended 20c cheaper, again breed and quality contributed, with the over 200kg pens ranging from 329c to 390c/kg. Yearling steers and heifers showed only breed and quality related price changes, as the medium weight steer portion made from 340c to 367c/kg, with the lot feeders securing the bulk in the penning. The better bred end of the lighter yearling heifers to the restockers averaged 344c, as a good quality selection of the heavier drafts made 350c/kg. The prime conditioned younger cattle to the butchers remained firm to top at 380c; however overall yield was lower compared to the last market. The reduced number of grown steers to slaughter sold at 270c, as good quality older heifers made 275c/kg. Cows sold at similar prices, with the plainer 2 scores averaging 223c, while the better covered heavy weights ranged from 228c to 230c/kg. The best heavy weight bull reached 240c/kg.

Scone report date 22 NOV 2016

Yarding 1222 ~ Change 44 (Comparison Date 15/11/16)

Quality remained fair to good, with the bulk entering the younger categories. Consignments lifted marginally and on average there was more weight presented, week-on-week. Vealer steers were reduced in number, as good runs of the vealer heifers and the yearlings were in the penning. There were around 140 cows, along with extra heavy weight grown steers suitable for the processors in the offering. The usual buyers were joined in the competition by extra restocker activity; this helped maintain



a higher price for some categories, which would have otherwise trended considerably cheaper. The over 200kg vealer steers returning to the paddock sold close to firm at 370c to 440c/kg. The same weight heifer portion also to restocker orders slipped 12c to average 371c, after topping at 403c/kg. The yearling steers sold to variable trends, with the lighter end easing 12c, as the medium weights sold to solid competition, while the few heavier weights trended cheaper by 9c to 14c/kg. Yearling heifers to the restockers and lot feeder orders remained firm for the lighter end to range from 320c to 366c/kg. The medium weights also showed little change to sell from 309c to 340c/kg. The prime conditioned younger cattle to the butchers carried extra weight, week-on-week, as averages slipped up to 20c/kg. Grown steers to slaughter eased 7c, making from 265c to 280c/kg. The cows slipped 7c, as the plainer 2 scores averaged 219c, with the heavy weight 3 and 4 scores ranging from 222c to 250c/kg. Heavy weight bulls trended cheaper to reach 250c/kg.

TRLX Tamworth report date 21 NOV 2016

Yarding 1285 ~ **Change 190** (Comparison Date 14/11/16)

There was a small increase in numbers. A large percentage of the offering were yearlings while all other categories had a small to fair representation. The overall quality of the offering was fair to good with all buyers catered for. There was a full field of the regular processor and feedlot buyers in attendance. The market for young cattle to restock and feed was solid throughout the good quality lots with the light and medium weights mostly firm. The heavy feeder steers sold firm to slightly dearer with in-



creased competition. There was a bit less demand for the secondary quality young cattle showing lower weight for age with the market for those cattle slightly cheaper. Well finished medium and heavy trade yearlings saw a firm to slightly dearer market trend. Heavy grown steers remained firm with odd lots showing a small improvement in quality. Plain condition medium weight cows sold to a cheaper trend, some of that was quality related. The well finished heavy weight cows sold to a dearer trend, up to 5c/kg with some improved quality lots showing a greater price increase. The best of the heavy bulls remained firm.

At the close of Tuesday' cattle (22/11/16) markets:

The Eastern Young Cattle Indicator (EYCI) settled at 650.50¢, up 2.25¢/kg cwt from where it settled the previous day. Trade steers were back $4\overline{e}$, at 339e/kg lwt. Medium steers were up 1e/e, on 301e/kg lwt. Heavy steers gained 1e/e, at 299e/kg lwt. Medium cows held firm at 234¢/kg lwt. Feeder steers held steady at 354¢/kg lwt.

NEWGATE FARM. Aberdeen, the youngest major stud in the Hunter Valley, splurged over US\$7.5million in acquiring females at breeding stock sales in Kentucky in partnership with S F Bloodstock. The latter is a group headed by American based Australians Gavin Murphy and Neil Bowden along with Newgate managing director Henry Field.

They started their buying spree when they acquired four lots at the Fasig Tipton sale on Monday and followed with the acquisition of ten more at the first two session of the

massive Keeneland Bloodstock November Bloodstock Sale. It is covered by seven catalogues aggregating 4762 lots and runs from November shuttled sires 8 to November 20. The most expensive purchase for the S F Bloodstock – Newgate partnership was US\$1,500,000 for 2011 foaled My Conquestadory, a Group1 winner at two and a Group1 Del Mar Oaks third at three. Served by champion sire Tapit, she is a daughter of Artie Schiller, a shuttler who has had good results in America. He is currently looking after his tenth Australian book, one which is being served at Emirates Park, Murrururundi, Hunter

The mares are destined join Newgate's big quality band of mares and could be among those chosen for use with their elite band of sires. Their could be at least a dozen in their stallion yards in 2017, including newcomers Flying Artie (by Artie Schiller), Capitalist, Extreme Choice and Russian Revolution..

More winning foreigners by

TWO of the trio of northern hemisphere bred horses who won at the Sandown meeting on November 12, Oewy(Ire) (the Sandown Cup, 3200m) and Beautiful Romance (GB) (the Zipping Classic, 2400m), are among the imposing collection of imports with shuttled sires in their immediate pedigrees who were successful in Melbourne in recent weeks.

Both flown in for the spring racing and trained at Newmarket in England for Godolphin, Quewy (Charles Appleby) and Beautiful

Romance (Saeed Bin Suroor) are both in fact bred on sire crosses that can be achieved in Australia

Qewy, winner of the Geelong Cup on October19 and fourth in the Melbourne Cup, is by Street Cry, the sire, and from Princess Nada. Arrowfield in the Hunter a Listed winning half-sister by Barathea to super sire Dubawi. Now deceased, Street Cry was a Darley more than 750 offspring into the Australian thoroughbred pool, and Barathea, a Sadler's Wells sire, left about 250 from five seasons at Widden.

Beautiful Romance, on the other hand, has Darley wisdom on both sides, being produced on a cross of two of their shuttled sires, New Approach (Ire), a Galileo English Derby winner, over Mazuna, a Group 2 winner by Cape Cross (Ire) (by Green Desert). New

Approach (220 foals) was here in 2009, 10, 11 and 12 and Cape Cross (about 200 foals) visited New Zealand in 2000, 02 and 03 and the Hunter Valley in 2005 and 2006.

Also inbred 3x4 to 2015-16 champion Australian Ahonoora, a sire who visited Valley in 1988 and 1989 (died after serving eight mares in the latter season), Beautiful Romance has raced visitor in nine years, pumping twice in Australia for a luckless seventh in the Melbourne Cup, after knuckling over early, and the Zipping Classic victory. She had won at Group 2 over 2100m at York in May.

Ahonoora also appears in the pedigree of the other imported winner at the Sandown meeting, the Hayes -Dabernig trained Redkirk Warrior (GB). This winner at the meeting of the Group 3 Yarramalong Racing Club Stakes over 1500m, his second Australian outing, and earlier successful in England

and Hong Kong, is in the first crop of Notnowcato, a top class English miler by the Ahonoora sire Inchinor.

Notnowcato stands at Stanley House Stud, the one at Newmarket conducted by generations of Lord Derbys over more than three centuries. One of the Lord Derbys tal thoroughbred Hyperion and an earlier one played a role in the establishment of the English Oaks (1779) and Derby (1780).

Adding to the collection of imports who have Australian used sires in their pedigrees is to be Ventura Storm, a winner in the northern hemisphere of six of 12 outings, including the Milan Gran Premio del Jockey Club-G1 (2400m) and Deauville Prix de Reux-G3 (2500m), and second in the English St Leger-G1. Set to join the Hayes - Dabernig stables, he is by Coolmore shuttled Zoffany (Ire), a grandson paternally of Danehill

through Dansili. BALLARAT CUP: Hayes Dabernig also train Pilote d'Essai (GB), the 5-year-old gelding who was a dominant winner on November 19 of the \$300,000 Ballarat Cup. He is a half-brother by the Green Desert sire Oasis Dream to Planteur (won bred, raced and stood immor- Longchamp Prix Ganay-G1, second French Derby-G1, Grand Prix de Paris-G1, third Dubai World Cup-G1 twice. They are from Plante Rare, an unraced daughter of Giant's Causeway (USA), a Coolmore Storm Cat sire who after a stint visiting Australia, 2002 – 2005, became as champion sire in America. Pilote d'Essai's grandam is a half-sister to the dam of Peintre Celebre, a Nureyev winner of the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe in new course record time and a Coolmore visiting sire in five seasons,1998-2003.The family also produced Melbourne Cup winner Protectionist.





HOW S.M.A.R.T. ARE YOUR

Every single life only becomes great when the individual sets upon a goal or goals which they really believe in, which they can really commit themselves to, which they can put their whole heart and soul

As the year draws to a close, many of us will reflect on the year that was, and the things we planned to do when it was

January and the New Year stretched ahead of us with clean pages. Before you groan and say "oh no, not another story about New Year resolutions", bear with me. This story is about ALL goals. You don't have to wait until 2017 to start working towards your goals. In fact, depending on when you are reading this, there are still plenty of days left in 2016. Waiting for January is like waiting for Monday – if it is a goal worth pursuing, then there is no time like the present to get started!

Are you one of the people who achieves everything you set out to do (if so, well done, you can probably stop reading now J). Perhaps you are a person who sets some really good goals, ticks some of them off, makes it part way with others, then somewhere in the middle of the year you run out of energy (or accidentally lose the list!). Or maybe you have simply stopped making New Year resolutions because you never ever achieve anything you put on the list? Time/money/kids/parents/spouse/ the universe conspire against you in your effort to lose weight, get fit, get that new job, or even just go for a massage once a month. If you fall into either of the latter categories, please keep reading, this story is for you J

The most important thing about setting a goal is to have a really good goal! I don't mean it has to be a big goal, it just has to be really good. A goal that is important to YOU. On a scale of 1 to 10, where "1" is "that would be OK" and "10" is "hell yeah", your goal needs to be at least a "9". It needs to be so good that you will invest the time and energy to succeed. At this point it helps to write down at least ten reasons why it is important for you to achieve your goal. This will help you think about why you really want to do

Once you have your really exciting, juicy goal in mind (eg lose 5kg, run 1km without stopping, get back into your skinny jeans, or go for a massage once a month), it's time to make your goal S.M.A.R.T.

Specific

Measurable

Accountable Realistic

Time based

Specific – how explicit is your goal? For example, have you only said you want to lose weight, or have you said "I want to lose 5kg" (or 6kg, or 4kg, or 20kg, whatever the number is for you? Similarly, have yousaid "I want to go for a massage once a month", or have you said "On my day off each month I want to go for a massage at (insert your favourite place)". Make your goal specific.

Measurable – How will you know when you have reached your goal? A weight loss goal is easy to measure, others (such as decluttering your house) may be more difficult to measure. What will your goal look like when you have achieved it? Write it down. Accountable - Some people say "A" stands for attractive or achievable, but I prefer accountable. What or who is going to help you stick to your goal? Are you going to announce your goal to the world, and post regular updates on Facebook? Or will you enlist the support of a few close friends and family? Maybe you will join a support group, such as Weight Watchers or a running club? This year I have joined Coalfields Cross Country Running Club and it has been great! Knowing that I have told people I am going to show up has really motivated me to stick to my training program and do a long run each week.

Realistic - How practical is your goal? If you are not currently able to run 5km and you want to run a marathon in a months' time, how likely is it you will be able to do it? Don't set yourself up for failure (or worse, injury!). Set realistic goals which you can plan to achieve.

Time-based – does your goal have a deadline? It's OK saying you want to lose 5kg, but by when? Do you have a special event coming up? Do you want to learn a new language before your overseas holiday? Set a time limit on your goal.

Now your goal is S.M.A.R.T., how do you feel about achieving it? Is it still a 9 or a 10 out of 10? If not, go back to the drawing board and rework it until it really works for you.
