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



Branxton officially now a 'RV Friendly Town'

Branxton has officially earned the title of a 'RV Friendly Town' with the opening of the RV Park at Branxton Oval.

The new facility was a joint effort by Cessnock City Council & the Branxton Greta Business Chamber with about \$60,000 spent to bring the facility to the correct standard.

An RV Friendly TownTM is one that has met a set of guidelines to ensure they provide a certain amount of amenities, and a certain level of services for these travellers. When RV tourists enter a town displaying the RV Friendly TownTM sign, they know they will be welcome, certain services will be provided for them that may not be available in other centres, and they will have access to a safe place to stay overnight, and possibly for a longer period. The essential criteria is:-

• Provision of appropriate parking within the town centre, with access to a general shopping area for groceries and fresh produce.

- Provision of short term, low cost overnight parking (24/48 hours) for self-contained recreational vehicles, as close as possible to the CBD.
- Access to potable water.
- Access to a free dump point at an appropriate location.



Cessnock City Mayor, Councillor Bob Pynsent said he looks forward to showing off his mate Krusher.



Councillors stand united, roads are a priority!



Cessnock City Council is calling on the NSW Government to make roads a priority and address their concerns over the condition of a number of state roads in the local government area.

Councillors voted unanimously to support a motion to seek support from various NSW Government officials in a bid to work towards a solution for Cessnock's ageing state road network. Cessnock City Mayor, Councillor Bob Pynsent stated the united stance of Councillors reflects the current frustration levels in the community. "We have been working

hard to secure safety upgrades with the Roads and Maritime Service. consistently raising our concerns, however this has resulted in little action". "The safety of our road users is paramount prompting the decision to pursue new avenues to gain the support of the NSW Government and secure much needed funding to enable these vital works to take place", Cr Pynsent

Raising the BARR IS FREE CHOICE THE ANSWER OR DOES GOVERNMENT HAVE A ROLE?

How are you going with your negotiations on power supply and the rates charged? What about your provider of home insurance – how do they compare with others? And if the NDIS is currently something that you are wrestling with, are you feeling empowered or overwhelmed, or maybe both? And is there anyone out there who could explain to me the difference between one private health insurance provider, and another?

The ability for us as consumer to have choice is often called a "democratic right" by many and a "liberty" or "freedom" by others. But the flip side of this choice is the challenge of being able to make good, well informed choices. To make the best possible choices you need to become something of an expert in reading complicated documents, understanding in great detail the issue of finance and having clear and specific goals about your own personal needs. And even then, you can never be quite sure if you have asked all of the right questions, found all of the right details and been provided with all of the right information. Good luck.

In recent years we have seen the most atrocious scams being rolled out to fool people into signing up for "training courses" to get a qualification, only to find themselves in debt with no training and no qualification. We are already seeing equally concerning signs on the NDIS front – with some particular dodgy companies taking a big slice of the funding meant for some of our disabled people. In some of the recent floods across the country we have seen some of the insurance companies refusing to pay out, because of the fine

I firmly believe that Government have an incredibly important role to play to set minimum standards. I have no problem with the private sector doing better than the Government, and in some cases they do, but in too many instances we have allowed the privateers to do worse, at the taxpayer's expense.

The development of the draft Singleton Community Strategic Plan (CSP) reinforced the importance of arts and culture to you, our residents. Indeed, a call for an art gallery for Singleton was one of the most significant outcomes from last year's community consultation.

But the Singleton Festival is far more than a platform for artisans and maestros, and a lure for creative types to flock to our part of the world seeking inspiration.

The festival offers a richness of new experiences for locals to discover what lies in our own backyards, and learn about the history, the culture and the beauty right here in Branxton.

The Artisans Open Day, to be held just next door in Elderslie on Saturday 6 May, is a case in point.

Visitors can travel back in time to witness the traditional craft of blacksmithing, reforged in a contemporary setting as award-winning Artist Blacksmith Will Maguire opens up his workshop.

He and his blacksmith colleagues will join their considerable talents to create a sculptural monument that is relevant to us today – even though their skills stem from a bygone era.

Plus, there'll be live music and

complimentary refreshments.

If you've had a chance to check out the full program, you'll see there's something happening as part of the festival to suit everyone – from the crowning of the Strongest Man and Strongest Woman of the Hunter in the Hunter Strength Wars though to Banny's Baton Banter conducting the Christ Church Camerata at the stunning Sacred Spaces and retracing the steps – and downfall – of notorious bushrangers Joe an Jimmy Governor in the Day of the Dead.

But first, we all need to take up our crochet hooks and turn out to loop Singleton's entrance to the Guinness Book of World Records and officially launch this year's festival. It doesn't matter if you've never tried crocheting before – there'll be a crash course at 9am ahead of the official world record attempt.

ANZAC Day is an opportunity for all Australians to pay tribute to the men and women who have served our nation in wars, conflicts and on peacekeeping operations. It's one of the most important dates in our commemorative calendar.

We give our eternal gratitude to the sailors, soldiers, airmen and women, past and present, who have given so much for us.

It always delights me to see so many local people at our local services and yesterday was no exception. During 1917, 76,836 Australians became casualties in battles such as Bullecourt, Messines, and the four-month campaign around Ypres known as the battle of Passchendaele. I've had the great privilege of visiting Australia's war graves there, including that of the Hunter's own Clarence Jeffries VC. This year also marks the Centenary of the Battle for Beersheba and the great charge of our Light Horse brigades. I have also enjoyed the very great

privilege of serving as Australia's Defence Minister and in that role, the further privilege of delivering speeches at ANZAC Day services on the Gallipoli peninsula and in Afghanistan. But whether I'm overseas or at home as was the case yesterday, every service is a moving one.

I thank all of our local RSL Sub Branch and Womens' Auxiliary members who again worked so hard to ensure ANZAC day was marked in an appropriate way. Lest we Forget.

Global political upheaval continued on Sunday night our time when France's traditional major parties dropped out of the race for the Presidency. With no candidate securing fifty percent of the vote, the first and second placed candidates will now run off in two weeks' time. The socialists and the Republicans are left to reflect and re-build. Their defeat follows the unlikely win by Donald Trump and the decision of UK voters to leave the European Union. Whether the French will continue the run of shocks by electing the extreme right's Marine Le Pen is yet to be seen but the whole world will be nervously watching. Le Pen is aggressively anti-Europe and in office, could seek to follow the UK out through the EU door. That may be one too many shocks for our global architecture to bear.

Those of us who believe the current rules-based global order - while not perfect – serves us well, now pin our hopes on Emmanuel Macron. Extraordinarily, the thirty-nine -year-old does not even lead a political party, just a political movement. His strengths include his main -stream views, his charismatic personality and his lack of political baggage as a new-comer. The traditional parties, the business community and international players are now lining-up to back him in, whether in the end that proves an

advantage or disadvantage remains to be seen. We'll know soon enough. Cheers, Joel

I have welcomed the news that the NSW Government will provide \$8 million to expand a network of Country Universities Centres (CUC) to enable regional and rural university students to study in collaborative and supportive environments closer to home.

The CUC centres will be modelled on an already successful pilot centre in Cooma with at least five other centres to be established over the next three years.

The first Country Universities Centre was established in Cooma in 2013 to allow local students who are doing distance or online university courses to study together in a centre that offers facilities, technology and support staff. Our regional students should have the option to live in their local areas close to their family and friends while undertaking their university education rather than having to relocate for study which can be disruptive to their personal lives and expensive.

That is why the Nationals in Government are investing \$8 million in at least five new CUC hubs to provide local study spaces for university students who are studying by distance. Facilities are expected to include high speed internet, video-conferencing and computer and print facilities as well as workshops delivered by qualified local

instructors.

There may also be opportunities to employ qualified local people to help students acquire the skills required to complete university courses such as research and essay writing.

As well as personal benefits for students, this can help reduce the loss of talent from country to city areas and allow local businesses to access local people with the qualifications to meet their needs.

As a Member of the NSW Government, I am calling for a Country University Centre to be located in Singleton, which I know will have profound benefits for students in Upper Hunter, and as such I will be working hard to achieve this outcome for our local community. The CUC Board is currently assessing locations for further regional hubs which will be established in conjunction with local communities. *Cheers, Michael*

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The good news about having pets!

Research has shown that owning a pet can have a number of physical health benefits

- Increased cardiovascular health (lower blood pressure, lower triglycerides and in men, lower cholesterol)
- Increased physical activity. Dogs especially help us get out and enjoy the outdoors while getting some regular exercise. They are great motivators and personal trainers, never wanting to miss a training session no matter the weather.
- •Fewer visits to the doctor
- •Growing up with a dog (and other pets to a lesser extent) during infancy may help to strengthen the immune system and may reduce the risk of allergies
- •Children who have pets are less likely to miss days more exercise. of school due to illness The joy of having a pet isn't new to most Australians; we have one of the highest rates of pet ownership in the world. In fact our pets are such positive influences on our lives that one study found that Australian ownership of cats and dogs saved approximately \$3.86 billion in health expenditure over one year.

There is a wide range of research that points to the positive impact pets have on our general health. Not all of it, however, is able to prove cause and effect. Longitudinal research, which examines the health of an individual before and after pet acquisition, seems to establish the case more clearly. For example, it can be argued that people who are healthy are more likely to own a pet, rather than particular health benefits being the result of pet ownership.

- English scientist James Serpell conducted a longitudinal intervention study where three groups of people were recruited and the first given dogs, the second cats, and members of the third did not receive a pet. Before the intervention, all three groups had similar results for a self reported assessment of general health. One month later, the reports of minor illnesses and complaints had substantially reduced in the pet groups, and in the case of the dog group (but not the cat), this remained true for the ten month duration of the study. The difference between the dog and cat effect may be because dog owners take
- •In a German longitudinal study of 225 occupants in nursing homes, half the group were given pet budgerigars. The conclusion six weeks later was that "budgerigars can effectively intervene in processes of aging, increasing the physical, social and psychological quality of life in old age." Several studies have shown that pet

ownership may reduce the need for medical services.

- •In a United States study of 938 Medicare enrollees, pet owners reported fewer doctor contacts during a one year period than nonowners.
- •Jorm et al's subsequent examination of Australian Medicare records of elderly subjects (mean age 79.9) which found no difference in use of health services between pet owners and non-pet owners indicates that the health benefits may not extend equally to all members of the community It still seems, however, that animal companionship may have a significant positive impact on the nation's
- •German, Australian and Chinese data indicate that pet owners make fewer annual doctor visits than non-owners, and that the relationship remains statistically significant after controlling for gender, age, marital status, income and other variables associated with health. Research by Headey et al has compared Australian pet owners to those in Germany and China, and found that the health benefits of pet ownership for the general community exist in the populations of all three countries, particularly for the long term pet owners. The German and Australian results were the first national representative surveys to show that (1) people who continuously own a pet are the healthiest group (2) people who acquire a pet after not previously owning one are the second healthiest group and (3) people who cease to have a pet or never had one, are the least healthy groups.

Children connect with local indigenous culture

Children at Singleton Council's Out of School Hours Care got a unique insight into Singleton's local indigenous heritage at an event organised by the Singleton Community Garden and Singleton Council on Thursday 13 April.

Made possible through funding from Glencore, the 'Singleton's Indigenous Heritage - A Youth Experience' project aimed to connect local children with the indigenous community by discussing and learning about indigenous culture directly from elders. The event included a visit to Baime Cave guided by local elder Warren Taggart, as well as a tour of the bush tucker garden with Kevin Lomax. Mark Ihlein, Council's Director Planning and Sustainable Environment, said the children were also treated to a performance by Uncle Perry, an Education Officer from Kotara School,

to teach them about the many different facets of Aboriginal life and culture, including language, music and dance. "It is important that children are provided with the opportunity to connect with country by learning about local indigenous customs and language, which many never have an opportunity to do," he said.

"The 'Singleton's Indigenous Heritage - A Youth Experience' project provided an opportunity for children to understand the significance and stories behind a local indigenous site, plus

Beating the bulge can be tough in winter when we tend to crave high fat comfort food. Here are some great healthy alternatives.

Salads and steamed veggies can't quite cut it in winter. Fortunately, there are ways to get that sense of a soul satisfying comfort meal without the fat and kilojoules of standard winter fare. Soups are an obvious choice, but baked pasta dishes with loads of veg can also be great for the diet conscious, as can risottos made without high-fat cheese but instead using such flavour enhancers such as good stock, herbs, spices, parmesan, wild mushrooms or porcini powder.

When counting kilojoules it's often better to seek out recipes that are inherently low-fat rather than trying to find or create low-fat versions of high fat food. Asian cuisines offer a world of delicious, warming, diet-friendly choices, from Japanese and Thai noodle

soups, stir-fries and hot pots to Indian dahls and vegetable curries. Miso udon noodle soup

Japanese vegetarian hotpot Chicken jungle curry

Lentil and cauliflower dahl Hot potato

Baked potatoes are a surprisingly low-cal, satisfying and filling meal if you stuff them with healthy toppings such as baked beans (great for protein); salsa and creamed corn; low-fat ricotta, cream cheese or cottage cheese and chives or other herbs; hummus or yoghurt and ratatouille. Be sure to pile some greens on the side.

Eggs are one of the best super foods around, packed full of nutrients and they can easily be turned into healthy winter meals, such as frittatas, pies and quiches made with herbs and vegetables; omelettes stuffed with your favourite lean meats, low-fat cheese, veggies and herbs; or baked egg dishes. Get creative

Comfort staples often be made healthier with a little tweaking. Use lean mince and add extra veg and lentils to your usual spag bog; substitute some of the high fat cheddar in your favourite mac 'n' cheese for a low-fat ricotta and add greens, such as broccoli or peas; top Shepherd's Pie with sweet potato mash made creamy with low-fat sour cream and milk; and pad your meat loaf with grated veggies such as carrot and zucchini.


Helping retirees sell key to supply

The key to housing supply is unlocking property held by retirees and upgraders who are choosing to stay put due to the cost of stamp duty, according to the Real Estate Institute of New South Wales.

REINSW President John Cunningham said comments made by NSW Premier Gladys Berejiklian that she is open to tax

changes to improve supply and housing affordability are a step in the right direction.

"Premier Berejiklian has stated that the key to housing affordability is supply. However, supply is not just about new homes. The key to housing supply is unlocking existing properties held by retirees. "Buyers are now forking out over four per cent of the value of a property on stamp duty and this is stopping the supply of established homes flowing

"There would be a chain reaction. One transaction can set off a chain reaction that leads to 10 sales. If we get the supply of existing properties flowing then the price pressure will be eased. "In order to set this in motion we call on the NSW government to provide retirees with a 50 per cent reduction in stamp duty for a residential property purchased to replace an existing residential property up to the value of \$1 million.

"In combination with this strategy there needs to be genuine and compelling incentives for all buyers, including retirees, to relocate to regional areas in order to ease the pressure on the Sydney market," Mr Cunningham said

Australia seen as a safe haven by wealthy

Australia is seen as a safe haven by the world's wealthiest individuals according to Knight Frank's Wealth Report.



Chocolate is not all bad!

School holidays with Easter smack bang in the middle! A perfect combination of events which means it has been more tempting than usual to say "the diet starts tomorrow". A lack of routine during the school holidays plus the inevitable gathering of friends over the Easter long weekend, can result in our best intentions being side lined in favour of popcorn at the movies (have you seen the Batman Lego movie yet??)



not to mention the chocolate Easter eggs which seem to be in never ending supply. I gave up a long time ago thinking of what I eat as a "diet". I just try and eat as healthily as I can, and as mindfully as I can, while watching my portion sizes. But even personal trainers can be tempted to let things slide for a day or so, and that day can quickly turn into a week! So I try and make sure that my healthy eating goals are backed up with tips and tricks which are now habits which I hardly have to think

For example, I love chocolate. I just love it in smaller quantities than I used to. I have also become quite fussy. Instead of eating any chocolate available, as the saying goes I now prefer quality over quantity. Here are some of my other top tips for getting through Easter (and beyond) without piling on the kilos or feeling guilty because you have over-indulged.

Ask for what you want. If you don't want chocolate at Easter(or any other time), say so. Your friends and family should respect your health and fitness goals. If, despite this, you are still given chocolate, you don't have to eat it. Just thank them and give it to someone else (I find it is best to get it out of the house as quickly as possible, but one option is to take it to work with you and share it with your work mates). If you can't imagine Easter without chocolate, remember bigger is not necessarily better. Ask for a small good quality Easter egg, rather than the giant egg with lots of smaller eggs inside. They will probably cost the same amount, but the smaller one is likely to taste better and have fewer calories!

If you are giving Easter eggs at Easter, don't buy extra. It is tempting when they are on sale to buy more "just in case I have forgotten someone, or in case someone turns up unexpectedly". Chances are, you have not forgotten anyone, and you won't have any unexpected visitors, but what you will have is extra chocolate in the house once Easter is over. This goes for any other gathering of family and friends – do you really need to buy that extra round of Brie? Or is it just going to sit in your fridge after the long weekend, tempting you until you eat it so it doesn't go to waste.

Put your food (even your chocolate) on a plate and sit down to eat. It is easy to grab a small chocolate egg (or other snack) and eat it on the run, but will you really enjoy it, or even remember that you have had it? Be mindful about what you eat. Put it on a nice plate and sit down at the table. Turn off all your distractions (Facebook on your phone, candy crush saga, emails on your computer) and for a few minutes just enjoy doing one thing - eating. You are more likely to pay attention to what you are eating. Plan ahead. If you are going on a picnic or to a friend's place for a BBQ, take healthy snacks or side dishes. It doesn't have to look like "diet" food. I like making a sweet potato dip which I can have with carrot or celery sticks. Or make a potato bake with low fat cheese and low fat milk. Or offer to take a salad so you can keep the dressing on the side. If you know there is going to be at least one healthy dish there that you are happy to eat, you will be less stressed about how the event fits into your meal plan for the week.

Keep track of what you eat and drink by writing it down. It is easy to lose track and forget what you have eaten, especially if you are away from home or eating on the run, so write it down! There are plenty of free apps you can use (I like My Fitness Pal but there are others) or you can do it the old-fashioned way and write it down on paper. You don't necessarily have to keep track of the calories for each item of food, just the simple habit of writing down what you eat can make you feel more accountable for what you are eating.

Finally, remember that chocolate is not "bad" or "good". It is just food. Don't beat yourself up when you eat it, but do make sure you really enjoy the experience and make it worthwhile. And if you don't eat it today, it will still be there tomorrow (unless of course the kids eat it all, in which case you should have hidden it better!!).

REVIEW ~ War Cry

After missing the mark with his last few novels, Wilbur Smith revisits his bestselling Courtney family franchise for the first time since 2009

when Assegai was released. Shifting from previous novels in the series, this book mostly follows a young woman named Saffron Courtney, whose father, Leon, is a businessman, war hero, and skillful hunter. In his own words, Leon is "confident in his prowess as a hunter and fighting man," and he's trained his daughter well. From an early age on, and certainly now, Saffron outdoes the boys she competes against. First on the polo field, then later by beating everyone else with her equestrian skills. Set prior to World War II, Saffron continues to hone her skills on the open fields of their large Kenya home under the watchful eye of her father.

Between revisiting Leon's point of view and filling new readers in on the family's backstory, Saffron slowly grows up as the story presses on. Soon she's a teenager ready to face the world, or so she thinks. Then a tragedy that hits close to home shakes Saffron, and the rest of the Courtney family, which stays with her. While away in South Africa for school, Saffron inadvertently runs

The sharp, yet time period-specific dialogue is another strength, something that's been hit-or-miss in some of the author's previous novels. The downside is that War Cry is a slow burn, which isn't attractive to all types of readers. Likewise, it's somewhat of a character study and for everything to

work as planned readers must care about the Courtney family to become engrossed in the story. Smith is one of the few historical fiction novelists who can pull that off, but even so, some readers may prefer a more thrilling, fast-paced plot.



TAKE SOME GOOD ADVICE

Making the Most of Your SD Card

Subra from Rutherford wants to save some of the onboard space on her phone. Subra writes "I have a Samsung Galaxy grand Duos I-19082 phone. The phone memory is almost full. However, space on SD card is hardly used. How do I transfer the applications etc to start from and save to SD card? I just want to free up the phone memory, without losing any usability of apps. Thank you for your help. Thanks for the great question. Moving your apps to your

SD card is one way to save space on your phone, and Android actually makes it very easy to do this. The first thing that you'll want to do is go to your settings and open your APPLICATION

MANAGER. Sometimes this is also simply called APPS, depending on which version of Android you're



Click on APPS or APPLICATION MANAGER and choose the app that you want to move. If the box that says "move to SD card" is grayed out, then you can't move it. If it isn't, then just tap on that and it will automatically move your



If you open this app in the application manager again, the box will now say "move to phone". That's all that there is to it!

Another great way to save some space on your device is to make sure that your camera is set to save photos to the SD card instead of internal storage, which is also a pretty easy fix. (Screenshots are from

my Galaxy Tab 4 running Lollipop. Your screens may look slightly different, but the instructions still hold.) Please note that if your phone doesn't have an SD card slot, or if you don't have an SD card installed, then the card option will either be absent or will be grayed out. First, open your camera app. Once it's open. choose the SETTINGS option, which usually looks



That will open your settings for you. You may have to tap on another cogwheel to open up the general camera settings, the tab of which is noted here with an arrow. Once you do, choose STORAGE or SAVE LOCATION or whatever your particular device has, and choose CARD, MEMORY CARD, EXTERNAL CARD, SD CARD or whatever your particular device displays. I've seen all of these on various Android devices.

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I hope that this helps! Internet Explorer Acting Up? Try This

Here's a quick tip if you're noticing some issues with Internet Explorer. Maybe it won't seem to load the right page or let you access a form. Perhaps you've got and store data locally. content that won't display. Sometimes clearing the cache is all it takes to stop quirky behavior. Press Ctrl+Shift+Delete. The window below will pop up. I'd suggest checking the box to preserve favourites and website data and choosing to delete temporary Internet files, cookies, and the history. If you're having an issue with old passwords popping up, I'd suggest deleting them and the form data as well. If there's no problem, leave them as



Then click the Delete button. Hopefully, clearing the cache can take care of the problem

How Your Smart Watch Puts You At Risk & How to Protect Yourself

The first phone with internet capability was released in 1993 by IBM and Bellsouth. Christened the Simon personal communicator phone, the device was designed primarily to allow for portable communication, with secondary purposes relating to the phone's ability to connect to the web. At that time, the mobile nature of the device was perhaps as exciting as its features and uses. Now, nearly 25 years later, consumers have graduated from carrying their tech to actually wearing it. Though wearables are revolutionizing modern life, these internet-equipped accessories can pose significant security risks. Here are the three top tech security concerns about wearables and recommended solutions users can employ to protect themselves from malicious



Data Is Not Encrypted Wearable tech like smart watches, activity trackers and pulse trackers collect Many of these products make no attempt at encrypting the data or at restricting access to it. Since many of these devices do not ask users for authentification through a password, PIN or biometric security confirmation, anyone who has access to the device has immediate access to the data that device holds. Additionally, this private data is also susceptible to interception while in transit as it is synced with information to be stored on a service

provider or manufacturer cloud servers. This risk is compounded if the user also employs a third-party app since some apps fail to enforce even fundamental security standards; this means the data they store or send is not encrypted either. Users may think that no one is interested in the information their Fitbits collect, but that is precisely the kind of data health insurance providers would love to view before agreeing to uphold a medical insurance policy.



Solution – For now, users are responsible for keeping their devices and information safe. However, with more awareness, device manufacturers might be pressured to strengthen security measures and increase data protection. By implementing the requirement of a unique password, as well as the encryption of communications and data storage, to gain access to the device data, privacy would experience an exponential improvement. **Connectivity Is Not**

One of the appeals of using a wearable device is the ease with which it can wirelessly connect to a tablet or smartphone via Wi -Fi or Bluetooth, but this convenience also represents a sizable weakness. A user may find it easier to just leave Bluetooth on at all times to allow for syncing to occur. However, a good number of these wireless communications are not prepared to deal with "brute -force" cyber attacks. Traditionally, hackers seek out and exploit software vulnerabilities to infiltrate a system, but a "brute-force" attack is an attack at multiple points of entry attempting to break into a system by applying a trial and error approach to cracking the login details.



Solution - To defend against brute force attacks on a mobile-device-towearable connection, users should confirm a connection to a network serving as few devices as

Oldsters rob a bank in a genial heist movie that doesn't quite shortchange you, yet doesn't pay dividends either.

Michael Caine, Morgan Freeman, Alan Arkin: The triple-whammy veteran cast that heads up this light-hearted Brooklyn-set heist caper (a remake of a largely forgotten 1979 movie starring George Burns) is just about distracting and charming enough to paper over the film's sketchy story and low energy levels. The three play an aging trio sick of being

kicked around by life in retirement. After one of them, Joe (Caine), finds himself in the middle of a bank holdup thinking he could do better, he and his friends decide to rob the Williamsburg Savings Bank. For much of the movie, the old pals plot and practice, honing the perfect alibi, while director Zach Braff (Garden State) leads us on the odd detour into each of their family or romantic lives without ever going deep. The script by Theodore

Melfi (Hidden Figures) pays lip service to contemporary economic struggles, referencing the squeeze on traditional industries (all three men are former steel work-

ers) and the breakdown of old-age financial relief and family support. But these nods to reality are just as soft as the movie's slapstick tendencies, which include not-veryrib-tickling scenes of shoplifting, and chases involving mobility scooters. And don't think too much about the plot; it's about as water-tight as a corporate-pension scheme. All three stars deliver exactly what you expect from themnothing more, nothing new—but their onscreen familiarity is a strange comfort in itself.

Covert Collection of Data

Not all risks involve the user being exploited for information; the user is also a potential perpetrator of collecting data through the use of wearables. Devices like smartwatches and headgear allow the wearers to record audio, snap photos and film video without being detected. Since this tech is small and innocuous, abuse of these features would be virtually undetectable. Not only would credit card numbers and identification documents be at risk, but anyone with a wearable could monitor the actions

and behaviors of anyone they please.



Solution – Companies will need to discuss limiting the capabilities of wearables and forbidding those that pose the highest threat. Businesses and venues may request that patrons disable specific features, or may restrict where wearables are permitted as the risk of monetary and identity theft increases with these capabilities. Proactive

individuals may want to consider a service, like LifeLock, to help protect themselves from identity

Twenty-five years ago, when the first mobile computer phone was unveiled, it is unlikely that the developers foresaw the evolution from mobile devices to wearable ones. Like all great innovations, the perks come with drawbacks, but being aware of the risks and planning ahead will mean that users can avoid being exploited and simply enjoy the advancements of technology.

This article was first published in 2009 The past nine months or so has been a fairly melancholy experience in our home. Firstly, my uncle passed away suddenly, followed by my beautiful mother and in terribly sad circumstances, Holly's father was recently taken from us. Death is a strange phenomenon. It is really the only inevitable event which will affect all living things at one stage or another, yet when it happens, it feels so foreign. The shock, the angst, the disappointment, the horror, the sadness.... the disbelief! When a loved one passes on, the world literally becomes a place 'you used to know'. You can't quite believe that people are still driving around, going to work, eating in cafes, playing golf, getting on with their lives whilst yours seems to stand still (or fall in around you). Then the roller-coaster ride of emotion begins. Everyone reacts differently to death. There is no textbook behaviour and every day is a new day.

Consequently, there has been a lot of soul-searching of late. During this time you confront yourself on a new level and tend to questions which have previously been pushed aside. I guess the most suitable word here is 'priority'. It is an opportunity to assess your priorities. Again, one word seems to hold pride of place on top of the list of priorities – family! Twelve months ago, the Hunter Valley Wine Industry Association created a promotional advertising campaign. It is not a campaign promoting a style of wine. It is not a campaign promoting a geographical part of the Hunter Valley. It is not a campaign to supersede the other wine producing regions of Australia. Simply titled 'Hunter Valley – We are Family', one could perceive this as a clever play on something we mark as

Forgive me for stating the bleeding obvious but advertising slogans are designed to attract a market. Most, not all, but most are captioned with glossed-over half truths or catchy one -liners in order to penetrate into our vulnerable psyches (or more to the point – wallets!). Despite the overwhelmingly convincing 'evidence'...... does Coke 'Add Life'? Does Vegemite put the rose in every cheek? Does Berocca give you back your B-B-Bounce and can you eat a Milky Way between meals without ruining your appetite?

So the question remains, is this simply another one-liner to spark some market share? Family is not a word taken lightly. Family is about closeness, togetherness, support and love. It is the essence of a complete fulfilment in human lives. It's what drives us to create a better world. It is the most important facet of most of our lives. To brand an area or a community of people as a 'family' is either a gracious and enlightening compliment or a disgraceful misuse of a value we hold so dearly

Having a thorough knowledge of our area throughout my life, I can only tell it from my point of view as far back as I can remember. The Valley was very different back then. The roads were all gravel, only a handful of wineries existed, the only place to stay or eat was in Cessnock or Bellbird or Maitland. Fortified wines were still very much in demand and residual sugar featured heavily in 'Moselle' styled wines. We called our semillon 'Hunter River Riesling' and our shiraz 'Hermitage'. Hock and Claret even graced labels. The pioneering families of Tyrrell, Tulloch and Drayton featured heavily and steered the ship towards an unknown future. This was the Hunter Valley, a small winemaking community, which extended into the upper reaches of Denman and surrounding areas.

Throughout the seventies my brothers and I were too young to appreciate the virtues of community spirit. It wasn't until the very early eighties that I saw for the first time, a community in a desperate situation. In the midst of one of the worst droughts for many years, our small winemaking community found ourselves in a little church in Broke, praying for rain. My brothers and I became bored and began to play up, only to be hit hard on the back of the head with a hymn book. I turned to see a ropable Brian McGuigan, his large, towering figure as serious as I had ever seen him. It was the exact moment I

realised the seriousness of a dire situation and I will never

forget the look on Brian's face as long as I

Family is about support. The Valley was there when Brian and Fay's daughter Vanessa, lost her battle with cancer. We were there when Reg and Pam Drayton were taken from us. We were there when Ed Joualt battled on, yet lost his life after a car accident. We were there when Al Sutherland and Peter Wright lost their battle with depression and we were there when Trevor Drayton was tragically taken from

Family is about togetherness. We were there at all the wine show dinners at Singleton when political guest speakers would bore the pants off us and everyone would be rolling drunk on the bus trip back to Pokolbin, where newly won trophies would be rolling around on the floor of the bus. We were there at the infamous ACI luncheons where hold on can't quite remember! We were there at all the restaurant openings in the Valley, all the lunches and dinners, birthday parties, christenings, weddings, the Pokolbin Reds rugby games and functions. Whatever the occasion, we are there with bells on. Family is about growth. We were there when the area took a massive growth spurt in the early to mid nineties, bringing new and interesting people to an ever-growing destination. We were there when younger winemakers got married and gave life to a new generation of winemakers and consequently grandchildren to an older generation of winemakers.

Family is about sharing. We were and are always there to help our neighbour, exchange winemaking knowledge and viticultural practices. We are there to lend a hand for all our community responsibilities and engagements. We were there when Wine Hunter Marketing and the Hunter Valley Vineyard Association historically merged to create an impressive communitybased organisation in the Hunter Valley Wine Industry Association.

Family is not all a big bowl full of fruit. Families argue; families envy; families fight; families side; families cry. The good in families would not be as good without the flaws. Flaws make us human. Mistakes make us human. Families could not exist without them.

The winemaking community of the Hunter Valley has changed a lot since I was a kid and it will continually change well into the future. The stories of the all the characters and the great winemaking feats are all kept alive and well. We have overcome some extremely difficult hurdles to get where we are and for that we are proud people, but most importantly.....we've had fun! A week before my mother passed away, I ran into Brian McGuigan. He asked me how Mum was and I half-heartedly alluded that she wasn't very well. The great, towering figure of Brian McGuigan held his arms out straight and placed his hands on my shoulders. He looked me straight in the eyes and placed great pressure on my shoulders with his big hands. He then offered me the biggest, warmest smile and his eyes told a thousand stories, yet he said nothing. It was one of the most comforting moments of my life and I will never forget that moment as long as I live. Whatever you believe is up to you. If you

think Coke adds life – that's fine. If you believe that Vegemite puts the rose in your cheeks – sensational. One thing I will tell you however, is that the wine community of the Hunter Valley has been built over a long period. People come and people go but the incredible and unique culture we have created is testament to our will to stick together. We eat together. We drink together. We laugh together. We cry together. We are family!

Yarding 1040 ~ Change 660 (Comparison Date 12/4/17)

With the previous market cancelled due to the Easter break, numbers more than tripled, as the quality in the penning was very good. The bulk of the yarding entered the vealer categories, with yearlings limited in supply, while the older steers and

cows were scarce in the pens. The market trend was firm to dearer, compared to the market held a fortnight ago. The medium weight 200-280kg vealer steers returning to the paddock improved 3c making from 370c to 444c, as the lighter end topped at 469c/kg. The same weight heifer portion also to restocker and backgrounder orders gained 15c and ranged from 355c to 408c/kg. The lighter end of the yearling steers to the restockers sold close to firm, ranging from 364c to 385c, with the heavier drafts topping at 384c/kg. The yearling heifers were generally lighter weights and those to the restockers lifted 10c, making from 329c to 360c/kg. The prime conditioned younger cattle to the butchers sold to strong competition, with the best at 395c/kg. The sale of 17 yearlings at \$1 million or more was the third highest in Australian sales history, beaten at Easter 2008 (28 lots) and 2007 (23). Only 58 lots sold under \$100,000, bottom \$20,000, and about 60 each sold for \$500,000 or more.

A feature of the sale was Arrowfield Stud's gross of \$20,040,000, the highest ever for a vendor at an Australian yearling sale.

Former shuttlers provide first winner of two \$10million races

WHEN American 4-year-old Arrogate overcame a tardy start and difficulties in running and still recorded a dominant win in the Dubai World Cup over 2000m on March 25, he became the first performer in world history to win two races at \$10million or more.

at \$10million or more.

This is the traditional value of the Dubai Cup, the world's richest race until this title was usurped by the inauguration at Gulfstream Park, Florida on January 28 of the \$12million Pegasus World Cup Invitational over 2000m. It too was

won untroubled by Arrogate, cruising home 4 3/4 lengths clear of his nearest rival.

Arrogate has now contested nine races, all on dirt, for eight wins and US\$17,084,600, a record for an American.It is the third highest earnings in world racing, headed narrowly by Japanese performers Orfevre and Gentildonna.

Also winner of the American Breeders' Cup Classic and the Travers Stakes (new track record), the Juddmonte Farms raced Arrogate is a grey bred on a sire cross of two horses who shuttled to Australia, Unbridled's Song (by Mr. Prospector grandson Unbridled) and Distorted Humor (by the Mr. Prospector sire Forty Niner and from a Danzig

A Breeder's Cup Juvenile and Florida Derby winner, Unbridled's Song visited Arrowfield in 1997, 98 and 99, leaving about 170 potential runners, and Distorted Humor, a dual Group 2 winner, came out to Grand Lodge, Avenel, Vic in 1999 and 2000 for 120 foals.

galloper whose six Group1
wins included the Breeders'
Cup Juvenile Fillies Stakes.
Historically, she can be traced
back to 1850 born Miss Agnes,


