# Mayor Peter Blackmore not to seek re-election

MAITLAND Mayor Peter Blackmore OAM has officially announced that he will not be contesting the coming local government elections this September. In a press release issued last Wednesday Peter confirmed one of the worst kept secrets; that he would not be seeking re-election. "Last Wednesday it was announced that I won't be running for Mayor or as a

Councillor in September's Local Government elections." said Peter.
"I have spent 22 years of my life as Mayor of this great city, in addition to the time I worked as the NSW Member for Maitland. Working for the public has been an honour and I feel extremely lucky that I've been able to

achieve what I have.
"I do, however, feel very comfortable with this decision. I'm very aware of

the fact that it's time for me to give back to my family and to be there for them, as they have been there for me. My wife Robyn has been by my side for this journey and I can never thank her enough for the support she has given me. I also want to spend more time with my children and grandchildren and watch them grow up and be there to support them and to watch them succeed. I'd also like to hit the road in my caravan,"

said Peter.

"There's parts of this country I haven't had the chance to see and Robyn and I are excited to explore more of what Australia has to offer. I want to thank the staff at Council for everything they've done for me, including General Manager David Evans who's been great to work with over the years. Maitland is well served by a diverse, enthusiastic and talented workforce committed to the community and I'll leave my role with confidence that this won't change.

"Finally, I'd like to take this opportunity to thank those people in the community who have supported me, but also those who have challenged me as it's made me a better public servant and a better person. Thank you for the opportunity and the many fantastic memories, that I will never forget. I look forward to serving you as Mayor up

until 9 September," said Peter.

Mayor Blackmore was first elected to Maitland Council in 1980 & served his first term as mayor from 1986 to 1990.

He was the state member from 1991 to 1999.
In 1997 Maitland council was dismissed & a referendum followed where the community elected the mayor leading to a four-year term.
In 1999 he was elected mayor again and is still in the chair.
Mayor Blackmore, on receiving an Order of

Australia Medal last year, paid tribute to his parents for teaching him ... "that it was the people behind the community who made it great."

"I was brought up this way, to work with the community and be actively involved in everything I did," Peter said. He also gave credit to former Maitland MP Milton Morris, who he described as his mentor.

It wasn't all plain sailing for Peter with accusations in 1991 of impropriety that led to an ICAC enquiry of which he was exonerated. In 2002 he was arrested and

charged with sexual assault that took 20-months to have all charges thrown out & he being awarded costs. At the time he was reported as saying that, despite calls

for him to stand down, he never considered giving in – "not even in my darkest moments."

As of today it can be confirmed that two sitting councillors have flagged their decision to stand for Mayor in September.

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

# Pets and **Patrols with** Ranger Kurt

Did you know if you sell a dog it is your responsibility to change ownership details? While a new owner is provided with a copy of the paperwork the responsibility sits with the seller. In fact, after selling the animal you have 14 days to notify Cessnock City Council of a change in ownership. A failure to do so is a breach of legislation, in fact those in breach could face a penalty starting from \$165.

The good news is changing and updating details for your pet has never been easier. Once you have your pet's microchip number visit the NSW Pet registry online at www.petregistry.nsw.gov.au. On the home page you will be given the option to set up your 'Pet Owner Profile'. Once set up, you can enter your pet's microchip details and 'claim' them, which links them to your profile. Now that your pet's details are linked to your Pet Owner Profile you can update their status (i.e. home/missing), name identifying marks and your home address. You also have the option to transfer ownership online whereby you nominate the new owner of the animal and they 'claim' the animal as their own.

In a few simple steps your mate's registration can be kept up-to-date. Jump online now and keep your mate safe www.petregistry.nsw.gov.au.

I attended the Public Forum on the proposed new Lower Hunter Hospital held in Maitland last week.

A bevy of experts explained, to a large degree, why the Metford site was the preferred site for the new \$400million health facility

The number of beds & as to whether it will be Private or Public tended to be the prominent

It appeared that the new hospital will be at Metford & a Private/ Public partnership facility, to a large extent, run by the private sector. This is because of budget constraints it was noted. The thing that did amaze

me was the fact that the

Minister publically stated, only weeks ago, that 'everything was back on the table'. In that report he challenged the state health department to prove to him that the Metford site was the optimum site from 35 sites they examined & if the running model viz., public/private,

would give the best outcome for the community. A reminder to the State Health Department; public servants don't make decisions, our elected representatives will always have the final say. Put your arguments forward, make a recommendation & don't try and pre-empt a political decision. Some of the criteria that the Health Department used to decide on the location & running model, as taken from their information website, included:

- Accessibility to existing communities, transport links and support services
- •Proximity to population centres and areas of population growth and



•Travel time to other major public and private health facilities

•Access to a skilled and

specialist health workforce

•Environmental and geotechnical factors

• Consideration of flood prone

areas and the implications for access and operation during flooding

•Land characteristics such as

slope, elevation and orientation

•Potential cost to develop, including connection to utilities

• Heritage and cultural aspects.

the Hunter Region lives within 25 km (16 mi) of the coast, with 55% of the entire population living in the cities of Newcastle and Lake Macquarie. Large growth was also recorded in Hunter Valley (excluding Newcastle), just to the north of Sydney, up by 3,400 people. Maitland SA2 recorded the fastest growth in this region at 5.1%, which was also the fastest growth outside Greater Sydney. The total number of people usually resident in Maitland in 2016 was 78, 096. This represents an increase of 14,591 people (22.98%) from the 2006 total of 63,505 people. In the rest of NSW, the highest population densities were in Newcastle - Cooks Hill (2,900 people per sq km), nearby Waratah -North Lambton (2,500).

The latest development is Huntlee, close to Branxton NSW. Branxton is equal distance from other centres of Cessnock, Singleton and Maitland.

Huntlee began life as Sweetwater, marketed from the late 1990s by its original developer, Duncan Hardie, who in 2005 envisaged a town of up to 50,000 people on the 2000 hectare site.

A decade later, the fully

approved Huntlee has a projected population of up to 20,000, with a 200 hectare town centre surrounded on three sides by four separate villages comprising as many as 7500 homes by 2035. The Huntlee site straddles the Cessnock and Singleton local government areas. Currently we who live in the area are serviced by regional hospitals at

Singleton and Cessnock and Maitland. If we the residents between Singleton and Maitland along the new freeway have any serious medical emergency now we are taken by ambulance to the John Hunter hospital in Newcastle which is straight down the brand new M15 (50km and takes 39 min by private vehicle) but much less by ambulance as there is less built up areas

to negotiate. My last trip in

took just less than 30min. The John Hunter is the quickest hospital reached as the freeway bypasses Maitland. The existing Maitland Hospital is 23 min (22.2 km) via New England Hwy/A43 navigating through many built up areas. (Google Maps)

I understand that Maitland is aiming to have a new Hospital developed at the old PGH brickworks. This distance is 33 min (30.5 km) via New England Hwy/A43. The proposed area of Metford is

totally unsuitable for the following reasons. 1. The PGH Brickworks site is influenced by the Williamtown flight-path while the Branxton area is unrestricted air space. 2. Most of the approaches to this site from the south and west are congested.

3. The road under the

railway line at this site periodically gets flooded. The demographics of the area of North Rothbury are changing dramatically with people moving here already. An additional 20,000 within 20 years

must be catered for. Any site along the new artery road, the M15 would be suitable. In fact a new hospital at the Branxton exit could be optimum and is only 15 to 20 minutes

from Cessnock, Kurri Kurri, Singleton and Maitland more especially if it were a teaching hospital. It is also envisaged to eventually have a campus of the Newcastle Uni at North Rothbury.

If the new Health Minister is true to his word, as reported recently in both the Maitland

an ambulance was 2015 and Mercury & The Newcastle Herald he will need to reconsider as he stated. The proposed location at Metford Bowling Club on 15 May is not the optimum site & if it goes ahead then we will bear the consequences of the wrong decision for possibly up to 60 years. We owe it to the local

It was a relief to hear that the new Health Minister, Brad Hazzard, has stated all options were 'back on the table' (Maitland Mercury 10 May). As was stated the location

must be in close proximity to the M1 freeway, close to railway access, free from flooding, to have helicopter access, public transport as well as a large population expansion projection. To answer all of the above is a location I put up some two years; the Wine Country Drive Branxton Greta off ramp. It covers all the requirements;

- \* Hospital approx 200mtrs from freeway
- \* Railway station
- \* Branxton and Greta approx 4klms each way \* A bus service past the front door

A projected 30,000 increase in local population with Radford Park & Huntlee + the 8,000 already living

All that was talked about was Metford. People were refused to make comment and to only ask questions re; Metford (of which the answered).

It was stated there was no flooding.I have a copy of the news article that appeared in the Maitland Mercury showing the streets that were flooded in April 2016 and how it isolated the Metford area. It was also stated that this area has no flight restrictions but I had checked with CASA after the media reported that the Rescue helicopters would not be flying into the hospitals at Cessnock and Kurri Kurri and I was told this Metford area was a RAAF training area for Williamtown RAAF Air Base so a NO FLY ZONE APPLIED for this area. At the proposed sight off the Wine Country Drive there is an area that could be appointed for the purpose of a helicopter landing area.

and agencies to the regions he wants Cessnock on the list. "Cessnock and Kurri are perfectly positioned with our close proximity to


"However we are concerned the current criteria being used for possible relocations may rule out Cessnock as we are not within 10 kilometres of a university," Cr Pynsent said.

The Showy Hydro Company has three owners; the Governments of NSW, Victoria and the Commonwealth. Readers may be aware that Malcolm Turnbull recently announced an intention to buy the States out. Last week the Opposition Leader in NSW made a very significant announcement. Luke Foley said that a future Labor Government would invest in the regions every cent from any sale of the State's share of Snowy Hydro. That investment could

be as much as \$4 billion. His announcement is welcome and we would all love the Premier to match it. We were short changed when the Port of Newcastle was sold, with the majority of the money going to Sydney.

The money should go straight in to the Singleton and Muswellbrook by-passes.

I am grateful to AGL for hosting me and a number of the Region's Labor Members of Parliament on a visit to Bayswater power station. It has been a long time since I've been on site and for many of my state and federal colleagues, it was a first.

Bayswater and Liddell are amazing facilities and between them, one of our biggest employers. But they are old and approaching the end of their commercial lives. Sadly, AGL confirmed Liddell only has five years left in it and Bayswater will be gone within 20 years.

AGL also confirmed that like other energy companies, it sees no future in investing in new coal-fired power stations. But as I've said many times before, that doesn't mean we can't create new jobs in energy generation and that's exactly what we need to do. We are well placed to grow our solar and wind energy footprint and we have big gas opportunities. Hopefully, "hot-rock" geothermal will become commercially viable

But investors need signals from government policy and they need it

The House of Representatives is

sitting this week but the Senate is not. Senators are busy in "Budget Estimates" committees which provide them with an opportunity to grill public servants about just about every aspect of the Budget. The Committees are not formed just for estimates hearings, they are standing committees of the Senate. So for example, the Senators on the Senate Committee on Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade will have Defence and Foreign Affairs officials appear before them. 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Type 2 Diabetes Type 2 diabetes is a progressive condition in which the body becomes resistant to the normal effects of insulin and/or gradually loses the capacity to produce enough insulin in the pancreas. We do not know what causes type 2 diabetes. Type 2 diabetes is associated with modifiable lifestyle risk factors. Type 2 diabetes also has strong genetic and family related risk factors

Type 2 diabetes:

- •Is diagnosed when the pancreas does not produce enough insulin (reduced insulin production) and/or the insulin does not work effectively and/or the cells of the body do not respond to insulin effectively (known as insulin resistance)
- •Represents 85-90 per cent of all cases of diabetes
- •Usually develops in adults over the age of 45 years but is increasingly occurring in younger age groups including children, adolescents and young adults
- •Is more likely in people with a family history of type 2 diabetes or from particular ethnic backgrounds
- •For some the first sign may be a complication of diabetes such as a heart attack, vision problems or a foot ulcer.

Is managed with a combination of regular physical activity, healthy eating and weight reduction. As type 2 diabetes is often progressive, most people will need oral medications

and/or insulin injections in addition to lifestyle changes over time

#### What happens with type 2 diabetes? Type 2 diabetes develops over

a long period of time (years). During this period of time insulin resistance starts, this is where the insulin is increasingly ineffective at managing the blood glucose levels. As a result of this insulin resistance, the pancreas responds by producing greater and greater amounts of insulin, to try and achieve some degree of management of the blood glucose levels.

As insulin overproduction occurs over a very long period of time, the insulin producing cells in the pancreas wear themselves out, so that by the time someone is diagnosed with type 2 diabetes, they have lost 50 - 70% of their insulin producing cells. This means type 2 diabetes is a combination of ineffective insulin and not enough insulin. When people refer to type 2 diabetes as a progressive condition they are referring to the ongoing destruction of insulin producing cells in the pancreas.

Initially, type 2 diabetes can often be managed with healthy eating and regular physical activity. Over time most people with type 2 diabetes will also need tablets and many will eventually require insulin. It is important to note that this is the natural progression of the condition, and taking tablets or insulin as soon as they are required can result in fewer long-term complications.

What causes type 2 diabetes? Diabetes runs in the family. If you have a family member with diabetes, you have a genetic disposition to the condition. While people may have a strong genetic disposition towards type 2 diabetes, the risk is greatly increased if people display a number of modifiable lifestyle factors including high blood pressure, overweight or

obesity, insufficient physical activity, poor diet and the classic 'apple shape' body where extra weight is carried around the waist.

People are at a higher risk of getting type 2 diabetes if they:

- •have a family history of
- •are older (over 55 years of age) - the risk increases as we
- •are over 45 years of age and are overweight
- •are over 45 years of age and have high blood pressure
- •are over 35 years of age and are from an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander background
- •are over 35 years of age and are from Pacific Island, Indian subcontinent or Chinese cultural background
- are a woman who has given birth to a child over 4.5 kgs (9 lbs), or had gestational diabetes when pregnant, or had a condition known as Polycystic Ovarian Syndrome. Many people with type 2 diabetes display no symptoms. As type 2 diabetes is commonly (but not always) diagnosed at a later age. sometimes signs are dismissed as a part of 'getting older'. In some cases, by the time type 2 diabetes is diagnosed, the complications of diabetes may already be present. Symptoms include: Being excessively thirsty, Passing more urine, Feeling tired and lethargic, Always feeling hungry, Having cuts that heal slowly, Itching, skin infections, Blurred vision, Gradually putting on weight, Mood swings, Headaches, Feeling dizzy & Leg cramps **Managing Type 2 Diabetes**



1 cup plain flour

2 tablespoons olive oil

# Cooking lamb shanks for a

8 large French-trimmed lamb shanks

2 large onions, unpeeled, cut into 1cm slices

# Slow-cooked lamb shanks

2 garlic cloves, crushed 2 cups beef consomme

3/4 cup red wine (such as merlot)

1/3 cup maple syrup

2 tablespoons cornflour, 2 tablespoons cold water & Salt, to season.

•Preheat oven to 180°C. Place flour and salt and pepper in a shallow dish. Lightly coat shanks with flour. Heat oil in a saucepan over high heat. Cook shanks, in batches, for 3 to 4 minutes or until browned. Transfer to a large roasting pan.

•Add onions and garlic to saucepan. Cook over medium heat for 2 to 3 minutes or until soft. Add consomme, wine and maple syrup. Stir to combine. Bring to the boil. Season with salt and pepper. Pour over shanks and cover pan tightly with foil. Roast for 1 1/4 hours. Remove foil. Turn shanks and roast for 45 minutes or until

#### Step 3

•Transfer shanks to a platter and cover to keep warm. Strain cooking liquid through a sieve. Discard onions. Return liquid to pan. Mix cornflour and water in a bowl until smooth. Stir into liquid and bring to the boil, stirring, over high heat. Reduce heat to mediumlow and simmer for 5 minutes or until reduced slightly. Serve shanks with gravy, cheese and herb mash and steamed cabbage.

#### Lochinvar's Tenison Woods Education Centre to transition to the Newcastle Maitland Catholic Diocese on 27th May



#### **REIA** welcomes focus on affordable housing

The 2017 Budget has recognised the need to address housing supply and affordability through a number of complementary measures, according to the Real Estate Institute of Australia (REIA).

"The boost to infrastructure spending, measures to improve housing supply, the extension of small business concessions, and the retention of the current negative gearing as well as

CGT arrangements for taxation of property investments will help ensure that the property sector remains an important contributor to economic growth," REIA President Malcolm Gunning said. "Whilst investment in dwellings has peaked and growth is forecast to decrease to 4.5 per cent in 2017/18, compared to 8.0 per cent in 2016/17, it is still a major driver of economic growth.

"We are pleased that the Government reiterated that it will not remove or limit

negative gearing or change the capital gains tax as this would increase the tax burden on Australians trying to provide a future for their families. This recognises that the current arrangements increase the supply of housing for our growing population, keep rents affordable and ease the burden on social housing. "With home ownership in Australia declining and first homebuyers finding it increasingly difficult to enter the housing market, allowing first homebuyers to build deposits with superannuation through voluntary contributions is welcome.

"Whilst REIA has advocated for a more aggressive approach to bridging the deposit gap by allowing first homebuyers access to existing balances in superannuation accounts the Government's initiative will reduce the time taken to save for a deposit by around 25 per cent.

"The change in the threshold for foreign resident capital gains tax withholding to \$750,000 from the current \$2 million is not welcome and could be considered misguided as most foreign investors buy higher valued properties in Sydney and Melbourne and to a lesser extent in Brisbane." Mr Gunning said. "It is more red tape and not

necessary. With the median house price of \$743,776 across Australia this will mean most properties will be subject to this requirement and results in more work for sales agents and conveyancers and depending

on the workload this presents for the ATO may even delay settlements

"With forecasts of moderate growth, an improvement in the unemployment rate, inflation well within the RBA's target zone, the Budget is welcome news for home owners, prospective buyers and renters," Mr Gunning concluded.

The great Australian dream is bulls\*\*\*



WE'VE reached a tipping point.

Debate rages about Australian housing affordability, fuelled again this week by 35-year-old rich -list property developer Tim Gurner, who claimed the current crop of first home buyers need to stop complaining and start saving. "They want to eat out every day, they want to travel to Europe every year. This generation is watching the Kardashians and thinking that's normal. Thinking that owning a Bentley is normal, that owning a BMW is normal," Gurner said on 60 Minutes.

Property experts are suggesting, however, the national obsession with universal home ownership needs to stop.

"The assumption that we've always had about 'The Great Australian Dream' - that everyone wants to have their own home - well that's bull\*\*\*, it just doesn't happen," said Kevin Turner, broadcaster and property commentator.

"I think we've got to get used to the fact that not everyone in Australia is going to be able to afford to own their own home. They're going to be renters long-term, or they don't want to own a home. Mr Turner said the rise in the 'Generation Rent' has also been bolstered by both a lack of affordability and

compulsory superannuation. Superannuation in my age demographics is about having your own house," he said. "But now that young people are putting so much money away for their retirement maybe they don't need a house?

Mr Turner said one benefit of permanently renting is you don't need a long-term plan for being able to one day live in your dream suburb.

"One of the advantages of renting is that you get to live where you want to live straight away - you don't have to get there through a series of moves. He said our cities must to

adapt to the change, because we need to find a way to fit more people into less space. "We've got to get more people into more square metres. So that probably is a big challenge.

He also believes the change isn't going to be contained to Sydney.

"I think it's going to become more critical for Brisbane.

"I think we're going to see good growth potential in Brisbane and I do think it's probably going to become ... not as acute (as Sydney and Melbourne) but certainly headed in that direction. Noel Whittaker, investment adviser and commentator. said with Australia's population forecast to hit 40 million within 40 years, he understands why young buyers would consider renting long-term. "I must confess, I have no

idea how young people on average incomes could afford a property without help from their parents. "Of course, cheaper accommodation is available outside the capital cities but this may not suit most people because of lack of job opportunities and health facilities," he said. Mr Whittaker said if you analyse the figures, long-term renters can be financially better off than homeowners.

"There are many studies which show that renting is cheaper than owning, but most renters don't invest the money they save by renting instead of buying. Mr Whittaker believes the long-term implication of a rent-only generation is a widening wealth chasm. "The gap between the haves and the have-nots is continuing to increase. How can any retiree who is single cope on the full-age pension of \$423 a week if they pay rent?" Peter Wargent, CEO of



We all have that little voice in our heads when we want to do something. For some of us, that voice is positive, telling us to do things, to sign up for that fun run, or apply for the new job, or start going to fitness classes. It's a "yes, I can do that" kind of feeling. We jump at the new ideas and experiences with confidence, not a doubt in our minds, happy to be taking action. For some people, the little voice in their head is the doubter, the nay sayer. The one who says running isn't fun, or tells you not



to apply for the job because you won't get it anyway, or not to join the new fitness class because everyone else will be fitter than you and you will look silly. This voice keeps us safe, in our comfort zones.

But where do these voices come from? Why are some people always looking on the bright side, or seemingly not caring what other people think, while others are full of self-doubt and coming up with all the reasons something won't work? Is it nature or nurture? Are some people born naturally optimistic, with their glass half full? Or is it learned? And can

Maybe your belief that it is harder to lose weight as you get older comes from hearing your mother or aunt saying it as you were growing up. Now it is something you believe without question. Perhaps your belief that you can't run comes from when you were at school and you always came last in the sports carnival. Wherever these negative (or limiting) beliefs come from, think of at least one reason for each why they are complete garbage! For example, a few years ago I had to do a fitness assessment which included running one kilometre and timing it. I didn't want to do it. I had been telling myself for years I hated running. I told myself I couldn't run to save my life (and I believed it). But because running was part of my assessment, and I didn't want to fake the result or tell someone I couldn't do it, I psyched myself up for it, telling myself it was only one kilometre, how hard could it be? Well, I had to stop three times, and I was so out of breath when I finished that I could barely talk. I told myself it was ok, running was overrated anyway, why run if no one is chasing you? I told myself I just wasn't a runner (the result even proved it), and I was fit in other ways. But it bugged me. I'm a little bit competitive, and I started telling myself it was only one kilometre, so if I was so fit why couldn't I run it without stopping? It was a

Running one kilometre became my goal. It took me a few months, and all that time the limiting beliefs were still in my head, but I was determined, so I kept at it. And eventually I did it. You have never seen anyone so excited to run one kilometre without stopping! And now I run marathons! If you had told me when I couldn't run one kilometre without stopping that one day I would willingly run 10km just for fun, I would not have believed you. But 10km is just one kilometre, ten times in a row. And I tell myself now I can run one kilometre (although it still surprises me when I do it without stopping). That is my positive

Think about your own goals. They may be related to health and fitness, or they may be related to other aspects of your life, such as your work. Perhaps your goal is to travel overseas? Some goals are specific, such as "lose 10kgs by June" or maybe your goal is more of a dream, such as learning to SCUBA dive "one day"

Now think about what you believe in relation to your goals. Beliefs are the things you know, deep inside. The things that you don't question, they just are. For each of your goals, think of three beliefs that support you in reaching each goal. For example, if your goal is to learn a new language, you could think back to a time when you did that successfully, such as French classes in Year 7. Or if your goal is to change jobs this year, think about the other times you have been successful in getting a new job. If you plan to lose weight, think about the times when you have lost weight before, the people who supported you, and how good you felt.

Now think about the beliefs that don't support you. For most people making a list of negative (or limiting) beliefs will be a lot easier than thinking about the positive beliefs. If you plan to lose weight, your negative beliefs might go something like this – "It's harder to lose weight as you get older", "I can't join the fitness class, I'm so fat I won't be able to keep up with the exercises", or "Now is not a good time, I'll wait until after my (holiday/ birthday/Christmas etc ...)

If you have limiting beliefs, you will have limited expectations, and you will behave in a way that contributes negatively to the outcome, which in turn reinforces your limiting

On the other hand, if you have positive beliefs (such as "surely I can run 1km"), you will have positive expectations, and you will behave in a way that moves you towards your desired outcome. When you successfully reach your goal, you will reinforce your positive beliefs, and the cycle continues.

She did not achieve any commercial breakthrough until

she challenged herself to write a darker, more serious

The novel took her six months, writing fulltime, to complete, at a time when she was in a difficult financial situation and had to borrow from her father to be able to complete it. Hawkins exchanges the simplicity and directness of her global bestseller for multiple narrators and plot lines

It's impossible to pin down the alchemy that turns a

novel like Paula Hawkins's The Girl on the *Train* into an unstoppable bestseller. It was a beautifully twisty, chilling thriller, but so were many others published in 2015. It can't all be attributed to the magic of the now ubiquitous "girl" in the title. But perhaps it has something to do with the apparent simplicity of its concept – a woman who drinks too much sees

something she shouldn't have from a train window. It's easy to tell people about; it's easy to imagine ourselves into the heroine's situation.

There's no simple, one-line description for Hawkins's

follow-up, *Into the Water*, released two years after The Girl on the Train, when the author might have been still lounging around on the riches earned from global sales of 18m copies. In contrast to the three narrators of Girl, Into the Water has at least 11. Rather than digging into the lives of a few characters, Hawkins throws her net across an entire town. That's Beckford, in the countryside near Newcastle, a place with a river running through it and a pool where women, "all those troublesome women", have drowned themselves, or been drowned, for centuries. "People turned a blind eye, though, didn't they? No one liked to think about the fact that the water in that river was infected with the blood and bile of persecuted women, unhappy women; they drank it every day.' Hawkins's story opens with the death of Nel Abbott in the Drowning Pool, a death that her teenage daughter Lena believes was suicide, but that Nel's estranged sister Jules, summoned reluctantly back to Beckford, believes was something else. As Jules looks for answers, in her own past and among the locals, she finds that Nel has made a number of enemies while writing a book about the Beckford pretty nicely, and I will admit to having to put the drownings, and that Lena's

not a suicide spot. Beckford is a place to get rid of troublesome women," Nel wrote.

There are so many strands that it's hard to keep track. with viewpoints given to everyone from the local psychic to a school teacher, a headmistress and the police investigating Nel's death. Hawkins provides us with more unreliable narrators than you can shake a stick at, and in case we forget they aren't telling us, or even themselves, the whole truth, they say ominous things like "I couldn't touch her. Into the Water isn't as slick or as clever – or as relatable - as The Girl on the Train, but it's creepy enough, provided you can stay on top of the multiple voices and the deaths piling up through the centuries. 

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

## TAKE SOME GOOD ADVICE

Music storage & other A reader wanted to know more about digital music options: "I like the idea of having all of my music handy on something like an iPhone. But I don't really want or need a smartphone. Do you need one to stream music? Does a music player have to go through a mobile phone



If you want to stream music listen to it over WiFi or a data connection while it plays on an app - you will need a smartphone or WiFi connected device like an iPod Touch. And you must stay connected the entire time you stream.

If you want to listen to digital music that you've purchased or copied from your own CDs, tapes, or albums - you can use a stand-alone player. You could use an iPod, which requires iTunes on your PC to transfer and manage music or choose another stand alone player. These players can hold thousands of tunes - likely your entire library. You transfer the music by plugging the device into your PC. Transferring music is simple. Your PC basically recognizes the device just like it does a flash drive and you just drag and drop. Once music is transferred, you're set until you want to copy more. There's no need for WiFi or any kind of data plan.

These devices range from little more than USB sticks with a headphone slot to ones that can also play videos and double as a voice recorder.

#### The Facebook Safety Rule **That Parents Keep Breaking**

There's one Facebook Safety rule that millions of parents break every day. And that's allowing kids under 13 to have a Facebook account.



Thirteen is the minimum age that a child is permitted to have an account on the popular social media platform. There's no way for anyone under the age of 13 to have an account unless they lie about their age. What's surprising is how many of

these kids are doing it with their parents' full knowledge and permission.

While the age of 13 may seem arbitrary to some, there are some real changes in our cognitive abilities around that age that can make kids a little less susceptible to predators and other online problems.

But, kids still aren't completely smart about what's okay and what's not. (Heck, many adults aren't even there yet.) If you let a 10-year-old on

Facebook, it's pretty close to dropping off a kid who has never left his hometown in the middle of metropolis all by himself. There are untold millions of people, some good and some bad. But you're expecting a 10-yearold to be able to understand the difference.

If they were recorded on home tape by your folks, it's actually illegal to sell them. If they are taking up room, I'd chuck them. Maybe keep a couple as a reminder. But you can likely find much better copies of the movie available at very reasonable

#### 3 Things You Must Do To **Prevent Crippling**

Ransomware Attacks By now, you've heard all about those ransomware attacks that crippled Britain's hospitals and businesses and organizations in 150

The worst part is that this round of attacks was entirely preventable if good, basic security rules had been followed. And I'm not even talking about teaching employees not to click on suspicious links or unexpected attachments. If the people in charge of keeping these systems safe had been serious about security, this never would have happened.

The flaw that allowed these attacks to go down was identified months ago by Microsoft and a patch was

issued back in March to protect systems against this exploit.

The problem is that many places are still running the unprotected XP operating system or just not bothering to do security updates for their system.

I know a lot of you love XP. But Microsoft ended security and bug updates THREE years ago. And even if you're running Norton or any other third-party security system, they can't properly patch or protect XP. XP systems are especially vulnerable because when patches are issued, hackers can do what's called reverse engineering. They analyze the security patch to figure out what it's patching and then write up a bit of malware to take advantage of that flaw in unprotected systems. That means Windows XP (and now Vista) AND Windows systems that haven't had recent security updates. Your PC is a sitting duck. Hey, maybe you've been running XP without issue for three years, but, as I've said in previous articles -I had a great uncle that went to Oueensland three months out of the year and used to leave his door unlocked. No one ever broke in. But I sure wouldn't want to try that. Big entities with money to pay for ransom are the preferred targets — for now. Keep in mind that the ransomware landscape is changing. You don't need to have any real tech knowledge these days to be a

cybercriminal. Crooks can purchase ransomware packages all ready to go. There are even services to collect their payments for them. Expect home users to be targeted more and more as more criminals enter the ransomware game and need more victims. Here's what you (and

companies and other organizations) must do to protect themselves. 1. Use an up-to-date

operating system. If you're using Windows XP, Vista, or a version of Mac OS that is no longer supported - stay offline with that computer. Also be careful about loading files onto that

PC. 2. Run those security updates ASAP. This refers to both Windows and Mac updates and to any updates from third -party security software. If your device isn't already set for automatic updates, set it now.

3. Be cautious about any links or attachments you receive.

As a consumer, be proactive. Ask your doctor, lawyer, financial advisor, bank etc.. what operating system is being used and if security is updated regularly. If they can't answer, ask them to find out who can. Check in with your church, club, or any other organiza-

# MOVIE REVIEW

## JOHN WICK: CHAPTER 2

In this next chapter following the 2014 hit, legendary hitman John Wick (Keanu Reeves) is forced back out of retirement by a former associate plotting to seize control of a shadowy international assassins' guild. Bound by a blood oath to help him, John travels to Rome where he squares off against some of the world's deadliest



There is a startling scene near the midpoint of John Wick: Chapter 2 where the eponymous hero, a lethal gun-toting assassin played by Keanu Reeves, runs through an underground nightclub in Rome and just. like, totally massacres whoever gets in his way. It is such a hoot, watching him shoot everyone in the nightclub. He shoots them in the face, under the chin, through the temple. Blam! Blam! Blam! Screams! Gore! Death! How can you go wrong? What could possibly be offensive about a fun-packed goresplattered nightclub massacre sequence in 2017?

There are, it seems, only two ways of talking about the John Wick franchise, which began in 2014 as a low-budget ultraviolent B-movie that nonetheless grossed £70 million at the box office. One is that it is just cartoon violence and that, according to the filmmakers and talent involved, it is balletic and beautifully choreographed violence that has more in common with dance and high art than the grubby screen killings of traditional action movies. And the other approach is that these films

are morally abhorrent gun porn that serve no purpose other than the debasement of cinema and culture. There is a third approach, however, and this is where John Wick: Chapter 2 is especially relevant — it is boring. Who would have thought that the gleeful depiction of the deaths of 128 people (the film's official body count). 104 of which are unflinching, skull-bursting "headshots", could be so uninvolving? And yet this film is tedious. There is no attempt at a plot - instead Wick has simply annoyed the assassin fraternity, including bad-boy Italian super-villain Santino D'Antonio (Riccardo Scamarcio), and so must kill them all before they kill him before he kills them all before they kill, etc, etc. Cue shoot-outs in Rome and New York, in museums and hotels, all executed via the kind of long-take wide shots that exist solely to showcase the weapons training and kung-fu moves of the dedicated star Reeves but which actually serve to underscore the deadening sameyness of the whole project. Whenever Wick runs out of bullets and knives (yes, he

manfully stabs a henchman in the anus in one touching scene) he resorts to hand-tohand combat, and with each

punch and chop he shouts an assertive, "Shuh!" Powerful for a brief moment, but it soon begins to sound ridiculous, with entire scenes devoid of audio except the repetitive grunting: "Shuh! Shuh! Shuh! Shuh!" Eventually I found myself willing him to finish the sentence, "Shuh, shuh, shouldn't have let my agent talk me into another one of these clunkers!'

On moral grounds, of course, John Wick: Chapter 2 is repellent and vile bullyboy cinema at its worst, and while you watch it you feel that a tiny part of your soul is dying. Yet everyone, deep down, already knows this. What they don't know is that it is also seriously



# Saleyard report - cattle

Singleton report date 17/5/17

Yarding 780 ~ Change –290 (Comparison Date 10/5/17)

Numbers eased and quality remained fair to good, with the bulk in the penning entering the vealer and yearling categories. The percentage of cows lifted, with around 75 head in the offering. The usual buyers competed in a generally dearer market, with only quality and breed contributing to any cheaper prices.

The 200kg plus vealer steers returning to the paddock improved 16c, making from 330c to 435c, with the heavier end gaining 12c to top at 383c/kg. The same weight vealer heifers to the restocker and background orders maintained firm prices to average 342c, after reaching 359c/kg. The better quality heavier drafts gained 8c/kg. Yearling steers to the restockers lifted 9c, with the best reaching 357c/kg. The yearling heifers to the restockers and lot feeders improved 7c, making from 299c to 337c/kg through all weight ranges. The prime conditioned younger cattle to the butchers sold to solid

competition, with the best topping at 375c/kg. The limited supply of grown steers to slaughter sold from 260c to 278c, with the heifer portion reaching 260c/kg. Cows sold at similar prices compared to the last market, as the plainer 2 scores averaged 199c and reached 230c/kg to the restockers. The better covered heavy weights were mainly over conditioned and these ranged from 208c to 220c/kg. The best heavy weight bull reached 240c/kg.

Scone report date 16/5/17

Yarding 1523 ~ Change 309 (Comparison Date 9/5/17)

The quality was fair to good, as consignments lifted, with the bulk in the penning entering the younger categories. There were around 180 cows, along with a larger supply of heavy weight grown steers and bullocks. The usual buyers were joined by another restocker and lot feeder order and the market overall was dearer.

The 200kg plus vealer steers returning to the paddock improved 12c, making from 346c to 438c/kg. The heavier weights also trended at dearer levels. The heifer portion to the restocker and backgrounder order lifted 5c and sold from 306c to

The yearling steers gained 3c to 8c, with the heavier end to lot feeder orders ranging from 310c to 364c/kg. Yearling heifers to the restockers and lot feeders made from 285c to 349c/kg. The prime conditioned younger cattle to the butchers lifted 10c, the best selling for 366c/kg. The better selection of grown steers and bullocks to slaughter trended 15c dearer, with age and quality contributing in

The overall quality of the young cattle was quite mixed with the end of the weaners in sight, while there were some very good quality and well-bred yearlings available to the feedlotters. The full group of regular buyers were in attendance with demand varying throughout.

Market trends saw an improved quality penning of weaner steers sell to a cheaper trend, up to 15c/kg. There were similar cheaper trends through the heifer portion however price falls were not as great in some cases. Medium and heavy yearling steers to restock and feed saw little but quality related price change while there was some breed related premiums. Medium weight yearling heifers saw a firm to slightly cheaper market trend, while well finished heavy weights to feed were 18c to

There were limited supplies of heavy grown steers penned, however quality was very good. This resulted in a firm to dearer market trend. There were varying trends in the cow market with medium weights selling to a slightly cheaper trend. Well finished cows saw a dearer trend averaging 5c to 7c/kg and more in places with quality and yield potential improved.




