



#### **Arts funding available**

Parliamentary Secretary for the Hunter Scot MacDonald MLC is encouraging artists, performers and organisations in the Lake Macquarie, Cessnock, Maitland and Port Stephens LGAs to share ideas both big and small for infrastructure and arts projects in the Hunter to deliver long-term cultural benefits to the community.

The \$100 million Regional Cultural Fund is part of the Deputy Premier's \$1.3 billion Regional Growth Fund to improve economic outcomes as well as local amenities and standard of living across regional NSW communities.

Mr MacDonald said the Fund would support the building of new artistic and cultural spaces such as galleries, theatres, libraries, museums and halls, as well as the upgrading or repurposing of existing arts, screen, culture or heritage infrastructure.

"The Regional Cultural Fund supports arts, screen and cultural organisation proposals for small, medium and large infrastructure projects that will deliver long-term cultural benefits to the Hunter" Mr Macdonald said.

"Galleries and museums will also be able to apply for operational funding to support the delivery of services, providing distinct experiences to visitors and promoting increased participation in creative and cultural activities


Deputy Premier and Minister for Regional NSW John Barilaro said regional NSW has long been home to producers of diverse arts and culture across a wide variety of disciplines including visual arts, performing arts, Indigenous arts, dance, music, exhibitions, publishing, film, television, radio and heritage works. Minister for the Arts Don Harwin said investing in arts and culture programs and facilities provides recreational and educational benefits as well as increased tourist visitation, which in turn helps art practitioners expand their networks and enter new markets.

Expressions of interest for the Regional Cultural Fund open on 17 July 2017. Successful applicants will be invited to provide additional information. Up to \$25 million will be made available in the first round of funding.

#### LOCATION

Dalwood Road, East Branxton from Wyndham Street intersection to the westerly limit of the road, adjacent to Lion's Park.

#### THE WORKS

Construction of drainage infrastructure and re-alignment of road to provide improved parking facilities and traffic movement.

#### FUNDING

This project is funded by Roads to Recovery (R2R).

#### DESIGN

The design provides

- Road re-alignment with addition of a turning head
- Increased vehicular parking and drop-off zones.
- Drainage upgrades
- · Pedestrian facilities and vehicle separation
- Increased storage for buses on Wyndham Street

The design provides improved safety for both vehicle users and pedestrians. Rear to kerb parking will be formalised and the total number of parking spaces will increase. Allowance will be made for drop off or 'Kiss and Ride'.

Stormwater infrastructure will be improved at the site. Stormwater that currently discharges in front of No. 8 Dalwood Road will be diverted via pipe into the swale drain running adjacent to Maitland Road.

#### CONSTRUCTION

Construction works commence July 2017 and require significant traffic control measures to be implemented on Dalwood Road. Works are programmed to be completed in September 2017.

#### DISRUPTIONS

Dalwood Road west of the Wyndham Street intersection will be closed periodically during construction as required and will not be available as a drop-off or pick-up point. Council will work with residents directly affected by the closure to provide access to their properties

During this construction period, drop-off and pick-up for school bus passengers should occur at Miller Park soccer fields, on the southern side of Maitland Road so that pedestrians can use the signalised crossing to access the bus stop.

Works are programmed to commence on the first week of July, 2017, during school holidays to minimise impacts.

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#### Increase in fire activity in local area



The NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) is urging Hunter Valley residents to take extreme care when conducting burning activities following an unusually high number of fires in the local area due to unseasonable conditions. NSW RFS Inspector Mick Holland said local Brigades have been called to a number of fires in recent weeks, including Putty, Jerry's Plains and Whittingham. "Current dry conditions mean landowners need to be very careful when attempting any burning," Inspector Holland said. "Residents and landowners need to take care when using fire and remember it is their responsibility to control the fire so that it doesn't escape and cause damage. "When undertaking burning activities, landholders need to notify their neighbours and local fire authority 24-hours before lighting a fire." Inspector Holland said residents planning to conduct hazard reduction burning should first contact their local Fire Control Centre and check if a fire permit is required. Residents are also reminded that the statutory fire danger period for Singleton and Muswellbrook shire council areas will commence on 1st September 2017 and fire permits will be required. Fire Danger Rating and Total Fire Ban information is posted daily at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au. Inspector Holland said all Hunter Valley residents should take the current conditions seriously and make sure they have a completed and practiced Bush Fire Survival Plan, in order to protect their family and property should they be threatened by fire. "If you are not prepared for the bush fire season then you must act now," Inspector Holland said. "Everyone should be using this time to prepare their property, which includes clearing gutters and removing fuel from around homes. "All households should have a well practiced Bush Fire Survival Plan so residents know what to do, particularly on days of increased fire danger, because there is no room for complacency when it comes to bush fire safety.'

#### Helping hand for local heritage

Police in the state's Hunter Region are investigating the circumstances surrounding the assault of a woman in her Singleton home last night.

About 9pm (Monday 31 July 2017), a 42-year-old woman answered a knock at the door of her Harriet Street home.

A woman, who is known to the resident, was at the door

A confrontation occurred between the two women resulting in the two visitors forcing their way into the

home. The man and woman punched and kicked the 41-yearold resident before leaving the premises.

The woman, suffering a fractured eye socket, cheek bone and nose, managed to walk to her neighbour's home where emergency services were called. She was taken to John Hunter Hospital where she remains in a serious but stable condition.


Seems unarguable to me!

#### FROM THE MAYORS DESK

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate the Cessnock Youth Week Organising Committee for being shortlisted as a finalist for Best Youth Week Program 2017. Cessnock Youth Week gets bigger and better each year and this is thanks to a group of passionate people who continue to show their dedication to young people in our community The Committee is no stranger to the Local Government Awards, having been awarded Most Innovative Youth Week Program in 2014 and taking out Best Youth Week Program last year. This year, the awards will take place in Sydney on Thursday 3 August and as a special recognition of their achievements, Council has decided to send two members of the committee to the event. Irrespective of the outcome at the awards, we also plan to hold a special Mayoral Reception in the coming weeks to congratulate everyone involved in putting the Youth Week program together.

I was also thrilled with the announcement the Qantas Wallabies will be holding a training camp in Cessnock from Sunday 6 to Friday 11 August ahead of their Bledisloe Cup clash against the All Blacks. The training camp will take place at the Cessnock Sportsground, the same ground that hosted the A-League pre-season clash last year and the Japanese national team training camp ahead of the Asian World Cup in 2015. I am proud the Wallabies have recognised the Cessnock Sportsground as a world class facility and this is yet another great opportunity for us to show off our top notch sports ground. I am very much looking forward to welcoming the Wallabies to our wonderful region and we will be sure to announce their schedule to the community when it comes to hand. We also have special guest, Jamila Gordon, coming to speak at our annual School Leaders' Breakfast at the Cessnock Performing Arts Centre on Tuesday 1 August. Jamila's story is nothing short of inspirational as she escaped the Somalian civil war, arrived in Australia when she was just 18 years old and is now a hugely successful businesswoman. Her story proves that dreaming big and remaining positive can lead to great things and I am certain our school leaders will walk away from the event feeling inspired.

On a more serious note, the notorious illegal dumping ground on McLeod Road in Loxford has been cleaned up and I am hoping it stays that way. A visit to Versailles during my recent holiday in France seemed a timely reminder of the consequences of out-oftouch leadership. In the end, the elitist, arrogant and born-rule attitude of King Louis XVI and Marie Antoinette cost them their heads. In a more recent but less dramatic uprising, the major parties failed to make the final cut in France's Presidential election.

Of course France's surprising election outcome follows shock election and referendum results in the United Kingdom and the United States. There have been other unexpected outcomes in other European elections too, and Germany could yet provide the next tremor.

In an earlier column I suggested people need to think about what the alternative might look like before seeking radical change. I stand by that view and time will tell whether our European and American friends should have thought harder.

But voters have few choices and voting for someone different can easily become their only option. Politicians have many choices and ignoring the feelings of their people is the dumb choice. That's the message I saw in France and it's the message I hear at home.

With real wages falling, prices rising and income inequality growing, too many people are feeling left behind. Equal opportunity for all is not possible in those circumstances. Politicians have an obligation to lead and persuade; to make the right and tough decisions. But ultimately we are obliged to represent the will of the people and business-as-usual is not want they want. Not here, and not elsewhere.

Many European politicians have learned that the hard way. Not as harshly as King Louis and his wife, but dramatically and painfully just the same. Will Australia's politicians make the same mistake? I thought Labor Leader Bill Shorten made a very useful contribution in his recent speech. Acknowledging a problem people and that is what my local work is the first step to fixing the problem and Shorten is the first major party leader in Australia to do so.

Those who want to argue that all the data suggests the people have never had it so good do so at their peril. Like Marie Antoinette's "let them eat cake" line, it can only end in grief.

#### Raising the BARR DOES A PARLIAMENT RECESS MEAN A HOLIDAY FOR AN MP?

I frequently get asked what an MP does when Parliament is not sitting. And this is more so the case when something like a "winter recess" is called for Parliament. All such enquiries are completely understandable. To be honest, I wouldn't have been able to answer these questions myself, prior to becoming an MP.

The first thing to understand is that Parliament generally sits in chunks of time. The chunks generally line up with school terms. In the middle of the year, our winter, Parliament takes a break, a recess, for 5 weeks. At the end of the year, our summer time, Parliament generally takes a recess for about 8 weeks. In April and October Parliament also takes a recess of 2-3 weeks for each. You are probably now thinking, well when does Parliament work? Good question. In truth Parliament sits for about 22 weeks of the year, which is 22 of the remaining non-recess weeks of the vear.

When Parliament is not sitting, the local MP is often back in the Electorate; the area and the people that they represent. The days can be full of meetings with locals that have a concern or problem with the way that they are being treated by Government or with regard to something that the Government are doing that is not liked. The time can also include going out on-site to visit a person, or a group, at the site of a problem that they are having or an idea that they have for a better future. And of course, many people just need a bit of help in sorting through the complexity of various Government Departments. The rest of the time in the Electorate is taken up by doing research and background work on the issues that people have raised, making representations on their behalf to various Ministers and Ministerial offices and of course following up when a Minister or their office does not respond. In addition, there are the various forms of communication that people use to touch base with the local MP including phone, mail, email and social media. I do my best to keep up with all of this, but it is not easy and I am not always 100% successful. None of us are perfect, right? In general, my time in the Electorate, meeting and working with local residents, is the best part of the job. I got into this line of work to try to help allows me to do – with some wins and some losses. It's not that I don't enjoy the debate of Parliament; it's just that it can be a bit surreal and removed from the real world and real people. I can't imagine a collection of life's experiences and people better than that offered here in the Cessnock Electorate; from West Wallsend to Wollombi and from Branxton to Barnsley and from Pokolbin to Paxton and Putty and everywhere in between.

#### **NSW Calls for National Quad Bike Safety Rating System**

The NSW Government is calling for the introduction of a national five-star safety rating system for quad bikes, to help save lives on farms. Since 2011, 115 people have been killed in quad bike accidents on Australian farms, with 32 in NSW alone.

NSW Government would call on the Federal Government to introduce a safety rating system, and would provide any support necessary to help develop and implement the scheme. A rating system is the next big step to reducing deaths and injuries from quad bike incidents

A safety rating system for quad bikes was a key recommendation of the NSW Deputy Coroner's 2015 inquest into quad bike deaths. The NSW Government is committed to improving rider safety through a multi-faceted approach. The NSW Government is providing incentives to encourage farmers to improve the safety of their quad bikes, education programs to support safer usage and now we want to give consumers better information to support their decision making.

A rating system would build on the NSW Government's \$2 million Quad Bike Safety Improvement Program, which provides free training and helmets for those who complete the course, as well as rebates for protective devices, and safer side-by-side vehicles.

#### **Community Groups to Benefit from Improved Infrastructure Grants**

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

What Is a Sprain?

A sprain is an injury to a ligament (tissue that connects two or more bones at a joint). In a sprain, one or more ligaments is stretched or torn.

What Causes a Sprain? Many things can cause a sprain. Falling, twisting, or getting hit can force a joint out of its normal position. This can cause ligaments around the joint to stretch or tear. Sprains can occur if

people: Fall and land on an arm.

#### Twist a knee. Where Do Sprains **Usually Occur?**

Sprains happen most often in the ankle. Sometimes when people fall and land on their hand, they sprain their wrist. A sprain to the thumb is common in skiing and other sports.

#### What Are the Signs and Symptoms of Sprains? The usual signs and

symptoms of a sprain are:

- Pain
- Swelling Bruising
- •Not being able to move or use the joint. Sometimes people feel a pop or tear when the injury happens. A sprain can be mild, moderate, or severe.

## What Is a Strain?

A strain is an injury to a muscle or a tendon (tissue that connects muscle to bone). In a strain, a muscle or tendon is stretched or

#### What Causes Strains?

A strain is caused by twisting or pulling a muscle or tendon. Strains can happen suddenly or develop over days or weeks. A sudden (acute) strain is caused by:

- A recent injury
- •Lifting heavy objects the wrong way
- •Overstressing the muscles. Chronic strains are usually caused by moving the muscles and tendons the same way over and over.

#### Where Do Strains Usually Occur?

Two common sites for a strain are the back and the hamstring muscle in the back of the thigh. Sports such as soccer, football, hockey, boxing, and wrestling put people at risk for strains in the back or legs. People who play some sports use their hands and arms a lot. Examples are gymnastics, tennis, rowing, and golf. People who play these sports sometimes strain their hand or arm. Elbow strains can also happen when playing sports. What Are the Signs and

**Symptoms of Strains?** A strain can cause:

- ●Pain
- Muscle spasms
- Muscle weakness
- Swelling
- Cramping
- •Trouble moving the muscle.

If a muscle or tendon is torn completely, it is often very painful and hard to move.

#### **How Are Sprains and Strains Treated?**

Treatments for sprains and strains are the same. To reduce swelling and pain in the first day or two, doctors usually say to:

- •Rest the injured area. If the ankle or knee is hurt, the doctor might tell you to use crutches or a cane.
- •Put ice on the injury for 20 minutes at a time. The doctor

might say to do this 4 to 8 times a day.

- •Compress (squeeze) the injury using special bandages, casts, boots, or splints. Your doctor will tell you which one is best for you and how tight it should be.
- •Put the injured ankle, knee, elbow, or wrist up on a
- •The doctor may recommend taking medicines, such as aspirin or ibuprofen. After treating pain and swelling, doctors usually say to exercise the injured area. This helps to prevent stiffness and increase strength. Some people need physical therapy. You may need to exercise the injured area or go to physical therapy for several weeks. Your doctor or physical therapist will tell you when you can start to do normal activities, including sports. If you begin too soon, you can injure the area again.

It is important to see a doctor if you have a painful sprain or strain. This helps you get the right treatments.

#### Can Sprains and Strains Be **Prevented?**

To help prevent sprains and strains, you can:

- Avoid exercising or playing sports when tired or in pain.
- •Eat a well-balanced diet to keep muscles strong.
- Maintain a healthy weight.
- •Try to avoid falling (for example, put sand or salt on icy spots on your front steps or sidewalks).
- •Wear shoes that fit well.
- •Get new shoes if the heel wears down on one side.
- •Exercise every day.
- •Be in proper physical condition to play a sport.
- •Warm up and stretch before playing a sport.
- •Wear protective equipment when playing.
- •Run on flat surfaces.

#### Singleton Council takes action to raise standard for animals at its Animal Management Facility



Singleton Council has acted on advice from the RSPCA to install cloth blinds to provide weather protection for animals at the Singleton Animal Management Facility.

Repairs have also been undertaken to the internal wall of the facility following a break-in earlier this

The RSPCA inspected the site on two occasions, the latest on 18 July 2017, following concerns raised about the standard of conditions recently. General Manager Jason Linnane said Council was also looking into two further requests to install a

a small wall inside each kennel for April 2017. further weather protection. "Council appreciates the recommendations of the RSPCA and has acted on those recommendations to put measures in place to ensure the welfare of

the animals at the facility is maintained," he said. 'Careful consideration has been given to the material used in the blinds to provide additional weather protection, but still allow the dogs to see out for external stimulus as well as let light in. 'Council is committed to the welfare of all animals while at the facility and in the rehoming process, and we have a very dedicated team of rangers tending to the animals seven days a week to ensure they have adequate

bedding, food and care. 'As well as continuing to work also visiting other local government areas to benchmark

the standards of animal management facilities with a view to informing options for the current facility, or a potential new building.'

The current Animal Management Facility has six kennels, which limits how long Council can hold dogs beyond the legislated requirements. A total of 169 dogs and 35 cats passed through the facility in the 2016/17 financial year.

Linnane said Council was finalising the design for a new Animal Management Facility to be presented to the ordinary meeting in September 2017, along with a finance and cost analysis for construction in accordance barrier between kennels, as well as with Council's resolution from 24

> He said the Animal Management Facility operated to protect the community from stray animals, as well as ensure the safety and welfare of lost dogs and cats.

"Council's ultimate aim is to reunite animals with their owners," Mr Linnane said.

"We detain animals for the shortest period of time possible and work quickly to try to find the owners of animals in our care using a range of channels, including microchipping records and posts on Council's Facebook page to reach as many people as possible.

The Companion Animals Act stipulates that we can only release dogs to their registered owners within 14

## Report

A review of end of year financial statistics have shown that despite police efforts, there are a high number of unauthorised drivers, and defective or unregistered vehicles on NSW roads.

Statistics indicate too many dangerous drivers

and vehicles on the road - Traffic & Highway

End of financial year statistics show that there were 23,237 unauthorised (suspended, disqualified, or unlicensed) drivers, 86,832 unregistered vehicles, and 25,175 defect notices issued for unroadworthy

When compared with the previous financial year, there has been an increase of 4912 infringements issued for vehicles defects, which serves as a warning to all road users to maintain their vehicles. Statistics have shown a minor decrease in unauthorised drivers caught behind the wheel, with 42 less legal actions being taken, when compared to the previous financial year.

End of financial year statistics have also shown an increase of 7320 unregistered vehicles detected on the road, when compared with the previous year. Assistant Commissioner Michael Corboy of the State's Traffic & Highway Patrol Command said driving an unregistered or defective car, or driving while not authorised to drive, is putting all road users at risk

We have already seen more than 220 deaths on our roads this year. Tragically, many of these deaths

"Despite our efforts, we continue to see dangerous drivers and cars on our road that simply should not be there.

"People that drive while they are suspended, disqualified or don't hold a valid licence for any reason, are not only selfish, they are an outright danger to themselves and other road users.

'As well as unauthorised drivers we see cars that are 9. Orange (81) unregistered, have bald tyres, worn brakes or missing lights.

"It is disheartening to see serious or fatal crashes that could have been avoided by some simple

'Worn or damaged tyres is a common defect that

seriously compromises a drivers ability to stop or steer, and greatly the risk of a crash.

'Our message is simple, if you do not hold a licence, or if your car is not roadworthy or not insured, get off the road, before you kill someone, or before we catch you," Assistant Commissioner Corbov said.

#### Trends in drink and drug-driving showing some decline - Traffic & Highway Patrol Command

Police are encouraged by statistics that show drink-driving rates are declining, however, with 25,000 caught in a year; drink-driving and drugdriving are still key issues across New South Wales. End of financial year statistics show that there has been a decrease of 1406 drivers charged with drug-driving, and a decrease of 1562 charged with drink-driving.

Assistant Commissioner Michael Corboy of the

state's Traffic & Highway Patrol Command said statistics indicate some road users are getting the message, however, there are still too many who drink or take drugs and drive.

"A decline in drink and drug-driving, shows that the message is starting to get across, and that the community will not tolerate those who put themselves and others at risk.

"However, it is still alarming to see that there were more than 17,000 drink-drivers, and more than 8,000 drug-drivers on our roads in the last financial year. "Every one of those drivers or riders have shown a complete lack of regard for not only their own life, but the lives of all others using the road.

"Evidence is clear that drink and drug-drivers are costing lives on NSW roads.

"We will not stop, and we make no apologies for catching and prosecuting anyone who thinks it's okay to drink or take drugs and drive," Assistant Commissioner Corboy said.

#### Alcohol is a depressant, and;

-Slows your brain so that you can't respond to situations, make decisions or react quickly

-Reduces your ability to judge how fast you are moving or your distance from other cars, people or objects

-Gives you a false sense of confidence – you may take greater risks, thinking that your driving is better than it really is

-Makes it harder to do more than one thing at a time while you concentrate on steering, you could miss seeing traffic lights, cars entering from side streets or pedestrians

-Affects your sense of balance – a big risk if you ride a motorcycle

-Makes you drowsy - you could fall asleep at the wheel.

Cessnock City Council is pleased to announce the notorious illegal dumping ground on McLeod Road in Loxford has been cleaned up and is hoping it stays that way.



#### First homebuyers package



by Tim McKibbin -**REINSW CEO** The package of measures to support first homebuyers released by the NSW Government is a step in the right direction. However, a lot more needs to be done. The package will see stamp duty exemptions extended to first homebuyers of existing homes up to \$650,000 from 1 July 2017 and then reducing proportionally to dwellings up to \$800,000. This will also apply to new homes.

Whilst welcome, I believe the stamp duty concessions need to be increased further to reflect the current median dwelling prices. More also needs to be done to address bracket creep, which has not been reviewed for more than 30 years.

#### Buyer beware

By Tim McKibbin -REINSW CEO There are many pitfalls you need to avoid when purchasing a property, which is why it is important to prepare as much as possible beforehand. For example, ensure you have pre-approval finance in place, so you know your purchasing limit. It is important to seek some legal advice upfront, and to organise pre-purchase inspection reports, including strata, building and pest. Good communication is critical. If you find a property you like, let the real estate agent know and ask how the offer and acceptance process works.

Finally learn to know the difference between your head and heart. Buying is 80 per cent emotional - whilst this might be OK when buying clothes, you need to be a lot more logical when buying a property!

#### **Saving money** on building and pest reports

REINSW CEO Currently any prospective buyer must pay to get a pre-purchase pest and building inspection report completed on a property they are interested in buying, even though other buyers will have already had the same reports done.

This is inefficient and expensive. The NSW Government has recently legislated that a real estate agents must keep a log of any property inspection reports completed on a property. A prospective buyer can then

approach the report's authors to purchase a copy of the report for a discounted price. Despite the benefit purchasers gain from this initiative we believe that a far more efficient means to achieve this outcome would be a mandatory requirement for a pest and building report be included as part of the contract. This is the current requirement in the A.C.T. and works very well.

#### What determines a property's price?

We are constantly bombarded with news about the property market and in particular the increasing cost of housing. It is not uncommon for purchasers to hold vendors and real estate agents to blame for the cost of housing.

#### Memories of Greta

Greta has a long and extensive history, dating back to its settlement in the 1820's. However, did you know at one time, Greta had twelve tennis courts? Or that during the Second World War, Greta was host to countless swing dances that many visiting soldiers would attend?

You may not remember these details from Greta's history, but Ella Allen of Greta sure does!

Mrs Allen, who has lived in Greta for 82 years, recalls some of the finer days from Greta's History. "All of the boys from the Army Camp used to come into town when the War was on" she says. "They used to come in [to Greta] to all the dances" As many Gretaites would be aware, the Greta Army Camp served as a training facility for Soldiers during WWII. "All of my friends and I had pen-pals from the Army Camp. I was only 14 when War broke out so it was a very turbulent time." But Ella also has some happy memories from that time. "I met my Husband at the Army Camp, it was really a fun time"

Growing up in Greta offered many simple pleasures that we, unfortunately, cannot enjoy today. "We used to go swimming in the Dam all the time" Ella said. "There used to be a boat jetty out there as well." The Dam Mrs Allen refers to is of course Whitburn Dam, located in Anvil Street, Greta.

But has Greta changed in the last 82 years? "Greta is definitely getting a lot bigger. Also, we all have to lock our doors and windows at night. We never used to do that years ago." Mrs Allen said.

Book review: The Late Show by Michael Connelly I was a bit of a latecomer to Michael Connelly and his long-running Harry Bosch series (but have been watching the TV show for good measure), so it was great to see that he's got a new protagonist in LAPD Detective Renee Ballard, who - despite 14vrs on the job – has been shunted to the midnight shift (The Late Show) because she dared accuse a senior officer of harassment. Renee Ballard works the

night shift at the LAPD in Hollywood, beginning many investigations but finishing none as each morning she turns her cases over to day shift detectives. A once up-and-coming detective, she's been given this beat as punishment after filing a sexual harassment complaint against a supervisor. But one night she catches two cases she doesn't want to part with: the brutal beating of a prostitute left for dead in a parking lot and the killing of a young woman in a nightclub shooting. Ballard is determined not to give up at dawn. Against orders and her own partner's wishes, she works both cases by day

by night As the cases entwine, they pull her closer to her own demons and the reason she won't give up her job - no matter what the department throws at her.

I very much enjoyed this new novel and character from Connelly. Renee Ballard is certainly interesting and - it seems - has quite the back-

Initially the lack of that backstory felt like a bit of a gap. I wondered if we'd met her in a Bosch / Mickey Haller novel I'd not read – and that may well be the case, however we do eventually learn a bit more of her history as this novel unfolds.

In the end I decided the lack of context (re Renee) was not necessarily a bad thing, although the fact I felt a bit of a gap I guess says something.

She's been a cop for 14 years but had previously planned to be a journalist. Her father drowned when she was just 14vrs old and she lived alone 'on the beach' for a couple of years before her grandmother found her and took her in... and there's obviously some baggage around her mother. She's with LAPD and in LA (somewhere... I'm not familiar with its suburbs and neighbours) but part of her seems to dwell in her childhood home of Hawaii. And she seems to kinda live in her van with her dog. As she's now working nights she sleeps on the beach in a tent during the day, occasionally visiting her grandmother

(where her stuff seems to be stored) for meals etc. And then there's the fact that she's obviously talented and (mostly) well-thought-of but.... accusing her former lieutenant of sexual harassment (which is only glossed over here) means she's been sidelined to the night shift - where she comes across an array of interesting cases which are then handed off to detectives working the day shift, to investigate. In this outing we also meet her former partner who apparently didn't stand by her after her former lieutenant refuted her harassment allegations.. which is a sore point as the pair were close. So... there's ALL of this

interesting stuff, but we only get snippets here and there. Eventually it was enough. Almost... And I do wonder if Connelly plans to share more context in future novels rather than dumping it all on us at once. And in that case, I'm happy I'm here on the ground floor and privy to the world he builds around Renee. Indeed, the fact I think of her as Renee (rather than Ballard) is a sure sign I've bonded with

her character. The cases Renee (ahem, Ballard) pursues in this first of the series are both substantial ones and I really liked that they didn't

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converge (as is so often the case) but both stood alone without muddying the narrative waters. I tend to groan if there are more than one case (and know I've said that very thing about Lynda LaPlante's new young Jane Tennison novels), but Connelly manages the two, rather distinct, cases well and I liked that one was fairly straight forward and the other more twisty. I didn't pick the twist and / or the whodunnit (despite my over-worked little grev cells – from extensive crime fiction reading, rather than intelligence #obvs!), which is a good thing and appreciated that Connelly didn't opt for the obvious clichés in that respect. There's also a nice little 'f\*ck you' at the end of this book. So in case it wasn't obvious, I'm LOVING this new series by Connelly and cannot wait for the next



# MOVIE REVIEW

### War for the Planet of the Apes



In War for the Planet of the Apes, the third chapter of the critically acclaimed blockbuster franchise, Caesar and his apes are forced into a deadly conflict with an army of humans led by a ruthless Colonel. After the apes suffer unimaginable losses, Caesar wrestles with his darker instincts and begins his own mythic quest to avenge his kind. As the journey finally brings them face to face, Caesar and the Colonel are pitted against each other in an epic battle that will determine the fate of both their species and the future of the planet.

Hail Caesar, indeed. One of the most gripping movie character arcs in recent memory comes to a conclusion with War for the *Planet of the Apes*: that of Caesar (Andy Serkis), a lab -born chimpanzee who gained unusual intelligence as a result of human experimentation; escaped his abusive captors; and led a revolt of similarly advanced apes, even as the human population began to dwindle due to the outbreak of a deadly virus. This all took place in the thrilling reboot/prequel, Rise of the Planet of the *Apes*, and the Shakespearean political drama (I kid you not), Dawn of the Planet of the Apes. War finds Caesar. some two years after the events of Dawn, facing a choice: continue living in increasingly antagonistic relationship with the remaining humans or actively work toward their ultimate subjugation.

That we are right there with Caesar in his agonizing predicament is a testament to Serkis' groundbreaking work in motion-capture performance (his turn in Rise was Oscar-worthy), as well as the impeccable CGI effects, which give every simian detail a startling verisimilitude. "My God. Look at your eyes. Almost human," a character observes of Caesar, who is staring him down with a mixture of anger, suspicion, and pity. Exactly. Directed, as was Dawn, by Matt Reeves, War for the Planet of the Apes opens with a stunning battle sequence, in which a team of human soldiers assaults

overhead shot of the fray allows us to take in the full scope of the violence and suffering. Later, when Caesar

plunges into a rushing river, we see his leap from far away, in long shot; the camera patiently holds on the water, without a cut, until Caesar emerges gasping for air right in front of us. All along, Michael Giacchino's score offers ominous rumbles and insinuating slices of strings. There is a soberness to the shape and sound of War for the Planet of the Apes that rightly matches the movie's serious consideration of conflict.

There is a curious turn, however, after this first act. Just as the movie seems preparing to spread wide an epic canvas, it curiously retreats to become a prison movie. The bulk of the film takes place in a snowy concentration camp for apes. overseen by a Kurtz-like madman known as The Colonel (Woody Harrelson). There are some standout scenes here, and certainly defining moments for the central conflict within Caesar's character, yet I couldn't help feeling that the narrative shift put the threefilm sweep on pause, exactly when it seemed to be building toward a monumental climax. It would be easier to forgive this detour if I was more taken with The Colonel, who arguably gets more attention than any human has yet in the trilogy. Despite Harrelson's best efforts—he can do scarycrazy as well as anybody-War asks too much of the character. Much of the film's plotting, motivation, and even theme are wrapped up in The Colonel; indeed, all three get explicated in a lengthy, laborious dialogue scene between The Colonel and

Caesar. Simply put, there is



too much humanity in this ape movie.

Far better are the scenes involving Maurice (Karin Konoval), the mournful orangutan who serves as Caesar's counselor and conscience, and Rocket (Terry Notary), his brave, right-hand chimp. Especially haunting are the visions Caesar has of Koba (Toby Kebbell), his nowdeceased adversary from Dawn, who reappears to taunt Caesar that he was right all along about the worthlessness of humans. These are all more compelling characters than The Colonel or Nova (Amiah Miller), a mute human girl whom the apes

encounter on their way to

the prison. (As for Steve

Zahn's Bad Ape, another

new character, I found his

presence to be distractingly Dobbyesque.) Despite such hiccups, War for the Planet of the Apes regains its footing for a finale that is appropriately momentous, then elegiac. An especially astute touch is the way the climactic battle is decided not by men or apes, but by the brute force of nature itself. These an understanding that humanity, for all its

films have been rooted in accomplishment, is still subservient to a created order. War for the Planet of the Apes honours the remarkable creature whopartly out of desire, but mostly out of tragic necessity—re-ordered things in irrevocable ways.



Our students hit the ground running on our return to school after the holidays. The use of chemicals on farms in NSW is regulated by legislation to ensure minimal negative effects on human health and the environment, and to ensure safe food for Australia and the countries we export to.

All farmers who use chemicals are deemed to be farm chemical users and have to keep records of all chemical usage.

It is normal practice to both consider the weather before, during and after applications of pesticides, when recording chemical usage.

The term pesticide is a general term. Within this we group pesticides into

- herbicides (applied to plants to control weeds),
- insecticides (applied to control particular insects) and
- fungicides (applied to plants to control specific fungi).

Biological control agents are regularly used in place of chemicals in many food crops

Spray drift is a serious issue associated with chemical application where sprayed chemical drifts onto adjacent or non-target situations. All chemical users are obliged, by law to ensure spray drift does not occur.

How Local Land Services can help

Local Land Services (LLS) offers support and advice to help farmers and farming groups maintain safe, profitable and productive farms. LLS work closely with organisations such as the Department of Primary Industries to provide up to date technical advice, support and pass on the latest

#### scientific knowledge. Training and courses

LLS is pivotal in the delivery of education programs such as the PROfarm range of short courses, including Chemical safety, Chemical risk management, Chemical application and fumigation on farms. We will coordinate local producer groups on timely and locally relevant topics such as nozzle selection, avoid inversions (weather related event), monitor temperature and humidity and select the right type of formulation for ground or aerial spraying. The dry seasonal conditions contributed to a larger penning of fair to good quality cattle, with the younger drafts making up the bulk of the yarding. The majority were suitable for the restocker and feeder orders, with some excellent

younger cattle in prime condition sourced by the butchers. There were around 70 cows penned, with very few grown steers and heifers in the offering.

The younger cattle trended cheaper, while the cows lifted in value week-on-week.

The over 200kg yealer steers returning to the paddock trended 20c cheaper, making from 290c to 379c, with similar decreases recorded for the heavier drafts, as they averaged 323c/kg. The medium weight vealer heifers also to the restockers eased 25c to average 287c, with the best making 319c/kg. Yearling steers were mainly light weights and eased 5c, with restockers paying from 310c to 332c/kg to secure their selections. Yearling heifers to the restockers were back 15c, the lighter end made from 248c to 280c/kg. The prime conditioned younger cattle to the butchers sold well for the higher yielding pens, however the plainer drafts struggled in the competition, with the best sold for 349c/kg.

Cows sold according to yield and quality, with the better pens lifting in price, while the plainer drafts trended cheaper. The plainer 2 scores averaged 6c dearer ranging from 160c to 210c, while the heavier weights made 222c/kg.


Numbers increased due to the surrounding areas remaining dry and the quality remained fair to good. The bulk were younger cattle, with the majority suitable for the restockers and lot feeders, and fair percentages of

prime cattle suitable for the butchers were also scattered throughout the market. The usual buyers competed, with the younger drafts remaining close to firm, and the older heifers and cows trended cheaper. The over 200kg vealer steers to the restockers ranged from 282c to 374c depending on breed, with the heavier drafts reaching 358c/kg. The same weight heifer portion also to the restockers made from 290c to 324c/kg, with only breed and quality contributing to any price variations. The yearling steers improved by 4c, with the medium weights making from 310c to 333c/kg. Yearling heifers sold at similar prices, from 274c to 331c/kg. The prime conditioned young cattle to the butchers lifted 7c, the best making 358c/kg. There were too few grown steers to quote, while the grown heifers sold at cheaper prices to range from 210c to 230c/kg. Cows trended 6c cheaper, the plainer medium weights averaged 182c, while the better covered heavy weights ranged from 210c to 218c/kg. The best heavy weight bull topped at 260c/kg.



Yarding 1122 ~ Change 152 (Comparison Date 17/7/17)

There was an increase of 200 head. Yearling cattle made up the bulk of the offering with a limited supply of vealers. There was also a limited supply of well finished heavy grown steers and cows were well represented. Quality and condition was mixed throughout the grades with crop-fed cattle showing the best condition. The usual buyers were in attendance and demand varied. There were insufficient vealer steers to quote. Light and medium



trended close to firm, quality accounted for some price change. There was increased demand for heavy feeder steers with the yearlings selling up to 4c/kg dearer. 

What do you do when it's cold and windy outside?

Even though the days are getting a little bit longer and there is a hint of spring in the air during



temperatures are still dropping close to zero overnight. This means it can be extra hard to find the motivation (or the inspiration) to get out of bed for an early morning exercise session, and even harder to get yourself moving after work.

When it is dark outside and it is more tempting to sit on the lounge watching Game of Thrones reruns than it is to do some exercise, it's important to remember that exercising in cold (and windy) weather has special benefits (as well as some special considerations).

Exercise in Winter is good for you! ~ In winter we are often driving to and from work in the dark, as well as spending most of our day inside an office, so it can be hard to remember that there is an

We are luckier here in the southern hemisphere than our northern hemisphere counterparts, but we can still miss our daily dose of fresh air and sunshine. Exercising outdoors in the fresh air even (or especially) in winter can be a terrific mood booster. Research shows that exercising outside releases more endorphins than exercising indoors, and even more endorphins can be released when we feel like we are battling the elements. The sense of achievement you get from going outside on a cold and windy day, knowing that you have done something that others only think about, is also priceless! When we stay inside over winter we also miss out on valuable exposure to sunlight and Vitamin D. Spending time in the sun, even on

**Get off the lounge!** ~ More time exercising and less time on the lounge means less time eating! Long walks on the weekend can get you outside in the fresh air, expose you to Vitamin D AND get you away from the refrigerator. Why not plan a weekend with your loved ones and go walking somewhere you have never been before? The cooler weather can be the perfect time to go and explore a National Park or the local bushland without the fear of snakes or bushfires! Burn more calories! ~ There is also evidence to show that exercising in cold weather burns more calories! You tend to not stop for as many breaks, and you need to work harder to keep your body warm - that

cold or windy days, can help make sure you are getting enough of this

sounds like a win-win situation to me! Exercising in cold weather still needs a bit of preparation! Wear Appropriate Clothes ~ It's important to wear warmer clothes, but not too warm! I was told once that if you are warm when you are standing on the starting line of a race, then you are wearing too many clothes! The same goes for fitness classes or other forms of exercise. Wear plenty of layers that you can strip off as you warm up, but remember that you may have to carry them with you if you take them off while you are running. I once left a jacket folded up on the side of the path when I was running around Lake Burley Griffin in Canberra and when I ran back along the path 20 minutes later it was gone! **Choose safe surfaces** ~ On cold mornings footpaths and roads can be slippery, so it is better to run or exercise on grass or dirt surfaces if you are worried about falling over.

Stay in well-lit areas ~ When it is dark, it is better to exercise in parks with flood lighting or along roads with good street lighting so you can see where you are putting your feet. It is also important that drivers as well as other people exercising can see you, so wear bright colours or a

**Take a friend** ~ There is safety in numbers, so if you aren't sure about exercising alone in the dark, take a friend! An exercise buddy can also be good motivation to get you out the door when you are warm inside. **Drink plenty of water** ~ You sweat almost as much during winter as you do during summer. The difference is that in winter your perspiration is either caught in the layers of clothing or evaporates more quickly due to the lower humidity. Also, high winds can dehydrate you. On top of that being indoors in warm air-conditioning can dry you out, so make sure you stay hydrated!

Spend a bit more time warming up and less time cooling down! ~ In winter it is important to spend a bit more time warming up. This helps your muscles and also helps your heart and lungs – cold air going into your lungs can affect your oxygen uptake so make sure you start out slowly and give your body a little bit more time to warm up. When you are finished exercising, make sure you have dry clothes to change into at the end of a workout as clothes full of perspiration can quickly cool down and chill your body

If you are heading out from home to go for a run or a brisk walk, do a longer walk to warm up and a shorter walk to cool down.

Make sure you are doing something you enjoy!~ Exercising in winter can be hard enough without dragging yourself out the door to do something you don't enjoy! To spice up your workouts, join a fitness group, a running club or go to a gym. You will enjoy doing some new workouts, and also meet some like-minded people to help keep you motivated.


