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
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

Cessnock Council's top infrastructure projects named



Cessnock City Council will submit the top four local infrastructure projects to the Australian Local Government Community Infrastructure register.

The register proposed by the Australian Local Government Association looks to attract federal government support for local infrastructure projects vital to local government areas across Australia.

Cessnock City Mayor, Councillor Bob Pynsent nominated the Branxton Greta Cycleway construction, Cessnock Airport upgrade, Richmond Vale Rail Trail project & the refurbishment/replacement of timber bridges as the priority projects, which were unanimously supported by Councillors.

"The four projects we will submit are critical to the future of our local government area and will generate economic and social benefits for our community."

"The purpose of the register is to strengthen our case for Commonwealth funding for these particular projects."

"Councils across Australia are faced with huge infrastructure backlogs and as a result funding from a federal level has become absolutely vital to maintaining our bottom

Cessnock City Council has been successful in securing a number of large federal government grants, in particular the Federal Government's Bridges Renewal Program, which have assisted Council greatly to remain financially stable.

JoyPatton; volunteer extraordinaire

It's been almost 20 years since Joy Patton established the first-ever Father Riley's op shop but she hasn't lost any of her enthusiasm for the Youth Off the Streets cause. The grandmother-of-seven still dedicates two days a week to the shop in Singleton, finding time in a busy schedule that also includes volunteering for the Glendon School of Arts, the Combined Rural Halls Committee and Sacred Spaces.

"What makes it worthwhile for me is that we always get invited to the presentation for Youth Off the Streets and you see the kids who have benefited from it," she says. "They come from the most tragic circumstances, but somehow they survive. Some go off to university, and others are happy to exist and be sheltered by Father's programs. I used to do fostering, but then after Father came through town I was inspired to get involved in the work he was doing." That's when the idea for the op shop was born, and Singleton became the first of many Father Riley Op Shops throughout the Hunter.

Joy now coordinates a band of 30 volunteers, the eldest aged "85 or 86", and there's always room for more. "It's a team effort – it's not just me," she says. "Everyone works really well together. We've got ladies who take all the clothes and the buttons, we've got the fellows on the trucks. Everyone's got things to do. But we're very short of men and assistance with the truck deliveries and pick-ups.'

When she's not in the shop, Joy has



plenty of other interests to keep her busy - not least the Glendon School of Arts, continuing in the tradition of her late husband who served as

The group is currently fundraising for improvements to the building used for weddings, and birthday parties, as well as an evacuation centre. "We've got to get new windows, a lot of new panelling has got to go on and it needs repainting," Joy says. And of course there's her work with Sacred Spaces, which Joy describes as a

"gem in Singleton". Her motivation is pretty simple. "To get involved really makes you aware of what's happening in your community," Joy says. "You see a need for different things and not only that, if you don't volunteer in the community, things just don't get done. At Glendon, we wouldn't have the hall if we didn't have volunteers; Sacred Spaces wouldn't exist without volunteers; nor the op shops in Singleton that do so many things for so many people in so many ways.'

A heavy dose of déjà vu

When the Federal Government announced the establishment of the Australian Space Agency I experienced a heavy dose of déjà vu. In my dim memory I recall a classmate of mine from OCS Portsea was involved in a space venture of some kind and he even gave me his card with the details on it. My friend and former colleague, Dave Miller, worked for the "Australian Space Office" (part of the Dept of Industry Science & Technology) and it was the role of this office to develop a space industry in Australia. Of course I lost the card but was able to get his email address. This we did and here is his reply.

"The Australian Space Office was closed down in the late 1990's as a result of Government austerity measures. We Engineers were made redundant as there were no positions for engineers in a policy dept! I was rehired as a consultant when they realised that they had to have a "Space Act" as part of their UN responsibilities to cover the possibility of anyone launching "space objects" from Australian Territory or international waters where the launch platform came from/was supported/controlled from Australia. We had many projects; most based on CSIRO developed technology of "Earth Observation" of various types including the measurement of sea surface temperature from space, measurement of sea-level atmospheric

pressure from space & the calculation of "bio-mass" (amount of vegetation such as forest density) from space. We provided instruments for a series of European "Earth Resources Satellites" providing 30 (+) years of earth observation (ERS1, ERS2 & Envisat). The instrument was called an "Advanced Across Track Resources" telescope ~ great scientific name but incomprehensible to the rest of us!

I was the "Australian Safety Officer" for the landing of a Japanese/German satellite based on a Russian re-entry SOYUZ vehicle which was to land in the Woomera

MAYBE BANNING GUNS ISN'TA BAD IDEA.

> People keep pointing to Woomera for space launch activities. It was setup not so much for space launch but for the testing of re-entry vehicles (for the UK & US). You launch the rocket high (not aiming for orbit) and then power it down through the atmosphere to simulate a re-entry vehicle arriving at orbital speed. By landing it in NW Australia you avoid the problem of losing all your data in the ocean if the parachute fails (as happened). Even if the re-entry vehicle crashes to the ground at near-sonic speed the scientists can usually recover sufficient information for their purposes.

> Woomera is also very good for conducting any type of aircraft or missile tests; if anything goes wrong the debris is recoverable and a big plus is that Russian & Chinese surveillance ships find it difficult to monitor such activities. Most nations have to conduct such activities over water so Woomera is an asset to the Western world.

> Australia launched a surplus US rocket from Woomera with a satellite "WRESAT" on it (Weapons Research Establishment, Salisbury SA) and so became a member of the "Space Launch Club" which allowed people like me to speak with Russians on matters I couldn't discuss with the Japanese (who weren't in the Club at that time). For example when I was in the German Space Operations Centre monitoring the launch of the German/Japanese satellite mentioned above and a countdown halt was called for due to a guidance malfunction, I was astonished at the guidance system that the Japanese were using and asked the Germans why the Japanese used such a system. The Germans totally understood the problem but said that due to "transfer of technology" restrictions they couldn't alert the Japanese to this fault in design.

There has been research work in Australia on hyper-sonic Ram Jet projects but I haven't kept up with it. The UK & Russia both have ram-jet powered missiles in service so they are probably more advanced than anyone. Pulse Jets are simple & very cheap but the vibrations are a problem.'

What the aims and financing of the Agency will be have not been announced and it may turn out to be simply a thought bubble, however the scope for space research encompasses just about every aspect of scientific engineering and organisational endeavour. So, even if we are late starters we have the expertise and opportunity to carve out a large piece of the action (as they say). Let's hope this happens but with our track record whenever the Federal Government gets involved in ANYTHING the result is abysmal. We should talk about this and what to do about it later. 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Councillors won't ignore car troubles



Cessnock City Council wants better measures to remove abandoned vehicles parked on roadsides and dumped in bushland across the Cessnock Local Government Area (LGA).

The latest Ordinary Council meeting saw Councillors unite on the issue of abandoned cars with it being labelled an eyesore and a fire danger.

Council is bound by the Impounding Act 1993 when dealing with abandoned vehicles which has a number of provisions that must be followed before a car can be removed by council.

The legislation includes time frames which allows for investigation to be undertaken to locate the owner of the vehicle and time to contact them ahead of the car being retrieved.

Cessnock City Mayor, Councillor Bob Pynsent understands Council is required to follow the provisions set out in the Impounding Act however said this has become a point of frustration for the entire community.

"The number of abandoned cars in our LGA is extremely concerning, not only because they are an eyesore and in most cases are vandalised but they pose a fire risk."

"Recent fires in our area have been the result of arson, and in some cases the fires have been caused after an abandoned car has been used as the source of ignition."

Council will investigate if it can legally impound an abandoned vehicle immediately under Section (5) of the Impounding Act 1993, if the impounding officer is satisfied that it may be vandalised or set on fire.

Council will also submit a motion to the upcoming LGNSW annual conference calling for common sense changes to the legislative provisions relating to abandoned cars in order to make it easier for the vehicles to be removed in a timely manner.

Residents are encouraged to contact Council immediately when they see an abandoned vehicle, often people assume it has already been reported, increasing the time the car is left abandoned as many days may go by with Council unaware of the vehicle.

SOLUTION SOUGHT ON ABANDONED CARS

Council resolved last week to investigate whether it can impound abandoned vehicles. Cessnock has one the highest rate of vehicle and motorbike theft in the state, with a large number of these vehicles being dumped and later vandalized or burnt. Not only is this unsightly but it proves a hazard to the community, with the recent Richmond Main bushfire being started by an abandoned, burnt out car. Of the various bushfires which occurred last summer, a number were deemed suspicious, the others again caused by burnt out cars. This puts lives and property at risk. As it stands, the process of impounding is lengthy, convoluted and dependent upon whose jurisdiction the vehicle sits - on Council or RMS managed roads. Although this will result in cost shifting to Council, it will enable us to be proactive in our attempts to stamp out this problem and ensure the safety of our community. If you see a vehicle which you suspect has been abandoned, please make a report either to me or direct to Council on (02)49934100.

POLICING REVIEW

A worrying concern brought to Council's attention recently is the State Government review into the boundaries of Local Area Commands (LAC). Council had previously called on the State Government to move the Greta/ Branxton/North Rothbury areas out of Hunter Valley LAC (based in Muswellbrook) and into Central Hunter LAC (based in Maitland). We had also requested consideration be given to the establishment of an emergency services precinct located adjacent to the HEX. What we didn't expect was the Government to look at scrapping Central Hunter altogether and moving our entire LGA up into Hunter Valley. The Greta/ Branxton/North Rothbury communities are all to aware of the pitfalls of having its LAC located so far away, and to see the remainder of the LGA also face such a situation is completely unacceptable. As a result of these concerns, Council resolved last week to support a Mayoral Minute seeking an urgent meeting with the NSW Premier, Minister for Police, Parliamentary Secretary for the Hunter, Member for Cessnock and NSW Police Commissioner to advocate for the retention of Cessnock and Kurri Kurri in Central Hunter LAC and that Greta, Branxton and surrounds be moved into the Central Hunter LAC. What was most disappointing is that there was absolutely no consultation with Council or the community by the State Government. Had the review not been reported in the media we would have been none the wiser. Again, it appears bureaucratic decisions are being forced on our communities, to our obvious and unfortunate detriment.

INFRASTRUCTURE PRIORITIES

A further Mayoral Minute passed recently will allow Council to submit its top priority infrastructure projects for inclusion in the Local Government Community Infrastructure register as proposed by the Australian Local Government Association. The projects

include the Cessnock Airport Upgrade, Richmond Vale Rail Trail Project, Council's Timber Bridge Replacement Program and the Branxton-Greta Memorial Cycleway. Registering these projects lifts their profile and in turn increases Council's opportunity to successfully obtain grant funding for their construction. It also highlights the problem of backlogged infrastructure projects, which councils all across the country are grappling with following rate freezes, decreased and unsatisfactory distribution of grants and cost shifting state and federal responsibilities to local government. The result is that councils continue to do more with less and as an industry we are fighting for financial relief from state and federal governments so that we can continue to deliver more for our communities.

NEW DEPUTY MAYOR

Lastly, I'm pleased to report that I nominated my Labor colleague Anthony Burke to the position of Deputy Mayor, for which he was successfully elected. Anthony is a Ward D Councillor who runs a small business with a young family. The role of Deputy is a 12 month term and Anthony will no doubt do a wonderful job. Cheers, Melanie

Raising the BARR HOW AND WHY DO WE HAVE THIS **POWER CRISIS?**

I have been asked many times in recent weeks about the option of keeping Liddell Power Station open to sure up electricity supply. My first thought and response is always the same: how did we end up here? And in today's column I thought that I would try to explain that, in as simple terms as possible, without asking anyone to take a position for, or against, coal or renewables

If we cast our mind back to the period of 2007-2011 in State politics and 2007-2013 in Federal politics, there was a conscience decision to move toward renewable energy and away from fossil fuels. Now regardless of your thoughts on that position and that decision, the fact is that there was a set and deliberate direction taken. Money was set aside, incentives were offered and a wider community education campaign was afoot. In particular, across NSW people dove into solar panels.

In 2011 at the State level, and in 2013 at the Federal level, the change of Government led to a change of position. Renewables were no longer considered worthy of investment. Again, regardless of your thoughts on that decision, that was the decision made. But this is also an important turning point in how we get to the crisis situation of today.

In changing our States electricity direction in 2011 at the State level and 2013 at the Federal level, it was abundantly clear to all what we would NOT be doing, and that was renewables. OK. But what wasn't explained is what we WOULD be doing instead. By and large this new direction never has been explained and I don't believe a decision ever made. You see a decision would have required money, education, planning and progress. Regardless of your thoughts on coal or renewables or politics, I am confident that nobody in our community would be able to tell me what new direction the Government launched into with regard to electricity. I sometimes hear the current State and

or even nuclear power, but I honestly couldn't tell you what the supposed new direction is. I do know that there has been zero, zip, zilch, State Government investment in coal fired power; I know that there has been no investment in gas fired power; and I know that talk of nuclear power only seems to be rolled out on a slow news

In summary there has been a decision to step away from renewables, but no decision to step into anything else. Hence, we are facing a power shortage, not caused by climate change or the burning of fossil fuels. On this front we don't have to take sides of pro-environment or anti-environment, in fact we can all unite. If the lights go out this summer it will be a result of a Government non-decision, the worst type of decision of them all!

On a personal note, I do offer a dark and satisfied giggle when I hear the Liberal Government saying that the free market, the privatised electricity market, has failed the people. Oh dear!

Food nutrients are absorbed in the small intestine. The waste is pushed into the large intestine (bowel) where water is removed. Diarrhoea is the frequent passing of loose, watery and unformed faeces

Acute diarrhoea is the sudden onset of three or more loose stools per day, lasting less than 14 days. The most common cause of acute diarrhoea is an infection of the intestines, such as gastroenteritis or food poisoning. Viruses are responsible for most cases. The intestinal lining becomes irritated and inflamed, which hinders the absorption of water from food waste. In severe cases, the intestinal lining may even leak water.

A bout of diarrhoea can be caused by a wide range of disorders, infections and events including:

food poisoning, gastroenteritis, tropical diseases, such as typhoid and cholera, anxiety or emotional stress, overconsumption of alcohol & medications, particularly antibiotics.

Common infectious agents Contaminated food and water are common causes of acute diarrhoea. Some of the infectious agents known to cause diarrhoea include: viruses - such as calici virus. adenovirus and rotavirus, bacteria – such as E. coli, Campylobacter, V. cholerae, Shigella, Salmonella and Staphylococcus aureus & parasites - such as Giardia lamblia, Cryptosporidium parvum and tapeworm.

Causes of chronic diarrhoea Some of the causes of chronic diarrhoea include: coeliac disease - which reduces

the intestine's ability to absorb food, chronic constipation the bowel is blocked by hard, impacted faeces, but some liquids manage to seep past the blockage. this condition, called 'spurious' or 'overflow' diarrhoea, is more common in the elderly, **hormone disorders** - such as diabetes or hyperthyroidism (overactive thyroid gland), cancer – such as bowel cancer, inflammatory bowel

The REIA Real Estate Market Facts Report for the June quarter 2017 shows the weighted average median price for houses for the eight capital cities increased to \$768,227, with prices increasing everywhere except for "The RBA is in a holding Adelaide and Perth. "The weighted average median price for other dwellings increased to \$604,456, again driven by median price increases in Melbourne and Sydney and, to lesser extent, in Darwin, Adelaide and Hobart," Mr Gunning said. "The largest increase in the median price for houses was seen in Hobart at 4.9 The median house price across

per cent, while for other dwellings Darwin's 9.3 per cent increase was the highest.

"In contrast median house

prices decreased in Adelaide and Perth and median prices for other dwellings decreased in Brisbane, Canberra and Perth," he said. Mr Gunning said over the quarter, median rents for three-bedroom houses decreased in most capitals except for Canberra. "Adelaide had the largest decrease at 2.9 per cent, with the other capital cities having similar declines. Median rents for twobedroom other dwellings increased in Canberra, Hobart and Sydney. In Melbourne, Adelaide, Perth and Darwin median rents for other dwellings declined cent over the previous with Brisbane having the highest decrease of 5.1 per

"The weighted average vacancy rate for the eight capital cities remained steady at 2.8 per cent dur ing the June quarter. Both Darwin and Perth continue to have high vacancy rates at 7.3 per cent and 6.9 per cent respectively, while Canberra recorded the largest decrease of 0.4 percentage points. Perth was the only capital city to see an increase with a rise of 0.8 per cent," he said. Mr Gunning said both investor finance and owneroccupied housing finance, excluding re-financing, showed strong increases of 12.8 per cent and 13.6 per

cent respectively over the quarter.

'Whilst both increased, over the last eight quarters we have seen owner occupied financing greater than that of investors. The decline in investors is in response to the more rigid lending criteria imposed by APRA on investment property lending which is cooling the residential markets, particularly in Melbourne and Sydney. "The past level of investor activity is flowing through in higher vacancy rates than has been the case for the last two years," Mr Gunning said. **NSW**

The median house price in Sydney increased to 2.3 per cent to \$1,194,247 over the June quarter and 14.2 per year.

Median house prices increased in all NSW zones over the June quarter except Inner Sydney where the median house prices Increases ranged from 2.0 per cent in Newcastle to 5.3 per cent in Outer Sydney. The median rent for three-bedroom houses in Sydney decreased to \$485 per week or 1.0 per cent over the June quarter but an increase of 3.2 per cent over the past year. The vacancy rate in Sydney decreased or 0.1 percentage points at 1.8 per cent over the quarter.

House sitting:

As metropolitan house and rent prices continue to soar a growing number of young people are turning to an alternative lifestyle option: house sitting. Sarah Baar and her partner, Richard Pratt, are among the mobile generation moving between properties as they save for their own home.

The couple has been house sitting at properties in Canberra and regional NSW for more than a year after moving from Melbourne to Canberra for work.

"The main benefit is we don't have any accommodation expenses; we don't pay rent and we don't pay bills." Ms Baar said. The couple originally turned to house sitting after struggling to secure a rental. Flying or driving between Melbourne and Canberra for regular inspections was adding up and parliamentary sitting weeks made snapping up short-term accommodation almost impossible.

Now, money otherwise spent on rent or bills is saved away to fulfil their dream of owning property."That's why

Ms Barr said. "We do want to buy ourselves a house but we

we've continued doing it,"

don't want to rent anymore. We've rented in Sydney and Melbourne and it seemed like we were paying off someone else's mortgage." House prices in Canberra continue to rise with the capital's median surging past the \$700,000-mark for the first time in March. Sydney's median property price has increased to more than \$1.15 million, while Melbourne's median is above \$843,000. Weekly rent has also become more expensive. Canberra is the third-most expensive capital city to rent behind Sydney and Darwin, with a weekly median rent of \$500 for a house and \$428 for a unit. In Sydney it's \$550 for a house and \$530 for a unit.

Co-founder of house sitting platform Your Home My Home, Mikaeli Loughrey, said she had noticed an increasing number of Generation Y adults taking up the flexible lifestyle since the online portal launched 18 months ago. 'When we first launched there was a lot of baby boomers who were travelling regularly," she

said. "There's been a huge shift to that 18 to 30-year-old market. About 75 per cent are those saving for their first home."

Ms Loughrey said the increasing popularity of house sitting among young adults also reflected the growing share economy. "It's both a cost-saving measure but also, as a generation, they are very nimble and very open to the share economy," she said. "For the digital natives, its not an issue; they use Ubers, they use Airtasker. To find somewhere to stay on an online platform is no different to other activities in their lives.' Ms Loughrey said other drawcards included greater independence than living with parents, as well as flexibility when exploring a new city or suburb. Ms Barr and Mr Pratt plan to continue house sitting until the end of the year as they continue to save for their first home. Ms Baar said there had been a couple of gaps between house sitting stints due to a prospective host's changing circumstances, but nothing too serious. "During that time we've just used Airbnb [or] have had the odd stay at a hotel as a treat," she said. "We haven't struggled finding anything.'



Short term holiday letting is by planning laws in NSW. estimated to be a \$31.3 billion industry in Australia and accounts for 25% of total visitor nights in NSW and this is growing. Accommodation is becoming an increasingly saturated marketplace. Booking sites and increasing adoption of the sharing economy has seen the rise of properties listed on sites such as Air BnB and Stayz.

This has resulted in an increase in the amount of properties being advertised for holidays across Australia, including within the Hunter Valley. Of concern, is that short-term holiday letting is It is important to review

largely unregulated

There are a range of issues emerging from holiday letting in NSW, including increasing competition for traditional accommodation providers; inconsistent quality of stay, amenity and safety protocols as well as injustice for fully complying businesses. As part of the NSW Government's plan to address the regulation of short-term holiday letting, it released its options paper in July.

The paper explores: Industry self-regulation Strata regulation Planning regulation Registration or licensing

and make comment on the paper, as it may affect the future of planning legislation surrounding holiday letting. The Standard Instrument within Cessnock City Council's Local Environmental Plan does not define short-term holiday letting. There is also differing legal opinion on the proper characterisation of this type of development. Until such time as the issue of short-term holiday letting is resolved, Council will continue to regulate all forms of 'tourist and visitor accommodation' under the Environmental Planning

and Assessment Act 1979,

Nelson Demille "The Cuban Affair"

Old bones and old grudges in contemporary Havana.

In this, his 20th, DeMille (Radiant Angel, 2015, etc.) deftly drops Daniel "Mac" MacCormick, captain of The Maine, a 42-foot sport fisherman out of Key West, into a storm of competing visions of Cuba's future. When a trio of Cubans and Cuban-Americans, Carlos Macia, Eduardo Valazquez, and the lovely Sara Ortega, offer him a small fortune to participate in a scheme to recover documents and cash hidden in a cave during the Cuban Revolution of 1959, Mac is tempted and succumbs to both avarice

and lust for Sara. The plan is to infiltrate Mac and Sara into Cuba as part of an educational tour under the auspices of Yale University (and some fun is had at the expense of the Elis). The two will break away from the tour, recover the money and documents, meet The Maine, which will be participating in a fishing tournament down the coast, and escape. Relations with Cuba are in flux; the exile community rejects the notion of a "Cuban Thaw," and the security services in Cuba also resist the idea. But some in the U.S. promote a lessening of tensions, and some in Cuba itself understand that the nation cannot survive without a quick infusion of money and that the best hope is U.S. tourist dollars. The real poverty of Cuba is clearly described,

as are the conditions of the infrastructure and the social climate. In spots the narrative seems to slog through discursive observations, but they are mostly informative and worthwhile, and then the plot picks up energy again. Though Mac and his mate Jack Colby seem to share a somewhat adolescent obsession with "getting laid," they are stout fellows in a fight, and the thriller charts a satisfying course. 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DeMille was born in New York City on August 23, 1943. He moved as a child with his family to Long Island. He attended Elmont Memorial High School where he played football and ran track.

ran track.
After spending three
years at Hofstra
University, he
joined the Army and
attended Officer
Candidate School.
He was a First

Lieutenant in the United States Army (1966–69) and saw action as an infantry platoon leader with the First Cavalry Division in Vietnam. He was decorated with the Air Medal, Bronze Star, and the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry, and was awarded the Combat Infantryman Badge.

DeMille returned to the States and went back to Hofstra University, where he received his degree in political science and history. He has three children, Lauren, Alexander, and James, and still lives on Long Island. DeMille's earlier books were NYPD detective novels. His first major novel was *By the Rivers of Babylon*, published in 1978 and still in print, as are all his succeeding novels. He is a member of American Mensa, the Authors Guild, and past president of the Mystery Writers of America. He is also a member of the International Thriller Writers, who honoured him as 2015 ThrillerMaster of the Year. DeMille holds three honorary doctorates: Doctor of Humane Letters from Hofstra University, Doctor of Literature from Long Island University, and Doctor of Humane Letters from Dowling College.

DeMille is the author of By the Rivers of Babylon, Cathedral, The Talbot Odyssey, Word of Honor, The Charm School, The Gold Coast, The General's Daughter, Spencerville, Plum Island, The Lion's Game, Up Country, Night Fall, Wild Fire, The Gate House, The Lion, The Panther, The Quest, Radiant Angel, and The Cuban Affair. He also co-authored Mayday with Thomas Block and has contributed short stories, book reviews, and articles to magazines and newspapers both online and in print.

Writing style

Many of DeMille's books are written in the first person, and as such his books follow a linear plotline in which the reader moves along with the main character. Although the tone of his writing varies from novel to novel, one consistent tool is DeMille's liberal use of sarcasm and dry humour.

Most DeMille novels, especially the more recent, avoid "Hollywood endings," and instead finish either inconclusively or with the hero successfully exposing the secret/solving the mystery while suffering in his career or personal life as a result. There are generally loose ends left for the reader to puzzle over, *Night Fall* being a perfect example.

Works

DeMille often uses Long Island, where he currently lives, as a setting in his novels, as in *The Gold Coast*, *The Gate House*, *Plum Island*, *Word of Honor*, *Night Fall*, and *Radiant Angel*. His most recent novels have followed two main characters, John Corey (starring in seven novels) and Paul Brenner (starring in two novels, with also a part in Corey's sixth novel). In earlier works, the storylines were completely separate, but there have been hints in the novels that they are part of a larger "DeMille Universe" that references events and characters in earlier novels, such as *The Gold Coast* and *The Charm School*.

DeMille spends approximately 16 months creating each of his novels due to the extensive research involved, and because he writes them longhand on legal pads with a number one pencil.



Identity fraud

Keeping it personal Unfortunately, it has become very easy for someone to steal your personal details and carry out illegal activities in your name. However, you can take steps to protect yourself from identity fraud by following the tips below. If you think your personal information has been stolen, contact the police immediately.

What is identity fraud or identity theft Identity fraud is a type of

fraud that involves the theft of your personal information including your name, date of birth, address and other details. Fraudsters then use this information, for example, to open bank accounts, obtain credit cards, start an illegal business or apply for a passport. Your details may also be used to commit serious crimes, such as money laundering and even terrorist acts.

Identity thieves are after everything that contains your personal information: bank and credit card statements, social media account information, bills, driver's licence, passport, investment reports, superannuation records, storage media such as USB devices, and any documents that contain your tax file

How identity theft happens There are many ways in which people can steal your identity. Your personal information is everywhere: on the cards in your wallet, bills in your letter box, emails on your computer at home and at work, and information you post on social networking sites. This makes it easy for someone to get your personal details. For example, they can look through your garbage bins for bills and bank statements, steal your wallet or bag, break into your letter box or home, or hack into your computer. Identity thieves are also becoming more sophisticated. documents at home - Store They may send you a letter, email. SMS or message through social media to 'phish' for information or pretend to be calling on behalf of your bank or a government department, and trick you into giving them information. They may install a program on your computer

Some telltale signs are if you start receiving bills, credit cards, loan statements or calls from creditors that you know nothing about or if you have difficulty obtaining a credit card or a loan because of an inexplicably bad credit rating. You might also notice that the amount of mail you receive is decreasing - which may indicate that items are being stolen or that mail is being redirected somewhere else. If your social media account has been hacked, you may notice posts appearing that you did not write, someone has logged into your account from an unusual location, your wall is flooded with spammy posts, and you are suddenly following a lot of new, unknown people.

How to protect yourself from identity theft

There are several ways in which you can stop your identity from being stolen. **Day-to-day protection**

- •Never give your personal details to people you don't **know -** If you receive a call from someone who claims to be from your bank or any other organisation, don't give them your details. Call the organisation in question to check it is really them calling. Never click on a link or call a phone number in an email - use a phone directory to look up the correct number. Also, beware of entering competitions online where you enter your personal information, as this could be stored and used by a scammer.
- Check your bank and superannuation statements
- If you see any unusual transactions, contact your bank, credit card provider or super fund immediately. Review your credit report -Get your credit report from one of these credit reporting agencies: MyCredit-File.com.au (Equifax), CheckYourCredit.com.au (Dun and Bradstreet). This allows you to check that no-one is using your name to borrow money or run up
- Carry only essential information - Avoid taking important documents out of your home to minimise the chance of them being lost or
- Secure personal your important documents in a fire and waterproof container or a safe deposit box in case your home is burgled or damaged.
- **●**Destroy personal information - Shred or cut up your bills, statements and expired cards to prevent thieves from using them.
- •Secure your mail Secure your letter box with a lock and collect your mail regularly. If you move house, notify the post office to redirect your mail. Mail

sent to the wrong address could be used to steal your identity.

Protect your mobile phone -Be wary when installing applications onto your phone. Scammers may send you applications designed to download malicious software onto your phone and steal bank account details. Computer and mobile protection

- •Keep your phone or other mobile device safe - Treat it like a wallet and know where it is at all times. Always lock your device with a PIN or password.
- •Be careful of what information you post on social media - Identity thieves trawl sites like Facebook, and Twitter and other social media for personal details they can use. Always ensure your privacy settings are set to 'friends only', and don't accept friend requests from people you don't know.
- •Always type the website address into your browser Don't click on a link in an email or open emails requiring you to enter your personal information. They could be scams
- •Be careful what information you give on social networking sites - Identity thieves trawl sites like Facebook and Twitter for personal details they can use.
- ●Disable pop-ups on your **browser** - People can use pop-ups to install programs on your computer that 'spy' on you or record your key strokes. This is how they find out passwords to your bank and other accounts. Most internet browsers (e.g. Internet Explorer, Firefox, Chrome and Safari) let you block pop-ups by selecting 'Turn on pop-up blocker' or a variation of this term under the 'Tools' or 'Settings' menu. You can also delete/ remove certain types of ads from your social feed.
- Make your passwords hard to guess - Use a combination of numbers and letters and change your passwords frequently. Avoid using the same password for multiple log-ins.
- ●Install up-to-date anti-virus software - It will automatically prevent, detect and remove any suspicious programs from your computer or mobile device. Always scan devices such as USBs or external hard drives for viruses, before opening them on your computer.
- •Log out of social media, bank websites and email accounts - This is important if you bank online. If you don't log out, anyone can access your details.
- Only download apps from the official app store or market - Check to make sure the app is from a well-known company.

Enable security settings on your mobile device - Turn off wifi, Bluetooth and GPS when not in use

- Never use public computers for banking or payments - If you use a computer at a library or internet café to look up vour bank account or do online shopping, your account details will be stored on the computer. You do not want your important online banking details to get into the hands of others. For more information on online scam protection, see the Australian Government website Stay Smart Online. "VICTORIA AND ABDUL"

The extraordinary true story of an unexpected friendship in the later years of Queen Victoria's (Academy Award winner Judi Dench) remarkable rule. When Abdul Karim (Ali Fazal), a young clerk, travels from India to participate in the Queen's Golden Jubilee, he is surprised to find favor with the Queen herself. As the Queen questions the constrictions of her long-held position, the two forge an unlikely and devoted alliance with a loyalty to one another that her household and inner circle all attempt to destroy. As the friendship deepens, the Queen begins to see a changing world through new eyes and joyfully reclaims her humanity.

MOVIE REVIEW



Judi Dench, Ali Fazal, Olivia Williams, Michael Gambon, Tim Piggot-Smith; PG-13 (some thematic elements and language); in general release Moviegoers interested in the history of British-Indian relations are getting spoiled this year. Where Gurinder Chadha's "Viceroy's House" examined India's transition from British rule after World War II and the negotiations that created modern Pakistan, "Victoria and Abdul" goes back a bit further into history, to the 19th-century reign of Queen Victoria. Director Stephen Frears' "Victoria and Abdul" which announces itself over the opening titles with a cheeky, "Based on real events ... mostly" purports to tell the story of a little-known friendship between Britain's famous queen and a favored Indian subject. We meet Abdul Karim (Ali Fazal) in India in 1887 as he is plucked from his mundane labors as a prison clerk to deliver an honorary award to Queen Victoria (Judi Dench) in England. As he and his sidekick Mohammed (Adeel Akhtar) make the journey

and take in the grandeur of Victorian England, they almost come off as an endearing Indian answer to R2-D2 and C-3PO, overwhelmed and mystified by their alien surroundings. This awkwardness leads to a couple of faux pas, but instead of banishing the pair back where they came from, the queen — intrigued by the good-looking Indian man, and to a lesser extent his sidekick — insists that the pair stick around for a while. The intrigue leads to a friendship between Victoria and Abdul, so the courier becomes footman and then the queen's personal language tutor as she tries to become more The whole process unfolds

familiar with her Indian subjects. with a charming, lighthearted tone that fans of British comedy will find familiar. One comic scene early on shows the queen and her subjects trying to enjoy a fancy outdoor meal while practically getting blown away by frigid Scottish winds. Such humor offsets the rumblings of the queen's English subjects, who balk at her accommodation of what they see as barely more than savages. It doesn't help that Abdul is also a Muslim, given their recent rebellion

back in India.

This tension grows as the story moves along, and then actually marks a dark turn toward the film's second half as circumstances change. Given the candid opening titles, it's difficult to know how much of the story to take as historical fact, but its message comes across clearly regardless. The tone change probably marks the strangest obstacle in a film that mostly provides an acting showcase for its leads particularly Dench, who is already generating Oscar rumblings for her performance. Fazal has a warm and appealing presence as the humble Abdul. Michael Gambon also turns up in a supporting role, and that feels fitting since he is also featured in "Viceroy's House." Eddie Izzard essentially plays the bad guy as Bertie, the Prince of Wales and the most skeptical of Queen Victoria's subjects. Even if "Victoria and Abdul" is a lightweight next to bigger historical films, Frears' effort is worth a look, even if only for the sake of a little charm and quality

Clearly recognising the owner of the arm, Nick and I look to our parents for their reaction. My father looks to my mother, who seems to be more interested in his reaction than her own. Suddenly, my father can no longer hold it in and starts nervously laughing. The laughter turns into hysterics and before long, the four of us are struggling to breathe as we keel over in fits of hysterical laughter. As odd as it may sound, that is one of the fondest memories of mv childhood.....

This excerpt is from a book I am writing titled 'There's No Place Like Home', about the trials and tribulations of family car trips. Actually, that's not quite true (although the story is). Forgive me, it's part of my academic humour. Everyone knows that one book couldn't possibly hold the attentive detail that would be required to enlighten all aspects of the family car trip. If it were titled There's No Place Like Home – Vol 1 of 3,240, it may qualify for a more justifiable and believable notion.

Having spent more than my fair share of time in the car as a youngster with my family, I am by no means any more of an authority on the subject than you, but the three boys within four years situation my parents found themselves in, certainly gave life to some profound experiences. Most of the time, it was relatively early in the trip where my father would have to pull over to read us our rights. There were, in retrospect (our driveway being exactly one kilometre long) times when we wouldn't even make it to the front gate before my parents would threaten to turn around. Of course, this was not taken as a threat so much as an opportunity. If we were travelling up the coast to enjoy a surfing holiday, we would take heed. If we were visiting great-aunt Gladys out the back of Whoop Whoop, we couldn't dismantle the harmony of the situation quickly

As is what's expected, now I am older and have kids of my own, the experience is a haunting one at the very least. The obvious agitation a parent goes through to consciously pack my two, tears rolling down their cheeks, a car and load up their family to drive for hours on end is akin to dropping some LSD and sitting in parliament for

Considering our locality here in the Hunter Valley, one would assume that most of us have in the past ventured up the coast along the Pacific Highway. I would certainly hope this to be the case or we need to sit down and have a serious chat. When I think of family car trips, I envisage this particular route northwards. We had a book which lived in our car for years, written in 1967 and called, with dazzling originality, 'Travelling North in NSW'. Oh, you know it? So you will be fully informed of its masterful hints on each page which have you pulling your car over every few kilometres to view some 'monumental and significant' landmark.....'Seven kilometres out of

Bulahdelah, stop and enjoy the commemorative plaque located on the third gumtree to the left of the large, not the small, but the large tree trunk, donated by Henry Kendall III, for the sighting of the first dyslectic rainbow lorikeet....' Whilst driving past these incredibly stimulating fixtures all the way up the coast, we would be mesmerised by how many people would be flocking to experience their magic and charm. My father actually used to hold them for ransom and threaten to stop at each and every one of them if the fighting continued. Put it this way, by the time we passed the Foster-Tuncurry turnoff, at least one of us would be crying. By the time we reached Taree, the three of us would be crying and by Port Macquarie. blood would be splattered all through the car and someone would have an eyeball hanging from its socket or two missing teeth. My father would simply pick up the copy of Travelling North in NSW and the next thing, five point three kilometres north of Woolgoolga, we would pull over with 150 other people to view the site of the largest cow dung ever dropped in the Greater Coffs Harbour Council region

..52 cm wide....and a colourful picture of a cow on a lectern.....Hhhhmmm..... One reprise we did endure however, was to stay in the cheapest highway motel possible. My father had a Masters Degree in finding these establishments. When I say reprise, the three of us loved staying in such abodes as we would be given our own room, sometimes several down from our parents. One fateful night, we arrived late to a small hotel-motel not far from Phillip Hughes' and Greg Inglis' hometown of Macksville. My parents were sound asleep when we took the car back into town and proceeded to drink the pub dry. Simon was about sixteen at the time, making me twelve. Without incriminating any other innocent parties, I was far from the only twelve-year-old in the place and I was years older in mind-set than my age would imply. Until the following morning, that is. Here's a small word game for you to play. Simply piece the words together....smash. police, broken, vomit, car, arm, blood

Parents of today's youths are better equipped to harmonise long distance car travel whereby, with simple execution of the installation of portable DVD players, the children simply liaise with a screen. Hours on end of peaceful driving. No yelling, no bickering, no fighting, no tears.....no communication! Voila!! The last time we travelled the coast road was just prior to Christmas. We had stopped at a service station and I wasn't coping very well with the crying and frustration my two young ones were placing upon us. I couldn't help but notice a couple in exactly the same car as ours, about the same age and two young kids of similar age to ours, in the back quietly watching a DVD. I looked back mucous all over their faces and their clothes, red blotches and generally not having fun. I looked back to the other kids sitting like angels, quietly watching away, with their calm looking parents smiling at one another as if on a second honeymoon. The penny suddenly dropped. I think it was very clear what I had to do. I jumped back in the car and turned to the kids....."Guys.....who wants to go and see where the biggest cow poo ever in the Coffs Harbour Council region was done?"



DALWOOD ROAD, EAST BRANXTON DRAINAGE & ROADWORKS



OCATION

Dalwood Road, East Branxton from Wyndham Street intersection to the westerly limit of the road, adjacent to Lion's Park.

THE WORKS

Construction of drainage infrastructure and re-alignment of road to provide improved parking facilities and traffic movement.

FUNDING

This project is funded by Roads to Recovery (R2R).

DESIGN

The design provides:

- · Road re-alignment with addition of a turning head
- Increased vehicular parking and drop-off zones
- Drainage upgrades
- Pedestrian facilities and vehicle separation
- · Increased storage for buses on Wyndham Street

The design provides improved safety for both vehicle users and pedestrians. Rear to kerb parking will be formalised and the total number of parking spaces will increase. Allowance will be made for drop off or 'Kiss and Ride'.

Stormwater infrastructure will be improved at the site. Stormwater that currently discharges in front of No. 8 Dalwood Road will be

diverted via pipe into the swale drain running adjacent to Maitland Road.

CONSTRUCTION

Construction works commence July 2017 and require significant traffic control measures to be implemented on Dalwood Road. Works are programmed to be completed in September 2017.

DISRUPTIONS

Dalwood Road west of the Wyndham Street intersection will be closed periodically during construction as required and will not be available as a drop-off or pick-up point. Council will work with residents directly affected by the closure to provide access to their properties

During this construction period, drop-off and pick-up for school bus passengers should occur at Miller Park soccer fields, on the southern side of Maitland Road so that pedestrians can use the signalised crossing to access the bus stop.

Works are programmed to commence on the first week of July, 2017, during school holidays to minimise impacts.

HUNTER LOCAL LAND SERVICES HELPING FARMERS PREPARE FOR DRY TIMES

Hunter Local Land Services will hold a series of seasonal condition workshops in early October, to help landholders and managers make good planning decisions as they deal with the dry start to spring.

There has been very little rainfall since early winter across the region and many farm managers are looking for options for feeding and marketing their livestock

> "A dry winter has seen winter pastures not providing the feed for this time of year and older pastures from last season have been depleted and are now of no value to provide sufficient nutrition for livestock," said Sustainable Agriculture Advisory Officer Albert

"Unseasonably warm weather and windy conditions in recent weeks has impacted water supplies and heavier reliance from stock is impacting both quantity and quality of these resources.'

Hunter Local Land Services staff are urging landholders to prepare their properties now and consider their options for managing livestock, heading towards summer.

"Crunch time is now looming for landholders to make staged decisions on dry season management for stock if not already in train," said Mr Mullen. "Hunter Local Land Services is holding a round of regional events to provide advice to landholders.

"These workshops will include advice on feeding, herd strategies, animal health and welfare as well as the long term forecast for beef markets." Mr Mullen said.

The workshops will feature cattle industry experts, district vets, agronomy and pasture representatives as well as rural financial counsellors.

Numbers dropped, this was mainly due to the shorter selling week, together with the forecast rainfall. Quality was mixed with unfinished younger cattle suitable for the restockers, along with percentages of high yielding and prime conditioned pens purchased by the butchers. Cow numbers dropped significantly and the usual buyers competed in a dearer market. Vealer steers returning to the paddock lifted 15c to 20c, as the over 200kg pens ranged from 280c to 334c/kg. The same weight heifer portion also to the restockers gained 20c, making from 230c to 299c/kg. Yearling steers to the restockers improved 14c to 20c, with the medium weights ranging from 240c to 290c/kg. The yearling heifer suitable for the restockers and feeder orders were limited in supply, however those sold trended dearer. The prime conditioned younger cattle to the butchers continue to sell at premium levels, as the best heavy vealers topped at 336c/kg. The lighter cows eased 4c to average 173c, while the better finished heavy weights maintained firm prices, making from 208c to 210c/kg.

The holiday weekend reduced numbers for a fair to good quality penning of mainly younger cattle and there were around 205 cows in the offering. The bulk of the younger cattle went to restocker and lot feeder orders, with numbers also suitable for the butchers. The hint of rain and the reduced selling week lifted prices. The over 200kg vealer steers returning to the paddock gained 10c, making from 255c to 336c/kg. The same weight heifer portion also to the restockers lifted 15c, ranging from 248c to 288c/kg. Yearling steers improved by 10c, with the medium weights to restocker orders making from 252c to 282c/kg. Yearling heifers gained 9c, with the lot feeders paying from 220c to 263c/kg to secure their selections. The prime conditioned younger cattle to the butchers were higher yielding and prices lifted accordingly, with the best reaching 323c/ kg. Grown heifers improved 5c in price, as the better selection of the lighter cows lifted 12c/kg. The better finished heavy weight cows dropped 6c, making from 186c to 210c/kg. His most memorable performers included Octagonal (10 Group1 wins, Australian Horse of the year), Might and Power (seven Group1 wins, Australian Horse of the Year), Savabeel (Cox Plate, Spring Champion Stakes), Sky Heights (AJC Australian Derby, Caulfield Cup, Rosehill Guineas), Efficient (Melbourne Cup, Victoria Derby), Jezabelle (Auckland Cup, Melbourne Cup) and Champagne (VRC LKLS) Mackinnon Stakes, STC Ansett Australia Stakes, neck second to Jezabelle in the Melbourne Cup). There are many more.

A tragedy of the reign of Zabeel, one in which he has been four times champion New Zealand sire by earnings, five by broodmares, twice champion Australian sire and leading Australian broodmare sire in three years, has been the small number of his sons that have received quality opportunity at stud. Three exceptions have been Octagonal (sire of Australian Horse of the Year and a champion sire Lonhro), Savabeel (three time champion New Zealand sire) and Reset.

There are only three of his sons in the 2017 edition of NZ Stallions book, Savabeel, Zed (dam by Danehill; sire of Group1 winner Survived) and Verdi (dam by Marscay sire Paris Opera; first season at stud) and the only one in Stallions books published in Australia is Reset (dam by Zeditave), a former

all his five starts, including the Australian Guineas and Futurity Stakes. He has sired over 380 winners with 31 successful in stakes races including Fawkner (in Melbourne winner Makybe Diva Stakes, Caulfield Cup, Caulfield Stakes, second Cox Plate), Rebel Raider (won Victoria Derby, South Australian Derby), Pinker Pinker (filly: like Savabeel from a Success Express mare; Cox Plate winner, second in the Epsom and Futurity), Hauraki (won Epsom, second ATC Australian Derby) and Set Square (won Victoria Derby).

The Reset daughters could be a good avenue of access to Zabeel in the future. They have already produced over sixty winners and earners of \$4million. Four successful in stakes are the The Soultaker (NZ, by Iffraaj), Madeenaty (Exceed and Excel), Houtzen (I (Jet Spur).

Also his classic winning son Rebel Raider, a resident on \$6,600 at the Wyndholm Park Stud, Miner's Rest, Victoria, is sire of stakes horses Waging War (Group 3 winner Adelaide), Pretty Punk (Listed winner Adelaide), Rockstar Rebel (second Queensland Derby), Ace Attack (winner Adelaide, third Morphettville Guineas) and Danger Deal (second Magic Millions Adelaide 2YO Classic, fourth SAJC Sires' Produce Stakes).





The Colts performed creditably, coming away with four victories from their five games completed over the course of three days.



injury was more a result of the constant laughing he endured over the previous days rather than from football.


