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

Week and Council staff were lucky enough to hear from one of Australia's leading mental health key note speakers, Craig Hamilton.

In any given year, 20% of the population is experiencing a mental health issue and Craig opened up to staff about his own personal battle with mental illness.

As with all these invented problems the Euthanasia question is not the province of Government to become involved. To attempt to prescribe what circumstances justify euthanasia of people is beyond the ability of civilized society. Every situation is different and there cannot be a one size fits all and there will always be doubts as to the appropriateness of any one case. The laws of each state still attempt to prevent assisted suicide and that must remain. It implies that the person attempting suicide does so in the full knowledge of the consequences of their actions. Any other person who assists in this is a criminal. It is a citizen's duty to prevent attempted suicide if that is possible. When a person reaches the end of natural life, that is, they will die without extreme intervention and there is no prospect of

until they expire. The natural tendency of all life is to fight to survive. Even if this person is unconscious the will to live is very strong and the automatic functions of the body will continue even under extreme difficulties of breathing. This final fight for life is extremely distressing for the person dying and also for the carers and loved ones who

recovery or improvement, the general idea is to comfort the person and be with them

are present and this can continue for hours, even days. It is in this situation where the administration of morphine will relax the patient and stop the fight. To do this is only a matter for the carers and relatives present. Nobody else, and certainly not a bunch of politicians, can prescribe rules for this.

In the event that a third party objects and fears a crime may have been committed then the matter is decided at an inquest. With the full facts considered as an individual case & the magistrate then deciding if any action should be taken.

In the case of an individual who decides that suicide is the option they wish to take there are no laws that will prevent this. Only advice and counselling can help if

Enough is enough The recent citizenship deliberations of the High Court saw the exit of a number of senators and Federal MPs. More recently, the President of the Senate, Stephen Parry, fell on his sword.

Nine killed over weekend

Nine people have died on NSW roads over the weekend, prompting senior police to issue a warning to all road users to take responsibility on our roads. Over the past two days (Saturday 4 November – Sunday 5 November 2017), seven people lost their lives in five separate crashes across the state.

About 11.10am on Saturday

(4 November 2017), a 62-year-old woman died after she was struck by a car while crossing Fern Street at Gerringong. About 11.30am on Satur-

day, a 28-year-old man died after the utility he was driving and a truck crashed head-on on Pheasants Nest Road, Pheasants Nest. About 4pm on Saturday, an 85-year-old woman died after the car she was driving left the roadway and hit a tree on South Road,

About 5.50pm on Saturday, a 45-year-old man and his passenger, a 48-year-old man, both died after the utility they were in left the

man, both died after the utility they were in left the roadway and rolled on the Cobb Highway, Wanganella.

About 7am yesterday (Sunday 5 November

"To lose nine lives in the course of two days on our roads is nothing short of a tragedy.

"Nine more lives lost means that we have now lost 332 lives on our roads already this year.

"The greatest tragedy is that many of the lives lost on our roads were avoidable if people took personal responsibility for their actions, and drive to the conditions especially in wet weather. "All road users need to slow down, take a break when they are tired, wear a seatbelt, avoid distractions, and avoid drinking and driving, or I fear that many more lives will be lost,' Acing Assistant Commissioner Smith said.

What an explosive time it has been in Canberra. First the politically motivated AFP raids on Trade Union offices, then the denials and eventually, the confession.

Then came the High Court's decision on the dual citizens still sitting in the Parliament. While not a surprise, the unanimous decision of the Court sent shivers through the political establishment.

Some say it all seems a bit unfair for the politicians involved but I couldn't disagree more. Rules are rules and we've all known what they are for a very long time. Why any politician would chose to ignore them or take the view they are above them is beyond me.

Rarely has Canberra looked so chaotic and disappointingly, at a time we need to be just the opposite. So we are now off to a by-election in New England which of course, includes the Upper Hunter Shire, the towns I represented until the last election. No doubt then I'll be reacquainted with many of my former constituents over the course of the next month. I'm looking forward to it!

Two government reports released recently delivered bad news in areas important to our electorate. The Productivity Commission (PC) expressed significant concerns about the speed at which the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) is being rolled-out and that this could undermine its overall effectiveness. The PC's conclusion is consistent with my own experience in our region.

The NDIS is a critically important project, not just for people with disability and their families but the whole community. It offered so much hope to so many. But too many people are feeling let down. That is the key message I receive at my NDIS forums and when dealing with individual cases. It's an unacceptable situation. The second report came from the Telecommunications Industry Ombudsman. It reported a 160 per cent increase in complaints about services under the National Broadband Network. I wasn't surprised and few who have switched over to the NBN will be.

My office is constantly bombarded by complaints about the NBN roll out. Once again it is a scheme which offered so much but is failing people and businesses. Slow speeds, drop-outs and landline problems are the common complaints. Many report that the speeds they are experiencing are slower than their old ADSL2 service.

The decision to scrap the fibre-to-thepremises was a bad one. We needed to do the job once and properly. And the way the cost continues to blow-out while service levels fall beggars belief. I continue to speak out in the Parliament on both the NDIS and the NBN and we are doing all we can locally to fix the problem.

Senate Estimates revealed a shocking 55 million phone calls to Centrelink went unanswered in the 2016-17 financial year. That's up from the 26 million missed calls from the previous year. It means that every hour, around 27,000 calls to Centrelink are going unanswered. Centrelink is in crisis. Those affected are our aged pensioners, disability pensioners, and young people negotiating youth allowance rules while studying, the unemployed and families with children with disability or with elderly loved ones in need of help. Something has to be done about it.

Step 1 is to appoint a new CEO on \$\$millions per year plus a nice little bonus if the share price goes up. Step 2, the new CEO slashes the workforce, and anyone that actually serves the customer. Step 3, as a result of all of the sacked workers and the fall of customer service, the profits go up and so does the share price. Step 4, the CEO gets a massive bonus payment because the share price has gone up. Step 5, the CEO leaves the business, with a bumper golden-handshake payout, before the complaints from frustrated customers rise to the surface. Step 6, repeat Steps 1

During this past week I have had the great misfortune to need some help from one of our major telecommunications companies, formerly owned by the people of Australia. To say that the customer service was hopeless, would be a compliment to just how terrible it was. It starts with them trying to hide their phone number and goes backwards from there. After searching around their website and trying some of their "self-help" tips, I finally uncover the elusive phone number. I then spend 2.5 hours on the phone and the internet, being passed around to 10 or 12 different staff. I still didn't get a result. In the end, I was given a secret pin code that would fix everything; I just had to enter it into my phone. Needing to hang up the phone, to enter this pin code, I was set to lose my current staff contact that I had spent more than 2 hours getting to. He assured me that he would ring back almost immediately to check that everything was okay. Predictably, the secret pin code didn't work at all. I waited for the call back. I waited. I went to bed several hours later, no call. I spent the next day waiting for that call, no call came. While waiting for that call, I went back online to try to solve my own enquiry. This "self-help" approach is what they really want me to do, because talking to a staff member requires them to have staff. Online "self-help" is much cheaper, uses far less staff and the staff undoubtedly works under much poorer conditions. The many many many pages, within the company website, that I explored, I found to be all equally hopeless, unless of course the purpose of them is to send you around in circles. So again I rang the secret phone number hidden deep within their website. My phone call experience this second time was identical to the previous afternoon (see above). More than 5 hours later, I still don't have the help that I needed. I just want a copy of my bill/payment history for one of my devices. Time to change providers I guess, to go to another corporate with the same business

SIMPLER PLANNING RULES FOR PRIMARY PRODUCERS AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT Our Upper Hunter electorate is set to

benefit from the proposed changes to

planning rules which will make it simpler for rural and primary production industries in regional NSW, helping farmers to get on with their jobs. Consultation is due to start on the proposal which will look to combine five primary production and rural development planning policies into one. The NSW Nationals in Government are committed to simplifying the process for our regions to enable a streamlined approach to planning as Primary production is one of NSW's biggest industries, generating millions in export income and employing tens of thousands of people, particularly in regional areas. Our Government's proposals will remove confusion about the kinds of intensive livestock operations requiring planning approval so commercial operators, councils and the community all understand the requirements. I encourage interested stakeholders to review the proposal and submit their comments for consideration. The State's primary industries have grown more than 30% since this Government was elected and are now worth a record \$15.44 billion. These proposed changes would allow a more simplified process, meaning our farmers would be able to get on with the day-to-day job of running a farm. I encourage producers and industry to provide feedback on the proposal. The changes will mean approvals are not needed for essential small scale, low impact activities like temporary housing or feeding of animals, routine maintenance of irrigation infrastructure, and stock containment facilities. The changes will also support feral goat depots.

The proposed policy changes are now on public exhibition for an extended eight-week period until 18 December. Any of our interested local landowners, individuals, and industry operators are encouraged to make a submission and share their views on the proposed changes.

HOTLINE ON BOXING DAY TRADE

As there have been changes regarding trading on Boxing Day, I wish to advise that there is a dedicated hotline available for workers and businesses to help ensure they are aware of their rights and responsibilities in the lead up to Boxing Day trade. New laws provide strict safeguards to protect workers, with retailers who force staff to work on December 26 facing fines of up to \$11,000 per employee. Penalties of up to \$22,000 will apply for landlords that force tenants to open on Boxing Day.

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
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Snake bites

Australia has some 140 species of land snake, and around 32 species of sea snakes have been recorded in Australian waters About 100 Australian snakes are venomous. bAlthough only 12 are likely to inflict a wound that could kill you. These include Taipans, Brown snakes, Tiger snakes, Death Adders, Black snakes, Copperhead Snakes, Rough Scaled snakes as well as the many sea snakes Most snake bites happen when people try to kill or capture them. If you come across a snake, don't panic. Back away to a safe distance and let it move away.

when disturbed Different types of snake bites

Dry bites

A dry bite is when the snake strikes but no venom is released. Dry bites will be painful and may cause swelling and redness around the area of the snake

Because you can't tell if a snake's bite is a dry bite always assume that you have been injected with venom, and manage the bite as a medical emergency. Once medically assessed, there is usually no need for further treatment, such as with antivenoms. Many snake bites in Australia do not result in envenomation, and so they can be managed A pressure immobilisation without antivenom.

Venomous bites

Venomous bites are when the snake bites and releases venom (poison) into a wound. Snake venom contains poisons which are designed to stun, numb, or kill other animals.

PHARMACY ADVISOR Symptoms of a venomous bite include:

severe pain around the bite, tingling, stinging, burning or abnormal feelings of the skin, feeling anxious nausea (feeling sick) or vomiting (being sick), dizziness, breathing difficulties, problems swallowing stomach pain, irregular heartbeat, muscle weakness, confusion & paralysis, coma or death (in the most severe cases).

In Australia, there are approximately one to four deaths a year from venomous snake bites.

Snake identification

Identification of venomous snakes can be made from venom present on clothing or the skin using a so called 'venom detection' kit. For this reason do not wash or suck the bite or discard clothing. It's not recommended to kill the snake for purposes of identification, because medical services do not rely on visual identification of the snake species. Antivenom is Snakes often want to escape available for all venomous First aid for snake bites

For all snake bites, provide emergency care including cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) if needed. Call triple zero (000) for an ambulance. Apply a pressure immobilisation bandage and

keep the person calm and as still as possible until medical help arrives. Avoid washing the bite area

because any venom left on the skin can help identify the snake.

DO NOT apply a tourniquet cut the wound or attempt to suck the venom out.

Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) Learn how to perform CPR. **Pressure immobilisation** bandage

bandage is recommended for anyone bitten by a venomous snake.

This involves firmly bandaging the area of the body involved, such as the arm or leg, and keeping the person calm and still until medical help arrives. If



possible, mark the site of the bite on the bandage with a pen.

A guide to pressure immobili sation bandages can be found on the Australian Venom Research Unit (AVRU) website.


Anaphylactic shock Snake bites can be painful. Occasionally some people have a severe allergic reaction to being bitten. In cases of severe allergic reaction, the whole body can react within minutes to the bite which can lead to anaphylactic shock. Anaphylactic shock is very serious and can be fatal. Symptoms of anaphylactic shock may include: swelling of the mouth, throat or tongue, difficulty swallowing, difficulty breathing or shortness of breath or wheezing, difficulty talking, a rash that may appear anywhere on the body, itching – usually around your eyes, ears, lips, throat or roof of the mouth, flushing (feeling hot and red) stomach cramps, feeling or being sick, feeling weak, collapsing or falling unconscious Call triple zero (000) for an ambulance. If the person has a

'personal action plan' to manage a known severe allergy, they may need assistance to follow their plan. This may include administering adrenaline to the person via an autoinjector (such as an Epipen®) if one is

The Australasian Society of Clinical Immunology and Allergy recommends that for a severe allergic reaction adrenaline is the initial treatment.



How to remove mould once and for all



It's as big a mystery as the Bermuda Triangle. We've all seen it at some stage in our lives, but why it's there and why we can't get rid of it (in

some cases) remains a mystery. Yes, I'm talking about mould – and in case you didn't know, it's bad for you.

I spoke to Shaun Primmer from Ventilate Your Home about how to clean mould and what you should do if you discover mould in your house. Shaun kindly even shared a natural mould killer with us...

What is mould? Mould is part of a group of common organisms called fungi. It comes in many forms but is typically white, green, grey or black. Mould spores generate in moist, damp, humid conditions and live off the proteins from timber, leather, ceilings and walls.

The spores tend to germinate in the sub-floor area and evaporate up into homes where there is a high moisture content. Mould thrives in damp, dark areas. That's why you can often find it in cupboards, behind furniture and on the underside of dresser drawers.

How can I remove mould from my home?

- Try to locate where the source of the problem is. Mould can generate in many ways, so make a list of what causes moisture in your home.
- 2. Speak to an expert and assess how bad the problem is. Do you need to get a professional in to kill and clean the mould?
- Look to eliminate the problem for good by using preventative measures such as subfloor ventilation systems and moisture barriers.

What kills mould?

You can kill mould naturally by using a diluted mixture of 4 parts natural brewed vinegar to 1 part water. After applying simply wash the area with a damp cloth and leave to dry.

How do I get rid of mould in the bathroom?

Firstly establish where the mould in your bathroom is and the damp areas and try to eliminate or ventilate the moisture. Mould is an environmental problem so you need to alter the environment in which its breeding. Make sure you

have adequate ventilation in the sub-floor of your bathroom.

To remove mould in bathrooms, try running your exhaust fan for longer to get rid of the excess moisture in the air. If your fan is venting into the ceiling space, call a handyman to install a flue (a duct for conveying exhaust gases to the outdoors). It's far more effective to have the bathroom fan exhausting to the atmosphere rather than your roof space.

Any tips for getting rid of mould for renters?

If you're renting and your home has mould. immediately advise your landlord in writing. Do some research and try to understand where you're introducing moisture into your home, then work backwards to eliminate it. For example, is it mould in the bathroom, or do you need to get rid of black mould on walls? Understanding what causes mould to grow will help prevent the problem from reoccurring.

How else can I prevent mould in my house?

Air purifiers are devices that filter the air and help keep a house dry. They're usually quite costly options but If required are well worth the investment.

It takes many months for that halting step to develop into a sturdy gait, but as toddlers become walkers, they open the door to independence, exploration, and, eventually, productivity. And just as walking is a signal achievement for each person, the two-footed upright gait is a banner accomplishment for our species. In fact, walking is one of the things that distinguishes man from all other animals.

Walking is an automatic, intrinsic human function, and it serves many practical roles. Strange as it seems, though, modern man appears determined to walk as little as possible. Not many men would walk five miles to work — but remarkably few choose to walk even a half mile to a friend's house or neighbourhood store. And it's not just a question of walking for transportation; moving walkways whisk us through airports, and elevators and escalators lure many able-bodied men away from stairways. If the

In all, these studies evaluated 459,833 participants who were free of cardiovascular disease when the investigations began. Each of the studies collected information about the participants' walking habits along with information about cardiovascular risk factors, including — in most studies - age, smoking, and alcohol use and, in many cases, additional health data as well. The participants were tracked for an average of 11.3 years, during which cardiovascular events (angina, heart attack, heart failure, coronary artery bypass surgery, angioplasty, and stroke) and deaths were recorded. The meta-analysis makes a strong case for walking. In all, walking reduced the risk of cardiovascular events by 31%, and it cut the risk of dying during the study period by 32%. One of the nice things about walking is that you don't need special skill, much less lessons. The main thing is to walk naturally and comfortably. But if you want to aim for an ideal stride, a few tips may help. Try to keep your posture erect with your chin up, your eyes forward, and your shoulders square. Keep your back straight, belly flat, and butt tucked in. Keep your arms close to your torso, bent at the faster pace, or both enjoyed elbow. Take a natural stride, but try to lengthen your stride as you improve. Land on your heels, and then roll forward to push off with your toes. Swing your arms with each stride, and keep up a steady,

In South Australia, for example, state law requires that building insurance must be issued for all domestic building work (which includes pools and spas) worth more than \$12,000 in total value.

"The purpose of this insurance is to ensure that you end up with a completed pool and/or spa holding a five-year structural warranty, without it you are totally unprotected and exposed to risk," states the SPASA South

3. Track history – Ask for testimonials, word of mouth anecdotes, do your research. "You are about to invest a large sum of money and should know who you are dealing with. Search your potential builder on the internet. Fair trading is also a good reference if there's been any legal action," says Simon.

4. Detailed quote - What's included and what's not? If it isn't set out in writing in your quote at the start it could end up a hidden extra cost to you at the end of the job... you don't want a nasty budget blowout when you should be busy blowing up your inflatable pool toys!

5. Professional credentials – Is your pool builder a member of SPASA, and can show proof of being licensed?

"SPASA has a very strict code of ethics for their pool builders and to be a member of SPASA you need to be licensed, insured and have had a credit rating check," Simon says. Finally, is everyone under your roof a competent swimmer?

If not, try to start lessons asap; you can use your future home pool to practice growing skills in a safe and technically sound way. "Attend lessons and use the home pool to practice what they learn at lessons," advises Di Palmer of State Swim.

"Without this, children will quickly learn to navigate their way around their own pools but can develop bad habits, finding themselves unable to get out of a dangerous situation later in life."



Branxton Greta Business Chamber successful AGM

- 1. Andrew Constance, working then with Cessnock City Council the BGBC was able to convince the transport minister of the importance from a safety and welfare issue resulting in the provision of bus shelters to be installed on the site. The concrete slabs have already been installed – just awaiting the shelters.
- 2. Urgent upgrade of the footpath from the Elderslie Road end of Miller Park to the traffic light opposite the Branxton Pool. The chamber again in detailed discussions with Cessnock City Council have resulted in this valuable upgrade.
- 3. The replacement of the bus stop shelter in Greta. The shelter was written-off after a motor vehicle accident. Replacement of this shelter was long overdue.

Raising the profile of the Branxton – Greta Memorial Cycle and walkway. Working with Cessnock City Council we have managed to raise the profile of the significance of this vital piece of infrastructure that will enable connectivity of both towns viz., Branxton & Greta, also providing a safe way for people from Greta, for example, to access the Branxton Memorial Pool and Miller Park sporting fields. This project is in the top 5 priorities for Cessnock City Council. Cessnock City Council has submitted a grant application under 'Resources for Regions' to enable this to be built & at the same time the BGBC has submitted a grant under the same programme to enable the memorial aspects to be installed. Both Cessnock City Council and the BGBC are yet to hear the outcome. However, after discussions with Clayton Barr MP Member for Cessnock we should hopefully hear before the end of this year.

BGBC has also raised the need to upgrade the corner of Elderslie Road. The site is currently used by water trucks and Cessnock City Council trucks as a stockpile site. The BGBC has raised safety concerns - discussions continue, and

Other issues are the general connectivity with all the local communities with kerb and guttering including the provision of footpaths – discussions continue.

Throughout the past 12 months the BGBC has attended meetings with Cessnock City Council, Singleton Council, the NSW Business Chamber and both state and federal politicians. 

His Dance Hall, prominent on the corner of High and Water

Streets, Greta for the greater part of this century, was no doubt one of the most influential buildings to grace this small town and played a out. major role in the day to day life of our community. Charlie, one time publican and councillor, lived locally from 1910 to 1942, watching many dramatic social changes taking place. From vaudeville to silent and movie pictures, through the Great World war and serious depression, onto another world war. His town weathered those great tides of change with fortitude and good humour. Beswicks' was a safety valve, unwinding the many frustrations of all those changes, offering fun and frolic, in the day to day pursuit of life's often difficult journey.

Earliest vaudeville's days of the stage and live entertainment fostered home grown talented artists, with comedy and drama feeding art expression, flourishing beneath the surface of this small coalminer's town. Self taught musicians vented their considerable skills at every opportunity in the home, at family gatherings, at wakes, weddings or birthday celebrations. Nothing could stop singers good and bad, standing bolt upright beside a piano, to rattle the rafters with heart wrenching dirges of 'The Old folk at Home', 'Danny Boy' or 'Take Me Home Again

Kathleen'. Many were frustrated **Cassidy'**. that his followers would artists hungering to express a latent try anything for a hard talent. Community singing flourished when hundreds gathered in the Hall and sang their hearts

Life in the twenties moved on to the new phenomenon Moving Pictures, when Charlie Beswick invested in a projector. Across the screen heroes mouthed all sorts of unheard sweet nothings, and piano player Lily Sinclair belted out a range of sentimental old favourites, setting the need for an audience totally struck with the apparent reality of it all. With their appetites whetted, Al Jolsen exploded into life with his 'Mammy' son in the Jazz Singer and talking movies were off and

Just about then the 1930's **Depression** came to blight our lives, jobs disappeared, money was tight, but the hunger for entertainment lived on. Saturday nights outside Charlie's Picture Show, young 'Dole' faces stood in groups planning free entry to the inside. An assortment of used tickets gave them hope. Wait for lights out, rush forward in a group and confuse Charlie at the door. In that confusion everyone made it to a seat for a moment or two, until his old eyes unearthed the ticket scam. His flashing torch searched out a number of villains crawling under seats, desperate to evade capture. Such was the influence of cowboy hero 'Hopalong

uncomfortable seat inside, and all because they were penniless.

It wasn't as though the show ran smoothly, for Charlie's single projector, stopped to change the spool every twenty minutes. While waiting we chatted in the dark for minutes, until the frantic galloping shooting cowboys were off and chasing once more, making Saturday night at Charlie's dream castle, a once a week cloud nine journey. Accompanied with a half time blistering hot pie from Mrs Mackinnon's shop next door, brought the whole world of make believe so close, you could almost

With the paint long worn from its exterior, the dusty well trodden gravel footpath circling it to the dingy lit dunny out back, three big sandstone steps to the front porch door, the pokey little ticket box with Mrs Beswick's face wanting sixpence, foot stamping kids on long hard stools, the flea infested back rows of torn and worn seats, passionate lovers dreaming nonsense in a hot embrace, the scratchy sound and dust rising through the glare of the projection light, outrageous laughter and shock horror when the villain kidnapped a pretty girl, all made for a once a week trip to Heaven in High Street. Regretfully vanishing when the lights went on, and cold reality

stalked the night as we walked the disillusioned long streets home, at midnight.

Charlie's Central Hall lived on throughout the 30's bleak years, dances fully patronised, were strictly 'no drink' affairs, even though the fellas shared a bottle of Bill Walker's cheap wine under the peppercorn trees out front. The cop stood at the door, warning young males taking out their frustrations on one another, in a friendly punchup on the grass, middle of unlit High

Parents chaperoned their daughters

inside, sat on stools beside the dance floor, the men shuffled around the doorway ready to charge in, when M.C. Ernie O'Donnell announced 'gentlemen take your partners for the Barn Dance'. The floor scarred from winter skating, clagged with chewing gum from picture night, kero and sawdust swept slippery for another terpsichorean boy meets girl fling, set the stage of romance fun and whatever. It was here many of today's long relationships blossomed as touching hands held, starting something only this dance hall was privy to. This friendly social meeting place, this Alladin's cave, this unhallowed hall of mirrors, now unhappily gone from the centre stage of town, helped so much in the

making of a world, the memories of which, few of us will ever forget. (Charlie Beswick and his wife left Greta about 1942 to retire to Newcastle, having been a part of our Greta through thirty years of good and bad times. Vale to the Beswicks and the part they played in our lives.)

The Armistice day, remembrance service will be held this year at the Branxton Rotunda on Saturday 11th November. The Service will start a 10:45 am sharp.

At the end of the service, a soil collection will take place at the site. This will involve local school pupils taking soil samples at the rotunda, that will be forwarded to the Dept. of Veteran Affairs in Sydney. The samples will be interned in the "Upgraded Anzac Memorial at Hyde Park", to signify the enormous sacrifice of our WW1 enlistments from Branxton.


Originally called Armistice Day, this day commemorated the end of the hostilities for the Great War (World War I), the signing of the armistice, which occurred on 11 November 1918—the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. Armistice Day was observed by the Allies as a way of remembering those who died, especially soldiers with 'no known grave'.

On the first anniversary of the armistice, in 1919, one minute's silence was instituted as part of the main commemorative ceremony. In London, in 1920, the commemoration was given added significance with the return of the remains of an unknown soldier from the battlefields of the Western Front.

The Flanders poppy became accepted throughout the allied nations as the flower of remembrance to be worn on Armistice Day. The red poppies were among the first plants that sprouted from

the devastation of the battlefields of northern France and Belgium. 'Soldiers' folklore had it that the poppies were vivid red from having been nurtured in ground drenched with the blood of their

After the end of World War II in 1945, the Australian and British governments changed the name to Remembrance Day as an appropriate title for a day which would commemorate all war dead.

I used to think Dan Brown was merely a crackpot. Now I wonder if he might not be a prophet.

What once seemed to be his deranged fantasy increasingly looks like our daily reality. In our myth-maddened world. we are befuddled by bloggers peddling conspiracy theories and menaced by transactions on the dark web; we can't cross a road without

dreading some runaway act of messianic terror, and we experience an implosion of identity if we lose our smartphones or forget our passwords. In listing those perils I have

summed up the plot of Brown's new novel Origin: whether or not we read his apocalyptic thrillers, we are living inside them. Origin stirs up again the witches' brew that Brown

first concocted in The



Brown's novels are treasure hunts set in a 24-hour period, and feature the recurring themes of cryptography, keys, symbols, codes, and conspiracy theories. His books

have been translated into 52 languages, and as of 2012, sold over 200 million copies. Three of them, Angels & Demons (2000), The Da Vinci Code (2003), and Inferno (2013), have been adapted into films.

Brown's novels that feature the lead character Robert Langdon also include historical themes and Christianity as motifs, and as a result, have generated controversy. Brown states on his website that his books are not anti-Christian, though he is on a 'constant spiritual journey' himself, and says that his book The Da Vinci Code is simply "an entertaining story that promotes spiritual discussion and debate" and suggests that the book may be used "as a positive catalyst for introspection and exploration of our faith'

Dan Gerhard Brown was born on June 22, 1964 at Exeter Hospital. He has a younger sister, Valerie (born 1968) and brother, Gregory (born 1975). They were raised in Exeter, New Hampshire, where Brown attended Exeter's public schools until the ninth grade. He grew up on the campus of Phillips Exeter Academy, where his father, Richard G. Brown, was a teacher of mathematics and wrote textbooks from 1968 until his retirement in 1997. his mother, Constance (née Gerhard), trained as a church organist and student of sacred music. Brown was raised an Episcopalian. He played squash, sang in the Amherst Glee Club, and was a writing student of visiting novelist Alan Lelchuk. Brown spent the 1985 school year abroad in Seville, Spain, where he was enrolled in an art history course at the University of Seville. Brown graduated from Amherst in 1986.

shoes" - is murdered while announcing a scientific discovery that will update Darwin and foretell our next evolutionary phase. The "reveal", as they call it in Hollywood, is delayed for 400 pages, but I doubt that I'll spoil anyone's enjoyment if I disclose that it turns out to consist of gobbledegook about "nucleotides" and "obligate endosymbiosis". Despite the chemical jargon and technical data, Brown remains a gothic novelist who is best when sending his characters to grope through mazy architectural spaces, his personal versions of Northanger Abbey or Hogwarts Academy. The action here hurtles from the titanium-scaled leviathan that is Gehry's Guggenheim museum in Bilbao to the skeletal carcass of Gaudi's Sagrada Familia in Barcelona, with a detour to the fascist mausoleum built by Franco in the Valley of the Fallen outside Madrid. Such caves of occult unreason are where Brown feels at home. Though his denouement

scientific amelioration of human ills and the need to replace warring religions with an all-purpose spirituality, Brown's true aims are more devious and deviant. His cryptic hints about malevolent global forces ratchet up our anxiety; blending the testimony of actual scientists such as Hawking and Dawkins with his own dotty or loony inventions, he produces a mentally corrosive mixture of truth and falsehood. Why should we trust a writer who thinks that Spain has a president not a prime minister, and who spells one of his favourite adjectives "collosal"? Here, to set beside the fake news that warps election results in what's left of the real world, is a specimen of phoney fiction, expertly designed to confuse the credulous. Yes, Brown is a prophet, and a false one – a Nostradamus for our muddled, crazed and

probably terminal times.



Top Internet tips and tricks The Internet is a vast and powerful resource and can be overwhelming for some users. Below we have provided my top tips and tricks for utilizing the Internet and an Internet

Take advantage of tabbed browsing

browser.

Take full advantage of tabbed browsing on all Internet browsers. While reading an article or browsing a website, you may come across a link that interests you. Any link to another page can be opened in a new tab so it does not interrupt your reading. To perform this action, hold down the Ctrl key and left-click the link. If you have a mouse with a wheel, click the link by depressing the wheel instead of rolling it. Either of the methods opens a link in a new window. Tip: To open an new blank tab, press Ctrl+T at the same

time. You don't need the http:// portion of a web page

When entering an Internet address, you do not need to type http:// or even www in the address. For example, if you wanted to visit The Branxton Greta Vineyards News, you could just type the branxtonnews.com.au and press Enter. To make things even quicker, if you are visiting a .com.au address you can type branxtonnews and then press Ctrl+Enter to type out the full https:// www.branxtonnews.com.au address.

Quickly move between the fields of a web page

If you are filling out an online form, e-mail, or other text field you can quickly move between each of the fields by pressing the Tab key or **Shift+Tab** to move back a field. For example, in the example form below you can click in the "First Name" field type anything and press tab to switch to the next field

Bonus Tip: You can also use the autofill feature to fill in common form fields.

Know your Internet browser shortcuts

There are dozens of different shortcut keys that can be used with Internet browsers. Below are a few of our top suggested Internet browser shortcuts.

- Press Alt+D or Ctrl+L to move the cursor into the address bar.
- Hold down the Ctrl key and press the + or - to increase and decrease the size of text. Ctrl+0 will reset the text
- Press the backspace key or press Alt key + left arrow to go back a page.
- Press F5 or Ctrl+R to refresh or reload a web page.
- Press F11 to make the Internet browser screen full screen. Press F11 again to return to the normal view.
- Press Ctrl+B to open your Internet bookmarks.
- Press Ctrl+F to open the find box to search for text within the web page you are reading.

Use Internet search engines to their full potential

Get the most out of every search result. If you are not finding what you want try surrounding the text in quotes. For example, searching for 'computer help' without quotes returns results with "computer" and "help" anywhere on the page However, if you search for "computer help" with the quotes it only return pages with "computer" and "help" next to each other.

Tip: In every search box you can press enter instead of using the mouse to click the Search button.

Try alternative browsers Most computer users use the default browser that comes included with the computer, with Microsoft Windows this is Internet Explorer. There are many great alternative browsers that are all free to download and use and may have features your current browser does not include. Below are a few of my favourites, try one or try

- Google Chrome
- Mozilla Firefox

Install plugins and add-ons All of the above alternative browsers also have a large community of volunteers who develop add-ons and plugins that can be added into the browser. Each of these browsers has hundreds of add-ons that can do such things like the current weather in your browser window, changing its colour, and adding additional functionality.

Make sure your browser and its plugins are up-todate

An Internet browser can have

many plugins that give it additional functionality. For example, Adobe Flash is a great way to bring movies and other animated content to the Internet. Keeping these plugins up-to-date is vital for your computer stability and also security. You can quickly verify if your plugins are up-to-date and get links to where to download the latest

Top Facebook tips Hide users, games, polls,

Film review: Bad Genius – exam cheating meets heist caper in thrilling Thai crowd-pleaser

Synopsis

'Ocean's Eleven' meets 'The Breakfast Club' in this multi award winning crime thriller about a straight-A student who devises an exams-cheating scheme which eventually rises to international levels. Based on true events!

Lynn, a genius high school student who makes money by cheating tests, receives a new task that leads her to Sydney, Australia. To complete the million-dollar task, Lynn and her classmates have to finish the international STIC(SAT) exam and deliver the answers back to her friends in Thailand before the exam takes place once again in her home country

A highly entertaining and surprisingly tense Thai caper revolving around a quartet of students who devise a test-cheating scheme for profit, Bad Genius is deserving of the rave reviews and commercial success it has won in its native country even if the finale suggests it was written to appease government censors. The story begins when Lynn (Thai model Chutimon Chuengcharoensukying, making her acting debut), a straight-A maths prodigy, befriends Grace (Eisaya Hosuwan) on her first day at an elite secondary school. Grace needs to pass the next test in order to be allowed to perform in the school play, and since the answers come so easily for Lynn, what's the harm in hooking a friend up? father is struggling for money? Structured like a Hollywood heist film – the cheating becoming more and more ambitious -Bad*Genius* is shot with style, mixing technically impressive cinemato graphy with just the right number of quick edits. And unlike other films with this subject matter, there is genuine weight to the actions of Lynn and her partner Bank (Chanon Santinatornkul), who are both from lower middle class backgrounds. But the finale flips the film on its head when charac-

considering the film had done a good job convincing the viewers that these students' actions are harmless, and that we should root for them. "To me 'cheating' means someone gets hurt. What we do doesn't hurt anyone. It's win-win," Lynn even tells Bank at one point. 

guess everyone of us had an unusual upbringing as there are no two upbringings alike, so please excuse this obscure and reticent statement; let's just say I had

unusual-unusual upbringing.

My parents, having given birth to three boys within four years, were in hindsight never afforded the opportunity of any perceptively normal family moments, as we were all born with 'on' buttons, yet devoid of an 'off'. My mother Robyn, who was the best mother in the entire world, didn't deserve the cards she was dealt. Put it this way, when Holly and I had little Poppy, the first girl born into the family for six generations, Mum seemed content for the first time. As hard as it is to admit these insightfully lurid reflections, they are in essence jam-packed with delightful melodrama and sentimentality which make for a good

Christmas was just another opportunity for my family to get drunk. My family drank a lot. A lot! I often joke that the reason we are winemakers is because it was just cheaper for us to make our own. People often joke with winemakers 'You better be careful or you'll drink all the profits!' With slight hesitance I can say from the heart.... I actually think we did! The only positive was that we were happy drinkers, as any negativity or aggression or violence was just not a part of our psyche. People were funny, conventions were to be poked fun at and nothing was sacrosanct. But all the while our laughter was in the bounds of a decent sort of Australian ethos – a do-untoothers Christian attitude within a Perce-the-Punter type of morality. It was always fun when the family partied ...that was when we felt like a family.

Every year we would spend Christmas Day with my Mother's sister and her family. They are still my favourite people. Now that Mum is no longer with us, I feel even closer to them. Christmas Day became a bit of a recipe from year to year. Instead of jumping from one reckless happening to another, I might take you through a typical (predictable) Christmas Day, starting as we walked through the door carrying boxes of wine and presents and excitedly downing our first ale.

Within minutes, my brothers and my cousins would be embracing our third beer and laughing about the events of the previous Christmas Day, such as when my youngest cousin Anto, fell asleep in the sun at Avoca Beach, only to wake up painted green from head to toe and dried vomit covering one side of his face. After a few more beers, we would sit down for a Champagne tasting, where my uncle would pull out some rare and treasured bottles of highly regarded labels, for us to peruse. As generous as his intentions, many bottles (and sometimes all of them) had been stored far too long in questionable cellaring conditions, yet every year he would ask for critical comments. The fact that my family is in wine and very fond of Champagne, forced a biased notion that in order for any positive comments, the product would have to be pretty special. Every single year, my uncle would sulk away from the table, with a translucent and dejected frown on his face. We had great pleasure seeing him like this and hearing his catch-cry"That's the last time I'm going to waste this stuff on you ungrateful buggers".....only for the next Christmas to roll around and on it goes.

Lunch would consist of prawns and oysters and delicious turkey and ham and all the Christmassy delights you can think of. My brothers and I were never big eaters, as we would rather leave more room in our stomachs for beer, wine and Cognac but we picked here and there just to be polite. Lunch really was a formula and every year was the same. We would 'pop' those what-cha-ma-call-its and pull the little package out of them, containing a paper hat, a small toy and a small sheet of jokes and spend the next ten or so minutes in child-like fashion, utilising this window of opportunity to cling to the past and familiar territory of Christmas Day. They're a catch 22, those things. You almost embarrassingly don the hat and sit there feeling like

a bit of a goose, wrestling with yourself to take it off, yet, when you do, you realise everyone else is still donning theirs and so you feel even more selfconscious and a bit of a party-pooper, so you put the bloody thing back onhhhhmmmm!

Following this, the well utilised and predictably enigmatic sarcasm would

'Hey Marshy what did you buy Uncle Tony for Christmas this year?" my cousin Johnny would ask, in front of everyone. My uncle Tony was one of the more prominent figures in the church (of England) and a hard person to buy presents for. One year, I decided to buy him a 'bong' for a bit of a laugh and did we get a laugh! Not because of the obvious ironic nature of the item but because he thought it was some kind of 'trendy candle-holder'. When he passed away some years ago, my mother and aunty and a few elder ladies from the church's hierarchy were packing up his things from his house when they stumbled upon this thing. Apparently it was sitting on a small tray, covered in melted wax. One could just imagine my uncle and some of the other church figures (including George Pell) sitting there discussing the serious issues of the church with a bong sitting on the table in front of them.

By the end of lunch, my eldest brother Simon would be pie-eyed and need to have a rest and every year he would consequently lose an eyebrow (and maybe a bit of skin...and a litre or two of blood). The fun started though, when the Cognac came out. Cognac is one of the most spiritual beverages and a pleasure to consume in small amounts. What a shame we could never enjoy it in this manner on Christmas Day. One minute you're sitting there relaxed and enjoying the afternoon chatting away and the next, you're tripping off your head on Cognac. The civilised look of brandy balloons and intelligent banter disguised the drunken façade of the clan. Before long, the old English rugby songs would begin. Given the perky lilt of some of them and the party spirit in which they were always sung, it suggested to my youthful imagination a bunch of rosycheeked wenches bearing flagons of ale in a scene of general merriment and abandon before a blazing Yule log in a hall decked with holly.....and with this in mind, you can plainly see the benefits of only ever drinking Cognac in moderation. We would repeatedly sing the same songs until the majority of us were comfortably horizontal and then the Port would come out! One tip when drinking port don't play drinking games with it....ever! The last time we did this on Christmas Day, we ended up sitting in a dinghy off Avoca beach and were dragged down to Kilcare, where a fishing trawler picked us up. We had all passed out.

Now I could go further and tell you a lot more of the typical antics of my family's Christmas Day festivities but I will save some for next year. Just remember though, always drink with a merry heart. The merrier you are – the more you can drink. Never take your little paper Christmas hat off; always use a 'sharp' razor when shaving someone's eyebrow off and when a cheeky nephew hands you something that looks like a piece of plumbing equipment it is not a trendy candle holder!












Saleyard report - cattle

Singleton Report date 1/11/17

(Comparison Date 25/10/17) Yarding 1100 Change -130

It was a pretty good quality yarding with a good selection of trade cattle along with the usual lightweight calves suitable or the restockers. There was also a better selection of grown steers and cows than previous sales.

Young cattle to the trade sold at similar rates with prime steer yealers selling from 320c to 352c while the prime heifer yealers to the trade sold from 290c to 352c/kg. Young steers to the restockers were fully firm selling from 292c to 405c while the young heifers were a little cheaper selling from 278c to 388c/kg. Feeders were firm with the feeder steers selling from 276c to 334c while the feeder heifers sold to 302c/kg.

Grown steers were 8c dearer with the prime medium and heavy weights selling from 260c to 280c/kg. Grown heifers were 4c dearer selling to 270c/kg. Cows were 5c to 8c dearer. 2 score cows sold from 180c to 200c to the processors and 205c to the restockers. The better 3 and 4 score cows sold from 212c to 238c with the prime heavy weights averaging 235c/kg. Bulls sold to

265c/kg.

Scone report date 31/10/17

(Comparison Date 24/10/17) Yarding 1336 Change 56

Numbers lifted slightly and there were more light young cattle offered. Restockers and backgrounders were most active. Trade cattle were limited and there were fewer grown cattle penned. The cow run was lighter with more cows falling into the medium weight range. There were more Bos Indicus cattle offered and plenty of Euro infused cattle penned in a dearer

Steer vealers to restockers were firm to 8c dearer ranging from 318c to 362c with the light weights reaching 382c/kg. Restocking heifers were firm, selling between 280c and 324c/kg. Heavy trade vealers were 8c stronger, selling to 340c/kg. Yearling heifers returning to the paddock lifted 10c and ranged from 270c to 323c while steers topped at 348c/kg. The trade steers were firm, selling between 292c and 317c and heifers 286c to 333c/kg.

Grown steers were similar but increased on average with a few more young steers offered. Steers and bullocks over 500kg ranged from 250c to 270c/kg. The medium weight cows were 8c dearer, selling from 218c to 235.6c and the heavy 3 and 4 scores were firm, selling from 205c to 230c to average 226c/kg.

TRLX Tamworth report date 30/10/17

(Comparison Date 23/10/17) Yarding 1294 Change –450

There was a reduced penning with the numbers down by 500 head. Overall it was a good quality, well finished penning with yearlings well supplied. There were sufficient numbers of light weight young cattle to attract strong restocker competition. There was also a good supply of heavy grown steers, to be expected at this time of year, and a limited supply of cows. All the usual buyers were in attendance.

Demand was solid through the young cattle with both restockers and feedlotters active. Market trends through the steer portion were firm to dearer with light weights significantly more expensive week-onweek. Medium and heavy yearling steers to restock and feed were only marginally dearer. Yearling heifers saw a firm to easier market trend with light weights unaffected. The medium and heavy weight feeder heifers sold to a slightly easier trend. Heavy grown steers sold on a firm to dearer market trend with some sales improving

by 5c/kg. Age and quality were factors in the price ranges. There was little change in the cow market with prices mostly remaining the same.



Black Caviar relation's historic Caulfield Cup win

Two outsiders, Boom Time and Single Gaze, who finished first and second in the 17 runner field that contested the 2017 edition of the \$3million Caulfield Cup, arguably the world's most prestigious handicap at 2400m, were sired at the Arrowfield stud at Scone and have pedigrees that suggests they would be more at home in big sprint races than pitting themselves against some of the world's best stayers.

Boom Time, the impressive winner of the Cup under Cory Parish, is a 6-year-old stallion by Arrowfield bred and raced 1995 Golden Slipper winner Flying Spur and out of a mare, Bit of a Ride, closely related to Black Caviar by another sire used at Arrowfield, Snippets.

Gallant in finishing second, Single Gaze is a 5-year-old mare by another sire bred and used at Arrowfield, Not A Single Doubt, a performer who never won beyond 1200 metres, and from Redaluca's Gaze, a winner of three races, 1000m-1900m, produced by Crying in the Rain, a winner nine races 1000m-1800m by Sanction, a Biscay who won six races at 1200m in Sydney.

at1400m or less. She was the best of five winners from Lover's Chariot, a Zephyr Zip non-winner sold at seven at an Inglis sale in 2004 for \$7,000. Since that sale, the quality of her immediate family has improved dramatically through the deeds of offspring of her unraced half-sisters Song of Kingston (by

> Norway (Vain). Song of Kingston's main claim to fame has been as the dam of Muirfield Village (by Exit Five B (USA), a winner in Sydney of three races, including the Group 2 Hill Stakes, and second in the Victoria Derby and Spring Champion Stakes.

Far more illustrious has been the sprouts from Song of Norway, producer of four stakes winners headed by Scandinavia (Snippets; 4 wins, QTC Cup-G2, VATC Blue Diamond Prelude-G3, Group1 placed SAJC Goodwood H, VRC Salinger S, Newmarket, Lightning H, MRC Oakleigh Plate).

Offspring of Scandinavia have lifted the family to elite statue. She is the dam of seven stakes winners including Group1 performers Magnus (Flying Spur; 4 wins, 6 Group1 cheques, first AJC Galaxy H, second VRC Newmarket, Lightning S, MRC Oakleigh Plate, third MRC Oakleigh Plate, fourth VRC Newmarket, also third Royal

Wilander (Exceed and Excel; 4 wins, MRC Schillaci S-G2, Blue Diamond Prelude-G3, fourth VRC Lightning S; sire) and Scandiva (Fastnet Rock; 2 wins at 2, ATC Magic Night S-G2, second ATC Sires' Produce Stakes-G1).

In addition, Helsinge, an unraced daughter of Scandinavia by the Green Desert sire Desert Sun (GB), has become a celebrated broodmare as the mother of one of the greatest sprinters the world has produced, Black Caviar (by Bel Esprit), and also of All Too Hard (by Flying Spur sire Casino Prince).

In earning over \$7.3 million, Hall of Fame inducted Black Caviar won all 25 starts (1000m-1200m), 15 of them at Group1 level – a record, including one at Royal Ascot, and collected titles of overall World Champion for 2013, World Champion Sprinter in four successive years, 2010 -13, Australian Horse of the Year three times, Champion Sprinter three times and European Champion Sprinter 2012.

Her brother Moshe, a performer whose five starts included three smart wins at 1000m is siring good winners from use alongside Magnus at Sun Stud (formerly Eliza Park) at Kerrie in Victoria.

When Black Caviar headed the World Rankings for 2013 (4yos

Ascot King's Stand Stakes; sire), up), the youngest performer high up was her half-brother All Too Hard, only a 3-year-old in Australia but treated as a 4-yearold in the assessments. A resident at the Vinery Stud, Segenhoe Valley, Scone, All Too Hard is now one of the leading young sires in Australia.

The family that produced this galaxy of racing stars was established in Australia with the importation in 1980 of Boom Time's third dam Love Song. Deceased at 14, she was a Denmark bred winner of the Danish Oaks and runner up in the Swedish Oaks by Warpath, a Sovereign Path (Grey Sovereign) product who was a competent racehorse up to 2000m and a handy sire.

man with a midas touch in business, breeding and racing last century who bred some wonderful racehorses using a broodmare band that included a number of importations modest in breeding and performance.

Two chosen out of a Tesio paddock in Italy by Hains' consultant, now deceased iconic Australian golfer Norman Von Nida, that produced performers he bred and raced were Ada Hunter, dam of one of the mightiest gallopers of all time, Kingston Town (by Bletchingly), and Ursula Lauderdale, mother

of Lowan Star (by Bletchingly's sire Biscay).

Trained by Tommy Smith, gelded Kingston Town galloped into the Australian Hall of Fame with 30 wins from 41 starts. He won 14 Group1 events, including the Cox Plate three times, Sydney Cup, AJC Derby and Queensland, and included in other efforts a neck second in the Melbourne Cup (1982) and a third in the Caulfield Cup

Lowan Star was not a Kingston Town, but her 11 wins from 27 outings included the Oaks in Sydney and Brisbane and placings at two at Randwick in the the Sires' Produce Stakes and Champagne Stakes. Like Kingston Town, Love Song was brought out for she was a performer who stayed Melbourne based David Hains, a 2400m by a track record setting sire who never went beyond 1200m.

Hains, unfortunately, had poor results with Love Song, and after producing two fillies who did not get to the races, Song of Norway (by Vain) and Song of Kingston (by Bletchingly, she was sold empty at broodmare sales. In consequence Scandinavia was bred, and raced, by leading racing identity Rob Crabtree and Mrs Y E Cratree and Lover's Chariot, grandam of Boom Time, by Mrs C M Webb.

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Making Smart Choices When You

As we head into summer, we start looking forward to lighter meals such as salads, grilled meats and barbeques. It is mportant to remember though that not all salads (or grilled meats) are created equal this was a topic of conversation when a riend and I walked past a kebab shop at



the weekend. He used to think kebabs were a healthy option - all things considered, they're just grilled meat, salad and a bit of sauce on a piece of flat bread aren't they? The reality is though a 'doner kebab" can be as much as 800 calories, or more than half of the recommended daily intake for a moderately active adult. This lead to a discussion about how, when you are watching what you eat, there are some real traps especially when eating out and it is easy to have your good intentions sabotaged. So I have put together my top tips for keeping your diet (and your body) healthy as we

Please note I am not a nutritionist and I can't give you specific "diet" advice – if you have specific health or diet issues you should speak with your doctor or a qualified nutritionist before changing our diet. That said, I hope by sharing my experiences and knowledge that you think more about the hoices you make and how to fit healthy eating into your day.

Aim to drink 6-8 glasses of water a day. I know some of you struggle with this but it is especially important when it is hot and you have been exercising. I have a Sodastream at home, so when I am working at home I try and have at least two bottles of Soda Water a day. I also make sure I have a glass of water every time I boil the kettle to make a cup of tea. When I am out and about I always ake a water bottle with me, and fill it up when I am near a tap. That way I spend less money on pottled water and soft drinks, and I am doing a little bit to save the environment! Staying hydrated keeps your cells and your internal organs healthy, and can also stop you feeling hungry, or help you feel fuller quicker

Eat More Fruit and Veg

Vegetables are your friend, so aim to increase the number of vegies you eat each day. Your entire diet should be around 50% vegetable, so try and eat as many as you can at each meal. If this seems oo hard, just try and increase the amount of vegetables you eat gradually each day. Maybe you can add a cob of corn to your dinner, or a home made tomato salsa (ok ok tomato is a fruit). Or a nome made egg and vegetable wedge can be great for lunch (or breakfast or dinner ...). Just make sure you cut it into slices and don't eat all of it at once!

Fresh Fruit is also a great handy snack. I saw a great pin recently which said "if you're not hungry enough to eat an apple, you're not really hungry"

Eat less processed food

Cut out processed foods. I know this is easier said than done, especially when convenience is important, but the longer the list of ingredients, the less "natural" the food (this also goes for shelf ife!). Try having only "one ingredient" foods in your pantry or fridge. For example keep a jar of nuts instead of a packet of nut bars, or some olive oil and balsamic vinegar instead of pre-made salad dressing which will have added preservatives and sugar

Sweet tooth?

Avoid artificial sweeteners and "sugar free" foods, and try to reduce the amount of processed sugar I always check the list of ingredients to see how much sugar has been added (if you follow tip number 3 you won't have this problem!), and I am quite often surprised. Like the time I bought a bottle of wasabi flavoured balsamic vinegar. The first time I put it on my salad, I was surprised how sweet it tasted. When I checked, one of the main ingredients was cane sugar! I also no longer have sugar in my tea or coffee, and there is no need to add it to your fruit - fruit is already sweet enough! Eating out

always ask for my salad dressing on the side. That way I can control exactly how much I put on my salad. You can also do this with gravy or sauce for your meat. This is especially important if you eat out a lot (ie more than once a fortnight). I know that most of the time when you eat out it is a treat, and you want to enjoy yourself. But if you are like me and you are on a few committees and the meetings are always held at the pub or the club, then you can find yourself eating out two or three times a week. I also order grilled (not fried or battered) meat – usually chicken or fish. Just be careful of the portion sizes – some pubs will serve you a "double" chicken breast which is close to 400g and three to four times the recommended "serve"

Opt for the healthy choice

Remember not all calories are created equal! This is a big one. If you are choosing a snack, think carefully about the choices you make. For example, a large banana and half a slice (approx. 40g) of chocolate cake are roughly equal in calories. But the banana is low GI, full of healthy vitamins and minerals, and will keep you feeling fuller for longer. So if your work colleagues are regularly holding morning teas, make sure you have a piece of fruit in your lunch bag. Your colleagues might make comments to start with, but once they know you are serious they will come to expect that you will say no to cake! If you are the person who used to always bring the cakes, try choosing healthier options, like fresh fruit with a chocolate dipping sauce

Clean out your kitchen/pantry and throw out anything which is out of date, or which is not going to help you reach your health and fitness/weight loss goals. If you can't bring yourself to throw food in the bin, and it is in date, give it to your neighbour or family members, or donate the items to charity And if your partner/family members absolutely must have treats, or other food you don't want to eat but find too tempting, as them to help you by only eating the treats when you are not around, or keeping the biscuits/cake etc somewhere where you will not find it!

Buy in bulk, but not too much! Buying in bulk can seem like a good way to save money, but not if the food perishes before you can eat it. It is also not worth buying in bulk if this results in you eating more than you planned to "because it's there". It is good though to buy food which is in season, so ry banding together with some friends and buying boxes of fresh fruit at the farmers market or local fresh providore. Set yourself a budget (so you don't go overboard and end up with more than you need - four of you might put in \$25 each) and see how much you can buy, then divide it between

mentioned before how hard it can be to buy a healthy snack when you are "on the run". Healthy snacks can also be quite expensive compared to packets of chips or lollies, this is generally because healthy snacks which are not highly processed have a shorter shelf life. The higher price reflects the nigher level of wastage on these products. I always have an apple or some other snack with me so I am not tempted to buy chips and I don't have to go hungry! I also try and cook meals in advance, so if I know I am going to be home late (which is four nights a week!) I have a healthy dinner ready to heat up rather than picking up take away. My "go tos" for cooking in advance are a quiche (easy to heat up and have with salad) and a stir fry (all I need to cook when I get home is the rice).

But what about the Doner Kebab?

One of the reasons kebabs have so many calories is not because they are full of unhealthy ingredients (be careful though if you want to load them up with all the extras, such as cheese and extra sauce). It is the size. A kebab can weigh over 700g. That is a big "sandwich". So if, like me, you love a Doner Kebab with lamb and hommus and tabouli, salad and a bit of BBQ sauce, have one as a treat occasionally. Or ask them to cut it in half and share it with a friend!

What else is happening at Louise Cairns Fit for Life?


