Not a rubbish dump!




How would you like to wake up and find this outside your front or back door every morning??? This is the sight that Branxton Op Shop volunteers see each day before they can enter the door and before they even

start to empty the bin provided for "drop offs". "Every householder is supplied with two bins; general garbage which is emptied weekly and recycled which is collected each fortnight," said a volunteer spokesperson. "Please use your own garbage bins for items we cannot use.

"If the goods you are dumping are dirty, greasy, paint stained or torn, we cannot use them. If toys are broken or damaged, or missing parts, we cannot use them. If you smoke we cannot use the clothes as the cigarette odour cannot be got rid of.

Residents reminded about high fronted roof gutters

Cessnock City Council is reminding local residents of the importance to ensure roof gutters and stormwater management systems are designed and installed by a licenced professional.

The incorrect design and installation of high fronted roof gutters and stormwater management systems have the potential to result in roofwater back-flowing into the roof or wall cavity during high rainfall

Water entering the building can cause damage to the building structure, as well as wall, ceiling and floor linings. Build-up of mould can also occur which has the potential to cause health problems for the occupants of the affected building.

Due to the water usually entering concealed parts of the building, any damage may not be evident for a long period of time which by then becomes a costly exercise to repair.

The requirements for the installation of high fronted gutters and associated stormwater management systems are regulated by the Building Code of Australia and related Australian Standards. Using a licenced professional who is appropriated skilled and experienced in undertaking roof plumbing is your best option to ensuring compliance with the Building Code of Australia.

In a continuation of our celebration of the one year anniversary of the Garden Organics service, Singleton Council is giving away another load of compost next week to our ratepayers.

Council's waste team gave away 1,000 native plant seedlings and 200 bags of compost in less than an hour on Sunday, and next week's giveaway is in direct response to Singleton's enthusiasm for green living. Council's hugely popular compost bins will also be available again for the sale price of \$20.

Acting Director Planning and Infrastructure Services Group, Mary-Anne Crawford said Council was thrilled with the response from the community.

"We opted to do our giveaway at the Sunday Market's in order to make it as accessible as possible for residents, and we were absolutely blown away with everyone's enthusiasm," she said.

"For those missed out on the weekend, please stop by Council's administration building next Wednesday between 10am and 12pm to collect a free bag of compost. We only have limited supply – so don't forget the early bird catches the worm!'

Singleton teamed up with Maitland and Cessnock councils and Solo Resource Recovery to introduce the green bin service in March last year. Since then, Singleton has collected 2,400 tonnes of organics waste that otherwise would have gone to landfill.

OK, so we need to measure each Party or candidate against a checklist. Ignoring preconceived ideas or deep rooted prejudices we may then make an informed choice about who we vote



I was particularly scathing of the way the Cessnock community had been treated over the expansion of Cessnock Corrective Centre. I said the manner in which the NSW Government has progressed the project was "a disgrace", citing its decision to change planning laws to avoid scrutiny and its failure to do anything to address the inevitable traffic, hospital and policing needs which would come with the expansion. I recognised the massive jail expansion will bring economic benefits for Cessnock, however, I am concerned the benefits will be outweighed by the problems caused in the absence of other physical and social investment. The Cessnock LGA is enjoying rapid population growth and has significant traffic congestion problems which will be made substantially worse by the jail expansion. The NSW Government can make up for the way it



Raising the BARR PETITION FOR SCHOOLS AND HOSPITALS BEFORE **STADIUMS**

As most will be aware, I had sent out a Petition calling for the Government to prioritise their spending of \$2.5B. Most would agree, even the keenest of sports fans, that schools and hospitals should surely receive funding before we indulge ourselves with sports stadiums. I want to thank the hundreds of people that have already returned their Petitions. Your support is greatly appreciated. I am hoping that our community can get more than 10,000 signatures which would force the Government to deal with the matter in Parliament. Given that one of the stadiums that might be knocked down and rebuilt is the Olympic Stadium at Homebush I thought that I would do some research into the Olympic spend. It turns out the entire Sydney Olympics cost the State of NSW \$1.5B including all sports and accommodation centres being built, as well as all competitions, temporary sites, transport, events and food and drink for the athletes. For anyone that has been to any of the Olympic venues across Sydney, most of course at Homebush, you would surely recognise that the build is enormous. It is hard to fathom how stadium

You will at times hear people talking about the deregulation of power prices or the possible re-regulation of the same. In NSW the Government made the decision to deregulate power in 2014. What this meant, in essence, is that the ceiling price was removed. That's right, the Government made the decision to remove any limits on the maximum price that could be charged. The logic used during that debate in Parliament was that by removing the maximum charge, the ceiling price, then more businesses would enter the market and that would create competition. It was also argued that people should contact each of the providers and "negotiate" a better price able to share information on for themselves. It was assumed that everyone had the power of negotiation. To use a comparison, consider the trick of buying a car and negotiating a price, or going

into a retailer and asking for

a discount on a shelf

product. The truth is that some people have the ability to do this, and others don't. It is fair to say that you have to have a fair bit of selfconfidence, as well as a willingness for confrontation and conflict, to be a good negotiator. Getting a 10% discount on electricity prices that have gone up by 30% doesn't make you better off. In the age of modern

telecommunications when people all over the world can be connected regardless of geography, it's interesting that demand for traditional transport options has kept pace with demand for faster internet speeds. Singleton Railway Station opened in 1863, the same year construction began on the first US transcontinental railroad and the year Henry Ford was born. Yet as the New England Highway put Singleton on the map as a motor transport gateway in NSW, passenger railway services steadily dwindled. It might be easy to blame the fall in the number of trains on insufficient passenger numbers and our greater dependency on cars. But we only need to look at the light rail revival in both Sydney and Newcastle to see that people want more options for getting around quickly and easily, regardless of distance, in the same way they want to be the latest iPhone. And, in the same way as cities and towns have grown and flourished for hundreds of years, ease of transport remains vital to the economic and social

wellbeing of urban centres

and the people who live in them.

That is particularly true for regional areas, and I would argue that Singleton is an exceptional case. There is no doubt the Hunter Expressway relaunched the motor gateway for Singleton, and more work needs to be done to make a New England Highway bypass for Singleton a reality. But as our economy diversifies and people swap long commutes for our country lifestyle, more passenger rail services must also be part of the future for Singleton, as they have been in the past. Council has long supported the Two More Trains for Singleton group and its

concerns about inadequate train services connecting Singleton with Newcastle and Sydney. The General Manager and I met with representatives from the group again

recently to continue the conversation and as a result, I have written to the Minister aluminium. The conditions for Transport, Andrew Constance, requesting a meeting to discuss opportunities and limits to providing more passenger trains between Singleton and Maitland.

Council got the message loud and clear through our community strategic process last year that transport services were a major issue for our community. I am committed to ensuring that that message is not only delivered, but heard on Macquarie Street. Cheers, Sue

Donald Trump has put "free-trade" back on everyone's mind. Free trade is international trading free of tariff barriers. A tariff is a tax on imports. It is paid by you and I every time we buy an imported good which attracts a tariff. Businesses pay too if they use an input to production which is subject to a tariff. That will be Donald Trump's first problem, the cost of producing goods in America is about to rise. Over time tariffs became common in most countries. They are a tax on all of us designed mainly to protect the local manufacturing sector in particular. In Australia families received help to pay the higher costs they faced on everything from cars to shoes – by higher wages set by a national tribunal. The higher wages were affordable thanks to our great terms-of-trade and the income we received from our rural exports - back then we lived "off the sheep's

It was all going pretty well until the world changed and our terms-of-trade deteriorated. As a small trading nation we then realised that to remain a wealthy country we would need to be competitive and taxes on imports were only making us uncompetitive. So we moved with the rest of the world in an attempt to ensure everyone lowered their tariff walls.

Unfortunately that push was only partly successful and remains incomplete. That's why there has been so much emphasis on so-called "freetrade agreements" between individual countries. They are a second-best result and their benefits are too often overstated. As are the things we give up. There is an old saying –

"when the US sneezes.

Australia catches a cold". It traditionally referred to the result of a down-turn in the US economy. Today it applies equally to the actions of Donald Trump. The President appears to have exempted Australia from his tariffs on steel and attached are still unknown. But if there is a "global trade war" - one in which countries retaliate by imposing new tariffs of their own – Australia will still suffer. Trump's actions are a symptom of collective failure. Policy makers around the world have not been able to create the "level playing field" so many aspired to. As a result, too many feel they are on wrong side of the restructure. It is those people Trump is hoping to appeal to. The US economy remains the world's largest. It can survive a trade war because it has more than 300 million domestic consumers. Australia is tiny in comparison and by necessity, we are export focused. Our position is not as strong as that of the US and an exemption from their new tariffs will not be

Waste Management Centre and Illegal Dumping

Illegal dumping has been a thorn in the side of this community for a long while, but particularly over the holiday period. Cleaning up illegal dumping is a waste of Council's time and resources and ultimately places greater pressure on the budget, which is of no benefit to anyone. Cessnock LGA's residents dump the greatest amount of waste, on average per person, compared to all other Hunter council areas and unfortunately we have a number of illegal dumping hotspots. Council's new Waste Management Centre has proven challenging for some people, in that they can no longer just empty the trailer into the "dump", however its absolutely necessary that we manage the community's waste in an effective way recycling what we can and thereby reducing the amount of landfill we accumulate. This reduces the amount of fees we as a Council pay to the State Government and EPA, which has a flow-on effect to the services we can provide to the community and the cost-effectiveness of those services. Get your hands on a program We live in a beautiful part of

the world and should take pride on our community and environment. If we all work together to dispose of waste in a responsible way, it's a win-win for us all. You can dob in a dumper by reporting anyone who dumps illegally, whether its in the bush, on the side of the road, or on the doorstep of the local op-shop. You can do so by calling our RID Squad on 131 555 or ridonline.epa.nsw.gov.au On the spot fines can be up to \$4000 for individuals or up to \$8000 for companies. If you are required to attend Local Court the penalty may be up to \$110,000! Repeat offenders may also face a jail sentence.

Cessnock Pool

At our most recent meeting Council dealt with the strategic direction of Cessnock Pool. I've written about the pool in this column before, and I acknowledge there are strongly held opinions on all sides of the issue. However, the present Council decided that in the current economic climate and with the uncertainties surrounding funding of the project, it

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would be irresponsible to promise a new gold-plated oool when it wasn't practically possible to actually deliver it. We had three options before us, which were: Option A – continue to operate Cessnock Pool as is. It has been established that Cessnock Pool no longer adequately services the population and is in need of costly upgrades and maintenance to keep it at its current operational level. Increasing patronage to the pool will help stem its annual losses of around \$450,000, however visitation has been stagnant and without any real investment in upgrades this option is not financially sustainable over the medium to long term. Option B – upgrade Cessnock Pool at its current location. Upgrades at the current location would aim to improve the capacity of

Cessnock Pool. Works may include upgrading the program pool, installing a splash pad and possibly upgrading the change rooms and amenities. The site is landlocked by roads and private properties, which limits the ability to expand the facilities without the cost of acquiring those properties. However, this option would result in a more diverse offering of aquatic experiences, which would encourage more people to

Option C – relocate Cessnock Pool to Turner Park, Aberdare. Relocating Cessnock Pool to Turner Park would aim to meet the aquatic needs of current and future populations and address the limitations on the current location. This option will be constructed in two stages and includes both indoor and outdoor facilities. There is, however, a significant capital outlay required for this option which will require the investigations of various funding sources including general revenue, development contributions, loans, grants and reserves. Ultimately, Council decided to adopt Option C (relocate to Turner Park) as its long term strategic direction and endorsed Option B (upgrade at current location) in the interim. This decision will ensure that residents are provided with a modern facility that meets their needs, whilst planning for future population growth and importantly, sets in place a plan to fund both of these

options so that the Cessnock

community is guaranteed the

infrastructure it deserves.

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Ross River virus disease

Identification of Ross

River virus disease ~ Clinical features Pyrexia and other constitutional symptoms are usually slight. A rash can occur up to 2 weeks before or after other symptoms. It can be absent in about one-third of cases. The rash is variable in distribution. character and duration, and may be associated with buccal and palatal enanthems (spots on mucous membranes). Rheumatic symptoms are present in most patients, except for the few who present with rash alone. Rheumatic symptoms consist of arthritis or arthralgia, primarily affecting the wrist, knee, ankle and small joints of the extremities. Prolonged symptoms are common. In some cases, there may be remissions and exacerbations of decreasing intensity for and paraesthesiae and tenderness of the palms and soles are present in a small percentage of cases. Arboviruses are viruses that are spread by the bite of arthropods, particularly mosquitoes. They are divided into alphaviruses

The disease can cause incapacity and inability to work for 2–3 months. About one-quarter of patients have rheumatic symptoms that persist for a year or more. RRV is the commonest and most widespread arboviral disease in Australia. In Australia, the five-year (2005– years. Cervical lymphade- 09) average number of notinopathy occurs frequently, fications was 4,781. Major outbreaks have occurred in all parts of Australia, primarily from January to May each year. RRV disease has been detected and possibly transmitted to humans in most major metropolitan areas of Australia, including Perth, Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne. RRV disease is considered endemic throughout most parts of

inland waterways and

coastal regions, but not in

metropolitan Melbourne.

Epidemics usually follow heavy rains, or high tides that inundate salt marshes or coastal wetlands. Following increased Victorian rainfall and floods, there were about 400 notified cases in 2010, compared with 80 in 2009.

The virus is maintained in a primary mosquito-mammal cycle involving macropods (particularly the western grey kangaroo), and possibly other marsupials and wild rodents. A humanmosquito cycle may occur in explosive outbreaks. Horses can act as amplifier hosts, and appear to develop joint and nervous system

RRV. Fruit bats might act as vertebrate hosts in some areas. Vertical transmission in desiccation-resistant eggs of Ochlerotatus spp. mosquitoes may be a mechanism to enable the virus to persist in the environment for long periods. This could explain the rapid appearance of cases of RRV disease after heavy rains. Victoria, particularly around RRV is endemic throughout Australia, Papua New Guinea, adjacent Indonesia and Solomon Islands. Cheers, Lee

BOCSAR statistics show crime rates falling as police focus on prevention

Wednesday, 14 March 2018 Proactive policing is having a significant impact on crime reduction according to the latest quarterly data from the Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research (BOCSAR).

NSW Police Commissioner Mick Fuller APM, said the figures reflect the hard work of officers with four of the major crime categories falling and the other 12 remaining stable. "We are continuing to focus on preventing and disrupting crime and as a result we are seeing a positive effect in reducing the fear of crime and increasing personal safety and security," Commissioner Fuller said.

"High-visibility and mobile policing operations targeting anti-social behaviour, alcohol-related violence, and drug possession and supply are having a significant impact in most parts of the state. In the last 24 months to December 2017, there has been a reduction in the following major crime

Break and enter (dwelling) – down 6.5 per cent

categories across the state:

- Break and enter (nondwelling) – down 9.8 per cent
- Steal from person down 8.3 per cent
- Fraud down 4.8 per

cent. Drug offences such as cocaine possession and the dealing and trafficking of cocaine, predominately a crime detected in Sydney's inner city and

Eastern Suburbs, have increased by 43.4 per cent and 64 per cent respectively. Commissioner Fuller said this can be attributed to increased operational activity targeting drug possession and supply. "We have regular drug operations, including the use of drug detection dogs, throughout the CBD, suburbs and regional centres targeting illicit drug possession and distribution,

Commissioner Fuller said. The increase in transport offences – specifically in the North West and South/ South West sectors – is reflective of greater proactivity by the Police Transport and Public Safety Command. Steal from retail store (up 3.9 per cent) was the only major crime category to increase statewide, while in the Greater Sydney area there was an increase in

Meanwhile, long-term trends in violent and property crime show four crime categories – robbery, motor vehicle theft, break and enter, and murder -are now at their lowest recorded levels in 25 years across NSW

sexual assault.

"It is encouraging to see an overall decrease in crime statistics which correlates with increased proactive policing," Commissioner Fuller said.

Driver stopped after filming crash scene on mobile phone – western NSW

Wednesday, 07 March 2018

Police have been left extremely disappointed after a driver was stopped after he was allegedly seen filming a crash scene on his mobile phone as he drove past in the state's west. About 3.30pm yesterday (Tuesday 6 March 2018), emergency services responded to a crash on the Barrier Highway, 41km east of Cobar, in which a Toyota Hilux towing a caravan had lost control and tipped.

The driver, a 64-year-old woman, and passenger, a 66year-old man, were both trapped for some time before being taken to Cobar Airport then airlifted to hospital. The woman, who was taken to North Shore Hospital, suffered suspected broken bones while the man, who was taken to Orange Base Hospital, suffered minor injuries.

There were diversions in place for a number of hours due to the crash blocking the

highway. While managing traffic, police observed a man driving past while allegedly holding his mobile phone on the steering wheel to film the crash scene. The 55-year-old man was stopped by officers and issued an infringement notice for using his mobile phone while

Inspector Steven Munn from

driving.

Darling River said messages on the dangers of using mobile phones while driving are clearly not getting through to some people.

"Here we have a serious crash where people are trapped and injured, and then we have a person idiotically filming the incident on their mobile phone as they drive past," Inspector Munn said.

"I'd like to say it's unbelievable, but sadly, over 29 years in the police, I can tell you it is not uncommon to see drivers using phones, driving too fast or watching emergency services rather than paying attention to their driving at crash sites.

"Police, Ambulance and volunteers from the SES and RFS were at this scene with an important job to do – we are trying to help those in the crash, we're trying to keep the traffic moving and we're trying to keep everyone else safe. "Instead we're having to chase after someone who thinks it's okay to break the law and put his life and the lives of others in danger by using his mobile phone while driving. This is completely unacceptable." Meanwhile, investigations into yesterday's crash are continuing. What does it mean to be nominated as an Executor.



When someone makes a Will they nominate an executor, they may nominate one person or a number of people to act together. You may have been told by a relative or close friend that you have been nominated as an executor in their Will but you may not be sure what it entails.

The role of an executor is to administer the estate of a deceased person in accordance with their Will. An executor must comply with various laws and rules that govern the administration of deceased estates and trusts.

The responsibilities of an executor may include locating the original Will, making funeral arrangeauthorities, making a list of assets and debts, making sure all property is insured, applying to the Supreme Court for a grant of Probate, securing assets, paying debts, lodging tax returns for the deceased and their estate, establishing any trusts created in the Will and distributing the estate in accordance with the Will. This is a guide only and not an exhaustive list, the steps involved will vary depending on the nature of the estate. A key part of the administration of an estate is to obtain a grant of Probate; this is an order from the Supreme Court of NSW that confirms a Will is valid and that any executors have the right to administer the estate. establishes a trust then the person nominated as executor will often have to take on the role of trustee. A Will may create a trust if the deceased gifts all or part of their estate to a beneficiary who is a minor such as a child or grandchild. In these circumstances the role of trustee may involve preserving and managing estate assets until the beneficiary reaches their majority. The age that a beneficiary reaches their majority depends on the terms of the Will, for example the will maker may have specified the age of majority as 18 or 25

If you are nominated as executor you can engage a solicitor to guide you through your role and this is usually paid for by the deceased's estate. A solicitor can assist by setting out your rights and responsibilities, helping you to apply for probate and assisting you with the administration of the estate to ensure it is carried out in the correct way.

Housing finance continues to decline



The January 2018 housing finance figures released last week by the Australian Bureau of Statistics show that lending for housing continues to decline across the board, according to the Real Estate Institute of Australia (REIA). "Overall the figures for January 2018 show in trend terms that the number of owner -occupied finance commitments decreased by 0.7 per cent – not only the fourth consecutive month of

decreases but also the largest

of the four decreases," REIA President Malcolm Gunning said.

"If refinancing is excluded, in trend terms, the number of owner-occupied finance commitments decreased by 1.2 per cent -the fifth consecutive month of decreases and again the largest of the five. Mr Gunning said in trend terms decreases were recorded in all states and territories except

Queensland, where lending

increased by 0.1 per cent. The largest decrease of 1.6 per cent was in Western Australia while the ACT was flat.

"The value of investment housing commitments decreased by 0.3 per cent in January in trend terms following falls in the previous twelve months." he said.

"In trend terms, the number

of established dwellings purchase commitments decreased by 0.7 per cent while the purchase of new dwellings decreased by 1.4 per cent new dwelling construction remained flat. Mr Gunning said the proportion of first home buyers, as part of the total owner-occupied housing finance commitments, increased marginally to 18.0 per cent in January compared to 17.9 per cent in the previous month. "The number of loans to first home buyers, however, dishonest developers time fell by 14.0 per cent compared to December

"The continued decline in housing finance explains why banks are competing for market share by reducing interest rates including those for first home buyers and investors," concluded Mr Gunning.

Clamping down on tax evasion

Purchasers will have to withhold GST on the purchase price of new

residential premises and new residential subdivisions, and remit it directly to the Australian Taxation Office (ATO), as part of settlement from 1 July 2018.

The government has introduced legislation as part of its aim to strengthen compliance with GST law in the property development sector.

The Minister for Revenue and Financial Services, the Hon Kelly O'Dwyer MP, said this measure will address tax evasion through phoenixing arrangements, where developers collect GST from their customers but dissolve their company to avoid paying it to the

"Currently, developers can have up to three months to remit GST after the sale of newly constructed residential premises and new subdivisions, allowing to phoenix and avoid their GST obligations.

Property prices on the rise

Property prices ended 2017 on a high with the weighted average median price of the eight capital cities up 1.0 per cent to \$769,501, according to the latest research from the Real Estate Institute of Australia. REIA Real Estate Market Facts for the December quarter 2017 showed prices increasing in all capital cities except for Canberra down 2.7 per cent. "The weighted average median price for other dwellings increased 0.6 per cent to \$590,455 over the quarter, with prices increasing in all capital cities except for Sydney down 0.4 per cent and Darwin sliding 7.4 per cent," REIA President Malcolm Gunning said. "Hobart had the largest increase in the median price for both houses at 5.2 per cent and for other dwellings at 4.8 per cent," he said. Over the quarter, median rents for three-bedroom houses increased or remained steady in all capital cities, with Hobart at 2.7 per cent having the largest increase. Median rents for two-bedroom other dwellings were variable among the capital cities. The median rent increased in Hobart at 3.2 per

347,621 motor vehicle owners across the Hunter will be able to access their CTP Green Slip refund from last Monday. The NSW State Government last year overhauled the old CTP Green Slip Scheme to create a more affordable, lower cost scheme. remained steady in Melbourne and Brisbane but decreased in Sydney, Adelaide, Perth, Darwin and Canberra. Perth had the largest decrease at 4.7 per cent.

"The weighted average vacancy rate for the eight capital cities remained steady on 2.8 per cent during the December quarter 2017," Mr Gunning said. 'Vacancy rates decreased in most capital

cities including Melbourne, Perth, Canberra, Hobart and Darwin, with the largest decreases of 0.6 percentage points in Canberra and Darwin.

'Vacancy rates increased in Sydney and Brisbane, while only Perth and Darwin had vacancy rates above the industry benchmark of 3.0 per cent," Mr Gunning concluded.



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



New rules for parked trailer advertise-



In late 2017 policy amendments were made to improve road safety and reduce driver distraction through the State Environmental Planning Policy No. 64 – Advertising and Signage (Amendment No 3) and updated Transport Corridor Outdoor Advertising and Signage Guidelines (November 2017). The changes have the effect

Banning advertisements on parked trailers on roads, road shoulders, footpaths and nature strips, excluding advertising associated with the primary use of the trailer, e.g. tradies trailer, and public authorities:

Requiring consent for displaying signage on trailers parked on private land in view from roads, road shoulders, footpaths and nature strips; and Allowing advertising in transport corridors permissible with consent from the Planning Minister or delegate, across NSW. The change to ban trailer advertising came into effect on 1 March 2018. All other changes came into effect on 29 November 2017.


The updates apply to all advertising signage that can be seen from a public place or public reserve, except signage that is exempt development. The amendments requires development consent for

the display of signage on a trailer where displayed on private land that is visible from a road or road-related

Individuals failing to comply can be fined \$1500 and businesses doing the wrong thing could attract a \$3000 fine. The new penalty notice offences have been introduced through the *Environmental* Planning and Assessment Regulation (Penalty Notices for Parked Trailer Advertisements) Regulation

The Consultation Draft National Alcohol Strategy (NAS) raises serious concerns for the alcohol sector as a whole. Whilst the Hunter Valley Wine & Tourism Association (HVWTA) supports the use of evidence-based policy measures to address medical and social problems emanating from excessive alcohol consumption the HVWTA is concerned that the NAS it is not a targeted approach to solving these problems. The NAS focuses on population wide measures

including increases in taxation, restricting availability and implementing bans on advertising, with an aim to decrease overall alcohol consumption and seemingly panders to populist

sentiments that demonise alcohol consumption. Changes to the NAS is a key focus for the HVWTA, and over the coming months will work

with other regional and state organisations on this, including pregnancy warning and energy labelling initiatives being proposed by Government/s. We will also endeavour to draft a response and raise the concerns we have on the NAS on behalf of HVWTA members. The Winemaker's Federation of Australia, the Alcohol Beverages Association, Wine Industry Suppliers Australia and other State wine industry groups all share concerns at the content of this draft strategy. 





Pets and **Patrols with** Ranger Kurt

Easter is almost here and while I'm sure many are looking forward to chowing down on chocolate it's important to remember that chocolate is toxic to dogs and in some cases, fatal.

Chocolate is toxic as it contains the compound theobromine which is a chemical similar to caffeine and is used medicinally as a diuretic, heart stimulant, blood vessel dilator and smooth muscle

relaxant. Dogs can't metabolise theobromine like humans

can and the highest levels of compound can be found in dark chocolate, cocoa powder and baking chocolate. The toxic effects vary depending on the dog's size, type and the amount of chocolate eaten, but may result in severe clinical signs if not treated early.

Consumption can lead to an increased heart rate, seizures, abdominal pain, vomiting, diarrhoea and in worse cases can also result in death.

Dogs are natural scavengers, so keep this in mind when preparing your Easter egg hunt for the kids. Some helpful tips is to use larger eggs and place them up higher so they're out of your dog's reach.

The importance of desexing your pet is something we'd also like to raise this month and if you find that it's something you can't afford, there are other avenues you can take.

Cessnock Council has had a long standing partnership with Hunter Animal Watch who work to reduce the number of unwanted pets in our area by offering financial assistance to people on low incomes to desex their

In January and February this year, Hunter Animal Watch helped 179 dog and cat owners across the Hunter to desex their pet which is a fantastic achievement. If you are a pensioner or unemployed and would like assistance with the cost of desexing your pet, we

We'd also like to advise that there are new rules in place for parked trailer advertisements and signage to improve road safety and reduce driver distraction. The changes have the effect of:

- Banning advertisements on parked trailers on roads, road shoulders, footpaths and nature strips, excluding advertising associated with the primary use of the trailer, e.g. tradies trailer, and public authorities;
- Requiring consent for displaying signage on trailers parked on private land in view from roads, road shoulders, footpaths and nature strips; and

Allowing advertising in transport corridors permissible with consent from the Planning Minister or delegate, across NSW

The change to ban trailer advertising came into effect on 1 March 2018. Individuals failing to comply can be fined \$1500 and businesses doing the wrong thing could attract a \$3000 fine.

Blackberry modified to 'help drug cartels'

The chief executive of a company that created highly-secure smartphones allegedly used by some of the world's most notorious criminals has been indicted. Canadian-based Phantom Secure made "tens of millions of dollars" selling the modified Blackberry devices for use by the likes of the Sinaloa Cartel, investigators said. The charges marked the first time US authorities have targeted a company for knowingly making encrypted technology for criminals.

The Department of Justice arrested Vincent Ramos in Seattle last week. He was indicted last Thursday along with four associates.

The BBC has been unable to reach Phantom Secure. They are charged with racketeering and conspiracy to aid the distribution of drugs. Both crimes have a maximum penalty of life in prison. Mr Ramos is the only one of the group currently in custody. "This organisation Phantom Secure was designed to facilitate international drug trafficking all throughout the entire world," US

told the BBC. "These traffickers, including members of the Sinaloa Cartel, would use these fully-encrypted devices to facilitate their drug trafficking activities in order to avoid law

enforcement scrutiny." 'Handful of other organisations'

Blackberry did not respond to requests for comment last Thursday and investigators would not say whether the firm had worked with them on this case. Mr Braverman said Blackberry was not alone in having its handsets altered for illegal purposes. "Our understanding is there are a handful of other organisations that exist like this. The FBI, and our office, will continue investigating not only Phantom

Secure but any other company that provides this kind of communication device to criminal organisations."

He added that while almost every smartphone on the market offers hardto-crack encryption - as well as apps from Facebook, Google and Apple - Phantom Secure should be held culpable for what the users of its services were doing.

"The difference is this company was specificallydesigned to aid international drug trafficking organisations," he said.

"The only way that you're able to actually utilize one of these devices and obtain one of these devices is if somebody else vouched for vou."

Phantom Secure sold devices on a subscription basis at a cost of \$2,000-\$3,000 for around six months of use. In order to become a customer, an existing user must vouch for the new person. That system, authorities said, was a way of preventing law enforcement from getting hold of the devices.

Agents estimated as many as 20,000 Phantom Securemodified handsets are in use around the world. Communications through the phones are automatically routed to servers in Panama and Hong Kong, according to court documents, making data more difficult to trace. Phantom Secure could also remove key functionality from the devices to lock them down, such as voice communication. microphone, GPS, camera, internet and messaging apps, leaving just the text functionality. Law enforcement authorities have repeatedly been frustrated by encryption technology making it harder to access communications between suspects.

In 2016, Apple refused to provide a tool that would allow the FBI to unlock an iPhone belonging to Syed Farook, a man involved in a mass shooting that resulted in the death of 14 people.

Last Thursday, a spokesman for the FBI reiterated the agency's concern about criminals being able to "go dark" and hide behind these sophisticated technologies. Privacy and open rights activists argue that removing or just

weakening encryption would put everyone at risk of data theft and surveillance - not just



Ransomware 'here to stay', warns Google study

Cyber-thieves have made at least \$25m (£19m) from ransomware in the last two years, suggests research by Google.

The search giant created thousands of virtual victims of ransomware to expose the payment ecosystem surrounding the malware type.

Most of the money was made in 2016 as gangs realised how lucrative it was, revealed a talk at Black Hat.

Two types of ransomware made most of the money, it said, but other variants are starting to emerge.

Track and trace

"It's become a very, very profitable market and is here to stay," said Elie Bursztein from Google who, along with colleagues Kylie McRoberts and Luca Invernizzi, carried out the research.

Ransomware is malicious software that infects a machine and then encrypts or scrambles files so they can no longer be used or read. The files are only decrypted when a victim pays a ransom. Payments typically have to be made using the Bitcoin virtual currency.

Mr Bursztein said Google used several different methods to work out how much cash was flowing towards ransomware creators.

As well as drawing on reports from people who had paid a ransom, it sought out the files used to infect machines and then ran those on lots of virtual machines to generate "synthetic victims", he said. It then monitored the network traffic generated by these victims to work out to where money would be transferred. The data gathered in this stage was also used to find more variants of ransomware and the 300,000 files it found broke down into 34 of them, he said. The most popular strains

were the Locky and Cerber families, added Mr Bursztein. Payment analysis of the Bitcoin blockchain, which

logs all transactions made using the e-currency, revealed that those two strains also made the most money over the last year, he said, with Locky collecting about \$7.8m (£5.9m) and Cerber \$6.9m (£5.2m).

The research project also revealed where the cash flowed and accumulated in the Bitcoin network and where it was converted back into cash. More than 95% of Bitcoin payments for ransomware were cashed out via Russia's BTC-e exchange, found Google.

On 26 July, one of the founders of BTC-e, Alexander Vinnik, was arrested by Greek police on money laundering charges. The police were acting on a US warrant and his extradition to America is being sought.

The gangs behind the ransomware explosion were not likely to stop soon, said Mr Bursztein, although established strains are facing competition from newer ones. "Ransomware is a fast-

moving market," he said.

"There's aggressive competition coming from variants such as SamSam and Spora." Novel variants were expanding quickly and many were encouraging fast expansion by paying affiliates more if they placed the malware on to large numbers of machines. The ransomware as a service model was already proving popular, he warned. "It's no longer a game reserved for tech-savvy criminals," he said. "It's for almost anyone."

TAKE SOME GOOD ADVICE

Look Out For Fake Comment Links

Those nasty phishermen are at it again, trying to snare you with their phony links. Sometimes they send links to malicious sites in emails. normally pretending to be your bank or some other account. Here's another trick they love to use: They'll comment on a story and stick a link to where they want you to do in that comment. It used to be the comments were obviously spam because they were just a bunch of random words, but these days, it's a little more sophisticated. The comments will reflect the actual content of the article and promise to offer help of some kind. Note that they don't show you the actual address for the link. A personal actually commenting with a helpful link isn't likely to go to the trouble of masking it.

Don't fall for it, you never know what's on the other end of those links.

The Death of Stalin

The Death of Stalin film review: masterful political satire is one for the ages

Armando Iannucci's new, ferociously sharp and funny tragicomedy explores power-grabbing among top level Russian ministers, in the aftermath of the titular event. The Death of Stalin has drawn many responses along the lines of 'a film for our times' and 'particularly relevant given today's headlines'. The implication being that Iannucci, creator of The Thick of It and Veep, and director of 2009's brilliant In the Loop, masterfully read the zeitgeist and conjured a farce appropriate for the era of Trump and a newly meddling, Putin-led Kremlin.

The key to Iannucci's success (other than the obvious: bone-dry wit and volleys of caustic one-liners) is the same reason his work will remain relevant long into the future. The writer/ director is, perhaps ironically – given the barefaced cynicism that permeates most of his work – a bit of a humanist. Or at least a person whose focus lies with people struggling to make it through the day, determined to do the best they can.

This attitude, prevalent throughout his work, is the reason his approach, while unquestionably British in sensibility, is pliable and universal. The monstrously entertaining spin doctor Malcolm Tucker (from The Thick of It and In the Loop) is the extremity of this 'struggle through the day' narrative. He's always in a maelstrom, always in crisis management mode, always fighting fire with fire, and despite the chest-thumping and sharp tongue, always

struggling. Most of Iannucci's other characters are reasonable, or reasonable-ish people, corroded and corrupted by a terrible system, where arguably the most terrible thing is that these people they have allowed themselves to be corrupted in the first place; to allow they values to be so compromised. That system has never been more shocking, or more brutally farcical than in The Death of Sta-This semi-historical film

begins at an orchestral performance, where a radio producer (Paddy Considine) is terrified to heardirectly from the man himself – that Stalin wants to



performance that just took place. Small problem: it wasn't recorded. And, having just finished, half of the audience have left. The producer scrambles to his feet, running into the room screaming, crying out to lock the doors and declaring a state of "musical emergency." A new conductor is needed, so they grab the "finest and nearest" (emphasis on that last word) who is in his pajamas. Bodies are also required to fill the room, for the acoustics, so they visit people's homes and drag out common folk who assume they are being taken to the gulag. It is a terrific opening, layered and and farcical, scene-setting from a left-of -centre place: far from the top echelons of power, and quite a way from the bottom. The focus, when it comes to panic and paranoia, is among a clique of government officials who are not so much relieved by the loss of their leader as thoroughly displaced by

These absurdly selfconscious people have learned to watch their tongues. Communist Party secretary Nikita Khrushchev (Steve Buscemi) even gets his wife to write down everything he says, as well as how the dictator responds (including which of his jokes get the best laughs) so he can study the notes and alter his behav-

When Joseph Stalin (Adrian McLoughlin) drops to the floor in his dacha, early in the piece, the simple act of getting a doctor isn't simple at all, given the dictator has thrown all the good ones in jail. When the possibility of getting a "bad doctor" is nervously floated, the question is asked: "What if he recovers and finds out?" To which Krushchev responds: "If he recovers, then we got a good doctor.'

This kind of droll to-andfro permeates the script

David Schneider and Ian Martin) in various contexts and in varying degrees. Iannucci keeps attention tightly focused around the politicians, which protects the film from racial caricature (it is ultimately about power and absurdity, not Russians) and from punching down. The top brass include a theoretically next in line deputy, the nervous and needy Georgy Malenkov (Jeffrey Tambor), the brutal and scheming enforcer Laventri Beria (Simon Russell Beale) and loyalist Vyacheslav Molotov (Michael Palin). Occasionally there are visions of common people, to remind us of the dangers of top level bureaucracy; the terrible things that filter down to the bottom. Without this, the behaviour of the primary characters might have existed in a harmless vacuum: a sandbox of snarky wordplay, devoid of real-world repercussions. Nothing, of course, could have been further from the truth. Eventually, without giving anything anyway, the clique - or at least components of it - self-combust, as the politics and powergrabbing become increasingly brutal. The choice, as one character puts it, lies between death and re-

What a film. What an achievement. The drama is farcical and the comedy hurts. The writing and direction radiate white hot intensity, and the performances sizzle. In its ferocious grasp of absurdity, story of petulant fiends with dangerous powers, and its stage-like focus on scenes and set pieces, The Death of Stalin evokes some of cinema's finest political satire – including a certain film about a doctor called Strangelove, directed by Stanley someone or other. Iannucci has created one for the ages.

Stephen Hawking $8/1/1942 \sim 14/3/2018$

Stephen Hawking, the British theoretical physicist who found a link between gravity and quantum theory, and who declared that black holes aren't really black at all, has died.

"He was a great scientist and an extraordinary man whose work and legacy will live on for many years," Hawking's children Lucy, Robert, and Tim said in a statement. "His courage and persistence with his brilliance and humour inspired people

"He once said: 'It would not be much of a universe if it wasn't home to the people you love.' We will miss him for ever.' Hawking was 76 years old, more than 50 years older than the age doctors told him he could expect to reach after being diagnosed in 1963 with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), also called Lou Gehrig's disease.

"Few, if any, have done more to deepen our knowledge of gravity, space, and time," said British astrophysicist Martin Rees. In a reminiscence to mark the occasion of his Cambridge University colleague's improbable 70th birthday, he recalled a young man who was unsteady on his feet and spoke with great difficulty. No one expected him to live long enough to earn his Ph.D.

Although his degenerative disease progressively crippled him and robbed him of speech, Hawking did more than survive. He became "arguably the most famous scientist in the world," Rees said, "acclaimed for his brilliant research, for his best-selling books [about space, time, and the cosmos], and, above all, for his astonishing triumph over adversity."

Hawking's scientific claim to fame was his revelation that the universe began in a singularity, an infinitely dense point of space-time. Working with mathematical physicist Roger Penrose, he would show that Einstein's General Theory of Relativity "implied space and time would have a beginning in the big bang and an end in black holes," according to Hawking's website, and that "the way the universe began was completely determined by the laws of science."

In the early 1970s, he was the first to show that radiation escapes from black holes and that the holes aren't completely black. His theory explaining what came to be called Hawking

radiation made him a scientific superstar. It was, said Declan Fahy, an American University communications professor who studies scientists as celebrities and public intellectuals, "a signature contribution to cosmology [just] as

the field became the most exciting place in physics. Years later, Hawking would say that black holes do not have "event horizons," or points of no return, and that one of space's most mysterious objects may need rethinking.

I was a student of Stephen Hawking's – here's what he taught me

Marika Taylor ~ Professor in Theoretical Physics, University of Southampton

Like many students of my generation, Stephen Hawking had already had enormous influence on me long before we ever met. When I was hesitating about my A-level choices, it was his book A Brief History of Time that convinced me to continue with physical sciences. In 1994, Hawking and mathemati-

cal physicist Roger Penrose gave a series of inspiring lectures about cosmology in Cambridge. As a direct result, I chose courses on black holes and relativity for my fourth year of study at the University of Cambridge. I first saw Hawking when I was an undergraduate. At that time he was living in an apartment building just behind my student house. He was already so famous that friends would come to my room just to watch him leaving and entering his apartment. But as an undergraduate I never tried to talk with him, feeling much too iunior and intimidated.

After I finished my fourth year, I was invited in to talk to Hawking, who was already using a speech synthesizer, about options for my PhD. I was quite nervous when I first met him, but he jumped straight into physics and soon we were discussing black holes. I became a student at the time of the "Second String Theory Revolution" in theoretical physics. Hawking had not worked actively in string theory, but he was very keen to understand the new ideas.

Following that meeting, he sent me off to read all the papers that Edward Witten, a famous string theorist, had written that year. My task was to come back and summarise them for him – the student teaching the master. It's difficult to describe how hard this task actually was: Hawking expected me to jump straight to the frontier of string theory as a starting graduate student. He also chose the title for my PhD thesis: "Problems in M-theory", which I worked on from 1995

I can only hope that my explanations of string theory were helpful. Hawking went back and forth on his views on M-theory, but eventually ended up thinking that it may be our best bet for a theory of everything No hand-holding

PhD students were enormously important to Hawking. In the early phase of his illness, his students helped take care of him. By the time I became his student he needed round-the-clock nursing. At this point, his students were no longer involved in his physical care, but remained essential to his research. Theoretical physics begins with ideas and concepts, but these then evolve into explicit detailed calculations. Hawking had a remarkable ability to do complex calculations in his head, but he still relied on collaborators to develop and complete his

research projects. Theoretical physicists typically give early PhD students "safe" research projects, and guide them through the calculations required. As the students develop, the projects become more ambitious and risky and students are expected to work independently. However, PhD students working with Hawking did not have the luxury of this gentle introduction – he needed us to work on his own high-risk, high-gain projects. Hawking's communication via his speech synthesizer was necessarily concise and he simply could not provide detailed guidance about calculations, making it extremely challenging to work with him. But it was also stimulating, forcing students to be creative and independent. He did give praise when he thought it was due. He once sent me away with a very hard problem - finding exact rotating black hole solutions of Einstein's equations with a cosmological constant - and was stunned when I came back a few days later with the solution. I can't even remember exactly what he said but I will never forget his enormous smile. Hawking was a determined and stubborn person. On many occasions he got through serious medical issues with sheer determination. This same determination could make him very difficult to work. But it could also push research projects forward: Hawking would refuse to give up on seemingly unsolvable problems.

In fact, never giving up is the main thing Hawking has taught me - to keep attacking problems from different directions, to reach for the hardest problems and find a way to solve them. It's immensely important as a scientist, but also in other aspects of life. Pithy one-liners

Hawking was devoted to his family. His eyes would light up when one of his children came to visit or when he proudly showed us pictures of his first grandchild. In many respects, Hawking treated his PhD students and collaborators as a second family. However busy he was, he always made time for us, often making dignitaries wait outside his office while he talked physics with a student. He would eat lunch with us several times per week, and funded a weekly lunch for the wider group to bring everyone together.

BIOSECURITY TEAM HELPING LAND-HOLDERS CONTROL PESTS IN DRY TIMES

Hunter Local Land Services biosecurity team is currently working around the clock to assist landholders to control pest species on their property. While our staff recognise feeding and watering livestock is the critical priority across the region this summer, the ongoing dry conditions also pose an optimal time for controlling pest species.

Biosecurity team leader Luke Booth said pigs and wild dogs especially are moving further afield to find food and water supplies.

"The only upside to drought conditions like we are seeing in parts of the Hunter Valley is the increased effectiveness of pest animal control programs," said Luke Booth.

"As water runs out in the rougher timbered country, pest animals are moving out into more open country.

"This means landholders can conduct baiting programs in smaller areas, but still have a lot of success, because many pests are particularly susceptible

Landholders considering joining a control program are being urged to contact Hunter Local Land Services biosecurity team.

Our biosecurity officers can discuss tailored support for your property. "We are rolling out programs across the Upper Hunter continuously at the moment, to meet the increased demand for pest control assistance," said Mr

"With limited feed and water supplies available we want to help landholders make sure their stock are not competing with, or being impacted by pest pecies, such as feral pigs, wild dogs and foxes.'

Landholders are also being urged to report sightings to their local biosecurity officer, or via the FeralScan App or website on https://www.feralscan.org.au/ FeralScan is a citizen surveillance program that helps map pest species activity and is a free resource for the community.

HUNTER LLS SALUTES LOCAL RUBBISH WARRIORS

With Tangaroa Blue Foundation this week revealing the details of 10 million items littering our waterways and coast, Hunter Local Land Services wants to pay tribute to the volunteers committed to cleaning up our region

4381 volunteers and partners from the Hunter region have taken part in Tangaroa Blue Foundation's Australian first study revealing the types of rubbish in our waterways and coasts.

The volunteers worked with community groups and partner organisations across the country to collect and record more than 10 million plastic fragments, cigarette butts and plastic lids & bottle caps from local waterways. "Hunter volunteers contributed essential data to this Australian first study into the origin of rubbish in our oceans and waterways," said Brian Hughes, Hunter Local Land Services Estuary and Marine Officer.

"More than 33 kilometres of recreational fishing line was collected in our region alone - that's an alarming statistic for those that use and love our waterways and ocean."

"Hunter volunteers also found more than 27,000 cigarette butts, and more than 16,000 beer cans and alcohol bottles, which is proof some people still aren't considering the environmental consequences of their littering seriously. The study added 10 million items of rubbish to the Australian Marine Debris Initiative (AMDI) Database in a bid to help save our oceans from plastic and

"By understanding where this rubbish is coming from we can work to stop it at the source before it enters the environment," said Brian Hughes from Hunter Local Land Services.

"The removal and prevention of marine debris remains one of the major environmental issues worldwide, and together, we are making significant

"By identifying the type of rubbish, we have been able to support new initiatives like the NSW container deposit scheme, as well as local projects like the Browns Creek Source Reduction project in Taree." said Mr Hughes.

Neville Begg, the breeder and owner, under Neville **Begg and Partners** Syndicate (Mgrs: NC and Mrs YJ Begg), of his son Grahame Begg's trained Written By, the winner under skilled piloting from the barrier 18 of jockey Jordan Childs of the 2018 edition of the \$1.5million Blue Diamond (1200m, Caulfield), Melbourne's premier juvenile race, has been

of Australia's most respected horsemen.

Inducted into Australia's Thoroughbred Hall of Fame in 2016, the now 87years old Neville Begg started his racing life in 1945 when he became a stable boy with iconic Randwick trainer Maurice McCarten. Neville went on to be McCarten's stable foreman for ten years, helping to condition the top performers Todman (in 1957 won the first Golden Slipper), Delta (won

Melbourne Cup, Cox Plate, Victoria Derby), Noholme (Cox Plate), Deep River (AJC Derby), Columnist (Caulfield Cup), Farnworth (AJC Champagne Stakes, second in the Slipper) and Wenona Girl (a Queen of racing, 27 wins), to mention a few.

Begg became a trainer at Randwick in his own right in 1967 and was quickly established as one of Australia's best, preparing so many winners he was runner up in the Sydney Premiership to the legendary Tommy Smith nine times.

Ending his training career with a stint in Hong Kong, Begg is credited with

Numbers doubled with the bulk entering the younger categories. Quality was fair, however there were percentages of mixed breeds this week. Cows were mixed, with plainer pens along with prime conditioned heavy weights in the offering. Ample numbers of the prime younger cattle suitable for the butchers were also penned. The usual buying orders competed. Vealer steers to the restockers averaged firm for the lighter end to top at 366c/kg. The over 200kg pens averaged cheaper, however breed and quality did contribute as the better lines of Angus reached 356c/kg, which was marginally cheaper, week-onweek. The same weight heifer portion to the restockers averaged 4c cheaper at 289c, with the better pens topping at 312c/ kg. Yearling steers to feed and restocker orders ranged from 240c to 290c/kg, again breed and quality contributed to most price variations. The yearling heifers sold at similar prices compared to recent markets, with the best to the restockers making up to 300c/kg. The prime conditioned high yielding younger cattle to the butchers reached 360c/kg. Cows sold to solid competition, with the plainer pens to the processors maintaining firm prices, from 138c to 200c/kg. The better conditioned heavy weights increased 12c, making from 210c to 225c/kg.

Scone Report date 13/3/18

Consignments increased as the quality improved to be fair to good. There was a better run of prime cows suitable for the processors, with pens of plain cows also offered. Young cattle were well supplied and the usual buyers competed. The heavier calves weighing over 80kg decreased 5c, to make from 258c to 416c/kg. The over 200kg vealer steers returned to the paddock 7c easier from 280c to 344c/kg. The same weight heifer portion for extra finish eased 11c to make from 280c to 308c/kg. The yearling steers to feed and restocker orders remained firm from 298c to 305c, this was attained for the medium weights, with the lighter end topping at 332c/kg. The yearling heifers also maintained firm prices, with breed and quality in places contributing to some price variations. The prime conditioned younger cattle to the butchers topped at 330c/ kg. Grown steers to lot feeders sold to solid competition and trended dearer, with prices from 230c to 291c/kg, depending on age. The plainer cows to the processors remained firm from 140c to 188c, with those to the restockers improving up to 20c to reach 216c/kg. The prime heavy weight cows gained 12c from 210c to 224c/kg. The best heavy weight bull topped at

TRLX Tamworth Report date 12/3/18

With an improvement in the market the previous week along with little or no rain forecast there was an increase of over 1,000 head. Young cattle were well supplied along with a very large penning of cows. Again there were some very good quality weaners and yearlings suitable to restock and feedlot orders, while limited numbers were purchased by the trade. There was a reduced supply of good quality heavy grown steers, while there was a great deal of variation in both condition and weight in the cows. All the usual buyers were in attendance. Despite the increased supply the market held up well for good quality cattle in most categories with demand high from all sectors. Once again northern feedlotters and processors were keen to procure numbers. Heavy weaner steers over 280kg remained

firm with little but quality related price change. The heifer portion sold on a firm to slightly dearer market trend with some of the heavier weights showing the best improvement. Medium and heavy yearling feeder steers saw a firm to dearer market trend with odd sales in the heavy weights up to 10c/ kg dearer. There was little change in the market for yearling heifers to restock and feed. Heavy trade heifers sold to a dearer trend, up to 12c/kg. The quality of the heavy grown steers on offer was a major factor in the cheaper prices recorded for those over 500kg to process, they were down as much as



20c/kg. The heavy feeder steers saw a firm to dearer market trend. The large penning of cows saw the well finished heavy weights remain firm, while the plainer condition light and medium weights sold to a cheaper trend. The numbers of well finished cows relieved pressure on some processors having to purchase plainer condition cows to fulfil number requirements.

Use it or Lose It

"If you want to retire happy, great health is important. The foundation for all happiness lies in health. Physical, mental, or spiritual health - you must use it or lose it!" - Ernie J Zelinski



"Use it or Lose It". How many times have you heard that popular saying? But as we get older applying this cliché to our health and fitness seems to get harder and harder. Is this an inevitable part of the ageing process? Or is it all in our head and "it gets harder as you get older" is just a saying to make us feel better for doing less than we used to?

As I have gotten older (I'll be forty nine this year) I have pondered this question a lot. My weight (and my fitness) have gone up and down over the years, and each time I have gotten fed up enough to do something about it, it just seems harder, and it takes a little longer to see results. Perhaps it is because as I get older I forget how hard it was last time. Or maybe it is because as we get older we have so many more responsibilities and activities vying for our attention? Or maybe it really IS harder.

Just like younger adults, there is a wide range of health and fitness in people over 40 years of age. You may have been exercising regularly for many years and because of this your health may be excellent. Other people the same age may have quite low levels of fitness.

Either way, the effects on health which result from a low level of mobility or fitness in the over 40's are very similar to the effects on other (younger) age groups. These include postural challenges brought on by tight muscles, poor balance from a lack of core stability, heart problems or high blood pressure, and diabetes.

As with all age groups, one of the easiest ways to address or prevent these health conditions is with regular exercise, including cardio exercise (which raises your heart rate) and resistance training (for example strength exercises using light weights). But even if you have been exercising your whole life, as you get older there are definite physical changes in your body which increase the challenge of maintaining your fitness.

Changes to your lungs and the muscles around your lungs means it takes more effort to breathe in and out, and your respiration rate increases as you get older, affecting the amount of air which moves in and out of your lungs when you exercise. This is turn affects the amount of oxygen available to go into your blood stream and to your muscles.

Another effect of getting older is a reduction in blood flow and along with it a decreased ability to dissipate heat via sweat as blood flow to your working muscles is reduced. Your metabolic rate also changes as muscle mass decreases so yes, you may be putting on body fat even if your diet hasn't changed!

These challenges are all in addition to the more commonly known health conditions such as osteoarthritis (where the cartilage in your joints breaks down), osteoporosis, and rheumatoid arthritis (inflammation of the joints). Your muscle tone also changes (affecting the stability of your joints), and reflexes and movement can become slower due to natural changes in your nervous system.

I can now hear you all asking "well, what's the point??". Aging is inevitable, so if a gradual deterioration in muscle tone, joint movement and flexibility is inevitable, why should I bother exercising?

The answer is that exercising regularly can help counteract the natural effects of ageing. Exercise can prevent physical setbacks, and improve your mental health as well. In fact, it can be argued that exercise becomes MORE important as you get older.

Keeping your muscles strong helps your joints,

Exercising your heart and lungs decreases your risk of cardio pulmonary disease, and

There are many studies which show that regular exercise can reduce your blood glucose levels and minimise your risk of diabetes.

Load bearing exercises and even some high impact exercise can help

improve bone density which in turn lowers your risk of fractures. Staying (or becoming) active as you get older can also be a great social outlet

You are not imagining it when you think that exercising is getting harder as you get older, even if you have always been reasonably active. The most important thing to remember is to take into consideration the physical changes occurring in your body as you get older, and that you really do have to "use it or lose it"


