'New donation partners on the reverse vending machines from this week include: Red Cross, WIRES Animal Rescue, Take 3 for the Sea and Clean Up Australia as well as 12 local Hunter groups across 24 machines.'

'Any Hunter groups wanting to fundraise through the scheme can collect donations of eligible containers through their networks, or can apply to

be listed as a donation partner on a reverse vending machine if one is nearby and they meet the eligibility criteria." NSW Environment Minister Gabrielle Upton said that in addition to collection points, over 380 million containers have been collected and claimed through the kerbside recycling system for the period December 2017 to March 2018. "Figures from the Scheme

Coordinator Exchange for Change show that during the first quarter of this year, 61 per cent of all eligible containers supplied in NSW were refunded through the scheme across the network of collection points and

recycling collections." "Their figures also show that this is a significant increase on the 33 per cent of containers recovered through household kerbside recycling prior to scheme commencement on 1 December last year, representing an additional 196 million containers that may have ended up as

On June 19, the NSW Government will hand down its final Budget before the 2019 State Election. The continuation of the Town Centre revitalisation, the subject of our latest unsuccessful application, remains on our wish list. But there are also plenty of other priorities for our

community that require State Government support, 4. such as the realisation of the Singleton bypass and solutions to traffic congestion; more public transport options; education opportunities; and a greater police presence. I could go on, and I will be raising our community's priorities with Member for Upper Hunter Michael Johnsen and in Macquarie Street every chance I get. I also invite Mr Barilaro, the Premier and her Ministers to return to Singleton as a reminder of where the State's wealth comes from and that it's the people of Singleton who pay the biggest price for our prosperity. TIME TO PUT DROUGHT POLICY BACK ON TRACK

The Prime Minister begins a drought tour this week and the Hunter should be on his itinerary. On May 3, 2013, the Commonwealth and the states and territories entered into a new COAG agreement on drought policy. The Intergovernmental Agreement on National Drought Reform enjoyed the unanimous support of the nine governments as well as the National Farmers' Federation. It was, in part, driven by a 2009 **Productivity Commission** (PC) inquiry into drought policy. It found that in 2007 -08, 23 per cent of Australia's 143,000 farms received drought assistance of more than \$1 billion. The PC argued that former **Exceptional Circumstance** (EC) declarations and related drought assistance programs did "not help farmers improve their selfreliance, preparedness and climate change management". It concluded: "the EC declaration process is inequitable and unnecessary". State and territory governments agreed a new approach was needed. Five objectives were agreed:

- 1. Assist farm families and primary producers adapt to and prepare for the impacts of increased climate variability;
- Encourage farm families and primary producers to adopt self -reliant approaches to manage business risks;
- Ensure families in hardship have access to a support payment that recognises the special circumstances

of farmers: Ensure that social support services are accessible to farm

families; and, Provide a framework for jurisdictions responses during periods of drought.

Clause 17 of the agreement states: parties will report against their roles and responsibilities in this agreement and their implementation plans annually during the operation of the agreement. Reports are to be provided for Primary Industries Standing Committee (PISC) and Standing Council on Primary Industries (SCoPI) meetings. The Coalition won office four months later. One of

its first acts was to abolish SCoPI and the PISC, two key COAG committees. The Intergovernmenta l Agreement will expire on July 1, 2018. Next to no work has been done on a new agreement. Farmers on Farm Household Support (unemployment benefit for farmers) are near the end of a three-year period of assistance. What will drought-affected farmers do now? The Turnbull government says they should apply for a concessional loan. But more debt is simply not an option for most. To be fair, the government

has improved a tax scheme which encourages farmers to put money away for tough times. It enhanced accelerated depreciation arrangements for farmers investing in water

infrastructure. But neither scheme helps farmers who have no money to invest or save. The COAG process must be restored. Its abolition was a terrible mistake. Only then can we put drought policy back on track. Drought can no longer be viewed as an "abnormal event". The focus for policy makers and farm leadership groups must be helping farmers build resilience. Tax concessions for drought proofing will no doubt remain part of the plan. So too will income support. The foundation for any drought policy must be adaptation and the embrace of better natural resource management practices. More market-based programs are needed to incentivise a focus on soil health, water efficiency and organisations will help carbon abatement. Of course, you can't expect engage and be included in a government to act on a changing climate if it doesn't believe the climate is changing. Droughtaffected Hunter farmers

Most people don't need to take vitamin supplements and are able to get all the vitamins and minerals they need by eating a healthy, balanced diet. Vitamins and minerals are essential nutrients, such as iron, calcium and vitamin C, that your body needs in small amounts to work properly.

Many people choose to take supplements, but taking too much or taking them for too long could be harmful. The Department of Health recommends certain supplements for some groups of people who are at risk of deficiency. These are described below.

Folic acid supplements in pregnancy

All women thinking of having a baby should have containing 10 a folic acid supplement, as should any pregnant woman up to week 12 of her pregnancy. Folic acid can help to prevent neural tube defects such as spina bifida.

1g of salt per tablet. Consider changing to a non-effervescent tablet, particularly if you have been advised to watch or

Blacksmith Repair Day to foster a culture of reuse

The ancient art of blacksmithing will be on show at the first ever Blacksmith Repair Day to be held on the 16th of June 2018 at Branxton. Hosted by local blacksmith artist and sculptor, Will Maguire, and supported by the University of Newcastle's Centre for 21st Century Humanities, the community is invited to bring in their old metal items and have them repaired. Mr Maguire will work at the forge on the day alongside his colleagues from the Artist Blacksmiths Association of Australia. Items to be repaired will be limited to steel and other metal items such as hand tools, household items, minor mechanical repairs, gardening or farming equipment and decorative objects. The processes available will be forging, electric welding (MIG/TIG/ stick), brazing, riveting, fabrication, bending, straightening, cutting, sharpening/redressing edges. Mr Maguire says the day will be not only about fixing damaged items but also about

bringing the community together through a celebration of practical skills that are often overlooked into today's modern world.

"Through this event we can combat some of the

excesses of consumer culture by reducing waste and breathing life back into items of worth. I'm also keen to build a sense of community by helping out our neighbours in the process," Mr Maguire

People can email Mr Maguire in advance of the day to discuss the suitability of an item in need of repair, however jobs will be taken on as they arrive by the volunteers available on the day. People can drop off their repairs or enjoy a bite to eat from the Slow Food Hunter Valley while they wait for their item to be fixed. "We'd love it if those bringing in items can make a donation. All proceeds raised will go to the Slow Food Hunter Valley who use the funds to educate local kids on the value of food and it's production," Mr Maguire

Mr Maguire first pitched the idea for the repair day at the Centre for 21st Century Humanities Start Up Workshop held in June last year. Director of the Centre for 21st Century Humanities, Professor Hugh Craig said the judges at the workshop were impressed with Mr Maguire's desire to foster a sense of community and create a culture of reuse and he was awarded seed funding for the

Proactive policing continues to drive down crime Wednesday, 06 June 2018

Proactive policing continues to have a positive impact on reducing crime across the state according to the latest quarterly crime data released by the Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research (BOCSAR) **NSW Police Commissioner** Mick Fuller APM, said the figures are a testament to the ongoing commitment of frontline police state-wide, with three of the major crime categories falling and 12 remaining stable.

"It is encouraging to see the continuing efforts of police having a significant impact reducing crime in our communities across the state.

"Our ongoing priority is to continue to enhance the capabilities of our officers as they proactively focus on preventing and disrupting crime," said Commissioner Fuller.

In the 24 months to March 2018, there has been a reduction in the following major crime categories across the state:

- Break and enter (nondwelling) – down 10 per cent
- Steal from motor vehicle - down 3.3 per cent
- Fraud down 3.5 per cent

BOCSAR noted despite the overall falling levels of crime, some parts of the Greater Sydney region saw an upward trend in some

categories, including sexual assault. This trend can be attributed to a number of factors, such as the reporting of sexual assaults, where statistics are based on the date the offences were reported,

not the date they were committed. In addition, police have been actively encouraging the community to report

historic assaults, which also leads to a significant increase in the number of reports received. A large proportion of the reports also stemmed from

referrals from the Royal Commission. Across the state, arrests for

drug offences, such as possession and use of cocaine, have notably increased by 46 per cent in the last two years. Commissioner Fuller said police will continue to target organised crime networks responsible for the distribution of illicit substances through regular drug operations, including the use of drug dogs. "Our focus is community

safety and we won't tolerate behaviour that risks the wellbeing of others." As part of the reengineering process, the NSW Police Force has announced several new specialist units, including the Fixated Persons Investigations Unit and five new Region Enforcement

Squads (RES). These RES units are comprised of specially-trained police tasked to disrupt drug supply and target gun crime, as part NSW Police Force's commitment to providing specialist resources to regional areas. Commissioner Fuller said the restructure is a unique



step forward in modern policing, making the NSW Police Force more agile, and capable of accommodating the demand for officers in the areas they

are most needed. "These changes see our officers refocussing their efforts on frontline services, allowing us to respond to crime quickly, better serve the community and continue driving down crime," said Commissioner Fuller.

Class Action Lawsuits

Class action lawsuits are something often reported on but what is a 'class action' and what kinds of claims can be bought by way of a class action lawsuit. A 'class action' is a lawsuit in which either one person, or a number of people, sues a company or institution on behalf of a larger 'class' which can be defined by a list of names or by a set of criteria. In order to commence a class action there must be seven or more Employment law cases persons with claims against the same defendant, the claims must arise out of the same or similar circumstances, and the claims must give rise to at least one substantial common issue of law or fact. Historical interest rates continue after housing market peak

As expected interest rates have Pilkington said. been kept on hold at the Reserve Bank of Australia's June board meeting as the property market corrects itself. REINSW President Leanne Pilkington said she expects to see the RBA leave interest rates in a holding pattern for the next 12 months.

"The housing market, from a number of key indicator perspectives, has peaked," Ms

"Prices are easing, clearance rates have dropped, and residential building approvals for April 2018 showed a 5 per cent decline, which is more pronounced than most expected.

"We're seeing the market correct at the moment, but in a sustainable, softlanding way. Raising

interest rates prematurely could jeopardise this soft landing, therefore we expect no changes to interest rates until at least April 2019 where we could see an upward movement," Ms Pilkington said. The RBA board will next meet on Tuesday, 3 July 2018.

Harsh restrictions for NSW homeowners under new Airbnb crackdown

People renting out their empty Sydney properties through online home-sharing services will soon be subject to harsher restrictions under new laws that will also empower strata corporations to ban the practice in their buildings. The proposal, announced

today, specifically targets vacant and investment properties using services such as Airbnb. Owners that don't live in their property will only be able to use it for short-term letting for a maximum of 180 days a year within greater Sydney.

Properties in the rest of NSW will be left uncapped.

The laws will also impose a "two strike" policy, meaning home-share users will be banned for five years from any platform for committing two serious

breaches within two years. Under the new

restrictions, described as some of the toughest in the world by NSW's Minister for Better Regulation Matt Kean, an apartment complex can also block a host from leasing on Airbnb if they do not live in the

unit. It requires 75 percent of strata owners vote against the owner using Airbnb.

Despite the harsh crackdown on a NSW industry that was relatively unregulated, Airbnb's Chris Lehane welcomed the restrictions. "It's a policy that is

innovative, it's a policy that is fair and balanced," the company's US-based global head of policy told reporters in Sydney. Mr Lehane believes the NSW approach could be used as a model across the world.

The government plans to implement a new mandatory code of conduct for homesharing services to abide by, with tough financial penalties for any breach. It will require home-sharing companies to provide data to the NSW government, something Mr Lehane said Airbnb was happy to do. "We certainly look

forward to working cooperatively and constructively with the NSW government." He said the company had already engaged in about

500 government partnerships across the world. NSW Greens MP Justin Field said the reforms did

not go far enough. "The one-size-fits-all approach ignores the unique challenges of short term holiday letting presents to certain communities," he

said in a statement.







A 'fair go' for all car owners



Federal Member for Hunter Joel Fitzgibbon supports a drive for a better deal to put more money back into the pockets of car owners and give 23,000 independent repairers a boost. Federal Labor plans to make car manufacturers share their technical information so that vehicles can be serviced by any mechanic.

It's a strategy the former auto electrician is confident will benefit dozens of independent small and medium business in the Hunter.

"New cars are computers on wheels. Real-time access to digital files and codes, which vary from car to car, is needed to complete many aspects of a repair or service. Car manufacturers generally own and control this technical information and in many cases are the only sources," Federal Member for Hunter Joel Fitzgibbon said.

Whether a person owns a Toyota Corolla or a Ford

Ranger, Labor believes everyone should be able to choose where they get their car serviced. But limited access to this vital information pushes up prices for car services, and limits the ability of independent mechanics to grow their business and generate more jobs. 'That's why a Labor Government will require car manufacturers to share technical information with independent mechanics on commercially fair and

reasonable terms, with safeguards that enable environmental, safety and security-related technical information to be shared with the independent sector," Mr Fitzgibbon said.
"This reform will not only deliver savings to drivers, who will have better choice and

will have better choice and easier access to repairs, but also create a level playing field for independent mechanics who will be able to stay in business as a result

"We will stick up for small businesses, Aussie tradies and keeping the cost of living down for families."

Labor has been calling for independent mechanics to get access to the same technical information which car manufacturers make available to their authorised dealers and preferred repairer networks. Five months ago the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission backed Labor's recommendations to ensure Australia's new car retailing industry isn't shutting out independent mechanics and forcing up prices for motorists. "Independent mechanics have been going to the wall while the Turnbull Government sat on its hands – there's no reason that this reform shouldn't happen straight away," Mr Fitzgibbon

"Labor understands it's your car and it should be your choice where it gets repaired – our plan will deliver money to the household budget and give local mechanics a boost to their business."

Seniors from the local area were recently briefed with the best tips and tricks to avoid common scams.



Mr MacDonald said those aged
over 65 were more likely than
younger people to become
victims of scams.

"Last year, across Australia, there were about 6,700 reports of scams against 18 to 24-yearolds who lost a total of about \$2.4 million," Mr MacDonald said.

"By comparison, there were more than 25,000 reports of scams against people aged 65 and over for a total loss of around \$17.5 million – that's eight times as much as their younger counterparts.

"There are many theories as to

why older people are more susceptible to scams, ranging from a lack of internet savvy to being more trusting, but one thing's certain, getting fleeced by a scammer can have a devastating impact.' At the Fair Trading seminar, residents learned about the many different types of scams, including investment "opportunities"; romance scams; non-existent government rebates; and fake lotteries. Mr Kean said he was proud to see Fair Trading staff sharing their expert knowledge on how to avoid scammers. "It's important that we spread awareness of scams and educate vulnerable members of the community so they can identify and protect themselves from dodgy businesses," Mr Kean





Steel's novels, often described as "formulaic," tend to involve the characters in a crisis of some sort which threatens their relationship. Many of her characters are considered over-the-top, making her books seem less realistic. The novels sometimes explore the world of the rich and famous and frequently deal with serious life issues, like illness, death, loss, family crises, and relationships. Also, there are claims that her popular story lines are based from the events of her life like having two ex-con ex-husbands and other events that she kept hidden from the public.

Despite a reputation among critics for writing "fluff", Steel often delves into the less savoury aspects of human nature, including incest, suicide, divorce, war, and even the Holocaust. As time has progressed, Steel's writing has evolved. Her later heroines tend to be stronger and more authoritative, who, if they do not receive the level of respect and attention they desire from a man, move on to a new life. In recent years Steel has also been willing to take more risks with her plots. *Ransom* focuses more on suspense than romance, and follows three sets of seemingly unconnected characters as their lives begin to intersect. *Toxic Bachelors* departs from her usual style by telling the story through the eyes of the three title characters, men who are relationship phobic and ultimately discover their true loves.

Steel has been criticized for making her books overly redundant and detailed, explicitly telling the story to readers instead of showing it to them. This sometimes has the effect of making the readers feel like they are on the outside looking in rather than living the story. To avoid comparisons to her previous novels, Steel does not write sequels. Although many of her earliest books were released with initial print runs of 1 million copies, by 2004 her publisher had decreased the number of books initially printed to 650,000 due to the decline in people buying books. However, her fan base was still extremely strong at that time, with Steel's books selling out atop charts worldwide.

Twenty-two of her books have been adapted for television, including two that have received Golden Globe nominations. One is *Jewels*, the story of the survival of a woman and her children in World War II Europe, and the family's eventual rebirth as one of the greatest jewelry houses in Europe. Columbia Pictures

was the first movie studio to offer for one of her novels, purchasing the rights to *The Ghost* in 1998. Steel also reached an agreement with New Line Home Entertainment in 2005 to sell the film rights to 30 of her novels for DVDs.



NEW APP TO RECORD YOUR RUBBISH FINDS BEING LAUNCHED IN OUR REGION

With marine pollution strongly in local communities minds due to thousands of pieces of plastic currently washing up on Hunter beaches after more than 80 shipping containers fell from a ship off the coast of Newcastle recently, Hunter Local Land Services is urging people to lodge their finds with the Australian Marine Debris Initiative.

Hunter Local Land Services is proud to support the Tangaroa Blue Foundation who is this month launching a new app for the community to record rubbish they find in local waterways, on our beaches and out to sea – so we can all work together to address this major global environmental threat.

The app is linked to the Australian Marine Debris Initiative, which is a national database of rubbish collected during beach and river clean-ups. Tangaroa Blue is a not-for-profit organisation dedicated to the removal and prevention of marine debris.

Heidi Taylor from Tangaroa Blue says the app will make real-time monitoring of pollution easier for the dedicated volunteers working to remove rubbish

"The app is going to make our data collection so much easier as volunteers can automatically record GPS data, add photos and even scan the barcode on rubbish so we can track it back to its source," says Ms Taylor.

"The AMDI database helps identify the types and amounts of marine debris impacting specific sites.

"We work with community, government and industry groups to identify sources to find practical solutions to stop marine debris entering our

ANOTHER TERROR DOG TAKEN DOWN BY PROFESSIONAL CONTROLLERS

A wild dog that has terrorised Upper Hunter farms for eight years has finally been controlled, thanks to the work of professional wild dog controllers. The dog frequented farms between Wallabadah and Murrurundi, killing and wounding countless sheep.

Landholder Peter Forsythe runs a sheep property at Chilcotts Creek, he said he was astounded to learn the dog had been removed by professional controller

"I just fell to bits, I couldn't believe our luck when I heard they got him - I had that dog trapped once seven years ago, and he got away, he's probably killed hundreds of my sheep since then maybe thousands," said Mr Forsythe. "I have lost 300 sheep to wild dogs in the last three weeks alone and you just can't believe the impact it will have removing an old dog like this.

"He was clever, he knew where all my traps were, he walked right past all the baits, so I can't thank the professional controllers enough for this.

The Professional Wild Dog Controller Program is a partnership with the Hunter Valley Combined Wild Dog Association, Australian Wool Innovation, Hunter Local Land Services and local industry partners including Glencore, Bengalla, Yancoal, the National Parks and Wildlife Service and Forestry Corporation. The \$1 million program over four years helps landholders access professional controllers for specific reactive and strategic control programs. Currently three controllers have removed more than 50 problem wild dogs from known hotspots in the Upper Hunter.

For landholder Peter Forsythe, the important thing now is to stay on top of the wild dog population.

"That one dog we tracked on a motion camera travelling more than two kilometres on the day we caught him, they can do a lot of damage in that time," said Mr

"With the drought conditions in our region we have all been backed into a corner, we have nowhere to go for lambing season with our stock, so we have to work together to remove these wild dogs to give our livestock the best chance.

"I have been trapping on my place for 10 years trying to get rid of these dogs, but we all need to work together - we can't relax, we need to keep at them and it's programs like the Professional Wild Dog Controller Program that are really helping make an impact."

Remember to report all wild dog sightings and incidents to your nearest Hunter Local Land Services Biosecurity Officer. Sheep and Cattle producers in the Upper Hunter who would like to take part in the

Singleton report date 6 June 2018

Marginal rainfall recorded around the supply area reduced numbers and quality was fair to excellent, with the younger cattle well supplied. The feature of the market were the high yielding, grain assisted and prime conditioned younger cattle suitable for the butchers and these sold to very strong competition. Cows more than halved in number, week-on-week. The market trend for the younger cattle was dearer, the cows sold to a cheaper trend. The over 200kg vealer steers returning to the paddock averaged 2c dearer, however the top pen reached 312c/kg, which was substantially dearer compared to recent markets. The same weight heifer portion to the restockers and backgrounders gained 8c, making from 152c to 240c/kg. The limited supply of yearlings suitable for the restockers sold at similar prices compared to the last market. The high yielding prime younger cattle gained as much as 30c to 40c, with quality and yield contributing in places, as good percentages carrying plenty of weight sold from 300c to 366c/kg. There were too few grown steers and heifers to quote. The plainer 1 and 2 score cows remained close to firm to 5c cheaper, making from 56c to 158c/kg. The better covered heavy weights eased 5c and made from 160c to 205c/kg. The best heavy weight bull topped at 230c/kg.

Scone report date 5 June 2018

Consignments declined substantially and the quality remained mixed, with the younger cattle well supplied. There was a good penning of cows with 250 in the market, with the plainer poorer pens along with the better covered heavier weights offered. The prime conditioned younger cattle suitable for the butchers were limited in supply. The market trend was firm to cheaper. The over 200kg vealer steers to the restockers eased 5c, making from 196c to 272c/kg. The same weight vealer heifers returning to the paddock remained close to firm, making from 110c to 240c/kg. Yearling steers were limited in number, as the better end to the restockers and lot feeders made from 136c to 260c/kg. The yearling heifers suitable for the restockers sold from 138c to 240c/kg. The prime conditioned younger cattle to the butchers topped at 296c/kg. There were too few grown steers and heifers to quote. The plainer 1 and 2 score cows to the processors eased 15c and made from 46c to 160c/kg. The better finished heavy weights eased 13c and sold from 152c to 184c/kg. The best heavy weight bull reached 210c/kg.

TRLX Tamworth report date 4 June 2018

In a reduced penning, cows made up 30%. Young cattle well supplied with limited numbers of grown steers and heifers. The quality was fair to good albeit very mixed. Overall the condition of the offering was down with the cool, dry weather and lack of feed showing effects. The usual buyers were in attendance with most participating. Market trends varied through the young cattle, the well-bred, better quality steer vealers to restock and feed sold to dearer trends and substantially so in places where quality showed an improvement. Heifer vealers and weaners sold to cheaper trends, 12c/kg and more in places. Medium and heavy weight yearling steers suitable to feed saw a firm to dearer trend, with most of the price improvement in the medium weights where there were some very good quality lots. Yearling heifers to restock and feed sold to cheaper trends with reduced demand. Secondary quality young cattle were heavily discounted with both restockers and feedlotters showing limited interest. The limited supply of well finished heavy grown steers sold to a cheaper trend of 6c/kg. In another large penning of cows market trends were cheaper. The plainest condition cows were heavily discounted, while the well finished heavy weight cows were down by 6c/kg on the better lots and more on those with less yield potential.

EYCI hits three-year low

Cattle in poor condition have reportedly been fetching just 30 cents per kilogram at some sale yards across NSW. The Eastern States Young Cattle Indicator (EYCI) is sitting at 466 cents per kg — its lowest level in three years, while prices at some sales have declined drastically in comparison to last year.

Mr MacCallum said prices at the Hunter Valley Angus Sale had dropped significantly. "Last year was the best we've ever seen so we weren't expecting it to be that good anyway [and] the results this year were around half of last year." In Darwin, the live export price has dropped significantly in the last few months.

Feeder steers going to Indonesia were earning \$3.20 per kg in February and that has dropped nearly 20 per cent to \$2.60 per kg, well down on the 2016 price, which reached \$3.95 per kg.

Robust backups offer protection, not just from security failures, but also from the many other ways that files become inaccessible.

I fear that a small business, duped the advice, will waste time, effort and money on improved computer security, just to be ruined by something

Backup. Backup. Backup.

Actually, ransomware is among the better things that can go wrong, because its relatively easy to recover from. The hardware still functions, the operating system works, its just data files that are effected. Delete the maliciously encrypted files, restore from the latest backup and get on with life. I would much rather deal with a ransomware attack than a failed hard drive or a power surge from a lightning strike. With good backups, ransomware should be an inconvenience, not a

Australia Post warns employees of possible data breach after PageUp malware

Australia Post is warning employees that their personal information may have been compromised after a possible breach of data held by cloud-based human resources (HR) software provider PageUp. The Australian software-asa-service vendor has revealed that its clients' data may have been compromised after the company detected "unusual activity" in May. The company's system was infected with malware, which has subsequently been removed, according to the software vendor.

PageUp's customers include Telstra, Michael Hill, Linfox Armguard Group and Australia Post. On 5 June, the Australia Post

advised that it was writing to

all employees whose applications had come through the system since it began using PageUp to let them know how the potential breach may affect them. "We recommend that they and others who have used our online recruitment system from October 2016 check that there has been no unusual activity concerning their personal information, the Australia Post advised. PageUp informed customers

that details such as name and

contact details of users could have been breached as well as usernames and passwords. However, passwords were encrypted, the company said. Australia Post revealed that the information that may have been breached is extended in the case of successful applicants, and

would have included personal information such as bank details, tax file number and superannuation details, diversity information, emergency contact information, conditions of

other details.

Telstra advised it has suspended the use of PageUp services while the investigations into the issue takes place.

As we learn more about Annie's family history, and as the consequences of the Horrific Event unfold, we're bombarded with numerous eerie possibilities. Sleepwalking! Parental regret! Seances! Family secrets! The emotional tension between certain characters is sometimes as nerveracking as the more

traditional scary-movie elements. It's not one specific thing we're afraid of, either, nor does the film limit itself to one sense of the word "horror." It has many good old-fashioned scares, sure (assisted by a crisp sound design and Colin Stetson's disorienting score), but it also has events, images, and ideas that are horrifying without being meant to cause "fright," per se. One kind of horror rattles your nerves for two hours, the other kind rattles them for days afterward. Collette's intensely committed performance is the anchor, but the others shine as well. Alex Wolff (Jumanji: Welcome to the Jungle), who's great at looking stricken, conveys complicated emotions wordlessly in several key moments. CONT MA)15+

Roseanne and the planet of the racists

Roseanne Barr's appeal has so long eluded me that her further fall from disgrace has failed to dislodge even the slightest pebble of pity, though pitiful she is.

It seems too facile to call her merely racist, which her tweet about former White House adviser Valerie Jarrett plainly establishes. Barr said that Jarrett was the result if the "muslim brotherhood & planet of the apes had a baby," amusing approximately no one.

No, Barr is more than an Ambien-enhanced racist;

she's what happens when a struggling network (ABC) sells out in a bid to capture Donald Trump's base. If executives had but tuned into Barr's Twitter account sooner, they'd have known she was a Trumpster suffering conspiracy fever. Then again, maybe they did know and didn't care. Ratings, baby, ratings are all that matter. Barr has apologized six ways from Sunday. In later tweets, she recalled begging ABC President Ben Sherwood not to cancel the recently resurrected show, saying that she thought Jarrett, who was a senior adviser to President Barack Obama, was actually white. She added that Jarrett "looks like my family!"

Sure. And did she also think that Jarrett was, what, a Presbyterian and not really a Muslim, as people on the fringe-right have long held? No, Barr was obviously tapping into the conspiracy theory that Jarrett, who was born to African-American parents living in Iran, is Muslim — and the racist's persistent belief that blacks are inferior and less evolved than whites.

This is such an enduring, dehumanizing trope of racists that it requires no further elucidation. That Barr, whose knuckles must be raw from strolling the sewers of her foul dreamscape, should select the ape and the terrorist Brotherhood to represent Jarrett's parentage is, in Sherwood's words, "egregious and unforgivable."

But, the Ambien made her do it! This was one of the explanations Barr offered, as she rifled through her primordial psyche in search of a credible excuse. Ambien may help you sleep, but it doesn't make you a mean, ugly person. Those conditions would be considered pre-existing and the "Ambien haze" to which Barr referred, a release of the inherent being. As the drug's maker

tweeted: Racism is not a known side effect of Ambien. The overwhelming



condemnation of Barr's remarks has proved at least one thing: Racism won't be tolerated in this country ever again. We can infer this because Barr made a similar racist remark in 2013 about then-national security adviser Susan Rice with little disapproval. With her familiar classiness, Barr tweeted that Rice, also African-American, was "a man with big swinging ape balls." Who thinks like this? Racists, that's who. Nevertheless, some have leapt to Barr's defense. Free speech, y'all, comes the chorus from quarters where the First Amendment is only selectively admired. Speech is free, all right, but it doesn't mean free from consequences — and free markets decide what sells. It didn't take guts for ABC to cancel "Roseanne." It took only a modicum of humanity — and, of course, the understanding that advertisers and audiences would no longer support the show.

No doubt, Barr's anguish over about the consequences shared by her cast and co-stars is sincere. But bottom line: There is no excuse. Inadvertently, the incident also highlighted who Valerie Jarrett is: a strong, intelligent, welleducated, service-driven, thoughtful, warm and charming woman of historic significance. One hopes that Jarrett, whom I count as a friend, is also impervious to the Barrs of the world. Regrettably, these include the current president, who rose to office on the racist "birther" myth about Obama's origins and was elected in spite of a long history of moral turpitude and alleged sexual abuse.

On a positive note, Trump and Barr are to be credited with shining a light on America's underbelly and uniting decent Americans in common cause.

In the meantime, Jarrett floats above the fray with grace and dignity, seeking ways to make this a teaching moment, and reminding us of what true leadership looks like.

Principal's Message

Early Learning

'If you want creative workers, give them enough time to play' John Cleese; Recently I attended a 'Creative Collaborations Symposium' evening at the University of Newcastle with our Kindergarten teachers. There were presentations from lecturers from the University of Reggio Emilia and Modena (Italy) as well as the University of Newcastle. The Reggio Emilia area of Italy has for many decades been ground-breaking in its approach to investigative play and creativity in early learning.

School

The symposium challenged educators to practice creative thinking in all areas of their students' learning. Children need to be given the opportunity to engage in self-directed discovery experiences, with educators encouraging them to make connections & see relationships between concepts. This is achieved using open ended questions, thinking routines and problem-solving activities. As educators we are focussed on assisting students to be imaginative with a purpose.

The debate as whether children should be taught to think (creatively and critically) or just learn to regurgitate fact and what constitutes intelligence is one that all educators and parents along with industry must have. Children are born inquisitive and creative! Why do we insist that we have them pass or fail in a school setting!

Grace bus change

As parents would be aware, there has been a change to the afternoon (early) Grace bus service. Hunter Valley bus has been engaged to cope with the overflow of students on this bus. Its route 179 service (a public service) will divert from Clift St via both schools. Review: Hereditary

Milly Shapiro, a girl with a distinct look who got her start playing Roald Dahl's Matilda on Broadway, is perfectly cast as a misfit with sinister potential. Gabriel Byrne isn't given as much to do — he only married into this family, after all — but he quietly provides stability. There's also a noteworthy turn from Ann Dowd as a member of a grief support group who provides Annie with some solace. With just a few short films under his belt (some of them also highly alarming), 31-year-old writer-director Ari Aster delivers his first feature with astonishing confidence, as if he'd been making stylishly effective heart-pounders for decades. At <u>Sundance</u>, he introduced a screening of *Hereditary* by saying he'd had "a rough few years" with his family. Whatever has happened in this guy's life, he's working through it by traumatizing audiences. One moment elicited an audience-wide "Gahh!" that was followed by stunned, disbelieving silence. I wish there'd been a camera to capture us all with our eyes wide, our mouths agape, our armrests broken. (It wasn't just a shock-value moment, either, but a legitimate turn in the story.) There's another image later that makes me shudder – an involuntary physical reaction — every time I think of it. If there's a better horror movie this year, I'm going to need new pants!



Bust Your Motivation Myths

A good friend of mine sent me a message recently and suggested I write a blog about motivation (or, as she put it, "how to give yourself a kick in the fat butt"). Some Personal Trainers would say motivation is a myth. Other people would say the size of your butt should not be an issue (I tend to agree – as my comments after seeing the film "Embrace" would indicate). What I do know, is that once the size of your butt (or anything else about your physical dimensions) starts hindering what you love doing (eg riding horses, running marathons, playing with the kids, walking up stairs, doing the gardening) to the extent that YOU want to do it, then you KNOW you need to do something about it. So what stops us?

We all know that eating well is good for us. Regardless of the effect on our waistline, there are positive benefits for our health, such as better blood pressure, lower blood glucose levels, lower risk of heart disease, the list goes on. The same with exercise – moderate levels of exercise can help everything from your mood to your memory, as well as your weight and stamina. So again I ask, what stops us doing the things we know are good for us, or better still, doing the things which will actively move towards our

My friend confided in me that she has just bought a new set of "tails". For those of you who are non-horsey, "tails" are a type of coat worn by equestrians who are competing at a certain level in dressage (as in "top hat and tails"). While top hats are less common now (due to safety considerations when riding), the "tails" are still considered a rite of passage, or a symbol of a goal attained. Everyone remembers their first set of tails.

I am sure my friend looks great in her "tails". More importantly, I am just as sure she wants to keep feeling that way while giving herself and her horse the best chance of success. Which is why she wants a "kick in the fat

"Whether you think you can or whether you think you can't, you're right." Henry Ford. And what stops many of us from starting towards a goal, even though we know what we need to do to get there, is two things – the fear of failure, and the knowledge of how hard we have to work to succeed! The latter is usually reserved for those who have tried and succeeded before they know what it takes to "get there", and they wonder if they have the energy or the determination to do it again, or maybe they tell themselves the circumstances are different this time, so they are not likely to succeed. Either way it is what they THINK that matters.

Take me for instance, my weight has always been up and down, despite eating relatively well and being quite active. The first time I remember being REALLY over weight and actively doing something about it was after the birth of my son. I spent the first few months after he was born in a haze of hormones, then I started back riding and doing other activities, and I was NOT happy with my weight OR my fitness (and nor were my horses!). So I did something about it – I signed up for Weight Watchers, started a regular exercise program, and I felt great!! I maintained this for a few years, then went through a mid-life crisis (aided by a few "life events") and I put on 20kgs. I kept telling myself It was ok, the weight would come off when the crisis was over. But it didn't. The weight stayed, My riding suffered, my self esteem suffered (anyone who helped me zip up my riding boots during that period will know just how bad it was, lol).

So why didn't I do something about it? Why didn't I go back to what had worked before? Weight Watchers and exercise? It was because there was one crucial factor which was different, and that was breast feeding. The first time I had done weight watchers I had been breast feeding, and rightly or wrongly I had attributed my weight loss success to the extra kilojoules consumed in the production of breast milk for my baby.

Fast forward a few years (yes, years) and I finally convinced myself that what had worked before COULD work again (and if it didn't, I wouldn't be any worse off). I learned pretty quickly that I had to get serious. I had to stop kidding myself about how much I was eating, how much exercise I was doing, and how good my routines were. I also had to smash the negative self-talk on its head. And the first step to doing that was

WRITE IT DOWN. Think of every excuse you make for not exercising/not eating right/not being organised/not getting your project done, and make a list. And when you think the list is finished, keep adding to it. Now for EVERY excuse, write at least ONE "counter spell". And if you think of something that is an excuse for doing the "counter spell", then write a counter spell for that too!

Now, whenever you think of that excuse, immediately think of the counter spell and how to implement it.

Second, GIVE YOURSELF A POWER SURGE, And I'm not talking about the ones you get at THAT time of life. Remind yourself that YOU are the one in charge. The sense of power which comes with doing what you say you will do, when what you think and what you say and what you do are aligned, is powerful.

NEXT, enlist support. You DON'T have to do it alone. You CAN ask for help. There is nothing more motivating than knowing that someone else is relying on you to show up and do your bit. And they will kick your butt in

FINALLY, fake it until you make it. Like many other things in life, you don't need "motivation" to succeed – you just need to keep showing up. Do it once, then just keep doing it, even if you don't want to. Before you know it, the thing you were most scared of will be a habit you can't live without.
