

All set for 90th Anniversary "Lock Out" & "Rothbury Riot" re-enactment to be staged at North Rothbury

THE 16th December 2019 will see the 90th Anniversary of the coal miners "Lock Out" & riot at North Rothbury & to mark this historic occasion North Rothbury Tidy Town & the CFMEU (Mining & Energy) have combined to produce a three-act re-enactment & short memorial service.

It is to be performed on Sunday 15th December 2019 on the original site at North Rothbury at 3pm. Just to recap; on 16 December 1929, New South Wales Police drew their revolvers and shot into a crowd of locked-out miners at North Rothbury, killing a 29-year-old miner, Norman Brown, and injuring approximately forty-five

miners. The incident became known as the **Rothbury affair** or the **Rothbury Lock Out & riot,** and is described as the

"bloodiest event in national industrial history." In 1929 colliery owners on the Northern New South Wales coalfields combined as the Northern Collieries Association.

On Thursday 14 February 1929 the mine employers gave their 9,750 employees 14 days' notice, that they (the miners) should accept the following new conditions:

A wage reduction of 12¹/₂ m per cent on the contract nates, one shilling (\$0.10) a day on the "day wage" rate; all Lodges must give the colliery managers the right to hire and fire without S

regard to seniority; all Lodges must agree to discontinue pit-top meetings and pit stoppages.

The miners refused to accept these terms, and on Saturday 2 March 1929, all miners were "locked out" of their


employment. In September 1929, the NSW State Parliament introduced an *Unlawful Assembly Act* designed to suppress the miners, which authorised police to break up any gatherings.

On 16 December 1929 about 5,000 miners demonstrated against the introduction of non-union labour into the North Rothbury mine by the conservative Bavin government, which had taken over the colliery. The government called in 70 New South Wales police officers

from districts outside Newcastle to protect the colliery and allow the entry of non-union labour. Angry miners marched to the mine gate led by a pipe band. When they charged the gate bearing clubs and firearms, the miners were met with defensive baton blows by the police and there were hand-to-hand clashes. Three shots had been fired at the police and the order to draw their revolvers and fire a volley of shots over the heads of the rioters and then into the ground. One miner, Norman Brown, received a fatal wound from a ricocheting bullet. The youngest miner was 15-yearold Joseph Cummings, who risked his life, dodging bullets as he ran for the doctor, in a futile effort to help save Brown's life. The Sydney Daily Telegraph Pictorial described the event as "the most dramatic industrial clash that has even shocked Australia." In June 1930, after fifteen months of living in poverty

and starvation, the miners capitulated and returned to work on reduced contract wages. However, the *lockout* failed to break the resolve or organisation of the miners union.

Council's annual report tells a positive story

Cessnock City Council has released its 2018/19 Annual Report which highlights Council is so much more than rates, roads and rubbish when it comes to what it delivers to our community.

The 2018/19 financial year was a busy one as the staff and Councillors worked hard to achieve the objectives within the Community Strategic Plan, Delivery Program and Operational Plan.

The numbers for some of Council's services in 2018/19 were quite staggering. The Cessnock Performing Arts Centre sold 16,478 tickets, there were 176,996 visitors to local libraries, 186,749 pool visits and 92,000 visitors to Hunter Valley Visitor Information Centre. The Cessnock Waste Management Centre had 43,649 visits through the gate, there were 3,518 tonnes of recoverable materials received and local garbage collections saw 1.13 million bins emptied. Council's Customer Service Team was busy responding to community members, taking 55,394 calls, resolving 24,093 customer requests and helping over 7,500 people at the counter. In the planning department, there were 937 local Development Applications determined. Federal and State Government grant funding is a way for Council to deliver large scale projects to the community and in 2018/19, Council secured close to \$13 million in additional funding. This has enabled for projects like Bridges Hill Park, the Cessnock CBD revitalisation, the Parks Shade Program and the new Hunter Valley Wine Country Tourism Signage. Council's capital works program saw nearly \$15 million of works delivered to our community which incorporates over \$5 million in road renewal jobs and close to \$2 million invested in local bridges. Council's General Manager, Lotta Jackson said the annual report shows Council is in a strong position and

she looks forward to another positive year. "We have some exciting projects in our operational plan and delivery program and we will continue to apply for

FOR once, hell had no fury Firies save North Rothbury from a fiery grave ~ hero's all of them

Imagine being shrouded in smoke, your eyes stinging with the dust, the raging heat pricking at your skin, the protective gear weighing you down - all while you are trying to battle a wall of flames.

That's what firefighters from our region faced when they travelled to North Rothbury & Greta on Tuesday 12th November as the predicted catastrophic conditions wreaked havoc in the two towns.

The emergency gave the firies little time to orchestrate a timely evacuation of residents with many unable to get out.

Those that did evacuate had packed their bags, handpicking their most cherished items, whatever could fit in the back of their cars, and waved goodbye to their homes, hoping and praying that when they returned their living rooms, their bedrooms, their bathrooms would not be charred ruins. That their lives would carry on uninterrupted. Their hope was justified. As soon as the fire was spotted at North Rothbury, only a short throw from the western side of Wine Country Drive North Rothbury, the North Rothbury RFS Brigade was first respondent and realizing the enormity of the situation

called disparately for backup which arrived very shortly after. The RFS used Wine Country

Drive as a containment line & didn't take a backward step with 5 firies going down with smoke inhalation. At the zenith of the battle there were about 10 fire

trucks & 2 helicopter water bombers. The firies prevailed leaving 4 homes damaged and a very thankful community. At about the same time Greta had a huge blaze erupt at York Street and Harper Streets & the fire at Whittingham (Singleton) was still at danger level putting enormous strain on our fire fighters to man and fight these fires. A resident of North Rothbury, who wishes to

remain anonymous, said that the RFS had saved their home and was there as it happened, unable to evacuate.

"If it wasn't for the courageous actions of the Rural Fire Service we would not have a home going onto Christmas; they were amazing," he said. Cessnock City Mayor, Councillor Bob Pynsent said while it was a terrifying afternoon for many, he was proud of what he saw, which was the enormous bravery of our firefighters and our

community rallying together to support one another. "On behalf of Council, I would like to thank both residents and firefighters who were on the scene; we have such wonderful community spirit and that really shone through." "Special thanks goes out to and Recreation Club for becoming the local evacuation centre and to those who made the Cessnock Showground available to shelter livestock. People were preparing food and drinks to share with firefighters, which was heart-warming to see. Neighbours were helping neighbours. It was a huge community effort." 'While fires in the area have been downgraded to advice level, we still urge residents

to be vigilant and have a plan in place in the case of another fire event," added Cr Pynsent.

A lucky escape from arson

The fires on Tuesday 12 November were a little too close for comfort. What surprised me was that until about 10am that day all seemed relatively safe. Then

the FIRES-NEAR-ME (a great app & wonderful use of modern digital technology), came up with a succession of fires; Old North Road near Hermitage Road, the Golden Highway at Whittingham and Wine Country Drive near the roundabout at Huntlee but no smoke could be seen.

Just after, noting the warnings I had occasion to drive from North Rothbury to Branxton and saw no evidence of a fire near the roundabout at Huntlee. What was going on? Either we had false alarms or the Fire Fighters were so quickly on to these reports that the outbreaks had been

dealt with almost immediately leaving little evidence of a fire. This was not the case at Whittingham. Earlier that morning I spoke


to a neighbour about the level of threat that had been declared and asked if he had a plan. He said his runaway stuff was already in the car but he was on dogwatch and planned to sleep that day, adding would I kick down his front door if things turned nasty. After viewing the warning on the phone I went to his house and checked him.

Fortunately, he was already awake and had cancelled going to work that night; just in case.

About ten minutes after I returned from Branxton that same neighbour stopped his car outside my place and told me that a fire was

burning at the end of Rothbury Street. Smoke started streaming overhead and getting thicker by the second. At the same time the welcome sound of fire trucks was heard coming to the rescue.







I have learnt that there are, on average, 62,000 fires in Australia every year. Only a very small number strike far from populated areas and satellite studies tell us that lightning is responsible for only 13 per cent. Not so the current fires threatening to engulf Queensland and NSW. There were no lightning strikes on most of the days when the fires first started in September. Although there have been since, these fires - joining up to create a new form of mega

-fire - are almost all man-made. Having seen the catastrophic ferocity & velocity of bushfires first hand at North Rothbury on the 12 November I can say that without our volunteer 'firies'

North Rothbury would have been burnt to cinders. After the emergency I did my own enquiries & found exactly where the fire started; no lightening or glass fragments just a criminal with a match or lighter. From the start of the current bushfires fires some weeks ago at Taree & further North of the state I resolved myself to the fact that they were a result of arsonists; we had the same conditions here in the valley with virtually no

fires. At the time I disagreed with **RFS** Commissioner Shane Fitzsimmons for not telling the public that the majority had been the work of arsonists. I suspect his rationale was to not encourage 'copy cats'. If the general public had been made aware we would have had all Australians alert to

'cunning, versatile criminals', more common in school holidays, expert

warns The rate of deliberately lit

fires escalates rapidly during the school holiday period,

The warning comes after emergency services personnel spent the National Centre for Research in Bushfire and Arson, said the great majority of bushfires are furtive and versatile criminals".

"About 85 per cent are related to human activity, 13 per cent confirmed arson and 37 per cent suspected arson,"

he said. "The remainder are usually due to reckless fire lighting or even just children playing with fire.'

Dr Read said holidays and summer were a bad combination when it came to

fire starters "School holidays are a prime time for fire bugs, but especially over summer," he

said. "The kids have got time to get out there and light, and the most dangerous adults choose hot days.

Taskforce Overcross, which was set up by police this month, found 23 bushfires were thought to have been deliberately or carelessly lit, with action taken against 21 juveniles and nine adults. The bushfire in the Gold Coast hinterland that destroyed 11 properties and the historic Binna Burra Lodge is still under

investigation. Two teenagers were charged over the Peregian Springs blaze and there have also been "suspicious" fires at Geebung on Brisbane's northside, Pimpama on the northern Gold Coast and in central Queensland. Backpackers who accidentally started the Stanthorpe and Applethorpe fires on the Granite Belt will not be charged. Police dealt with a 12-year-

old boy under the Youth Justice Act, over a deliberately lit fire that destroyed bushland in Logan simple answer as to why

were also questioned over a bushfire that came close to homes at Ormeau on the north Gold Coast. Dr Read said while it was disturbing that so many children have

been

involved in lighting the recent fires, it's not surprising and sometimes not

malicious. "Children with autism can have a fascination with fire and we also have kids who are victims of child abuse, neglect and depression and often the fire lighting is a cry

for help," Dr Read said. There is another group that is just experimenting with fire play and it gets out of hand. "The fourth group is the difficult group who are truly malicious and heading toward developing full-

blown adult psychopathy. This is the group that really needs to be handled by the justice system." **Older arsonists 'more**

concerning' Dr Read, who is also a Research Fellow at Melbourne's Monash University, said he was more concerned about older arsonists, who are likely to light fires on high fire danger days and closer to populated areas.

"These people are above the age of 30 and get more dangerous the older they get," he said. "What we're dealing with are people who are pretty embittered with life, some of low intelligence and others who have issues with violence, alcohol and drugs. "They suffer depression and sometime have personality disorders, sparked by relationship breakdowns or the loss of a job."

"Arson is a very serious offence that can lead to life imprisonment.' Dr Read praised the formation of the taskforce. "I absolutely commend that, it is very responsive," he

"This taskforce will have the ability to collaborate with other departments, police and firefighters and even the community. Arson is a very furtive crime and it's usually the community that has suspicions and that information needs to get to police.'

The Circle: Symbolises God's everlasting love for His people, a love which gives us Jesus so that we may know the extent of his love.


Evergreens: Represent the eternal life to come and the new life Christ brings to the world.

Like all local councils. Singleton Council did everything possible to support the NSW Rural Fire Service, NSW Police and the emergency services as they lead the response to several incidents across our region, battling extreme and unprecedented conditions to save hundreds of homes and prevent the further spread of

bushfires It does not seem enough to say thank you to all of those emergency services personnel, Council staff and the agencies who were on the ground and literally at the firefront in dangerous conditions. It is due to your courage and dedication that there were no further losses, and why many of us are still able to sleep in our own beds. We owe you a great debt. Our thoughts and prayers continue to be with everyone who was affected by the fires in the Singleton and

neighbouring local government areas, as well as across NSW. But if there is anything positive to come out of last week's catastrophic conditions, it is to commend everyone in our community who accepted and took appropriate action, and the wonderful way the people of

Singleton always support each other in times of need. Like the way we have all banded together in the face of the worst drought on record. Last week's conditions highlighted, yet again, the consequences of drought as many local property owners feared first of all the arrival of a bushfire, and secondly whether there would be any water to fight it.

So as the smoke settles and the hot, dry conditions move into summer, it's more important than ever that proper recognition is given to all areas experiencing drought.

No one could begrudge new initiatives for droughtaffected areas announced by the Federal Government recently. But I am furious Singleton continues to be left off the list for eligibility and I am far from giving in. I will continue to lobby on behalf of our farming community. People in our local

government area are

suffering in this drought, just set by the regulator. as people are suffering across Pauline Hanson's Bill failed our region and across Australia. We know there are votes to 31. Liberal and projects that can be done in our LGA to support droughtaffected properties to develop and enhance water assets to build longer-term resilience and redundancy so that when the next dry spell comes - or the next bushfire the impacts won't be so

pronounced. I invite Prime Minister Scott Morison and Deputy Prime Minister Michael McCormack to come to Singleton so that he can meet personally with the mums, dads and kids who are our farming families, to look at their faces and tell them that they're just not doing it tough enough. It's been twenty years since a Coalition Government, led by John Howard, deregulated Australia's dairy industry. Howard did not act precipitously. Rather, he took the next steps in a long period of necessary reform beginning with Labor Primary Industries Minister, John Kerin. Not long after, the big

supermarket chains saw opportunity, using fresh milk as a loss-leader in a strategy to build market share at the expense of the corner store. It was a strategy that by 2011 gave birth to the "dollar milk" so despised by dairy farmers.

Long caught in a cost-price squeeze, our dairy farmers are leaving in droves as the drought adds to their woes. Their production costs continue to rise while the price of fresh milk and cheese remain stubbornly

low In the Parliament this week, Labor teamed with Pauline Hanson's One Nation and others in a second attempt to save our dairy farming families by supporting a Bill which largely mirrored the policy Labor took to the 2019 election: a proposal to introduce a Minir Gate Milk Price. The concept is a simple one. An independent regulator would regularly assess the cost of producing milk within each dairy region. It would then set a minimum farm gate price just above that cost. A Mandatory Code of Conduct would protect farmers from the power of the big processors while still allowing farmers to negotiate Parks. With this beauty the best price for their milk - comes significant fire risk

in the Senate last week 30 National Party Senators voted together to defeat the proposal. The vote took place the same day it was becoming clear that the Morrison-McCormack Government is not even capable of implementing a Code of Conduct to manage the power imbalance between our farmers and the processors who purchase their milk. Finally dragged screaming to support a Code, it's been twenty months since the

implementation process began. Sadly, last week we learned the Government is working hard to water-down its own draft Code. The more enlightened farm leaders advise that the amended draft Code would be worse for farmers than not having a Code at all. The Code is supposed to level the playing field for dairy farmers by amongst other things stopping claw-back provisions in contracts which retrospectively cut payments to farmers. When asked four times on ABC radio this week to explain the dilution, Agriculture Minister, Bridget McKenzie, declined to do so

four times. It is not overreach to suggest that without change, we could lose our dairy industry and find ourselves importing our drinking milk. Already we import around half of the dairy products we consume. Yet Scott Morrison refuses to act and National Party MPs are either unwilling, or unable, to stand up for our farmers and to him. Former Leader Black Jack McEwen will be rolling in his grave! Cheers, Joel

Raising the BARR **OUR CATASTROPHIC FIRE** DAY WAS FORTUNATELY

NOT CATASTROPHIC I want to thank and applaud all efforts made by everyone last week for what could have State Government or its terrible Tuesday While we most certainly had some fire events, the preparations and response by fire services and community allowed us to get on top of the problem as quickly as possible with a minimum of damage. One of the beauties of our

region is the vast amount of bushland - privately owned and natural, Crown Land, State Forests and National though no less than the price during our hot dry summers.

Controlling fires inside of our urban, cleared, residential areas is possible, but controlling fires in our rugged bushland is far more problematic. Fortunately, last week, our fires did not get into this largely uncontrollable fire land. It is important to note that by and large the strategy for fire in bushland is to allow it burn until it is a threat to life and property. So don't expect our brave fire men and women to be tracking deep into our bush to fight the fire, unless there is a strategic advantage to this in perhaps building a

fire break. There has been some chatter about the need to do more back-burning to prevent the worst of the fires by eating up their fuel before they start. There is some real common sense to this, especially in areas where bush and housing meet. There will no doubt be (I hope) a greater focus on this in the future. One really important message from last week's events is that we now have the ability and willingness to advise the wider community of these catastrophic days. Generally, the classification of catastrophic is only used on days when the humidity (moisture) in the air is very low, land very dry, temperatures high and winds strong. As we all saw last week, the use of a catastrophic fire rating has a significant impact on community with schools and other services closed down and large numbers of people off work to look after their families. For business owners, this is a pretty big hit to their operations. For large government agencies it makes it hard to deliver basic services. Governments, and all political parties, are very aware of all of this so no one will be using the rating of catastrophic lightly. It will only be used in the most extreme and dangerous of

circumstances. So finally I urge this caution; please don't be fooled by the absence of a terrible, widespread, catastrophic fire event in our local area last week; please don't fall into a state of emergency warning fatigue. The very next time that we get these same warnings, likely to be again during this summer, please take note of all warnings and please make all necessary preparations as if your life depended on it, because it might. The tragic events on the mid-north coast last week could just as easily have been right here, in our neighbourhood. And maybe next time they will. On behalf of the community thank you to our local firefighters for their fast action during the catastrophic fire conditions we experienced. Fires along Wine Country Drive, North Rothbury, York Street and Harper Street, Greta were escalated to emergency warning. The blazes threatened dozens of homes forcing residents to evacuate. Bimbadgen and the Mushroom Group must be acknowledged for their huge show of community spirit in offering free tickets to Rob Thomas to firefighters, their families and those impacted by the fires. What a wonderful way to show support to our local community. There was an exceptional turn out last Wednesday to the Cessnock Walks Kawuma where our community came together in solidarity to raise awareness of the impacts of

Air pollutio

Air pollution: an overview It is well known that air pollution can be harmful to our health. The air we breathe can contain a variety of pollutants emitted into the

atmosphere outdoors (also called ambient air) as well as into the air indoors. Air pollution can contain a mixture of solid particles, liquid droplets and gases from a variety of sources such as industry, motor vehicles, heating appliances, and tobacco smoke.

Air pollution can also be generated by natural events such as bush fires and can contain windblown dust, pollen and mould spores. The composition of air pollution can vary greatly, depending on the season, the weather and the types and numbers of sources. At the levels measured in Australia, the effect of air pollution on any individual's health is generally very small. However, because everyone is exposed to air pollution the total effect across the whole population can be substantial. In Australia, it is estimated that about 1%

of the total burden of disease is due to air pollution.

How does air pollution affect your health?

Exposure to air pollution may cause a wide range of health effects. These vary from mild symptoms such as irritation of your eyes, nose and throat, to more serious conditions such as lung (respiratory) and heart (cardiovascular) diseases.

Depending on the particular pollutant, shortterm exposure has different health effects to long-term exposure. Short -term exposure exacerbates, or makes worse, pre-existing illnesses such as asthma, chronic bronchitis (also called chronic obstructive pulmonary disease or COPD) or heart disease. Longer-term exposure can actually cause the development of

respiratory and heart conditions and shorten someone's life. Read more about specific

adverse health effects in Common air pollutants and their health effects, Who is affected by air pollution and Simple steps to protect your health. Who is affected by air

pollution? Everyone can be affected by air pollution especially when exposed over prolonged periods of time. However, some groups of people may be more susceptible than others in regards to exposure to air pollution. Different pollutants may affect these groups differently. For example, several of the pollutants may trigger symptoms in people with asthma, whereas people with heart disease are most likely to be affected by particle pollution. The following people are more likely to be affected: People with asthma: exposure to air pollution might worsen your symptoms or trigger asthma attacks. Use your reliever medicine and check you have an up to date asthma action plan.

• People with lung disease, such as chronic bronchitis (also called chronic obstructive pulmonary disease or COPD): exposure to air pollution might worsen your symptoms. Use your reliever medicine and see your doctor if symptoms don't resolve.

People with cardiovascular (heart) disease: exposure to air pollution might induce symptoms such as palpitations, chest pain or shortness of breath. If your symptoms persist or are severe, you should seek urgent medical advice from vour doctor or nearest Emergency Department. People can be more susceptible to some type of air pollution in certain life stages:

• Unborn babies (pregnant women):

exposure to high levels of air pollution over longer time periods (ie weeks to months) may be linked to adverse pregnancy outcomes such as reduced birth weight or preterm birth. **Children** are likely to be more vulnerable to exposure to air pollution compared to adults for the following reasons:

- * Their lungs are still growing and developing* Their immune and
- metabolic systems are still developing * They suffer from frequent
- respiratory infections * They are more active outdoors than adults and therefore breathe in higher doses of outdoor
- pollutant
 However, most evidence suggests the

evidence suggests that this is more likely in situations when concentrations are elevated over long periods of time and not just over a few days. There is so far no evidence that short-term increases in air pollution have permanent effects on the developing lung. Some children are especially vulnerable. This includes children with underlying

chronic lung conditions such as asthma and cystic

fibrosis. Older adults: Older people are more likely to be affected by air pollution, perhaps due to generally weaker immune systems, or cardiovascular health conditions. As people age, their bodies are less able to compensate for the effects of environmental hazards. Air pollution can aggravate heart disease and stroke, lung diseases such as chronic bronchitis (also called chronic obstructive pulmonary disease or COPD) and asthma. Simple steps to protect

your health In Australia, state and federal governments are working closely together to keep the air as clean as possible. There are also steps individuals can take to reduce air pollution in the community such as choosing 'cleaner' domestic heaters and reducing the number of

trips in the car. In order to limit your exposure to air pollution, there are a number of simple steps you can take such as: **Check your local air**

quality index (AQI) to find information on current air pollution levels in your area

Know when and where air pollution may be bad Ozone is often worst on hot summer days,

especially in the afternoons and early evenings Particle pollution can be

bad any time of year. It can be especially bad when the weather is calm, allowing air pollution to build up. Particle levels can be high near busy roads, during rush hour, and when there is smoke in the air from wood heaters, hazard reduction activities or during bush fires. Dust storms will also generate high levels of

particle pollution. Avoid exercising near busy roads and industrial areas. If you experience symptoms, or tend to be susceptible to air pollution consider the following:

- Substitute your exercise with a less intense activity (e.g. walk
- instead of jog) Reduce the time you are exercising outdoors
- In summer, plan your most vigorous activities for the morning See your doctor if
- symptoms are severe or do not settle after reducing exposure
 - Reduce your air pollution inside your home Don't smoke indoors
 - Regularly ventilate


your home to remove indoor pollutants and build up of moisture. Turn on exhaust fans, particularly when bathing, showering, cooking, doing laundry and drying clothes.

- Don't use wood-fired stoves and wood-burning heaters (fire places) in your home if possible. If you do use a wood-burning heater, follow the recommendations on our factsheet on wood-burning heaters to minimise air pollution
- Don't use unflued gas heaters if possible. If you do use an unflued gas heater, follow the recommendations on our factsheet on unflued gas heaters
- Install a kitchen exhaust fan above your gas cook top if possible
- undiagnosed respiratory or cardiovascular health Consider limiting burning candles and incense Don't use ozone generators for managing
 - indoor air pollution or odour problems. If you suffer from asthma, other respiratory conditions such as chronic bronchitis (also called chronic obstructive pulmonary disease or COPD), or

cardiovascular disease, make sure you have your reliever medicine handy.

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ARSON ~ BUSHFIRES

At least two people are dead, several remain missing and more than 150 homes have been destroyed in the past several weeks as bushfires have surged out of control along the Eastern Coast of Australia. With most of the country in severe drought, total fire bans are being enforced across every jurisdiction, but that doesn't stop people from doing the wrong thing. In far northern New South Wales over the weekend, two youths were arrested after allegedly setting a fire in scrubland at Kingscliff by gathering paper, dry leaves and vegetation and setting it alight with a cigarette lighter. A man walking past saw the

smoke, and the boys – who fled towards the beach. He tried to put the fire out himself before calling the fire brigade. Firefighters managed to put the fire out quickly, but the damage could have been much worse in the hot, dry conditions.

Police eventually caught two young teens who they believe started the fire. Aged 13 and 14, the boys have been dealt with under the Young Offenders Act. A large percentage of fires you deliberately cause a are deliberately lit.

Estimates from the National Centre for Research in Bushfire and Arson suggest that of the 60,000 bushfires that occur each year in Australia, about 13% are started deliberately, and 37% have 'suspicious' origins. The crime of deliberately starting a fire is taken very seriously. It is a very dangerous crime - one that can cause extensive damage quickly, and which can seriously injure and kill people and animals, and a crime that is not always easy to solve. However, advances in science and forensics are making headway in this area. Last year the New South Wales parliament passed laws to increase the penalties for bushfire arson offences from 14 years to 21 years. In New South Wales, there

are four distinct offences within the Crimes Act 1900 which deal with the destruction of property by means of fire.

Causing a bushfire The offence of "causing a bushfire" is contained in s 203E of the Crimes Act. which says that you may be charged with this offence if

fire, and you are reckless as to whether that fire may spread to vegetation or public or private land. However, you will not be charged with an offence under this section where you started the fire under the direction of a fire fighter, or as part of your employment as a fire fighter, or where you caused the fire in the course of "hazard reduction operations" – i.e. back burning. Because of the serious consequences that may result from bushfires, the maximum penalty for this offence is 25 years imprisonment. Section 100(1) of the Rural

Fires Act 1997 (NSW) outlines the crime of deliberately lighting fires, mandating a maximum penalty of five years' imprisonment and/or a fine of \$11,000 for any person who, without lawful authority: sets fire or causes fire

being the owner or occupier of any land, permits a fire to escape



Co-living... is it the future of renting?

Co-living. For many Australian's it's a foreign concept, but what once could have been brushed off as a fad has become anything but. On Friday, Co-living operator Hmlet opened its largest offering yet - an 82-room warehouse conversion in the heart of St Peters. Describing co-living as 'a social lifestyle driven by shared values of mobility, sustainability and social responsibility,' Hmlet has already seen major success in Sydney, opening nine locations since its launch in January. Co-living comes in all shapes and sizes. It draws in tenants with it's 'no strings attached' message, offering fully

furnished rooms without the lengthy leases. In this latest St Peters build, Hmlet is offering single bedrooms from \$370 a week, with a shared bathroom, communal kitchen/dining and shared community space. For those who are more cashed up, there are entire apartments up for rent from \$800 per week. It's a tidy sum, but Hmlet Australia Managing Director Chrystan Paul says it's what you get for the money, that counts. "You have to look at it as what you're getting for \$370 a week", says Paul. "For \$370 a week you're

getting a fully furnished bedroom within a fully furnished apartment. You're getting all-inclusive bills, including high-speed internet and electricity. "You're also getting one you're getting access to a community, a concierge and you're not having to

lock yourself in to a 6 month or 12-month contract" The minimum stay in a Hmlet property is three months – a draw card which

is proving popular with the 25-35 age demographic. Paul says they cater to a lot of different people... but most fall into four categories.

"We're catering to expats, who can come to Australia and move in straight away, they don't have to be hassled with the likes of having to buy furniture, set up internet, find flatmates. That's been a solid part of

our demographic.' "A similar demographic is interstate travellers; they may be from Melbourne or Perth and have moved for a job.'

Paul says locals, frustrated with the traditional methods a select few builders and of renting also take up a significant chunk of their rooms, along with

The developer is building a co-living apartment complex in Waterloo, complete with 374 units. Crown Group chief executive Iwan Sunito told Domain, they travelled to Hong Kong to see how the concept was working there. Co-living has taken off across the globe, with major success in the UK, US and Asia.

For some, it's tipped as the answer to end urban loneliness, for others, the concept seems strange and lacking in privacy. Despite this, the potential for growth exists. Cracking down on shoddy builds

Following the disastrous defects which forced the evacuation of the Opal and Mascot Towers, the New South Wales government has moved to introduce new laws, which will better protect future apartment owners.

The Design and Building Practitioners Act 2019 (NSW) will dramatically increase the accountabilities new laws could result in for builders and designers, including a requirement to register plans for key elements such as fire safety and waterproofing, to ensure they are compliant with the Building Code of Australia.

The Design and Building Practitioners Bill 2019 [NSW] (Bill) proposes that designers will need to be registered practitioners and provide a compliance



The NSW Police Force is urging the community to be vigilant and report suspicious activity as investigations continue into the cause of bushfires across the state. Strike Force Tronto,

comprised of detectives from the Financial Crimes Squad's Arson Unit, has been working closely with individual police area commands and police districts to provide specialist assistance and advice to police on the ground.

Since August this year, legal action - which ranges from cautions through to criminal charges - has been taken against 54 people for 69 bushfire-related offences.

State Crime Commander, Assistant Commissioner Stuart Smith, said detectives use a range of proactive techniques and strategies in the lead-up to

and during the bushfire danger period. "Since the Emergency Declaration on Monday (11 November 2019), Strike Force Tronto has provided expertise to four police area commands and 12 police

districts," Assistant

Commissioner Smith said. Police are using proactive strategies and techniques to target potential bushfire arson and reduce the occurrences and impacts of bushfire arson. "Bushfires can be catastrophic, and any report of a deliberately-lit fire is treated extremely seriously," Assistant Commissioner Smith said. "Profiles on people deemed to pose a risk in relation to potential bushfire arson are prepared each season and provided to individual police area commands and police districts. "This process continues using additional intelligence collected throughout the danger

period." Investigations into suspicious fires are being conducted by detectives from individual police area commands and police districts, with assistance from specialist officers attached to Strike Force

'Information provided to police from members of the public can help identify and apprehend an arsonist and could help the police to prevent bushfire arson occurring," Assistant Commissioner Smith said. "If you see someone acting suspiciously, contact police, and if you see a bushfire, members of the public should always phone Triple Zero (000).' Penalties relating to

bushfires under the NSW Crimes Act, the Rural Fires Act, and Rural Fires **Regulation include:**

- Damaging property with the intention of endangering life – up to 25 years imprisonment; - Manslaughter - up to 25 years imprisonment; - Starting a bushfire and being reckless as to its spread - up to 21 years imprisonment;

- Lighting a fire when a total fire ban is in place up to 12 months imprisonment and/or a \$5500 fine; Not putting out a fire that you have lit - up to 12 months imprisonment and/ or a \$5500 fine; - Failing to comply with a

bush fire hazard reduction notice – up to 12 months imprisonment and/or a \$5500 fine;

· Light or use a tobacco product within 15metres of any stack of grain, hay corn, straw or any standing crop, dry grass or stubble field – up to a \$5500 fine. For more information on bushfires, monitor



SUMMER FEED AND FODDER ADVICE

Did you get our Summer Feed and Fodder Advice newsletter that recently went out? Our Agricultural Extension and District Vet teams captured some important advice about preparing for summer and ensuring you have enough feed on hand for the months ahead, including an update on recent rpices and availability of popular fodders.

Some tips to remember:

In your planning processes for the next three-six months, please consider:

Do you have enough fodder on hand to get through summer?If not, what fodder is available considering that feed prices will continue to

remain high as feed is in high demand and hard to source.The costs associated with feeding stock for the summer period and where the

fodder will come from as it is getting increasingly difficult to obtain.

The lack of water supplies is now at a critical level in some areas.
In dams that still retain water, quality has also been severely impacted by the ongoing hot and dry conditions.

• There are significant animal health issues that arise from poor quality water, including problems caused by blue green algae.

It is important to remember that animals being handfed or lactating and hot weather also increases water needs (up to 100 litres a day per animal).
Please also consider temperature stress and ensure adequate shade or shelter is

available, especially for vulnerable animals like young stock. **ARE YOU GOING AWAY THIS SUMMER?**

If you are going away over summer have you made emergency evacuation plans for your livestock? Please complete a Bushfire Survival Plan and ensure you have notified a neighbour or someone who can act on your behalf or move your livestock in case of fire, flood or even water shortages through failed pumps etc. Unfortunately livestock get caught in natural disasters as well, especially if owners are not present to be able to evacuate or care for them at short notice. Also if you own sheep or goats and plan to go away on holidays for a number of weeks over the holiday period, please ensure that you animals have been adequately drenched before you leave, and that you have arranged for a neighbour (or similar) to keep an eye on them during your absence. If weather conditions over the Christmas period favour survival of worm eggs and larvae on pasture, enormous worm burdens can build up in your animals over a period of just a few weeks. If these worm burdens involve numbers of blood sucking Barber's Pole Worm, your sheep and goats may develop a fatal anaemia before you return from holidays.

Detailed Cattle report for Gunnedah Last reported 19th November 2019

There was little change in the overall numbers. Cows were again put forward in large numbers, while young cattle including calves were well represented. Quality was fair to good with condition very mixed. There were quite a few well finished cattle presented, a credit to producers. The usual buyers were in attendance with demand varying throughout. Restockers were active on good quality young calves with the market trend as much as 23c/kg dearer. There were increased numbers of vealers with the market also showing dearer trends, some of the better quality heifers experiencing strong gains. Plain quality lightweight yearlings sold to cheaper trends. Better quality lightweight yearling steers sold to a slightly dearer trend with increased demand from restockers. Medium and heavyweight yearling steers to restock and feed sold firm to 10c/kg dearer. Market trends through the good quality yearling heifers were firm to slightly dearer on the back of keen restocker and feedlot competition. The plainer quality heifers sold to cheaper trends. Well finished heifers to the trade sold 6c to 8c/kg dearer. Well finished grown heifers sold to cheaper trends with demand from processors weaker. The plainer quality and condition heifers attracted less competition from restockers and feedlotters, selling to cheaper trends also. Weight of numbers impacted the cow market with the well finished medium and heavyweights bearing the brunt. They saw a cheaper trend of 8c to 16c/kg. The plainer condition cows were less affected. Heavy bulls remained firm. **Detailed Cattle report for HRLX Singleton**

Last reported 20th November 2019

Numbers doubled, as the quality on average was on the plainer side. The younger cattle were well supplied, with the majority yearlings, as the bulk was suitable for the restocker and lot feeder orders. Grown steers were well supplied, however the well finished pens suitable for the processors were scarce in the pens. Cows made up the majority of the older cattle, with approximately 330 head in the penning. The better bred and popular breeds of the younger cattle sold well, however the plainer mixed breeds contributed to an overall cheaper market. The over 200kg vealers returning to the paddock eased 10c, with the steers making from 222c to 288c, as the heifer portion sold from 156c to 234c/kg. The better bred and popular breeds of the yearling steers sold to solid competition and reached 308c for the lighter drafts, while the medium and heavy weights made from 200c to 306c/kg. The yearling heifers to feed topped at 270c, however the majority trended considerably cheaper and averaged from 188c to 240c/kg. The prime conditioned younger cattle to the butchers were limited in supply and yield on average was considerably lower, with the best topping at 324c/kg. Grown steers to the lot feeders and identified with 2 teeth sold to strong competition and reached 300c, while the majority sold around the 236c to 256c/kg range. The heavy weight steers and bullocks to the processors decreased 20c and received from 236c to 255c/kg. The grown heifers also eased 20c, with the best reaching 240c/kg. Cows trended considerably cheaper, with the plainer drafts selling as much as 30c to 40c lower, to sellfrom 120c to 210c/kg. The better finished heavy weights sold 20c cheaper and made from 210c to 242c/kg. The best heavy weight bull topped at 230c/kg.

Detailed Cattle report for Scone Last reported 19th November 2019

Consignments increased, with the vealers reduced in number, while the yearlings were well supplied. Grown steers and bullocks were scarce in the pens, while the cows were well represented with approximately 350 penned. There was a good yarding of bulls, with some carrying a high yield potential. The market was firm to a shade cheaper, however breed and quality contributed in places. The over 200kg vealers to the restockers lost 8c, as the steers made from 215c to 292c, while the heifer portion received from 192c to 242c/kg. The yearling steers to the lot feeders remained close to firm, with the medium weights ranging from 260c to 288c, while the lighter weights topped at 302c/kg. The yearling heifers to feed improved 10c, with an extra buyer at the rails, prices made from 254c to 278c/kg. The prime conditioned younger cattle to the butchers were higher yielding this week and the best topped at 344c/kg. Grown heifers improved 2c and received from 250c to 260c/kg. Cows lost 3c, with the plainer 1 and 2 scores ranging from 190c to 238c, as the better covered heavy weights received from 230c to 265c/kg. Heavy weight well muscled bulls reached 300c/kg.

Detailed Cattle report for TRLX Tamworth Last reported 18th November 2019

There was a sharp increase in numbers with heat, wind and fires covering the drawing area. Young cattle and cows made up the bulk of the offering. There was a fair supply of young calves and limited numbers of well finished grown cattle apart from cows. Overall, the quality and condition of the offering showed a great variation. There were large numbers of very plain condition cattle penned with a break in the season not coming. Most of the usual orders were in place, a little less processor activity. There were strong restocker orders, mostly from the far south. Market trends varied through the young cattle with calves selling to a cheaper trend, as much as 8c/kg. Light weight vealers and yearlings saw the benefit of those Southern restocker orders with market trends significantly dearer. There were breed related price improvement in the vealer steers. The standout was the improvement in prices for the very plain quality and condition light weight yearlings, both steers and heifers. The better quality yearling steers to restockers and feeders in all weight classes sold to a slightly cheaper trend. C muscle yearling heifers to restockers and feeders sold on a firm to slightly cheaper market trend. The plain quality and condition heifers significantly dearer. Well finished heavy grown steers sold to a cheaper trend, with reduced competition from processors. The trend was similar for the well finished grown heifers. There was little but quality related price change in the cow market with the usual processors competing. The high yielding C muscle cows remained firm. Demand for heavy bulls was very strong with the market trend as much as 18c/kg dearer.



An extraordinary Life

Family patriarch Bill Waterhouse, once the biggest bookmaker in the world, has died at the age of 97.

The father of high-profile bookmaker Robbie Waterhouse and father-inlaw of leading trainer Gai Waterhouse died surrounded by his family on Friday 22nd November. "He was a fighter to the end," Robbie Waterhouse said. "He lived a good life legendary across so many fields.

"It was an extraordinary life. "He was a barristor and

"He was a barrister and bookie. He was the leading bookie at the dogs, trots and gallops and it was amazing he was at the top of four or



five different industries during his different careers. "He was the biggest importen of light industries

importer of liquor into Australia in the 1940s. He


had the biggest hotel in the 1950s. "He would have also been one of the longest serving diplomats in the country as

the consul-general to Tonga since 1970." Waterhouse is survived by his wife of 65 years,

great grandchildren. Born William Stanley

Waterhouse, the qualified barrister was a colourful racing figure who carved his name as a bookmaker, particularly during the 1960s and '70s. He was the first Australian bookmaker to stand at Royal Ascot in 1967. Waterhouse was never far from controversy and will be remembered for his alleged role in the Fine Cotton 'ring-in' scandal. In 1984, Waterhouse and



Bill Waterhouse always maintained his innocence and in 2002 had his bookmaking licence reinstated in order to train his grandson Tom, who became the fourth generation of the family to stand as a bookmaker on Sydney tracks, in the business.

He retired from bookmaking in 2010 at the

age of 88. Robbie Waterhouse confirmed the passing of his father on Twitter on Friday morning.

"Very sad that we have lost my father, Bill Waterhouse," he wrote. "He left us peacefully with his family by his side. He was in great spirits till the end. He enjoyed a great day with all his great-grandchildren last Sunday."

Waterhouse was known for his boldness and willingness to go head-to-head with leviathan punters such as Ray Hopkins, "Hong Kong Tiger" Frank Duval and "The Filipino Fireball" Filipe Ysmael. His fearless attitude ed to him losing \$1 million in a single day in 1968 and he subsequently became widely regarded as the biggest gambler in the world. 'King of the bookies' Former big bookmaker Dominic Bernie learned by pencilling for Waterhouse

and saw his calmness under pressure. "Bill's success was due to his intelligence and courage," Bernie said. "Like all successful

bookies, he had confidence in the prices he was betting.

with clever opinion markets which allowed him to anticipate market movements before they occurred. "I've seen him lay columns of bets on a favourite, and naturally many of them won. But over time, more lost than won, and Bill will be renowned as a very successful satchel swinger Known as the "king of the bookies" for his dominance of the betting ring, Waterhouse was reported to often hold more than the Totalisator during his prime. "Bill was a giant in the bookmaking profession. He was fearless, controversial and a great character when the track was the only place," Racing NSW chief executive Peter V'landys said in tribute to Waterhouse.

When it comes to sea shanties, I'm very much of the school that a little goes a long way. I'm fine with a stirring chorus or two of What Shall We Do With *The Drunken Sailor?* but by the time we've got around to Blow The Man Down or Boney Was A Warrior for the second time, I've had enough. I suspect I'm not entirely alone in that. Well, the good news is that Fisherman's Friends – a film that has sea shanties at its core – gets the amount of hearty, slightly nasal male singing just about right. We're surprised and delighted when this unlikely-looking group of Cornish fishermen bursts into a harbourside chorus – wow, these guys can actually sing - but as we head deeper into the second hour, we're quietly relieved that there are one or two non-singing storylines to hold our potentially flagging interest.

The result is an easy-going, gently moving, flagrantly commercial treat that will surely go down as one of the most crowd-pleasing British films of the year. And yet it definitely does not start out that way, struggling to shake off the impression that this has been casually, almost carelessly put together. For starters, the casting seems just a little too adventurous for its own good. This, after all, is based on the true story of a group of Cornish fishermen who, back in 2010, became singing sensations. And yet of the three leading characters, two are played by character actors well known for normally employing their own very different accents: David Hayman, a Scot, and Dave Johns, a Geordie. Throw in Londoner Noel Clarke playing an American record company boss and that's an awful lot of 'acting' going on. Combine that with a rather clumsy script and a young director making only his second feature film, and vou have a movie that

hit its stride. Never mind, we can always admire the scenery, which just happens to be Port Isaac, the picturesque fishing village made fa mous by TV's Doc Martin. Slowly, however, the film gains its sea legs, helped by very nice performances from the three actors most naturally suited to their roles: Somerset-born James Purefoy, who plays the singing group's grumpy but still ruggedly handsome leader, Jim; Bristolian Tuppence Middleton, who plays his very pretty and conveniently divorced daughter. One of the defining features of Mark's Gospel is how thick the Apostles are. From the outset of the short text, Jesus is on the road to the Cross. He bluntly tells his disciples that he is going to die and, if they choose to follow him, they will too. They don't get it. Or, rather, they wilfully refuse to get it because this is not the glorious mission they imagined they had joined.

Canadian theologian Bernard Lonergan coined a term for it: "scotosis" - an inability to learn through painful insights.

Everyone can be guilty of it; when pet theories or hopes collide with harsh reality, change can be almost physically painful. Happily, the 21st century provides myriad ways to ignore uncomfortable facts by curating your own truth.

Want to believe that Barack Obama was really born in Kenya? There are whole networks dedicated to cultivating your ignorance. Suspect that blooddrinking, flesh-eating, shape-shifting extraterrestrial reptilian humanoids walk among us with the sole aim of enslaving the human race? Then stuff The Biggest Secret in your Christmas stocking and start surfing the outer reaches of the internet.

The beauty of democracy is you still get to believe whatever rubbish takes your fancy as long as you

cause no great harm. There are alternatives. Take China. There, the Chinese Communist Party is keen to police people's thoughts. There the uncomfortable truth of the Tiananmen Square massacre has

been airbrushed from post-'89 mainland minds.

And the party gets really quite cross when anyone raises it.

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Pruning Trees in Spring – Is it OK to do?

As you've been admiring all the fresh green growth in your yard this spring, perhaps you've noticed something else, too. Like excessive growth of a tree or shrub that you want to cut. Generally, the best time to prune most trees is when they're leafless in winter. But as you know, with each rule of thumb, there are exceptions. Your Guide to Pruning Trees

in Spring If you can prune your trees

before they begin growing, that still counts as dormant pruning and is the ideal time to prune because of these benefits. Once trees start budding or blooming in spring, though, double-check that pruning now won't put your tree in harm's

Can I do any pruning after trees have leaves and buds in spring?

In general, pruning in spring can limit the tree's bloom potential for the year. Plus, trimming in spring can leave cuts on trees that leave them more vulnerable to an insect infestation or disease. But, you can safely do some tree pruning in spring-as long as you don't remove any more than 10 percent of the tree's branches.

Your goal with spring pruning should be one of two things.

Pruning for safety: Remove any dead, dying or decaying branches to keep your tree (and home) safe.

Minimal pruning for aesthetics: Cut or remove branches to shape

Are there any trees that are



better to prune in spring? Yes! If you've just planted a new tree, cut off any broken, defected or damaged limbs. Should you prune young trees?

Whv? New trees need help finding their

way during their early years. Without your guidance, young trees can start to branch out in the wrong direction. To wrangle their wild tendencies, prune them to provide a stable structure. While forest trees compete for sunlight in close quarters, urban trees have plenty of light - sometimes all to themselves. Newly planted trees happily soak up the sun, causing multiple branches to grow that compete with one another to become the "leader." Despite having many strong branches, this makes the tree overall weaker. Without a defined trunk, trees lack the central frame needed to withstand storm damage. Plus,

this could

cause future

issues, which

can be costly

to fix later.



How do you train young trees with pruning?

To make room for the leading limb, arborists select a central branch that's free of damage, wounds or defects. Then, they identify competing stems to shorten or remove. Riding your tree of rival branches is called structural or subordinate pruning. The goal is

to encourage the tree's leader to grow by trimming competing branches.

Training your young tree to grow the right way is simple and quick. Plus, this small step can often prevent expensive or damaging structural corrections later.

As always, before DIY-ing this

project, consult your arborist to avoid severe or long-term damage from an improper cut. Rule of thumb: no more than 25% of the canopy should be removed at a time. Any tips on when to prune

young trees?

When you first plant a tree, trim away any broken, defected or damaged branches to prevent future issues. Then, wait.

Two to three years after planting, you'll see tree branches sprout into competition. You can also prune maple,

walnut and birch trees in late

spring or early summer. When pruned in winter, they tend to ooze sap. The sap does little to no harm, but some people think it's too messy! Trimming these trees after they have all their leaves for the season reduces sap bleeding.

And, finally, prune these trees once they're done blooming for the season in spring:

- Apricot trees
- Chokecherry trees
- Crabapple trees Dogwood trees
 - Flowering cherry
 - trees
- Flowering plum trees
 - Juneberry trees Lilac trees
 - Magnolia trees

Are there any trees I should never prune or trim in spring? Remember: pruning trees in spring can leave them more vulnerable to insect infestation and diseases.

That's why you **don't** want to prune these trees in spring, summer or early fall:

- Oak trees to reduce the chance of oak wilt (if oak wilt is in your area)
- Elm trees to reduce the chance of Dutch elm disease
- Sycamore trees to reduce the chance of anthracnose
- Honeylocust trees to reduce the chance of stem cankers

Parking education in the spotlight

Cessnock City Council has rolled out a parking education campaign to highlight key parking rules to the community, and school zone safety is a key focus for the campaign.

As part of the campaign, Council has distributed corflute signs to schools across the region highlighting school zone parking offences, along with the hefty penalties and

demerit points that apply. Each parking offence in a school zone carries a penalty of two demerit points and the majority of the offences will mean those who are caught will be dealt a \$344 fine. Offences include parking in a key priority for Council a 'no parking' zone (\$191), stopping where a 'no stopping' sign applies (\$344), stopping in a bus zone (\$344), double parking next to another Principal Ranger, Jason vehicle (\$344), stopping Mullee said while he

within 20 metres before or 10 metres after a children's crossing (\$344) or stopping on a footpath or nature strip (\$344). Student safety across the Cessnock Local Government Area has always been Rangers and since 1 July 2019, they have conducted over 200 patrols in our local school zones. Cessnock City Council's

understands the school drop -off can stressful with the morning rush, the rules and penalties are in place for a reason, and that is to keep our children safe. "School zone safety is a huge priority for us, but often people don't understand the rules or the penalties that apply." "We hope these signs and our education campaign will help people to better understand the parking rules which will also limit

the need to issue infringement notices," added Jason. Parking rules outside of school zones will also be highlighted during the campaign, which will include additional offences like parking in a disabled park without a permit (\$572 + 1)demerit point), exceeding the limit in a timed parking zone (\$114) and not parking in the direction of travel (\$268). Residents are encouraged to keep an eye out for the signs at our local schools and check out Council's website, Facebook page and local newspapers for more information about parking rules.
