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

Rothbury Riot 90 Anniversary Commemorative Service and re-enactment attract large attendance





LAST Sunday, 15th December 2019, saw the local community & many visitors come together to commemorate the 90th Anniversary of the 'Rothbury Riot'.

To mark this historic occasion North Rothbury Tidy Town & the CFMEU (Mining & Energy) combined to produce a three-act re-enactment play & a short memorial service on the original site of the riot in North Rothbury. The service commenced at 3pm with "Joe the Piper" playing "The Last Lament". After that moving piece North Rothbury Tidy Town vice-president Mark Stanford welcoming all attendees & gave apologies Mark then handed proceedings over to MC Greg Hall, who is the coproducer of the documentary Lockout', who then introduced Annabelle Hughes who gave 'Welcome to Country' Both Cessnock Mayor Bob

Pynsent & CFMEU Northern District secretary Shan Thompson gave occasional addresses with both iterating the importance the historic event was to the trade union movement in Australia, the plight, and also the resolve, of those who were 'locked out'.

Mayor Pynsent mentioned Beryl Armstrong who lived in a cottage almost at the front gates of Ayrfield Colliery and her valuable help on that day to those who were injured & shot. Interestingly, her son Rev. Dan Armstrong was in the audience & it was mentioned that he was the only one in attendance that day who was actually there in 1929 &, as stated, albeit only 1-year old. After the occasional address's were completed MC Greg Hall invited Phil Aughey to commence the re-enactment which again saw "Joe the Piper" (aka local piper Joe Royston) start proceedings.

With writer, producer & narrator Phil Aughey at the



microphone the play & narration took just on 15-minutes with the shooting of Norman Brown the finale. The play covered, in that short time, almost all aspects

of that tragic day with a lead up to the actual riot. The actors playing mine owner Merewether & the then NSW Premier handled their roles with great aplomb whilst the two female actors were wonderful.

After an encore Salvation Army Pastor Jason Jenkins gave a short memorial service which was quiet moving for the audience & he himself as his grandfather, who he never knew, was killed in a mining accident. After the service North Rothbury Tidy Town President Mike Lowing paid tribute to sponsors & the volunteer helpers. The commemoration then moved to the actual memorial for a wreath laying ceremony which concluded the memorial

event.



ADOPTION OF COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION PLAN AND REPEAL OF CHAPTER B2 PUBLIC NOTIFICATION AND ADVERTISING OF THE CESSNOCK DEVELOPMENT CONTROL PLAN 2010

At the Council Meeting of 20 November 2019, Council resolved to adopt the Community Participation Plan (CPP) and Repealed Chapter B2 Public Notification and Advertising of the Cessnock Development Control Plan 2010.

Council advises that the Community Participation Plan became effective from **21 November 2019**.

The intent of the CPP is to make it easier for the community to understand when they can get involved in planning matters. It provides guidance on how the community can have a say on the different types of planning matters for which Council is the Planning Authority. The CPP only applies to matters legislated by the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979*.

Singleton residents praised for 25% drop in water usage as drought tightens grip & Hunter Water impose level 2 water restrictions on 20 January 2020

Singleton residents and businesses are leading the way in conserving water, with a 25% drop in residential usage and a 16% drop in business use compared to the same period last year.

Mayor of Singleton, Cr Sue Moore has praised the community's efforts as the local government area continues to feel the impacts of the drought - and the dam level keeps plummeting.

She said with Hunter Water already announcing the move to level 2 restrictions on 20 January 2020 for customers including Branxton, Singleton Council would consider whether to follow suit in February.

"Our community has been fantastic

in cutting down on water to conserve our supply and the results we've seen are nothing short of incredible," Cr Moore said. "But unfortunately the scale and impact of this drought means that the level in Glennies Creek Dam is still dropping fast, and with no rain in sight, it may be necessary to move to Level 2 water restrictions when Council reconvenes in February." Until then, Level 1 water restrictions will remain in force for all residential, commercial. industrial and government customers in Council's water supply area. customers who refuse to comply with restricted activities with on-the -spot fines of \$220 and a maximum penalty of \$2200.

For residential

properties, current

level 1 restrictions

Watering of lawns by watering systems, microsprays, drip systems, soaker hoses, non-fixed sprinklers and hand-held hoses may only occur between 6pm to 9am daily in summer

Watering of residential gardens by watering systems, microsprays, drip systems, soaker hoses, non-fixed sprinklers and hand-held hoses may only occur between 6pm to 9am daily in summer

Topping up or filling of garden water features is permitted Irrigation of new turf is

permitted for one week after laying, which after level 1 restriction of watering lawns applies

Washing down of walls or paved

surfaces is banned, except for health and safety reasons and as long as a trigger hose is used (eg spilt food and drink, animal droppings, sewer overflows etc)

It's more important than ever that we continue to be vigilant about water, even over the Christmas period when we tend to indulge a little more than usual." Cr Moore said.

But of course the best celebration we could have is if it rained for Christmas."

If Kevin Rudd had secured Parliamentary approval for his CPRS ten years ago, the fires would still be raging Our climate is changing adversely. Long hot and dry spells are creating a tinder box. Back-burning is becoming more difficult because moist and cool windows of opportunity are becoming fewer. Scientists tell us greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) are contributing to changes in our weather patterns and the global community should play safe and adjust

behaviour.

But Australia is only

responsible for almost 30 percent of global emissions. We must reduce emissions in Asia and India, or fail. To modernise and clean-up their economies, developing countries need a lot of energy and a lot of coal to build wind turbines and solar panels. Indeed it takes 200 tonnes of metallurgical coal to build one wind turbine. Australia produces relatively clean and efficient coal. Exporting it to nations coming out of poverty helps them develop their economies and offsets the dirtier, less-efficient coal buy elsewhere – coal which often comes from mines where there is no care for health, safety or fair wages. It is worth noting that 60 percent of the world's electricity production still comes from fossil fuel Blaming and demonising our coal miners for the current fires is not just silly, it's

MORE THAN A NUMBER: ROAD TRAUMA TAKING A TOLL

I urge all drivers to take extra care over summer with the State's road toll already at 330 – seven higher than last year.

It is devastating to think 330 people haven't made it home this year. That's 330 families celebrating Christmas without a loved one. The impact is massive and it's not just deaths that are the tragedy on our roads. Almost 11,000 people have suffered serious injuries in crashes in just 12 months.

We want everyone to stop and think - think about how their behaviour on the roads impacts others, think about how they would feel if they lost a loved one and think about what they can do to help stop these deaths and injuries on our roads.

We will do everything we can as a government by building safer roads and using technology to help keep people from harm. But at the end of the day we really need everyone to take personal responsibility. In NSW so far this year 217 people have died in regional areas. The really sobering fact is around 70 per cent of fatalities on country roads are country residents. It's not visitors from out of town, it's people who live in the area, who know the roads well and who often aren't far from home when the worst

thing happens. NSW Police Assistant Commissioner Michael Corboy, Commander of the Traffic & Highway Patrol Command, said all drivers need to play their part in

Measles

With the recent outbreak of measles in Somoa it is a timely reminder that measles is a serious disease that is easily spread through the air The measles virus has infected almost 4,500 people in the South Pacific nation of 200,000 since late October. Of those who died, 57 were under the age of four. Samoa has said nearly 90% of eligible people have been vaccinated against measles as it lifted a two-day curfew imposed amid an outbreak that has killed 65 in recent weeks. The outbreak is in part blamed on people spreading false information, claiming vaccinations are dangerous. Immunisation is effective in preventing the disease. All children and adults born during or after 1966 should be vaccinated with

- In the past, measles infection was very common in childhood. Most people born before 1966 will have been infected with measles as a child and are likely to be immune.
- Thanks to immunisation measles is now rare in Australia. Measles remains common in many parts of the world, and large outbreaks continue to occur in a number of countries. This is why it is important to make sure you are fully protected against measles prior to overseas travel.

What are the symptoms?

The first symptoms are fever, tiredness, cough, runny nose, sore red eyes and feeling unwell. A few days later a rash appears. The rash starts on the face, spreads down to the body and lasts for 4-7 days. The rash is not itchy. Young children (especially infants) may also experience diarrhoea. Up to a third of people with measles have complications. These include ear infections, diarrhoea, and pneumonia, and may require hospitalisation. About one in every 1000 people with measles develops encephalitis (swelling of the brain).

How is it spread?

Measles is usually spread when a person breathes in the measles virus that has been coughed or sneezed into



the air by an infectious

Measles is one of the most easily spread of all human infections. Just being in the same room as someone with measles can result in infection. People with measles are usually infectious from just before the symptoms begin until four days after the rash appears. The time from exposure to becoming sick is usually about 10 days. The rash usually appears around 14 days after exposure.

Who is at risk? People are at risk of measles

- they have never had measles infection or
- they have not had two doses of measles containing vaccine or
- they have a weakened immune system (e.g., people who are receiving chemotherapy or radiotherapy for cancer or people who take high-dose steroid medications) even if they have been fully immunised or have had past measles infection and they have had contact with someone with measles infection

How is it prevented?

- The best protection against measles is immunisation with two doses of measles containing vaccine, given at least 4 weeks apart.
- In Australia two doses of measles containing vaccine are offered to children under the national Immunisation Program (NIP). The first dose is scheduled at 12 months of age as measles-mumpsrubella (MMR) vaccine. The second dose is scheduled at 18 months of age as measles-mumpsrubella-varicella (MMRV) vaccine. These vaccines provide protection against mumps, German measles, and chicken pox as well as measles.
- People planning travel with children between 6* and 18 months of age should discuss their travel plans with their GP, as the schedule can be adjusted for children travelling to areas with a high risk of measles.

- Anyone born during or after 1966 who has never had measles infection should see their doctor to make sure that they have had two doses of measles containing vaccine at least four weeks apart. If not the vaccine is free in NSW.
- It is safe to have the vaccine more than twice, so people who are unsure should be vaccinated. People with measles should stay at home until they are no longer infectious (i.e. until 4 days after the rash starts) to reduce the possibility of spreading it to other people.
- * The national recommendations for early measles vaccination of infants prior to travel have recently been updated - previously the lower age limit for vaccination was 9 months of age

How is it diagnosed?

Measles is suspected when a person feels unwell, has a cough, runny nose or sore eyes and a fever followed by a rash.

Whenever measles is suspected, samples from the nose, throat, and urine should be collected to confirm the diagnosis. A blood test may also be performed. Confirmation of the diagnosis is important as it allows prompt public health follow-up of other people who are at risk of measles.

How is it treated?

People with measles infection are normally advised to rest, drink plenty of fluids, and take paracetamol to treat the fever. There is no specific treatment. What is the public health

response? Doctors, hospitals and laboratories, schools and

childcare centres must notify cases of measles to the local public health unit. Public health unit staff will interview the doctor and patient (or carers) to find out how the infection occurred, identify other people at risk of infection, implement control measures (such as immunisation and restrictions on attending school or work) and provide other advice.

All you need is 7 ingredients to pull off this impressive Christmas ham. **Ingredients**

100g pkt plum paste

8 whole star anise

125ml (1/2 cup) fresh orange juice, strained 125ml (1/2 cup) maple syrup

2 teaspoons Dijon mustard

7-8kg whole leg ham, on the bone

6-8 small apples

Method

Step 1

Preheat oven to 170C/150C fan forced Place an oven shelf in the lowest position, removing other shelves. Line a large roasting pan with baking paper. Place a wire rack on top and pour enough water into pan until just under the rack but not touching. Step 2

Place the plum paste, star anise, orange juice, maple syrup and Dijon in a saucepan over medium heat. Cook, stirring, for 2 minutes or until paste has dissolved. Bring to the boil then simmer, stirring occasionally, for 8-10 minutes or until syrupy. Transfer to a heatproof bowl and set aside to cool and thicken.

Step 3

Use a sharp knife to cut around the ham


shank, about 10cm from end. Run knife around the edge of the ham. Gently lift the rind off in I piece by running your fingers between the rind and the fat.

Use a mandoline to thinly slice the apples crossways. Brush the top of the ham with a little glaze. Place the apple slices on top, slightly overlapping. Use toothpicks to secure, where necessary. Arrange star anise randomly over apple slices.

Step 5

Transfer the ham to prepared wire rack in pan. Wrap the shank in foil. Brush one-third of the remaining glaze over apples. Bake for 40 minutes. Brush again with half of the remaining glaze and bake for a further 40 minutes. Carefully remove the toothpicks.

Brush the ham with half the remaining glaze and bake for 20 minutes. Brush with the remaining glaze and bake for a further 20 minutes or until the apples are golden and sticky. Set aside for 30 minutes to rest before slicing to serve

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Council on board with recycled glass 'sand'

In response to Australia's recycling crisis, there has been an increasing trend for councils to utilise recycled glass 'sand' for civil works and Cessnock City Council is proud to be on board.



Council recently used around 90 tonnes of recycled glass sand for the Neath Road Culvert Project and now plans to use approximately 1200 tonnes of the material on its current works on Gingers Lane, Weston.

It takes about 5,200 single use glass bottles to manufacture one tonne of glass sand which means around 6.2 million bottles will be used and recycled.

These projects alone make a significant contribution to protecting the environment and Council will monitor the performance of the material, with the hope of a broader scale introduction in the future.

With similar properties to normal sand and approved under the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) regulations, this recycled material provides a local end use for thousands of tonnes of glass collected from kerbside recycling each year. This use will not only help to close the loop on recycled materials, but it will also address the immediate concern around stockpiled materials.

Cessnock City Mayor, Councillor Bob Pynsent said Council is committed to better waste management practice, along with increased resource recovery and reuse. "The war on waste is everybody's responsibility and it's so important that we lead the way to alternate technology and uses."

"Local government can make a significant contribution to the reuse of materials and we will continue to monitor technology developments for new advancements and others that further contribute to the circular economy."

"I'm so pleased we are starting to implement the use of recycled glass sand in some of our local works and hope to see it continue across our local government area for years to come," added Cr Pynsent.



THE DOCTRINE OF PRECEDCENT

Whenever courts have to consider cases involving either the interpretation of laws made by parliaments or cases where no laws exist, the effect is that by making a decision and providing reasons for that decision, those courts are creating new laws. Their decisions have developed into a body of legal principles known as common law and case

When a case comes before a court, the parties to the action present the evidence they need to support their case. The judge listens to the evidence, decides what evidence is relevant and what facts have been proved, decides what law is relevant, and applies that law to the facts in making a decision which is binding on the parties.

The law declared by the judge in the reasons for the court's decision directly affects the parties to the case. That law will also affect, indirectly, people bringing actions involving similar legal principles before other courts in that jurisdiction, because of the doctrine of precedent. Precedent means that judges are bound to follow interpretations of the law



made by judges in higher courts, in cases with similar facts or involving similar legal principles. This principle or rule is then used by the court or other judicial bodies use when deciding later cases with similar issues or facts.

of precedent provides predictability, stability, fairness, and efficiency in the law. Some of the rules that

make up the doctrine of precedent are:

- a judge follows the law declared by judges in higher courts in the same jurisdiction in cases with similar facts.
- a court must give reasons for its decision in a case. The reasons should include an explanation of why the court has chosen to

follow, or not follow, a previous decision which is similar to the case before it When an earlier decision is not followed it is said to be distinguished from the earlier case.

- most courts are not bound to follow their own earlier decisions although they often do. For example, the highest court in Australia, the High Court, while not bound to follow its own earlier decisions, does so in most cases.
- the decisions of courts outside Australia are not binding on Australian courts, although they can be used to assist or guide Australian courts in making decisions on new facts. If, for example, a matter before an Australian court is unusual or difficult, judges and lawyers might look to overseas decisions for guidance or comparison. the decision of the highest court within a particular jurisdiction is final. The highest court is the court to which the final appeal lies. The High Court is the highest court in the Australian court system. Cheers, Kerrie



First home buyers take advantage of low interest rates: REIA

Housing affordability has improved across the country seeing the highest percentage of first home buyers in the marketpiace in eight years, according to research from the Real Estate Institute of Australia.

REIA President Adrian Kelly said the September quarter 2019 edition of the REIA Housing Affordability Report found housing affordability improved in all states and territories, except Tasmania, while rental affordability improved across the nation.

"Although the average loan amount has risen, the increase in family income and the decrease in the interest rates have negated this rise," Mr Kelly said.

"Similarly, with a small decrease in average rents, the percentage of income to meet these payments has also declined.

"The total number of loans increased over the September quarter by 10.0 per cent and the number of new loans to first home buyers increased by 9,270, some 13.6 per cent over the quarter and 6.8 per cent over the year.

"The percentage of first home loans to all home loans, excluding refinancing, is at 29.4 per cent. This is the highest percentage since 30.3 per cent in December 2011.

"The largest increase was in

the Australian Capital Territory at 61.1 per cent, while South Australia and the Northern Territory bucked the upward national trend."

New South Wales

Over the September quarter, housing affordability in New South Wales improved with the proportion of income required to meet loan repayments decreasing to 36.2 per cent, a decrease of 0.9 percentage points over the quarter and a decrease of 0.3 percentage points compared with the corresponding quarter 2018. With the proportion of income required to meet loan repayments 5.7 percentage points higher than the nation's average, New South Wales remained the least affordable state or territory in which to buy a home. 

Warning issued to looters suspected to be targeting NSW **bushfire victims**

The NSW Police Force has issued a stern warning following unconfirmed reports on social media of stealing offences within bushfire-affected areas of NSW.

While police have not received any complaints of theft from the community, and no investigations are currently active, police are warning that criminal behaviour will not be tolerated.

State Emergency Operations Controller (SEOCON), Deputy Commissioner Gary Worboys APM, said it was deeply concerning to think that anyone would use the bushfire emergency to target vulnerable members of the community.

"These communities have suffered enough without individuals stealing what items they have left," Deputy Commissioner Worboys said.

Mayors unite to combat car theft this Christmas

Having a car stolen is stressful, inconvenient and costly, particularly during the festive season. Community members across Newcastle and the Hunter are being urged to be vigilant over summer

as motor vehicle thefts are set to spike the time of year. Cessnock City Mayor, Councillor Bob Pynsent joined forces with Mayors



from Newcastle, Lake Macquarie and Port Stephens to educate people across the region about motor vehicle theft and how to avoid becoming a victim.

Cessnock City Mayor Councillor Bob Pynsent said the Cessnock Local Government Area is currently ranked number two in the state for motor vehicle thefts. In 2018 there was 298 vehicles stolen from our area.

"The data shows these crimes are opportunistic and it's common for thieves to steal car keys in a home theft. A simple tip is to keep your keys out of sight when at home. Don't leave them in obvious spots like near doors or windows. It's also advised that your keys shouldn't have a tag that has your name and address."

Historically, televisions and computers were among the items stolen in home burglaries, however vehicles are now the most common target, with keys the sole item stolen in roughly 1-in-4 break and enter cases.







Hit the beach and not the road with additional passenger rail services from 5 January 2020

With the school holidays stretching to the end of January and plenty of Singleton residents making plans to hit the beach this summer, Mayor of Singleton, Cr Sue Moore is encouraging everyone to leave the car at home and take advantage of additional passenger rail services from Sunday 5 January 2020.

Minister for Regional Transport and Roads Paul Toole announced in October 2019 that two new direct train services would operate between Singleton and Newcastle seven days a week starting early in the new year, giving customers six return options from Sydney and Newcastle on weekdays and four on weekends.

The services are the result of more than a decade of campaigning by the Two More Trains for Singleton group, supported by Singleton Council. However, they will operate as a trial for 12 months to gauge demand.

"Our community has worked incredibly hard for the introduction of these services. and now it's up to us to use them advocating for additional public to make sure they remain a permanent fixture on the timetable between Newcastle and Singleton," Cr Moore said. "And January is the perfect time to give them a trial run.

"People can hop on a train to head to the beach in Newcastle, enjoy a meal overlooking the harbour at Honeysuckle, or go right through to Sydney for any number of school holiday activities

"And best of all, there's no need to count the minutes to the return journey with more options only to keep them operating, but to get back to Singleton without to leverage even more services." having to rush.

FROZEN 2

Why was Elsa born with magical powers? The answer is calling her and threatening her kingdom. Together with Anna, Kristoff, Olaf and Sven, she'll set out on a dangerous but remarkable journey. In "Frozen," Elsa feared her powers were too much for the world. In "Frozen 2," she must hope they are enough.

Frozen 2 review: More mature, ambitious and intricate than its hit predecessor by Clarisse Loughrey

The film plays with fire by taking the same path as other sequels, but succeeds where they have often failed



Parents, you can breathe a sigh of relief. Frozen 2's new showstopper "Into the Unknown" isn't as aggressive an earworm as "Let it Go". It's more lyrically complex, with a lot more high notes – the kind that'll break your eardrums if sung by anyone who isn't Idina Menzel – and it's hard to imagine a car full of kids howling such a delicate scale for hours upon hours. Frozen 2, Disney's sequel to its \$1.3bn hit, is more mature, ambitious, and intricate than its predecessor. That doesn't automatically make it better – *Frozen*'s success was built on a simple and relatable story of sisterly love – but it's different enough not to feel like a stale rerun. There are surprises here to uncover, and a renewed sense of energy to the proceedings. Admittedly, the film does play with fire by taking the same path as other sequels, padding out a character's backstory in the hope it'll add depth to their world. There are echoes of last month's *Maleficent*: Mistress of Evil, as Queen Elsa (Menzel) is carted off to a magical place that might provide a few answers about where she comes from. But Frozen 2 succeeds where so many others have failed. As the sentient snowman Olaf (Josh Gad) himself neatly summarises in one scene, Elsa made peace with her ice powers at the end of Frozen, when she discovered that the key to it all was love. Now, she rules over Arendelle, while Anna (Kristen Bell) and

her boyfriend Kristoff

(Jonathan Groff) provide a sense of domestic normalcy through weekly charade sessions. That is, until a mysterious female voice (provided by Norwegian singer Aurora) pierces the quiet and shakes Elsa's soul. Is someone out there looking for her? Does she have a greater purpose beyond the castle walls? Anyone hoping Disney is finally giving Elsa a girlfriend, by the way, will be sorely disappointed - her sexuality still remains purposefully obscure. Instead, this alluring call draws Elsa into an enchanted forest that feels ripped straight from the pages of Norwegian mythology. There are giants, runes, and an indigenous tribe inspired by the Sámi people. Frozen 2 has an authenticity that immediately separates it from so many other subpar follow-ups. Its world building not only feels earned, but meaningful. Returning directors Jennifer Lee and Chris Buck ensure that every frame is exquisitely detailed and rich with colour: we move gracefully from autumn leaves to the pinkish glow of ethereal fire, then on to stormy, grey waves and shimmering ice crystals. Certain sequences here are even more spectacular than the creation of Elsa's ice castle, with the filmmakers now more confident to step out of reality and deliver something truly jawdropping. Lee's screenplay, too, makes some bold choices. She teases out several compelling ideas:

environmentalism. reparations, exploitation and how we should confront the past. It's all vague enough that it could be applied to a hundred different real-world situations, which perhaps makes it all the more powerful as a learning tool for families. But Frozen 2 doesn't lose itself in rootless ambition. It works because we're guided through these strange, unfamiliar surroundings by the steady hands of Elsa, Anna, Kristoff, Sven, and Olaf characters with whom we're all very much familiar (or, for some parents, exhaustingly familiar) and the cast sink straight back into their roles. Elsa and Anna's sense of sisterhood is tested, but ultimately prevails. Kristoff bumbles around with a ring in his pocket, wanting to propose to Anna but never quite finding the right time (he also happens to get what, in truth, might be the film's best song – an Eighties power ballad accompanied by a chorus of crooning reindeer). Olaf remains annoying to those who have always found him so, but those who appreciated his brand of existential humour will be amply rewarded. At one point, he casually shares his theory that "advancing technology will be our saviour and our doom". Frozen 2 may have grown up a little since 2013 – just as its fans have - but it never allows itself to lose sight of what made the original click: its warm heart and generous spirit.

I am all in on freedom of speech. I have defended it, been attacked for it and been abused with it. I also don't buy the absurd and dangerous line that free speech does not extend to beliefs or opinions that are offensive. Free speech that is constrained to whatever some random observer deems acceptable or appropriate is, by definition, not free at

I am also acutely aware that, unlike in the US, there is no explicit legal

protection for free speech in this country. That is why those who value it must constantly defend it, often from an authoritarian hard left which demands

the policing of language while at the same time dishing out the most vicious personal abuse.

And I am acutely aware that plenty of people on the right often use the fig leaf of free speech to say ugly, ignorant or obnoxious things. That is horrible and deeply regrettable but it

by government or the angry mob.

Israel Folau's infamous post about drunks and homosexuals and adulterers et al going to Hell is the perfect example of this. It is stupid, it is offensive and – for what it's worth – it is a hopeless misinterpretation of the Biblical passage he is

So, do I support what he says? Absolutely not. But should he be banned from saying it? Also absolutely

However, now that's out of the way, let's cut the crap.

The notion that Folau is a humble martyr for his faith or a flag-bearer for freedom of speech is nothing short of horsesh*t.

When he was first asked by Rugby Australia to remove his inflammatory Instagram post he refused, so staunch were his spiritual convictions. In both word and deed he declared that his faith was more important than his football career and he was prepared to walk away from fame and fortune rather than compromise his beliefs.

Never mind that up until that point Folau had no problems trousering millions of dollars thanks to the Wallabies' primary sponsor Qantas, whose CEO is a proudly gay man and whose corporate ethos explicitly embraces the lifestyle Folau condemns. Strangely he didn't have any problem profiting from such profligate sin, nor – were he so concerned for their mortal souls – did he ever pick up the phone to Joyce and attempt to save him and his wayward flock from the ravages of hell.

And even after he decided to become a martyr he couldn't even do that right. The whole point of being a martyr is that you sacrifice whatever it takes for your beliefs. Folau lasted about five seconds before he decided that he didn't want to sacrifice anything at all. He wanted to have his faith and eat it too. And so after making a big song and dance about being willing to forsake his brilliant football career and all the gold and glory that came with it, he decided that he'd actually still like the money thanks very much and sued a punch-drunk Rugby Australia for an eye-watering \$14 million - a figure pumped up to the rafters by the humble Folau's conviction that he was a sure bet to become captain of the Wallabies and rake in those big sponsorship bucks once more.

Even more nauseating is that this narcissistic crusade was bankrolled by thousands of ordinary Australians who genuinely believed that Folau was fighting for free speech – perhaps the only good faith shown in this sorry saga.

Nothing could have been further from the truth. Thanks to Rugby Australia folding like a house of cards and offering him an apology and a confidential multimillion-dollar payout no legal precedent has been set and no principle has been determined. The

Say what you like about Folau, at least he seems to believe the dumb shit he says. By contrast Rugby Australia, like so many institutions these days, appears desperate to say all the right words without having any idea what they actually mean.

How else could you possibly explain the nonsensical ramblings of CEO Raelene Castle in the aftermath of the fiasco.

"No we didn't get it wrong," she said, a day after Rugby Australia apologised to Folau and his family – apparently for getting it right. "At the end of the day we stood up for the values of Rugby Australia," she said, a day after they refused to go to court to stand up for the values of Rugby Australia.

Frankly, RA can't have it both ways: Either the sacking was wrong or the settlement was. Yet this is an organisation that when offered the choice between two crap alternatives somehow managed to do both.

Whatever this sorry saga teaches us, and I'm not sure it's much, it is certainly not a victory for free speech and it is certainly not a victory for values. If anything it is further proof that precious few people in public life have the courage of their convictions and none of them was in that mediation room.

On that note, it will be interesting to see what Folau does with his reported millions once the lawyers have had their lunches.

The only Christian thing to do would be to donate it to the poor – and if Izzy won't take my word for it, perhaps he'll listen to the bloke whose every word he claims to follow: "Again I tell you," he said, "It is easier for a

The North Rothbury Rural Fire Service Brigade did the clean-up of their own volition just prior to North Rothbury Tidy Town doing it .. they beat them to the punch)

To the NSW Government who in the latest state budget, \$12.9 million in expenses was cut from Fire & Rescue NSW, while the Office of NSW Rural Fire Services - a service run by volunteers — lost \$26.7 million in expenses. Just one example of what that money could have done:- almost 70 new "Class 3 Pumper" trucks, heavy fire engines for both metro and regional areas which cost around \$580,000 each.

Rugby League Historic Piece Donated to Greta Museum

A very rare piece of Rugby League memorabilia was donated to Greta Museum in this anniversary year of the 70 years since the Greta Migrant Camp opened. This story finishes some of the migrant stories we have published this year, with a

The piece was donated by Alex Kowalski local Rugby League junior from the Greta **Branxton Colts.**

Kowalski has played his entire club life with the Colts from 1995 to 2019 when he decided to retire from Club Rugby League. The piece donated was his

Champions Poland Rugby League jersey, with limited jerseys printed to celebrate Poland's successful **International Emerging Nations** Rugby League Tournament in

Kowalski played for Poland in all their games during the

tournament and even had the honour to captain the team against Hungary in their warm-up test match before the tournament where they were

dominant in that game also. At the end of the tournament the unranked Poland had played 4 games against Hong Kong,

Japan, Vanuatu and Philippines and went through undefeated scoring 178 points with only 26 scored against them.

"A lot of the guys' families came through camps throughout Australia. It was a real good eye opener to hear the hardship their families went through and the team used these stories as motivational drive throughout the tournament; their families made great sacrifices to come to Australia," Kowalski spoke



proudly. Kowalski is a grandson of Polish migrants who passed through the Greta Migrant Camp and ended up making Greta home, like many families around the township. Kowalski also said that the jersey had a couple of local guys' names on it, like Ethan Niszczot (tournament top point scorer), Josh Day (trainer) and Troy Lowrey (trainer). Kowalski is Poland's 23rd capped player and also became most capped player on Saturday 28th September this year where he travelled to Lodz. Poland to play Poland's first ever home international match against the Czech Republic. The team won 34-18 with Kowalski getting a double. Speaking with Kowalski, he mentioned that he arrived on the Monday morning in Warsaw before the game with some of his teammates and staff members before a two hour drive to Lodz and then went straight to training that afternoon to meet the other team members. Also, during the discussion regarding his week (Tuesday to Friday) in Lodz, that it was very busy. "I was waking up around 7am,

walking over a kilometre to meet the others before heading to the day events one being a children's hospital, with five schools visits and training every evening, the

earliest I got back to my apartment was 9pm, I was clearing 40kms a day and had blisters on both feet by Thursday. But it was well worth it, planting the seed of interest in Rugby League over there and to see kids who never heard of the game with the biggest smiles by the end of the clinics. Especially when finding out kids were staying during their lunchbreak to learn how to play and even staying back after school for an hour and half. It was a great feeling. This trip couldn't have happened without the likes of Lukasz Lucka and Shane Young."

Kowalski got individual sponsorship from the HVL Group (Hunter Valley Lubrication), and some kind donations from the Greta Branxton Rugby League community who donated their spot on the jersey to Red Nose.

Come into Greta Museum to see and admire this historical jersey and think about all the good our local young people are achieving now. Open Wednesday and Saturday 11am to 3pm at 96 High Street, in the former Greta Council Chambers.
