

#### Singleton 'bypass' not 'bypassed'



THE federal budget has given the go-ahead for the much needed Singleton Bypass. It forms part of the federal governments \$7.5billion infrastructure stimulus package announced last Tuesday in the

federal budget.

The project is expected to support 1370 direct and indirect jobs, it is due to start in mid 2023 and be finished by late 2026.

Apart from the Federal Government's commitment of

\$560 million to the project the New South Wales Government will contribute \$140 million to almost fully fund the works. The bypass will improve traffic flow, travel times and safety through Singleton town centre by reducing traffic including heavy freight.

The New England Highway currently carries around 26,000 vehicles, including more than 3,700 heavy vehicles, through the centre of Singleton each day. Singleton Mayor Sue Moore said that it is fantastic news. "It has long been recognised that a partnership between the Federal

and State governments was required to deliver the Singleton bypass, and the \$560m to be allocated in the Federal Budget is a significant step forward to realising this vital piece of infrastructure.

#### Singleton 'bypass' not 'bypassed'

'Our focus now will be on working with the NSW Government to commit to bridging the funding gap of about \$45 million.

"But most importantly, we will be stepping up our efforts to ensure the project is built in keeping with the needs of our community and the people who regularly drive through our local government area. We need to make sure the bypass is built right now, not as a stop-gap measure that will require further attention 20 years' down the track.

"Our community deserves a full interchange at Putty Road and John Street to make it easy for everyone to visit our Town Centre and get on their way again, and it needs to be dual lane for the entire length.

"The people of Singleton are already facing a range of economic, social and environmental challenges compounded by industry change, and we need all levels of government to build infrastructure that will help us to overcome, and most importantly thrive, into the future.

"I am pursuing meetings with the relevant State ministers as a matter of urgency to discuss these issues, and in light of the impending Budget announcement will be very keen to see a resolution and construction sooner rather than later," said

Member for the Hunter Joel Fitzgibbon MP said the Coalition's support for the much-needed bypass road had come five years after the NSW state government committed \$95 million to the project and construction would not begin until 2023. "I'm pleased the Federal Government has committed to the Singleton Bypass, which is something I've been calling on for several years. It's important that federal funding of regional infrastructure is made on the merits of a project, and I have argued that the Singleton Bypass has always stood-up on merit.'

'The Bypass will improve amenity and congestion within Singleton, improve the efficiency of the New England corridor for business and industry, and get our coal mining employees to work more quickly and more safely," said Joel. The State Member for Upper Hunter, Michael Johnsen, said that he had been

pushing the NSW Government and the Federal Government to get the job done. 'The Nationals in Government have committed NSW's 20 per cent share of the funding in 2015, and I am delighted that after years of lobbying and of communicating the wishes of my Singleton community, we now have secured the Federal Government's 80 per cent share of the funding to complete the bypass," said Michael.

"The NSW Government has committed \$92 million towards the Singleton bypass under Rebuilding NSW and allocated \$2.7 million in 2019-20 to continue development of the project.'

"Transport for NSW has over the last couple of years worked hard to decide the route and the bypass design, and just as the Nationals in Government promised and delivered the Scone Bypass, we are delivering on our promise of the Singleton Bypass," Mr Johnsen concluded.

#### Young people encouraged to make their voice heard through YES.

Cessnock City Council wants to hear from young people about the issues important to them as they develop the Youth Engagement Strategy (YES). The YES is designed to provide young people in the Cessnock Local Government Area (LGA) with a platform to have their voices heard about issues important to them.

It's an initiative of Council's Cessnock Youth Centre and Outreach Service (CYCOS) and is aimed at young people aged 12 to 25 who are living, working or studying across the Cessnock LGA. Young people can get involved by doing an online survey or through online discussion panels during October and November. 'Pop-up' consultations are also planned a local High Schools across, where students will be encouraged to respond to a series of questions.

Participants can also get creative by submitting a photo, video, drawing, painting, short story, song or poem via email that represents the theme "Your Voice, Your Community'

Similarly, they can take a photo and post to Instagram using the hashtag #2325Mayorforaday to show what changes they would make to their community if they were crowned 'Mayor for the Day'. A range of prizes, vouchers and experiences are on offer for the most creative entries.

Cessnock City Mayor, Councillor Bob Pynsent, said it's vital young people have a voice in determining the future of their community.

"This is an opportunity for young people to be a part of the conversation around issues and events that directly affect them. It will help Council better understand their needs and make decisions based on what they tell us is important."

How?

How does the Federal Government pay back the national debt within a time limit that does not inflict the debt on our children and grandchildren?

Leaving aside the massive indebtedness of the States after small business has been recompensed for being closed down and bankrupted during this calendar year, and let us be clear the cost of the damages will be massive and legal and unavoidable. How the States deal with this will be fascinating over the next few years.

Back to the question posed; a get-up calling itself the Australian Institute is running advertisements advocating higher taxes to pay for - you guessed it, more spending on education, government services, social security, hospitals et al. All the usual feel-good stuff the left, socialist and commo's bang on about.

This, despite the massive spending increases made to these aspects of the economy over the last twenty years. Way above the inflation rate and without any improvement in outcomes for the longsuffering public. The only people to benefit from this extra spending has been the public servants.

It is no surprise that the Australian Institute is in Canberra and as its website explains, it is a green lefty loony outfit get-up that opposes everything that might assist this country recovering from the present economic crisis. They quote economists for

goodness sake, and we know economists have no more idea than Daniel Andrews. The Institute moreover reflects the dominant ideology of the Federal Bureaucracy, which is against dams, animal husbandry, cheap baseload power and mining. This lot cheers Chinas Communist Party and Xi Jinping's Belt and Road initiative.

They genuinely believe they run this country and not the elected Federal Government. That's how come 30 million dollars of your money spent on a parcel of land west of Sydney subsequently, is valued at 3 million dollars. give or take a few grand. So, increasing taxes is not the answer to paying down the debt.

We should examine everything the Australian Institutes promotes and reject it out of hand as we should their advertisement for higher taxes. But that is not the only

reason to reject higher tax. Tax removes money from



people and reduces our ability to turn money over in commerce which is the engine of the economy. Commerce generates wealth which in turn creates employment and hence adds to the tax revenue. The average home loan is financed over 25/30 years. The Federal Governments debt is currently five hundred billion dollars but is due to blow out. There would need to be an annual provision of 25 billion dollars to repay the current debt over say 20 years, That represents 28% approximately of the current budget. Over the next twelve months, the Federal Government debt is due to reach 851 billion dollars, just over the debt limit currently set. Annual expenditure will increase exponentially as will the repayment of the debt. This means it will double itself each year) We shall see what the budget is on Tuesday (last Tuesday) and what the

Still, there are lovies at the ABC who think we should not worry about debt and print more money. Every other economic sovereign grouping (i.e. the EU) is doing it why shouldn't we? Trouble is, this has been tried before in the Wehrmacht Republic of Germany in the 1920s, Uganda under Ide Amin and Zimbabwe under the atrocious Robert Mugabe. Germany overcame their crisis by appropriating the property of Jews and generating an immense weapons industry for war against the rest of Europe looting as they went. Uganda and Zimbabwe are still basket cases. We have to outgrow our debt by creating employment, increasing our productivity and reducing the cost of production. These are all related to each other and must be given equal priority. The sticking point is the

rotten ideology of the greens education and training for distorting sensible governance and accountability and the dichotomy between the people who pay tax from the distorted progressive productivity of the private sector and those who suckle on the public teat. All governments, State Territory and the Commonwealth need an ideological frontal lobotomy to get rid of non-essential limitations on development. Such as, over-regulation by too many different authorities, (i.e., ten years to approve the Adani Mine) conflicting ideas of what is right and what is bad for development. (i.e., steam turbine generation using coal or nuclear energy). Long-term planning implemented for the provision for essential services such as fresh water, sewerage, affordable electricity and disposal of garbage and industrial waste.

It is the State and Territory administrations which are negligent in this. They fail in the provision of real



In my previous column, I wrote about a proposal that I was putting to Maitland City Council to increase the transparency of councillor's sometimes-hidden online activities. The proposal was the first of its kind in NSW. It sought to establish a public register of all social media pages administered by councillors, as well as websites they own and manage.

I'm pleased to say that my proposal was overwhelmingly supported by Council, with 11 votes in favour and only two votes against. Since that meeting, a local media organisation has already exposed the operator of one pretend "news" site, and some Maitland City councillors have put their names to social media pages for the first time ever. My proposal has been drafted to require elected

councillors to publicly report means we can welcome the their ownership or management of social media sites and websites on an annual basis, or within three months of any changes to such sites.

Councillors can continue to use social media and websites as they wish. The new draft rules won't stop councillors saying or doing anything online, but they will force councillors to reveal their identity when running social media sites or websites.

I was fortunate to spend the long weekend on a dairy farm. COVID-19 and welcome rains have taken the plight of our dairy farmers off the front pages, but their challenges remain enormous. Last year Australia lost 500 dairy enterprises, we can't let that continue. The drought is not completely behind us and its impact will impact on farm finances for years. But the biggest issue remains the power imbalance between our farmers and those who buy their product for sale.

There is clear market failure in the dairy sector. Market failure describes a situation where a market can't operate fairly and efficiently for some reason. In this case it's the market power of the processors and the retailers. The economic textbooks tell us that governments should let the market work without interference and find its own level, but it also tells us that when there is market failure. government intervention

is justified. The government needs to find a way to regulate the price the farmers receive at the farm gate. It needs to be a fair price. I've suggested the

Government ask the ACCC to investigate the merit of allowing it to set a minimum farmgate milk price in each dairy region (because each is different). That would still leave scope to allow the price to rise and fall as it currently does but not fall below the average cost of production in the region. But the Government refuses to provide the ACCC with the reference needed to

#### Weight and health

People who are overweight \* do 'regular physical or obese tend to have higher blood pressure and higher blood cholesterol levels than others, and are more likely to develop heart disease, diabetes or a stroke. The main way to lose weight and improve health is to change eating habits and increase physical activity.

Some simple guides for checking body weight, and the amount and distribution of body fat are:

- Body mass index (BMI) – a measure of weight for height, calculated by weight in kilograms divided by height in metres squared (kg/m2).
- \* Waist circumference a measure of fat around the abdomen (stomach). Using more than one type of measurement (e.g. BMI and waist circumference) is often

recommended. A doctor or your Piggott's Pharmacist can help with these measurements and explain what your results might

Overweight and obesity

People who are overweight or obese have too much body fat. Fat around the waist ('apple shape') is more of a health risk than fat around the hips and thighs ('pear shape')

Overweight and obese people are more likely to develop a range of medical

- conditions such as \* high blood pressure
- \* heart disease
- \* high blood cholesterol
- \* some cancers \* diabetes type 2
- \* joint problems (e.g.
- osteoarthritis, gout)
- \* gallstones <sup>k</sup> sleep apnoea
- \* asthma and other breathing
- problems.

Being overweight or obese can also lead to social problems (e.g. low selfesteem) and can make many activities more difficult.

Causes of weight gain

Most people put on weight because they eat and drink more energy from food than their body needs or uses. The 'spare energy' they eat and drink builds up in their body as fat. The amount of energy in food is measured as kilojoules (kJ) or calories. The amount of energy your body needs depends on a number of things, including age, gender, your genetic makeup and how active you

Some medical conditions and medicines can also play a role in weight gain. Ask a Pharmacist for more information about medicines and weight gain.

Self care

The best way to reach and keep to a healthy weight, is

\* have 'healthy eating' habits, to reduce energy intake (eat less calories or kJ of food)

activity' to use up energy. Weight loss should be gradual (e.g. 1 kg per month) to make sure fat is

lost, rather than muscle or water, and to reduce the chance of putting weight back on. Healthy eating

Healthy eating means balancing the food you eat, to get the amounts of energy and nutrients that your body A healthy, balanced diet

means:

- eating a wide variety of healthy foods every day
- \* eating mainly vegetables, legumes and wholegrain foods (e.g. wholegrain/wholemeal breads, cereals, pasta, rice, quinoa, couscous)
- \* eating moderate amounts of fruit
- \* eating moderate amounts of lean meat, fish, skinless poultry, eggs, tofu, nuts and seeds
- \* eating moderate amounts of reduced-fat dairy foods (e.g. milk, yoghurt, cheese)
- \* eating small amounts of oils and fats. Fat supplies twice as much energy as carbohydrate or protein, so eating less fat is an important way to reduce energy intake. Polyunsaturated or mono-unsaturated oils and fats are the best oils and fats to eat
- \* eating small amounts of sugars and salt
- \* drinking enough fluid every day to satisfy your thirst and to keep your urine 'lightcoloured' (unless a doctor advises you not to). It is best to drink plenty of water and limit other drinks.

#### To control y our weight:

- \* Limit the amount of high energy foods and drinks you consume. High energy foods include high fat, high sugar and highly refined foods (e.g. pastries, pies, pizzas, hamburgers, chips, cream, creamy sauces, butter, sweets, cakes, biscuits, chocolate, soft drinks, fruit
- \* Limit foods and drinks high in salt. Do not add salt to food.
- \* Limit alcohol. Have no more than two standard drinks a day.
- \* Eat smaller portions, eat slowly and stop eating when comfortably full.
- \* Have a planned, regular eating pattern of meals, or meals and mid-meals.

#### Physical activity

Physical activity uses energy, and regular exercise or physical activity will use up fat and build muscle. Your body shape will change, even if you do not lose weight.

\* Start slowly by using everyday events to increase your activity (e.g. take the stairs; park the car 10 minutes away

#### from work).

- \* Do active things you enjoy and will want to continue.
- \* For general health and wellbeing, do at least 150 minutes of moderate intensity physical activity each week. To lose weight, you may need to do more physical activity.

If you have not exercised for a while, check with your doctor before starting.

#### Medicines for weight loss

Medicines can help with w eight loss. They work best if combined with healthy eating and physical activity. Some medicine companies offer customer support programs that can increase the chances of successful weight loss.

Some medicines that can help weight loss are:

orlistat - reduces fat absorption in the stomach and intestine. Orlistat capsules are a nonprescription medicine available from a pharmacist

liraglutide - reduces appetite. Liraglutide injection must be prescribed by a doctor.

Some medicines are prescription only and must be prescribed by a medical practitioner.

#### Other treatments for weight loss

- 'Meal replacement' products and commercial formula foods, with a very low-calorie content. These products come in various forms, such as powders, drinks, soups, bars and biscuits. Some products are designed to replace all meals, and others are designed to replace only one or two meals per day. Ask a Pharmacist or dietician for advice.
- Surgery is sometimes suitable and helpful.
- Some herbal products and diet supplements are marketed as weight control medicines, but there is no proof for the weight loss claims of many of these products.

#### **Important**

- Set a realistic goal for weight loss.
- Make healthy diet changes that you can continue.
- Start a regular exercise routine that you can continue.
- Healthy weight loss takes time. Avoid 'crash' diets.
- Ask a doctor or Pharmacist about weight loss medicines.
- · Ask a doctor, your Piggott's Pharmacist or dietician about meal replacement products. Cheers.

#### Coal Miners Pneumoconiosis - What you need to know about 'black lung disease'

In February 2019, it was reported that there were 102 confirmed cases of mine-dust -related diseases in Queensland with 250 more suspected cases awaiting assessment by experts in the US. In the past few years, a number of cases have been confirmed here in New South Wales.

The re-emergence of coal miners' pneumoconiosis is a sobering reminder that continued vigilance must be a key factor in ensuring the eradication of this disease in

#### What is coal miner's black lung disease?

Coal miner's pneumoconiosis ("CWP") is caused by the inhalation of coal dust and is one of several respirator disease caused by long-term exposure to high concentrations of respirable coal dust. It is commonly known as 'black lung disease' as the effected lungs appear to be black in colour rather than pink. Related coal mine dust lung

diseases include silicosis, mixed dust pneumoconiosis and chronic pulmonary disease.

CWP is caused by prolonged exposure to respirable coal dust and the general build up of coal dust particles within the terminal airways. A workers body reacts to these particles by forming layers of scar tissue over the affected areas. The dust collections and scarring may appear as small round shadows on a workers regular chest x-ray. What is respirable dust? The dust particles created by mining coal generally fall

into two size categories inhalable dust and respirable dust. Inhalable dust is about

0.1mm in diameter and is visible to the naked eve. This type of dust gets caught in the mouth, nose and upper respiratory tract and can cause short-term effects such as eyes and nose irritation, asthma and bronchitis. Respirable dust on the other hand is invisible. It is around 0.005mm in diameter and passes through defences and directly into lung tissue. These form of dust causes irritation to the lungs, which the body attempts to heal, causing scar tissue to form (fibrosis). This replaces health lung tissue and causes an increase in mucous production, shortness of breath and wheezing.

Who is at risk of developing CWP? Any worker exposed to

harmful levels of dust is at risk of developing a dust-related lung disease. The risk is linked directly to your total level of exposure to dust - the longer a person is exposed to high concentrations of respirable dust, the more series and life -altering the disease becomes

#### What are the symptoms of

CWP usually takes several years to develop. It is common for there to be no symptoms in the early stages of the disease. There are two types of CWP: simple and complex. The diagnosis is dependent upon the level of progression of the disease and simple CWP can



**COVID-proof regions: Where** prices have increased despite the pandemic

The economic fallout from the coronavirus crisis continues to have farreaching effects, including on the property market. But new data shows property prices in some areas are showing resilience despite the pandemic.

If a worker is diagnosed with complex CWP, prognosis is poor and there is no cure. The treatment regime from this point is to maintain and protect remaining lung function

What do workers in the coal industry of NSW need to do? There are a number of controls implemented by Coal Services including periodic health surveillance, chest x-rays and independent airborne dust monitoring at mine sites that work towards preventing dust disease - however education of workers is also crucial. We cannot emphasis enough

the importance of workers having regular chest x-rays. A chest x-ray is required every six years if you have a high risk of dust exposure. In addition, it is important that workers ensure they are undergoing their Periodic Health Assessment with Coal Services every three years. As part of this assessment, lung health is examined along with a number of other occupational health issues such as noise, fatigue, mental health and musculoskeletal issues. Prevention is key and early detection can be life saving.



Bricks and mortar we have plenty, but fewer medical services are being delivered in Maitland in 2022.

One would have believed back in 2011 that the people of the Maitland State Electorate and Lower Hunter were going to get a State of the Art new Hospital that they expected when MP Robyn Parker and Jillian Skinner then Health Minister made their grand announcement of a new \$766 million 412 bed teaching hospital to support the John Hunter Hospital in Newcastle was the big promise.

The groups had been in limbo after a restructure of the Treasury Managed Fund saw the organisation left without public liability insurance since the start of the 2019/2020 financial year. The state government provided a grant to cover the cost of the insurance and they are now forging ahead throughout the state.



All Our Shimmering Skies **Trent Dalton** 

#### By Toni Jordan

Early in All Our Shimmering Skies, seven-year-old Molly Hook is reading tombstones with her mother, Violet, in the cemetery the family owns on the outskirts of Darwin. The year is 1934 and the person doing much of the grave digging is plucky Molly with the shovel she calls Bert.

Violet is going away, she tells Molly. "Promise me you'll make your life grand and beautiful and poetic and where it's not poetic you'll write it so," Violet savs. Later we meet World War II Zero pilot Yukio Miki, struggling with grief and his commitment to the Japanese war effort. His father, a maker of famous knives, taught him ... the wonders and importance of story. The finest blades are forged not with steel, son ... but with

story. Many fine novelists worry away at the same themes, a tongue drawn to a loose tooth. We've seen Trent Dalton's preoccupation with the power of words and stories to transform damaged children before, in his debut novel, Boy Swallows Universe. We've also seen the powerlessness of childhood, a visceral thing in his hands. The thing that makes his work so remarkable, though, is his seamless and plausible blending of reality and the mystical. Magic, or at least the possibility of it, is again important in All Our Shimmering Skies, but not as literary technique added on a whim. Dalton's fantastical elements are a logical psychological progression for Molly. As in his earlier work, childhood trauma becomes the architect of a different kind of reality. And Molly's trauma is especially gruesome, though the novel never feels manipulative or overly sentimental. The story becomes more compelling as it progresses. By the time Molly is 12. Australia is at war and most of Darwin is evacuated, though not Molly or her family. Without her mother for protection, Molly is horrifically abused by her father and sadistic uncle Aubrey. One scene in the graveyard is particularly chilling. Then the Japanese bombers come. For Molly, imagination is a survival tool and her fancies have their own rationale. Her family haven't always been diggers of graves — for generations they've been driven by a lust for gold and have shown voracious carelessness in the way they destroyed the land to find it.

Molly believes that an Indigenous

'sorcerer", Longcoat Bob, cursed her grandfather long ago for stealing gold. This curse is the reason for the cruelty and debasement of her father and uncle — the hearts of all Molly's kin are destined to turn to stone. Guided by poetic clues etched on the back of her grandfather's prospecting pan and the advice of writers such as Emily Dickinson and Shakespeare, she heads off to find Longcoat Bob and have the curse lifted, but she's not alone. Greta, the beautiful actress girlfriend of Uncle Aubrey who's suffered one too many of his beatings, goes with her. Molly's mother told her the sky is her best friend and Molly finds many examples to confirm this. The sky saves her life. It talks to her and sends her gifts, including Yukio, when he parachutes from his doomed

plane almost at her feet. Dalton's Northern Territory is a magnificent wild Eden and there's splendour in his smallest descriptions. In time All Our Shimmering Skies becomes a mythic quest as Molly is driven to find Longcoat Bob before her own heart turns to stone and she loses the ability to care for anyone. She leads Greta and Yukio into the wilds of northern Australia, with danger ahead and in pursuit.

The similarities between Dalton's two novels are too explicit to be ignored but they don't diminish his achievement here. It's unfair to compare any novel to Boy Swallows Universe, which has sold more than 500,000 copies in Australia alone and was longlisted for the Miles Franklin literary award. I adored it, but it wasn't perfect. Neither is All Our Shimmering Skies. It's unnecessarily repetitive and baggy and could easily lose 80 pages. There's too much symbolism and metaphor and Yukio's fortuitous knowledge of exactly the right

English words strains credibility more than the fantastical events. It's also a work of shimmering originality and energy, with extraordinary characters and a clever, thrilling plot. On paper, Uplifting Australian Gritty Fantasy Gothic seems an unlikely mix, yet somehow it works brilliantly. Dalton's novels are companion pieces exploring how traumatised children cope and evolve under the most dreadful of circumstances, while also being cracking good reads. I found All Our Shimmering Skies unputdownable.

on cue, Greta tells Molly to shut her eyes and imagine "that dark and scary and fragile place where you've been before ... you go there enough times you realise that dark place is actually your sacred place". At the same time there is magic all around us, the novel says, if only we lift our

gaze to the skies and look. Toni Jordan's most recent novel, The Fragments, is published by Text.



#### RESEARCHERS TRACK THREATENED SHOREBIRDS IN HUNTER AND PORT STEPHENS ESTUARIES

(LLS) is calling on visitors to the Hunter and Port Stephens estuaries to watch out for threatened shorebirds, with new signs installed across the region highlighting key feeding and nesting sites as part of a major tracking and protection program. Funded by the Australian Government's National Landcare Program, the project is identifying threats to shorebirds and developing strategies to protect them including research, habitat restoration and community engagement. Shorebirds, also known as waders, are a group of longlegged birds that live on the fringes of lakes, estuaries and coastlines feeding on worms and crustaceans. Reegan Walker, Senior Project Officer with Hunter LLS, said that many people don't realise that there are so many threatened

Hunter Local Land Services "There are five threatened shorebirds species that travel to the Hunter and Port Stephens estuaries every year from their Arctic breeding grounds." "Incredibly, researchers have recorded non-stop flights of around 9000km during these journeys," said Mr Walker.

The project is funding the installation of a large-scale radio tracking system to provide highly accurate 24hour information detailing shorebird movements within each estuary - the first such system in Australia.

"Migratory shorebirds come here with one key objective: to gain enough weight to sustain them on their long flight back to their breeding ground. They must eat as much as possible, and when not eating, they must rest to conserve their energy," said Mr Walker.

"We are working with the University of Newcastle to find out exactly where

these birds are feeding and resting, so we can ensure those sites are properly managed." Hunter Local Land Services and partner organisations are asking recreational visitors to the Port Stephens and Hunter estuary areas to look out for shorebirds either feeding or resting, and to give them a wide berth to avoid disturbing them from these crucial activities.

'We've worked with MidCoast Council, Port Stephens Council and the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service to install fifteen shorebird identification signs at key visitor locations across the region."

"The signs provide images of different shorebird species and information detailing their long journey back to the Arctic to breed," said Mr Walker.





#### **Detailed Cattle report for Gunnedah**

Last reported 29th September 2020

There was an increase in numbers with yearlings well supplied. All other categories represented. The quality of the offering was generally good with secondary quality lots in limited number. The condition of the penning was mostly good with plain condition cattle, not surprisingly, short in supply. The full field of buyers were in attendance and there was increased export processor activity. Demand was high from all sectors through the young cattle market. This resulted in dearer trends throughout, any negative price change was quality and breed related. Vealer steers to restockers were up to 10c/kg dearer with the heifer portion showing a greater rise. Both quality and breed were strong factors in the cheaper prices for the lightest of the yearling steers with a vast range in that quality. Medium weight yearling steers to restock and feed posted strong gains. Heavy weight feeder steers saw a firm to slightly dearer market trend. Medium weight yearling heifers to restock and feed saw a significantly dearer market trend under strong competition. Trade yearlings saw a firm to dearer trend, little change in the heavy weight steers, while the heifers posted strong gains. Heavy grown steers sold to a much dearer trend with increased competition. This followed through to the well finished heavy grown heifers. There were two extra buyers in the cow market with the extra competition resulting in a dearer trend of as much as 18c/kg.

#### **Detailed Cattle report for HRLX Singleton**

Last reported 30th September 2020

Consignments increased marginally for a generally good quality penning, with the vealers and yearlings well supplied. There were fair numbers in prime condition and suitable for the local butchers, however the majority were purchased by the restocker orders. The export cattle were limited in number, with approximately 18 cows offered. The market trend was dearer. Vealers returning to the paddock lifted 12c to 18c, with the over 200kg steers making from 406c to 540c/kg. The same weight heifer portion received from 436c to 486c/kg. The yearling steers improved 10c, with the medium weights to the restockers making from 390c to 460c, as the lighter end reached 474c/kg. Yearling heifers also sold to strong competition, with the restockers paying from 396c to 468c/kg depending on the weight offered. The prime conditioned and high yielding younger drafts to the butchers gained 10c to 12c in value, as prices ranged from 400c to 460c/kg for the better end. The older steers and heifers also trended dearer, with a heavy weight steer reaching 352c, while the heifers topped at 376c/kg. The better covered heavy weight cows lifted 12c and sold from 272c to 300c/kg. The heavy weight bulls reached 275c/kg.

#### **Detailed Cattle report for Scone**

Last reported 29th September 2020

There was only a small penning of fair to good quality cattle, fair percentages in prime condition and suitable for the butcher and processor orders. The majority were younger drafts, with approximately 30 cows all in prime condition, also in the market. The market trend was firm to dearer. The prime conditioned and high yielding younger cattle to the local butchers again sold to strong competition, with the best vealer reaching 438c/kg. The vealer steers to the restockers remained firm and sold from 412c to 498c/kg. The heifer portion also maintained firm prices, with those to the restockers making from 410c to 476c/kg. The yearling steers also sold at similar prices week on week, as restockers and lot feeders paid from 380c to 450c/kg, depending on the weight offered. Yearling heifers improved 12c with those to the restocker orders receiving from 376c to 440c/kg, also depending on weight. Grown steers to the processors sold from 318c to 348c, as the best of the older heifers reached 368c/kg. Cows improved 15c, however yield was higher week on week with the better covered heavy weights making from 266c to 290c/kg. The best heavy weight bull reached 280c/kg. Cow and calf units sold from \$2000 to \$2800/unit.

#### **Detailed Cattle report for TRLX Tamworth**

Last reported 28th September 2020

Numbers almost doubled in the lead up to next weeks public holiday. Young cattle were well supplied, particularly yearlings. There was an increased penning of cows along with a few heavy steers and heifers. Quality was mostly good overall with some categories showing improvement. Condition was also good with most cattle showing the benefit of good crops and pasture conditions. The usual buyers were in attendance along with some extra feedlot competition. Not all processors operated. Strong restocker demand for light weight cattle saw vealers sell firm to dearer. Trends were also firm to dearer for yearling steers to restock and feed. Light and medium weights attracted keen restocker demand with quality improvements accounting for some strong price gains. Medium and heavy weight feeder steers saw a firm to slightly dearer trend with some quality related price change either way. Heavy weight trade steers also sold to dearer trends on the back of the strong feedlot competition. High restocker demand for quality females resulted in light weight yearling heifers selling to dearer trends. The quality of the offering contributing to some significant price improvement. Medium and heavy weight feeder heifers experienced little but quality related price change. Heifers to the trade were also dearer. Increased competition for heavy cattle saw the grown steers to processors sell to a dearer trend. The well finished heifers followed suit. That increased export processor competition was evident in the cow market with the well finished cows selling to a dearer trend of as much as 18c/kg.

#### LOCAL LAND SERVICES HELPING PEOPLE ESCAPE TO THE COUNTRY

As more and more city people consider moving to regional areas, encouraged by the remote working opportunities provided through COVID 19, many are considering buying a rural property and escaping to the country. For many of us, the idea of 'getting away from it all' and becoming a part of a rural community is a lifelong dream. Acreage can be rewarding

but if people do not have the skills and knowledge to look after their land and animals properly, the great Aussie dream could turn into a nightmare.

Local Land Services has responded to this need by releasing a toolkit of new and updated resources to help people successfully make the shift to

country life. The new resources include the 2020 update of the Rural Living Handbook which is a starter guide to getting the most out of a rural property and contains a wealth of resources for new and prospective rural residents. It covers a range of topics as diverse as emergencies, rural crime, owning livestock, farm safety, developing a property and what each landholder's General Biosecurity Duty

The handbook includes a 'Before you buy' checklist that lists the sort of

questions a prospective rural property owner should ask prior to purchase, to avoid potential problems.

The handbook is not

designed to include everything a new or prospective rural resident may want to know but is intended to be a springboard for further personal research. Each section includes lists of useful resources and websites as well as contact details for organisations that provide support to rural landholders.

"The landholders we help are pretty diverse, from large-scale primary producers to people who have a lifestyle block or hobby farm," said Peter Evans, Senior Land Services Officer at Local Land Services.

"We tailor our help to what they need with the end goal of making sure our farms and environments are productive and healthy. We understand it is not always easy to know what

to do or the right people or organisations to go to for help, if you have never lived in a rural area before." Susie Crowe is one land-

holder who has been helped by Local Land Services and the Rural Living Handbook.

She says she referred to the handbook a lot in the early days after she and her husband Greg bought a 134

-hectare property at Wallerawang, west of Lithgow four years ago. They wanted the farm to pay for itself, but it was overrun with blackberries and they knew very little about how to achieve that goal.

"We were consciously incompetent; we knew we didn't know anything," said Mrs Crowe.

"When you're starting out, you need to surround yourself with people you can trust, and Local Land Services provided such a diverse range of expertise."

The Rural Living Handbook is the most up to date version of a guide that was originally compiled nearly 20 years ago for councils throughout Sydney's drinking water catchment. It was largely based on the work of Jack Miller, a Landscape Planner at

burn Mulwaree Council who said he is pleased the handbook is just as relevant today as in 2004. "Back then, we saw a need for some basic information for people who were moving into our local government area who did not know much about rural life," he said. 'Over the years this publication has been reproduced in a number

After We Collided: Raunchier, darker sequel offers less Twilight, more 50 Shades





#### The worst debate in modern American history: how hope was mugged in the Trump-Biden clash (CHOICE

Ninety minutes is a lifetime in politics these days – and Wednesday's reality TV show let us know that it was 90 minutes of our lifetimes we will never get back. A horrible, disastrous, useless session that left viewers utterly disappointed – the worst debate in modern American history.

President Donald Trump hates being challenged, and he gamed this debate to occupy the platform and bully former vice-president Joe Biden and the moderator, Chris Wallace, to recreate his favourite playing field: where he owns the oxygen and sucks it out of the room. He loved all those precious minutes where he could soar unfettered because, in the words of an Australian prime minister he does not know, "I'm going to do you slowly, mate." Trump lashed Biden for being a Trojan horse for socialism, anarchy, crime and much, much worse.

Going into this first debate, the polls and the fundamentals underpinning Biden's campaign were steady. Nationally, he is up by seven to 10 points against Trump, and is constantly registering more than 50 per cent of voters polled - a significant benchmark. He is leading in every crucial swing state, and competitive even in Republican redoubts Iowa, Georgia and Ohio. Women voters are for Biden over Trump 65-35 – up 15 points over Hillary Clinton's margin.

Trump's approval is at 43 per cent. No president has won re-election while under 50 per cent - a benchmark Trump never reached in his term. He is carrying white voters 52-46, but in 2016, he won them by 16 points. Biden leads with older voters 52-37; Trump won them by seven points in 2016. Sixty per cent of Americans do not want the Supreme Court to outlaw abortion but this is a major driver for Trump to place judge Amy Coney Barrett on the court by election day. At 57 per cent approval, Obamacare is more popular than

So Trump had to take Biden apart, and rev up the

engine that won those key states that delivered the presidency to him in 2016 with only 46 per cent of the popular vote, against Clinton's 48 per cent. Trump only plays offence – never retreats into defence. Biden struggled under the onslaught – to get heard, to keep focused on issues as Trump changed the subject and was out-talked. Biden could not proceed for more than 30 seconds without Trump interrupting. Trump was pugnacious in the extreme, but Biden does not fight on those terms, and was hurt. Trump absolutely cemented his base with his performance. They loved it. Biden supporters came away sickened by the President as much as ever. This debate left the country as divided as ever on their leadership and their

future. But was Biden's performance strong enough to bring nim to victory over the last 34 days of the campaign.

His enthusiasm factor is much weaker than Trump's. Sixty-five per cent of the Trump base is "very" enthusiastic for their President, but only 49 per cent are similarly amped up for Biden. That was probably unchanged after this debate. If all of Trump's supporters show up to vote and 10 per cent of Biden's stay home, trouble for Joe.

Biden's Hispanic vote is not especially strong, and this could cost him Florida, where Hispanics who hold enmity for the regimes in Cuba, Nicaragua and

Venezuela are firmly behind Trump and his animus for the dictators their families fled. The projected African American vote for Biden will be

greater than Clinton's in 2016 - but lower than Obama's in 2012. There are wildcards that could come into play. No one is immune from coronavirus. If Trump or Biden gets

change the race. If Biden stumbles physically or mentally, this could raise doubts about his abilities for the presidency. And sadly, there is a prospect of violence. The days before the election will be the most tense the country has faced since the September 11 terrorist attacks in 2001. The mood is grim – and was not at all helped by this Trump-Biden

In the decade from 1963-72, horrific political violence was rampant, from the assassinations of president John F. Kennedy, Martin Luther King and Robert F. Kennedy, and the attempt to kill governor George Wallace of Alabama as he campaigned in 1972 on a white supremacy, law-and-order platform. Candidates for the presidency have not been attacked since. The danger today is an America with too much ugly anger and too many guns.

Trump and Biden will meet two more times. But with 90 million tuned in, this was the one that counted most. It disappointed and reinforced the terribly sad state of American democracy. Hope was mugged on the debate stage in Ohio.

Several councils have thrown residents in regional NSW their support behind NSW Labor's calls for the government to consider easing COVID-19 restrictions in rural and regional NSW.

Rural and regional areas that have not recorded a local positive COVID-19 case in months have still been subject to the same restrictions placed on metropolitan areas where the virus had been more consistently present. Shadow Minister for Health, Ryan Park, said the "one size fits all" approach needed to be reviewed by the government. "It has been months since locally acquired cases were reported in some parts of the state," Mr Park said.

Shadow Minister for Local Government, Greg Warren, said it didn't make sense for pubs, club and restaurants in Cooma, Cessnock or Coraki to be subject to the same restrictions as those in Castle Hill, Carlingford or Clovelly. "Applying a bit of common sense regarding the easing of restrictions would make an enormous difference to rural and regional areas throughout NSW," he said. "Placing restrictions on

communities that have remained largely isolated from the virus seems counterproductive and unnecessary.' NSW Labor's calls have received support from a number of rural and regional councils including Cessnock and the Riverina Joint Chairman of the Riverina

Joint Organisation, Rick Firman, believed the level of restrictions should be rolled back given the absence of the virus in the local community. "This is something all of us across the Riverina region as mayors, councillors and staff have been calling for, for some time now," Cr Firman said. "There has been very few if any cases out here and we need to get our economy and tourism industry back on track, so we warmly and fully support this campaign by NSW Labor."

Cessnock City Council Mayor Bob Pynsent echoed those thoughts.

"We are in a strong position to welcome visitors back to the Cessnock Local Government Area and the easing of restrictions will see a significant increase in tourism, which is so needed for our local economy," Cr Pynsent said. "Our businesses have gone through enough with the bushfires and now COVID-19."

#### Hunter community organisations can now apply for new Clubgrants funding

Community organisations across the Hunter region impacted by COVID-19 are encouraged to apply for funding, thanks to the next round of the NSW Government's Infrastructure Grants program now open.

The grants are made possible by the Clubgrants Category 3 Fund which re-invests profits from registered clubs' gaming machines into a statewide funding pool for large-scale community projects. #### FRANGIPANI



What you need to know about frangipani

Name: frangipani (*Plumeria* sp. and cvrs.) Height: 5–8m with age, canopy often as wide Foliage: deciduous. Large (20–30cm long × 10cm wide), deep green, distinct veins and mid-rib.

Climate: tropics, subtropics, sheltered location in warm temperate, and microclimates in cold temperate.

**Soil**: free-draining to sandy soil. Will perform best with extra organic matter in the soil.

**Position:** full sun, protected from winds

Flowering: varies by region, from December through until April.
Feeding: not essential,

although a spring/summer feed is beneficial.

Watering: during warmer months if needed. Avoid winter watering.

The *Plumeria rubra*, or frangipani, is native to Central America, Mexico and Venezuela. It's known for its beautiful and fragrant flowers, the colours of which can vary enormously from white with a yellow centre, through shades of apricot and right through to pink and even dark red. Uses of frangipani Whether grown in the ground or in big pots, no

Uses of frangipani Whether grown in the ground or in big pots, no tropical-look, resort style, Balinese or modern Aussie coastal garden is complete without a frangipani or two. You can even plant a perfumed rainbow! The choice of flower colours is enormous, and the perfume

Frangipani is excellent grown against sunny walls, providing cooling summer shade while letting winter sun flow through. It can also be a real problem solver, as it will thrive in sandy soil that many plants can't handle.

And if you only have a balcony, you can still have a frangipani! They can do very well in large pots and planters too.

How to plant and grow frangipani
As frangipani hails originally from tropical regions, its best performance will be in the tropics and sub-tropics.
However, if protected from cold winds and frost, it can also grow well, albeit more slowly, in cooler zones.
Locally they seem to thrive even with a cold winter and occasional frosts.
In cooler areas, select a

north-facing spot that will create a suitably warm microclimate. Frangipani will tolerate a wide range of soil types, provided drainage is excellent. Avoid locations where soil may remain wet, especially across the cooler months, and avoid windy spots, as

Frangipani planting tips Follow these planting tips to ensure your frangipani will thrive:

frangipani branches are

brittle.

Frangipani will benefit from some extra organic matter, such as a quality compost or composted manure, blended in with the planting soil.

Don't be surprised if the plant only has a very loose root ball when you remove its pot.

Try not to disturb the roots too much, as they can be easily damaged.

Larger plants will require staking, as they will be top-heavy until they establish.

Frangipani care tips
Frangipani is a very
easy-care plant. If
conditions are dry in the
warmer months, water the
plant as the leaves and
flowers are developing.
Avoid watering your frangipani while it is dormant
(leafless).

Fertilising isn't necessary, but will improve performance. Apply a controlled-release fertiliser around the edge of the canopy line in late spring or early summer. How to prune frangipanis Occasionally, you may

need to prune your frangipani to restrict size, tidy a broken branch or to remove an inconvenient branch. On older trees, look for any branches that have started rubbing or crossing over, or have stopping producing foliage or flowers, and remove them. Diseases and pests Frangipani rust generally appears shortly before leaf fall, and shows up as discolouring of leaves above, and orange spots on their under-surface. Thoroughly spray all leaf surfaces with a suitable fungicide such as Eco-Fungicide and repeat weekly. Any fallen leaves should be promptly removed, sealed in a plastic bag and disposed of in the regular bin (not the compost). Scale insects are found on

Scale insects are found on stems or leaves. They look like small white or brown lumps. These can easily be treated with a suitable horticultural spray oil. Growing frangipani from cuttings

Frangipani grows very easily from cuttings. Your cutting should be a growth tip at least 10–15cm long. Ensure the cutting is cleanly cut, not crushed, and put it somewhere warm and shady until the sap seals.

Once dry, fill a suitablesized pot with a freedraining potting mix or propagating mix. Put the cutting in, and support it if required. Put it in a warm spot and only water when dry. You can grow a new plant from even very large cuttings—just ensure they have adequate support as they grow.

A lot of people say frangipanis are old hat, but a row of evergreen frangipanis can look just as good in a modern setting as they would in an old garden. They flower from November to May, so if you can find a better plant for the tropical or subtropical garden than frangipani, I'd like

#### Boarding your pets whilst you are on holidays

It very important to remember that when planning a trip or holiday your pets may need to go into a boarding facility. Its important to understand what your local boarding facility can and will offer your pet whilst you are away, remember to ask if you can have an inspection before selecting a facility:

- \* What are the hours of operation
- \* Will my pet have their own room
- \* Do they supply bedding \* Is food included or can I bring my own
- \* Do they have air conditioning – very important in the summer months

These are just a few ideas of questions to ask when considering a boarding facility; more importantly is that all pets that are boarded in facilities are required to be fully vaccinated:

Cats: The recommended minimum requirement for cats going to boarding is the F3 vaccination. This provides immunity against feline enteritis and feline respiratory syndrome (commonly called 'cat flu').

Check with your vet however – they may also recommended your cat has an additional vaccination against Chlamydophila and Feline Leukaemia. The FIV vaccination is also a good idea.

It is recommended your cat's vaccinations are fully up to date and if a booster is due it is done at least 2 weeks prior to boarding.

Dogs: The recommended minimum requirement for dogs going to kennels is the C3 and C5 vaccination. This provides immunity against distemper, hepatitis, parvovirus, parainfluenza and Bordetella (which causes kennel cough).

Kennel Cough is not particular to boarding kennels – your dog can pick this up in off leash dog parks. You should check with your veterinary as the C3 now comes as a tri-annual or 3 yearly whereby the C5 is at this stage only an annual shot, you should remember to check with your boarding facility prior to boarding. I hope the above has been helpful in the decision to board your pets; choosing the right facility is important, so ask your vet, your friends or even look at

their reviews.



#### Nominations open for local 'sport grant program'

On Saturday 26th Sept the **Greta/Branxton Colts** U/18's won a memorable premiership when they

couple of tackles later saw a nice crisp backline shift to the right which resulted in a try in the north-eastern

corner to centre Will Regan. enough to claim the title. Patrick Andrews' difficult conversion attempt in the blustery conditions was waved away and the Colts led 4-0.

Denman responded immediately after Greta/Branxton allowed the ensuing kick off to bounce dead in goal. Four tackles later from the drop out the Devils opened their scoring with a converted after their five-eighth waltzed through some brittle Colts defence to lead 6-4.
