Branxton RV Park set to contract professional management

Cessnock City Council management recommends The Campervan & Motorhome Club of Australia (CMCA) manage Branxton RV Park following lengthy report to councillors

report were:-

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A report presented to councillors at the last ordinary meeting of Cessnock City Council concerning the contracting out of management rights for the Branxton RV Park has been deferred to allow further discussions (some new councillors wanted more information and a chance to inspect the RV Park). The recommendations in the

1. That Council endorses Campervan & Motorhome Club of Australia LTD as the preferred applicant to manage Branxton RV Park subject to community consultation; 2. That Council gives public notice of the Branxton RV Park Management proposal for a period of 28 days; 3. That Council provides public notice of the intention to engage Campervan & Motorhome Club of Australia LTD as the Branxton RV Park Manager subject to consideration of submissions received; and 4. That the General Manager negotiate a licence agreement for Branxton RV Park Management after considering the public submissions received. The report was made after council asked for 'Expressions of Interest' with only the one submission received from the Campervan & Motorhome Club of Australia LTD. In June 2021 the President of Central Hunter Business Chamber sent a formal request that Council explore options to increase visitation to the Branxton RV Park. Following this request Council completed an expression of interest (EOI) process to determine the interest of any parties wishing to manage the Branxton RV Park. The Business Chamber &

achieve some or all of the following outcomes for the Branxton RV Park: Increased visitor numbers; An improved customer service experience; Improved facilities; Site maintenance levels that meets community expectations; and Increased expenditure within

The RV park has been unofficially looked after by the chamber for many years with Branxton RSL President Brian Furner OAM being the

doyenne. The council report indicated that under professional management the RV Park would increase visitor numbers by 5,000 per year with an average overnight spend of \$256 bringing an extra \$1,280,000 into the town. The proposal will go to public exhibition for 28-days next month &, hopefully, will be up & running under the professional management of the CMCA by the end of the financial year. The park is very well used and has some great comments on WikiCamps Australia. It averages around 20-vans per day

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Follow up on construction progress; Branxton to Greta Shared Pathway/Cycleway

As stated in the last reporting of the construction progress of the long awaited and much anticipated construction of the Branxton to Greta Shared Pathway/Cycleway (which was last November) is currently still on hold and has been for the over 6 months

The official commencement of the project, with much fanfare, was in March 2021 & the estimated completion date was announced, depending on weather conditions, to be by this month.

After making enquiries with Cessnock City Council last week I received a reply just on deadline of printing this edition.

I asked for an update and received the following reply A contractor has been engaged to undertake the

Stage 2 section of the pathway from chainage 400 (end of stage 1) to chainage 820 and the letter of award has been issued. Once the works start, it is expected to take six weeks to complete, weather depending.

Investigations are continuing on the remainder of the footpath to Greta on the south side of the highway, and the crossing of the New England Highway. Works will follow once the investigations are complete.

Council appreciates the community's support and patience as they progress the Branxton to Greta cycleway project. Cessnock City Council

secured \$1,950,000 under Round 4 of the Australian Government's Building



Better Regions Fund to build the 3.3km off-road, shared cycleway/pathway & kicked in \$650,000 of its own funds. The project has been a long

time coming as it was first

funded and then de-funded

in 2004 when the state gov-

ernment provided \$600,000 to be matched by Cessnock City Council but CCC declined the offer from the State Government due to its inability to provide the matching finance of \$600,000 over four years.



There is a remarkable contradiction becoming evident as the cries of impending doom grow ever more strident and hysterical. Man made emissions of CO2, unless curtailed, will see the end of human kind, against the mounting evidence that CO2 has no role in global warming.

Leaders of the Western World, with a few exceptions such as India and Israel, keep harping on about some climate tipping point where Global Warming will become irreversible.

What is not is not explained is that global temperature in the past has been much higher than computer modelling suggests is going to happen by the end of this century. Mean temperature as dictated by climate and moves up and down in cycles related to solar activity, orbital variations about the sun and unpredictable events such as vulcanism to name a but a few.

When cyclical events coincide with major tectonic events the climates trips from glaciation to inter glaciation such as we are currently in or back into the deep freeze. CO2 does not cause these cycles but may well be affected by climate change as to the amount of this gas in the atmosphere. The gas (CO2) concentration can be measured as parts per million or as a percentage of the earth's atmosphere. At present the CO2 concentration is 410 ppm.

Or .014% which makes it a trace gas in the atmosphere. At such low concentrations you wonder how plants dependant on CO2 for their source of carbon manage to get enough to grow. One factor is the majority of the earths plant bio-mass is in the ocean and does not get its CO2 from the atmosphere. Land based plant life absorbs CO2 from the atmosphere during daylight when photosynthesis occurs but then uses atmospheric oxygen at night to convert plant sugars into plant fibre. The result is that not much oxygen comes from landbased plants but there is a drawdown of CO2. The anthropomorphic produced CO2 is not sufficient to cover this draw down. Other sources of CO2 occur to explain the

current increasing concentrations of the gas and this involves de-gassing of the oceans, volcanic activity, decay of organic matter and many other sources.

To demonstrate the extent of CO2 drawdown by land-based plants, in the northern hemisphere spring and summer readings of the level of atmospheric CO2 drop between May and August every year. This is recorded by the research station on the Island of Hawaii and reflects the rapid growth of forest and crops. This does not

occur to a measurable amount in the southern hemisphere spring and summer for there is less land mass and the massive deciduous forest of the north are not present to create the bud-burst

drawdown. There are two points we can take from this. First the turnover of CO2 in the atmosphere by natural causes significantly outweighs man made emissions. Approximately 75 to 80% of which comes from the northern hemisphere and due to the Coriolis effect remains there. The second point is the historical written records document Global Warming events which were hotter than now and where CO2 levels could not have been due to the activities of man. From 500

BC to 500 AD was the 'Roman Warming', an essential enabler of the rise of that empire. The Dark Ages cooling from 535 AD to 900 AD saw the demise of the Romans and a statis in human events apart from warfare and famine. The Medieval warming from 900 AD - 1300 AD saw the triumph of the Vikings, farming in Greenland and excess crops and wealth leading to the building of the great castles, cathedrals and monasteries. The little Ice age occurred from 1300 AD to 1850 AD and happened very quickly with a drop in temperatures of 4° C in two decades. This led to famine followed by the plague and 50% of Europe's population was wiped out.

A number of years ago I predicted the supposition that CO2 causes the environment to heat up will be proven to be incorrect. This would expose the tidal wave of current opinion amongst the press. Politicians, academia and the renewable energy rent seeking as the greatest ever fraud and misuse of resources the world has ever seen.

The development of guidelines for outdoor fitness equipment and multipurpose courts will include a review of what we currently have, developing design principles and criteria, identifying potential and future locations across the Cessnock LGA, an estimate of costs and a priority action plan.

Residents are invited to have their say on these two projects via an online survey which is available on Council's website until Monday 14 March at www.cessnock.nsw.gov.au/AmenitiesReview. Cessnock City Council Mayor Jay Suvaal is encouraging residents to take part in the consultation. "Our region is growing and we need to make sure the future provision of public amenities, outdoor fitness equipment and multipurpose courts reflect our community's needs," Councillor Suvaal said. Council will also be holding workshops with key community stakeholders. It was an honour to host a morning tea last Thursday at Laguna Community Hall, with Resilience NSW Commissioner Shane Fitzsimmons in attendance, where we announced round two of the recipients of the Cessnock Bushfire Community Recovery and Resilience Grants. This funding was designed to support small scale community led projects that promote recovery, resilience, disaster preparedness and wellbeing following the 2019/2020 Black Summer bushfires. With COVID being the focus of the past couple of years, these fires seem like a distant memory, but the threat and impact to residents, local fire brigades

and volunteers was immense. These grants were part of a \$500,000 commitment from Resilience NSW to fund

WE REALLY MUST TALK ABOUT HOUSING

It seems that barely a week goes by when myself, my staff and/or my office is approached by a family that is about to become homeless. They are desperate and I am helpless. Our local area, in 2021 and 2022, has found itself in the middle of a massive shortage in rental properties and affordable housing. There are a variety of reasons for this, which I will get to soon, but it's extremely important to note that a recent report by Shelter NSW has identified the Hunter and Central Coast as hotspots. The Central Coast is the state's most desperately under-supplied housing area. Cessnock is at number 3: Newcastle at number 4 and Maitland at number 7.

Our Hunter and Central Coast areas are closely linked to each other particularly in regards to employment and housing. A large number of us are constantly moving in and out of each other's LGAs. When I have community meet and greets, almost without fail, one or two people arrive to say hello to their new local MP, given that they have just arrived in the area after having moved from the Central Coast or Newcastle. When I ask why they had moved, almost without fail it is because their previous neighbourhood had become unaffordable. From this new neighbourhood, they would say, they could still drive in/out to their place of

drive. Nobody reading this column needs to be reminded of the incredible tourist destination that the Hunter Vineyards have become. We experience almost 2 million visitors each year. In the past, their accommodation needs have been met by a huge tourist accommodation industry in the vineyards and surrounds. But then along came online booking systems like Airbnb and the various accommodation markets have been turned upside down.

Airbnb has had a huge impact on the number of rental properties in our area available for long term leasing. Landlords weigh up the choice of having a consistent weekly rent, or, take their chances with the less reliable but much higher income from short term rentals to tourists. Good luck to the weekenders and those landlords doing well in this market, but the flipside is that many in our local community that are just looking for a "home" now have very slim pickings. In addition to all of this, for the houses that do at times become available, because there are so few of them, rents are often quite high and well beyond the affordability of single income families, single parent families or in general our low income families. And I won't get started on the casualised workforce that have unpredictable incomes and live in a constant state of fear about next week's roster. NSW needs a plan to solve these housing problems. The evidence shows that the Hunter and Central Coast are at the top of the list of places that need a housing solution urgently. And we simply cannot rely on developers releasing more land to build more houses,

because for those developers it is in their interest to strangle the market of supply so that they can maximise their profits. That is after all the business that developers are

We've long known about AGL plans to close its coal-fired electricity generators earlier than originally planned. Along with other community leaders, I've accepted the inevitability of the closures and have long urged AGL to invest in new electricity generation in the Hunter including gas, hydro, wind, hydrogen, and solar projects, backed with battery storage.

We've also worked with AGL and the unions to ensure Liddell's workforce was taken care of with well-funded voluntary redundancies and the right to transfer to the nearby Bayswater Power Station. The Coalition Government had always accepted Liddell's closure but in the heat of the climate change debate in 2017 it decided to weaponise the issue by attempting to bully AGL into keeping Liddell open well beyond its physical life.

The stunt achieved nothing to protect us from higher electricity prices and blackouts. However, it's likely it won the Government a few extra votes at the 2019 election, as it had hoped. My concern back then was that the Turnbull Government's political games would run interference on AGL's plans for new generation, particularly its plan for a gas peaking station in Tomago. On that matter, I was vindicated. Now, just as the heat appeared to be coming out of the unhelpful climate wars, a new threat to investment plans has world. Don't believe for a moment the Brookfield/ Cannon-Brookes raid on AGL is about our natural environment. Rather, it's about money. Brookfield and Cannon-Brookes claim they can buy AGL, close its coal-fired generator assets earlier, still make money, all the while keeping power prices down and avoiding blackouts. I doubt they can, and most energy experts

agree. Meanwhile AGL says if left alone, it will deliver around

2,000 Megawatts (MW) of renewable generation by 2024 through wind and pumped hydro projects across three states. Battery projects with a combined capacity of 450 MW will provide storage and firming capacity. For perspective, between them, AGL's three existing coal-fired generators are capable of delivering around 6,000 MW of reliable base-load power.

Origin's terrible shock announcement last week that it will close its Eraring generator means the loss of an additional 2,800 MW. In a statement, Brookfield and Cannon-Brookes said they plan to build 8,000 MW of capacity in less time. I doubt that very much. Brookfield as owners, will have an investment advantage over AGL. It doesn't have to worry about green fund managers and will have lower funding costs. In other words, it no doubt believes it can make greater returns running the coal generation assets than AGL has been able to do. This is not primarily about the environment, it's an exercise in economic engineering

What does this all mean for power station workers, electricity prices and electricity reliability? Sadly, I suggest the answer is, nothing good. There is certainly no good news for Hunter power station workers, many of whom thought they had up to 15 more years of work and in any case, found some comfort in AGL's workforce transition plan. Only the most ardent climate ideologues could believe electricity prices will be lower or energy security more assured if Brookfield and Cannon-Brooks are successful in their bid to buy AGL.

DRAFT WATER SHARING PLAN

I sat down last week with the Minister for Water. emerged from the corporate Kevin Anderson, to express my concerns regarding the impact on Tidal Pool Water Users of the changes proposed in the Hunter Unregulated Water Sharing Plan including the cease to pump provisions. I don't believe the proposed changes will achieve the social, economic and environmental goals that we all seek as a society. As a result, I do not support the draft Water Sharing Plan for the Tidal Pool and have requested the Minister review the issue. I was disappointed that I

could not make it to the recent public forum held by the Tidal Pool Water Users but I have heard many of the opinions from the community. I continue to encourage everyone to submit their views on the draft plan and also copy your concerns to my email address upperhunter@parliament.nsw. gov.au.

STRONG INTEREST Commercial interest for almost 40 gigawatts of renewable generation and storage projects has been received by the NSW Government for the Hunter-Central Coast Renewable Energy Zone (REZ).

The registration of interest representing over \$100 billion of potential investment includes 24 solar energy projects, 13 onshore and seven offshore wind energy projects, 35 large-scale batteries and eight pumped hydro projects. The Energy Corporation of NSW (EnergyCo) is in the early stages of planning the Hunter-Central Coast REZ and will be using this information to inform the timing, capacity and boundaries of the REZ. It is expected that the Hunter-Central Coast REZ will be formally declared under the NSW Government's Electricity Roadmap legislation by

mid-year. SMALL BUSINESS SUPPORT

Small businesses that experienced a downturn over summer can now apply for a NSW Government support payment of up to \$5,000 per week.

The program will provide targeted support to businesses with an annual turnover of between \$75,000 and \$50 million that experienced a decline in turnover of at least 40 per cent in January 2022 and the start of February 2022

Antibiotics

Antibiotics are medicines used to treat infections caused by bacteria. Many bacteria are now resistant to commonly used antibiotics. Infections caused by these antibiotic-resistant bacteria are difficult to treat. Wise use of antibiotics can help to slow down the spread of antibiotic resistance. Many illnesses are caused by microorganisms such as bacteria, viruses and fungi. These illnesses are called infections. Antibiotics can only be used to treat infections caused by bacteria. Antibiotics interfere with the growth and increases. Bacterial resistance to function of bacteria, but do not affect viruses or other micro-organisms. Antibiotic resistance

Bacteria can develop resistance to an antibiotic. If this happens, infections caused by the bacteria can no longer be successfully treated with that antibiotic. Some bacteria have now become resistant to most of the antibiotics in common use. Examples of resistant bacteria are methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus (MRSA), vancomycin-resistant enterococci (VRE) and multi-drug-resistant Mycobacterium tuberculosis (MDR-TB). Infections caused by these resistant bacteria are very difficult to treat. Using antibiotics correctly

It is very important to use antibiotics correctly. Antibiotics can only be used to treat bacterial infections. They do not work against viral infections such as the common cold, most sore throats, most sinus infections, most coughs, acute bronchitis and the 'flu'. Viruses and bacteria are completely different types of micro-organisms. When an antibiotic is taken for a viral infection it:

• has no effect against the virus. It will not help a viral infection get better faster or stop it spreading to others • may allow the growth of resistant bacteria. Then, the antibiotic will not work when it is really needed. Bacterial infections that are resistant to antibiotics are a lot more difficult to treat and may not be curable

 may cause side effects such as stomach upset, diarrhoea and thrush

• may cause an allergic reaction. If antibiotics are used often, and when there is no need for them, the growth of bacteria that are resistant to antibiotics antibiotics is spreading. In the future, many of our common antibiotics may not work.

Self care

There are a number of simple things that you can do to help reduce the spread of antibiotic resistance.

Use antibiotics wisely • Do not ask your doctor to prescribe antibiotics. Instead, ask how best to treat your symptoms. Remember that most coughs, colds, sore throats and runny noses are caused by viruses, which cannot be killed by antibiotics. Many minor bacterial infections will also clear up on their own and do not need antibiotics. · Carefully follow the instructions for taking antibiotics. Take them for as long as you have been told to, even if you feel better. Sometimes, your doctor may give you a repeat prescription for a second course of antibiotics. Always ask your doctor whether you need to use the repeat. • Never share antibiotics with family or friends.

• Do not use antibiotics left over from a previous infection, or old prescriptions for antibiotics, without first checking with your doctor.

Gout

Gout is a common and very painful type of arthritis. It occurs when uric acid crystals form in and around a joint. It mainly affects men over 40 years of age. Gout can usually be well controlled with medicines and changes to diet.

Uric acid (urate) is one of the body's waste products. If uric acid builds up in the bloodstream, it can settle in and around joints as crystals. Uric acid crystals can irritate the joint, causing inflammation (swelling) and pain.

People who get gout usually have a high level of uric acid in their blood. Gout usually begins in one joint, most often the big toe joint, but it may spread to more joints. It can affect foot, ankle, knee, hand, wrist and elbow joints. Signs and symptoms

A gout attack usually comes on suddenly, often overnight. Common symptoms are: • joint inflammation, with swelling, redness and heat

• a very tender and painful joint, which is sensitive to touch. Sometimes even the

weight of a bed sheet can cause severe pain. If a fever is also present, it is important to get medical advice as soon as possible. Without treatment, a gout attack usually lasts about one week. After the first gout attack, more attacks are likely to occur.

The time between gout attacks can be days, weeks, months or years. If gout is not managed correctly, the time between attacks may get shorter, attacks may last longer and more joints may be affected. Repeated gout attacks can permanently damage joints, and may also lead to the formation of kidney stones. **Risk factors**

Some people are more likely to get gout than others. Factors that may play a role in causing gout include:

- a family history of gout
- · drinking too much alcohol, particularly beer • being overweight or overeating
- · joint injury or surgery

• some medical conditions (e.g. high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes, kidney disease)

- · some medicines (e.g. fluid tablets, cancer chemotherapy) crash dieting or fasting
- not drinking enough fluids
- eating foods that increase uric acid in the blood. Foods linked to gout

Foods high in purines may increase uric acid levels in blood. Some of these foods have been linked to gout attacks. They include:

• meat, especially red meat and offal (e.g. liver, kidneys, heart)

FINANCE If you are planning on borrowing money to buy a property, then before you start looking at properties you may want to begin organising your finance. You can get things started by speaking to a lender or mortgage broker and consider applying for 'preapproval'.

Finance pre-approval is when a lender indicates that they may be willing to lend you a certain amount of money subject to certain conditions. Pre-approval can give you an indication about how much you could borrow from a particular lender but is not an offer of

a loan. One benefit of having finance pre-approval is knowing how much you can potentially borrow and understanding what the repayments would be for this amount. It can also make the process of unconditional loan approval faster when you do find a property to purchase. Once you have found a property and had an offer accepted then you can formally make the loan application. The lending body will value the property to determine whether the property is adequate security for the loan. The lending body lends a percentage of the valuation of a property, not a percentage of the

purchase price. The lending body will then issue unconditional written loan approval which indicates that a lender has taken all of your financial information as well as the valuation of the property into account and is willing to move ahead with a home loan for a specific amount for a specific property. Another important aspect to

consider with the monetary side of buying a property is how you are going to pay the deposit. The standard deposit is 10% of the purchase price, it is sometimes possible to negotiate payment of a 5% deposit or payment by way of deposit bond if you do not have the cash but that is subject to agreement by the vendor. Once you have considered your financial position of how much you can potentially borrow and how you will pay the deposit it is time to start looking at

properties. 2. AFTER YOU HAVE FOUND THE RIGHT PROPERTY

Once you have found a property you want to buy you can engage a solicitor or conveyancer to review the contract and act on your behalf in the conveyancing process either before you make an offer, or after you have had an offer accepted. Whichever way you decide to proceed it is important that you obtain advice before you sign the contract.

The conveyancing process involves the transfer of ownership to you and making sure that you get a good title to the property. Your representative will review the contract of sale and provide you with advice, they will also negotiate any amendments to the contract where necessary. Once any amendments have been agreed you can then sign the contract which will be held by your representative. during the five-day Once you have had your offer accepted then you should consider arranging for a pest and building inspection to be conducted. This can help identify any structural or pest problems with the building. If you are buying the property with someone else, you will need to decide the type of ownership you will have. There are two types of shared ownership:

o Joint Tenants,

where the property is held by two or more people in equal shares. If one dies, his/ her share goes to the survivor; and o Tenants in Common, where the property is held by two or more people in equal or unequal shares. If one dies, his/her share goes to a person named in his/her will.

It is at this time that you will also need to apply for formal loan approval, as outlined above the lending body will value the property and if everything is in order, they will provide unconditional written finance approval. **3. EXCHANGE**

When all the reports are in order and the loan is formally approved and you are satisfied with the contract then you will need to make payment of the deposit, this will usually be paid in to the real estate agent's trust account. Your solicitor will then organise the exchange of contracts, exchange involves the purchaser signed contract being sent to the vendor's solicitor who will date the contracts and then return the vendor signed contract to your solicitor - this completes the process of exchange. After the exchange of contracts, there is provision in the Contract for a five-day cooling-off period. This means you can change your mind and cancel the contract. If you decide not to proceed cooling-off period you will forfeit 0.25% of the purchase price to the seller. Alternatively, the vendor may request that you waive the cooling off period, if you agree then there is no cooling -off period if you instruct your solicitor to sign a Section 66W Certificate which waives your cooling-off rights and the contract is binding from the date of exchange.

Looming deadline is no holiday for short term rental property owners

Holiday homes without a proper fire safety plan will not be able to accept bookings from March 1 under new regulations.

The Department of Planning, Industry and Environment (DPIE) is standing firm on the deadline which is part of a new state-wide regulatory framework to overhaul the growing sector. Since 1 November 2021, anyone wishing to lease their property for short term rental accommodation (STRA) must be registered with NSW Fair Trading. A mandatory Code of Conduct for all participants has also been implemented.

The changes also allow facilitators - in addition to letting agents – to provide property management services for such accommodation. Why the change?

Technology has made it quicker and easier to book short term rental properties online. The economic upside for homeowners and investors is that empty-houses or rooms can be used to generate additional income.

The new code of conduct aims to address concerns of inconsiderate or anti-social behaviour from shortterm tenants. It applies to booking platforms, hosts, letting agents and facilitators.

Under the changes, NSW Fair Trading can take disciplinary action such as a monetary penalty or a 'strike' against a property, host or guest, for serious breaches.

It may also list non-compliant participants on an Exclusions Register, effectively stopping them from taking future bookings. Owner corporations can now also adopt by-laws restricting types of short-term rental accommodation within its strata scheme. Not as easy as it sounds

Already some 33,424 properties have joined the STRA register in NSW. The new rules don't apply to caravans, tents or moveable dwellings. All dwellings must comply with fire and safety regulations, including the installation of smoke alarms powered by mains electricity or nonremovable batteries with a minimum life of 10 years. "In light of the pandemic and lockdowns, we gave the community an extra four months to give them plenty of time to implement the fire safety standards," said a spokesperson for the DPIE "All registered properties must have a fire safety plan finalised by 1 March 2022, including clear evacuation diagrams, alarms, extinguishers, and emergency contacts."

REINSW member Rebecca Cribbin, who runs a holiday letting business in the Southern Highlands, supports the changes but believes the timing couldn't be worse with current delays finding tradespeople due to the pandemic. She employed a company to carry out fire safety inspections and draw up evacuation diagrams for almost 400 properties last October. After months of negotiating, the company pulled out of the project because logistically the project was too large. "It is okay if you are a mum and dad operator with an Airbnb but when you look after a lot of properties, like us, it is a very difficult task," Ms Cribbin said.

"While we had a fair amount of warning, it wasn't just a simple checklist, and some properties need upgrades. Regulators may have the best of intentions, but they don't understand the logistics of the implementation of their red tape." Some STRA investors have opted to move their

property into long-term lease because of upfront and ongoing costs. Facilitator versus letting agents

Central Coast agent Cathy Baker, from Belle Property Killcare, is concerned inexperienced facilitators with no qualifications have been given equal footing to manage holiday bookings. They are permitted to create listings, rental pricing, guest vetting, check-in services and organising cleaning for up to 20 properties.

But unlike letting agents, facilitators do not need a certificate of registration or licence to operate which she describes as 'ludicrous'.

"There are so many moving parts to short term leases, and they may not have the competency to deal with the conflict resolutions, the trades and bonds and things like that," said Ms Baker, who is a committee member on the REINSW residential sales chapter.

"By giving them a different title of 'facilitator', they have acknowledged that they are someone different to a managing agent. It is almost like they have allowed the holiday business to be de-regulated.'

REINSW: FIRST HOME BUYER SCHEME "A SLAP IN THE FACE"

Despite the announcement to coincide with the by-elections, there are still no details available on the NSW Government's latest scheme in which it proposes to contribute to the cost of a first home buyer's home in return for part ownership of their property. But what is clear, says the Real Estate Institute of NSW (REINSW), is Government's admission it can't solve the affordable housing crisis for first home buyers. REINSW CEO Tim McKibbin says the absurd proposal is a bizarre attempt to address the symptoms of the problem, not the problem itself: lack of supply.

'This proposal is not only poorly conceived, it is actually a slap in the face to first home buyers," Mr McKibbin says.

"First, there's stamp duty to consider. A first home buyer purchases their home with help from the Government and pays stamp duty. The Government takes that stamp duty to refund itself for the equity it has now taken in the first home buyer's property.

"It creates a bizarre scenario in which the first home buyer is, in part, providing finance for the Government to acquire a portion of their home.

"For first home buyers who have waited a long time and made major sacrifices to enter the market, this is a bitter pill to swallow, and with the median house price in Sydney now over \$1 million and therefore not exempt from stamp duty, any suggestion that this will help people overcome the stamp duty barrier is clearly wrong. "Many other questions arise too. How might the Government's interest in a property impact a first home buyer's ability to secure finance from a bank? Does the Government stand to benefit from increases in the value of the property, particularly if the first home buyer makes improvements?

"The potential pressure on family relationships poses another threat, as there is clearly an expectation in the Government's scheme that mum and dad will liquidate some of the equity in their home to assist their children. "It raises difficult questions, like what will this do to the relationship if they refuse? There are already many expectations placed on the Bank of Mum and Dad and this proposal potentially adds to these.

'There are many ripple effects such a proposal could have which could distort the market even more. The last thing we need is further Government intervention in a free market which contributes to the demand side of the equation when it's the lack of supply that is fuelling the affordability crisis," he says.

Mr McKibbin says the timing of the scheme's announcement, just prior to the by-elections, shows that the NSW Government understands voters' concerns about housing affordability.

Unfortunately, it also shows Government does not understand how to solve the problem, he says. "First we had the property tax and now we have this equity stake scheme. Both seek to treat the symptoms of the affordability issue without addressing the cause, which is the undersupply of homes and Government's addiction to property taxes," Mr McKibbin says.



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



Peter Franz Schweizer (born November 24, 1964) is an American political consultant and writer. He is the president of the Government Accountability Institute (GAI), senior editor-at-large of far-right media organization Breitbart News and a former fellow at the conservative Hoover Institution. Schweizer wrote Clinton Cash, a 2015 book discussing donations made to the Clinton Foundation by foreign entities and Bill and Hillary Clinton's income after they left the White House in 2001. The book was criticized for speculation, conclusions not supported by the evidence presented, and for factual errors which were corrected in the Kindle edition.

While in high school, Schweizer attended the National Conservative Students Conference at George Washington University and was a member of Young America's Foundation (YAF). He graduated from Kentridge High School in Kent, Washington in 1983. Schweizer then attended George Washington University and, subsequently, graduate school at St Cross College of Oxford University on YAF scholarships. He was on YAF staff starting 1993 and edited its magazine.

In 2012, Schweizer and Steve Bannon co-founded the Government Accountability Institute, a conservative think-tank whose stated goal is to "investigate and expose government corruption, misuse of taxpayer money and crony capitalism." Schweizer is president of the organization. It is registered as a nonpartisan organization, but largely focuses on the Democratic Party.

Schweizer's early work at Senator Jeremiah Denton's National Forum Foundation (NFF) focused on the Cold War. He co-authored a National Review article with Denton's son, James (often cited as Jim), "Murdering SDI", about the suspicious deaths of several European officials who supported the Strategic Defense Initiative. While at the NFF, Schweizer also published a report titled "The Meaning and Destiny of the Sandinista Revolution'

In 2012, journalist Steve Kroft used Schweizer's work as the basis for a report on CBS's 60 Minutes about Congressional insider trading. Titled 'Insiders: The road to the STOCK act", Kroft relied heavily on Schweizer's reporting in his 2011 book Throw Them All Out, which CBS independently verified, to demonstrate how members of Congress trade stocks unethically, and inoculate themselves from prosecution. The following year, Kroft revisited Schweizer's work to create another 60 Minutes report on how members of Congress use the funds of their political action committees for private inurement. A year later, Schweizer authored another GAI report about the Obama administration, which said that President Barack Obama failed to meet often enough with Secretary of Health and Human Services Kathleen Sebelius during the rollout of the Affordable Care Act (ACA). He publicized the report with a story for *Politico* titled "When Barry Met Kathy: Almost never, it turns out. Schweizer's report relied on publicly available information about Obama's schedule. Three months later, after making FOIA requests of non-public documents. The Hill found evidence of multiple meetings which both scheduled to attend, including seven specifically about the ACA. Detailed Cattle report for Gunnedah Last reported 22nd February 2022

There was a reduced supply this week. Yearlings made up a large percentage with fair supplies in the other categories. The quality of the offering was generally good, however quite mixed from a breed perspective. The majority of the cattle presented in forward to well finished condition. A similar panel of buyers were in attendance with no extras. There was a very good quality penning of heavy weight vealer steers. They attracted strong restocker competition and sold to dearer trends. The high quality accounting for strong improvement. The heifer portion also sold to dearer trends, both to restockers and local trade. Medium and heavy weight yearling steers to restock and feed saw little change in the market trends, with most price change affected by breed and quality variations. Improved quality negated some of the price falls on a mostly cheaper market for medium and heavy weight yearling heifers. Detailed Cattle report for HRLX Singleton Last reported 23rd February 2022

Consignments decreased marginally and the quality was mixed, however there were extra numbers of the better bred drafts this week. The majority were younger cattle more suited for the restocker and lot feeder buyers, with numbers of the higher yielding pens to suite the local butchers and processors also penned. The market trend was cheaper although the better bred lots are still selling well. The over 200kg vealer steers to the restockers slipped 20c, with breed and quality contributing in places, as prices ranged from 500c to 748c, and up to 806c/kg for the lighter end. The same weight heifer portion also to the restockers eased 20c, and made from 520c to 664c/kg. The yearling steers trended cheaper, as the lighter weights to the restockers ranged from 470c to 640c/kg depending on breed. The medium and heavy weights to the restockers and feeder buyers received from 458c to 618c/kg. Overall there were extra crossbreds this week and this contributed to a cheaper market, with the exception of the popular breeds, they sold at similar rates, week-on-week. The cows also trended marginally dearer, however yield and quality did contribute in places. The over 200kg vealer steers to the restockers lost 10c and ranged from 606c to 740c/ kg. The same weight heifer portion also to the restockers trended 10c cheaper and sold from 608c to 680c/kg, as the heavier drafts maintained firm prices. 

Kenneth Branagh has taken for an audience, more on some of the world's most famous tales - from Shakespeare's Henry V to Agatha Christie's Murder On The Orient Express to fairy tale classic Cinderella - but this time out, it's personal, as he steps back into his own past for the semiautobiographical Belfast. As the old joke goes, everything was in black and white back then, and so it is, for the most part in Branagh's film, which travels from a brief colour tour of Belfast today back over a wall and back to a monochrome summer of 69 in Belfast. To be specific, the date is August 15, one day after the Battle of the Bogside riot ended,

which many historians consider to be the first major event of what came to be known as "the Troubles'

Although beginning with an outbreak of violence on a working-class residential street - at that point populated by both Catholic and Protestant families, which was soon set to change this is a film that is as much about the intimacy of community and family as conflict, with events seen from the point of view of young Buddy (Jude Hill, a real discovery in his first role). Much of the initial intimacy we see is a

product of proximity. These are terraced streets of small houses, packed with large families, whose children fill the street with their games even as barricades begin to spring up. Nine-year-old Buddy is the perfect companion interested in getting a Catholic girl in his class to notice him than the trouble flaring up on the street, but impacted by the rising tensions anyway. Branagh has an easy way with a camera and isn't afraid of sentiment, but he offsets this with a good line in comedy that cuts through the softer stuff like an astringent.

There's mischief afoot as Buddy's older cousin ropes him in on a raid on the local corner shop - her dismay at what he takes will give a chuckle to many who were kids in the era - but there's also a nod to darker times ahead. His cousin, like Buddy, a Protestant, loftily informs him that you can tell who the Catholic kids are by their names but then adds, "You have to get taught it". "Who teaches you?" Buddy wonders, the question hanging in the air, reminding us that prejudice is something we

learn not that we're born with. The ability to smuggle in stronger themes while not losing sight of the mainstream entertainment he's crafting has always been part of Branagh's armoury. But the serious stuff never gets in the way of more

pops taking time out in the outhouse or mum on the phone in the hall. Here we spend a few months with Buddy and his extended family, as his pa (Jamie Dornan) tries to persuade his ma (Caitriona Balfe) that it's time to leave the tensions of Belfast behind them and head for England, while his granny (Judi Dench) and pops (Ciaran Hinds) share sweetly worked scenes as they grapple with the ageing process and the prospect of their family moving away. The tension between ma and pa runs through the film, encapsulating domestic emotions that fed off and reflected the increasing pressures in the wider community. One could quibble that a night of big band music and romance feels almost as though it's popped in from a neighbouring musical, but the child's perspective helps to ease us over these sort of humps, as Buddy experiences things in the heightened way of the young - also indicated by the way that TV programmes, films and even the theatre are shot in

everyday observations, like

full colour as though dragging the youngster into his own private Oz. Although this community would go on to be largely defined by strife in the eyes of the world for many years to follow, Branagh makes sure that what we chiefly feel is the love.



Emotional scenes as iVote court challenge hears results of 39 council elections now in doubt ABC Illawarra

Councillors have shared their "shame" and "embarrassment" at being drawn into a Supreme Court case sparked by NSW Electoral Commission's iVote crash and vowed not to run

again if forced into another election. The court is being urged to throw out the local government election results of Singleton, Kempsey, and Shellharbour Ward A after its electronic voter system failed to accept online votes at the December 4 polls.

The commission has named 22 defendants from across all three councils in the case.

On the second day of the hearing, Kempsey Deputy Mayor Alexandra Wyatt said the process had left her so traumatised she would not contest another election.

"I can't afford it and I won't take any other money out of my family's

savings," she said.

"There's no guarantee I won't spend another \$5,000 and be sitting here again because another system failed.

"For me being a defendant [in the] Supreme Court doesn't produce an image of a good person but a criminal, a bad person, or someone that has committed an offence or crime."

"I will just go home and crawl up in the fetal position and emerge when I no longer feel shame, embarrassment, and humiliation."

Kempsey councillor Liz Campbell broke down crying telling the court how being dragged into the case had exacerbated a "personal and vicious mistruth" campaign against her.

While re-elected with more than the quota she had not been returned as mayor, and locals were now suggesting she was challenging the outcome. "The inference being I am challenging the results

of the election because I lost," she said. Holding back tears again she called the case a "deep miscarriage of justice".

"To find yourself a defendant in the Supreme Court defending the fact that you were democratically elected is distressing and it has

taken a personal toll on me." Shellharbour Ward A councillor Maree Edwards told the court the situation was "entirely" the

commission's fault. "It is a monumental error and the commission's failure is now our cross to publicly bear," she said. Cr Edwards' voice trembled as she spoke to the

court over a video link. "For those of us who have participated willingly in these proceedings it has been harrowing and all consuming," she said.

"My very ill and elderly father was delighted when I was a successful candidate. He along with my family have had to share my stress and dismay due to the actions of the Electoral Commissioner.



The counsel for Shellharbour Council argued that declaring an election void based on statistical modelling and the assumptions behind it was inherently flawed.

It also argued the costs of another election would be \$500,000 to council or taxpayers.

As many as 39 councils in doubt Kempsey councillor Ian Bain introduced

mathematical scientist Vanessa Teague to criticise the modelling and data being used by the commission to identify problems with the vote.

"What I am trying to explain is that the selection of these three councils is really arbitrary," he said. Dr Teague said because of way the data had been interpreted by the commission the results of 36 additional councils should be in jeopardy. "There is

actually just as good a reason to suggest that quite a number of other

councils are comparably in doubt," she said.

Kiama MP and former state government minister Gareth Ward is

representing Shellharbour Deputy Mayor Kellie Marsh and told the court he "feared and doubted" a fresh election would be fair.

"There is no doubting my client's election. She romped it in," he said.

"Her election and its legitimacy have not once been challenged.

"This is not a case where there was rampant widespread voter fraud, or lost ballot boxes, or ballot stuffing. There were no riots our outbreak of warfare that suspended an election.

"This was an old-fashioned stuff up.

"This is matter for the parliamentary committee

that oversees the Electoral Commission. "The commissioner has done absolutely the right thing by bringing this matter to this honourable court to consider, but the relief the commissioner seeks is disproportionate, undemocratic, and unfair."

Mr Ward also warned a self-funded, independent candidate like his client would be at a $\$ disadvantage in recontesting the position in the Labor-leaning Illawarra where the major party would "mobilise" its resources.

After two days of hearings Justice Robert-Beech Jones reserved his judgement.

"I will give this the utmost urgency, but bearing in mind the novelty and complexity, even when I deliver reasons ... I certainly won't make a declaration of voidness on the spot."

He said if any declaration to void the election were to be made it would not happen before the looming federal election.



SINGLETON COUNCIL STATEMENT – SUPREME COURT PROCEEDINGS

The NSW Electoral Commission has issued the following statement in regards to Supreme Court proceedings concerning iVote and the 2021 NSW Local Government elections:

"In early January 2022, the NSW Electoral Commissioner commenced proceedings in the Supreme Court of New South Wales seeking a ruling about the validity of the 2021 NSW Local Government elections for councillors in Kempsey Shire Council, Singleton Council and Shellharbour City Council (Ward A). The proceedings were heard in the Supreme Court before his Honour Justice Beech-Jones CJ at CL on 22 and 23 February 2022. His Honour reserved his judgment and will make a decision at a later time.

"During the hearing, representatives for the NSW Electoral Commissioner stated that the proceedings were brought because of an issue with respect to the iVote system which was not caused by, and does not reflect in any way upon, the conduct of any of the defendants to the proceeding.

"In particular, representatives for the NSW Electoral Commissioner emphasised that that the naming of the individual councillors as defendants involved no suggestion of any wrongdoing or impropriety on their parts. Rather, the individual councillors declared to have been elected in each of the affected elections were named as defendants only because they were legally necessary parties, in that their positions may be

affected by the Court's orders (depending on what the Court decides). Public officials are from time to time named as defendants in litigation for that reason. The NSW Electoral Commissioner wishe clear that any suggestion that that circumstance reflects negatively upon the persons named as defendants is unfounded.

"The NSW Electoral Commissioner will make a further statement when the Supreme Court delivers its judgment."

Singleton Council General Manager Jason Linnane attended the hearing in Sydney this week. Following the hearing, he said:

"The matter was heard Tuesday 22 February and Wednesday 23 February in the Supreme Court of NSW

"While this is a very unwanted distraction and waste of resources for Council and the other defendants, I was very pleased to hear the barrister representing the Electoral Commissioner publicly state that there has been no act or omission on the behalf of council or any of the candidates to cause this situation. This reiterates our previously stated view.

"While we very much desire a decision as soon as possible, we appreciate the need for the proper consideration of the matter by His Honour. For Council, our view is that we have a properly declared governing body and we will keep on with the job of serving our community while we await the decision."



Choose an area near your back door to pave an entertaining patio. If possible, pave a large enough area to fit an outdoor setting and heating unit. Covering the space with an awning or pergola helps to frame the space and makes it feel more like an alfresco room, as well as shelter it from the elements, adding to the liveability of the space. 2. LAWN LOVING

Winter can be a tough time for lawns but there are ways in which you can prevent this through careful preparation.

Choose a slow release fertiliser and feed your lawn throughout autumn ensuring it is healthy and in good condition coming into winter. The north eastern part of Australia gets less rain than in the stormy summer months so if you live in this area, it's important to keep your lawn hydrated during what can be cool and dry conditions. In the southern parts of the country where there is more rain during winter, you can switch to watering as needed. You'll know when grass is thirsty by watching for curling of the leaves or the appearance of dry spots.

3. CHOOSE YOUR PLANTS WISELY If you are in the process of renovating your yard, it's a good time to consider plant and flower choices. You can't go wrong with camellias, which will flower for over six months a year in the right conditions. If you've got potted plants, take the opportunity to consider their position in the yard and if you can, move them to an area in the garden that may be better suited to capturing more sunlight. Sasanqua camellias are perfect for forming a fast-growing hedge that can be kept clipped to around 2–3m.

4. OUTDOOR LIGHTING

With those short winter days, a well-lit garden is ideal if you want to continue entertaining into the colder months.

Lighting can completely change the look and feel of an area – opt for a floodlight that can be specifically directed at an area or festoon lighting to add ambience (look for the IP44 rating for indoor and outdoor use in all conditions). "Outdoor lighting allows us to create an atmosphere for different purposes whether it's for late night dinners or nights by the fire pit," says Jason. Fairy lights make for a cosy get-together around the firepit.

5. WARM IT UP

No garden is winter ready without a source of heat. Opt for a mobile heater to provide flexibility, or a stylish yet functional fixed strip heater that is perfect if you have an overhead pergola. Backyard fire pits are becoming increasingly popular and can add a real wow factor to your outdoor space.

Fire pits are the new water features; they are a great feature in any backyard, and require a lot less maintenance than a water feature. A fire pit will transform your backyard into a cosy and inviting space,
